Caulfield fights to retain its name

CAULFIELD Council has publicly announced that it supports the proposed new municipality of McKinnon which would comprise the former City of Caulfield and that part of the City of Moorabbin, north of South Rd and west of Warrigal Rd. It does not however, support the name 'McKinnon'.

Caulfield Mayor, Cr James Barrett said the name 'McKinnon' was totally unaccepted by the Council and the community.

"McKinnon is the name of a suburb and road in the proposed new City which does not reflect the image of a whole municipality. The name does nothing in terms of unifying a new municipality," he said.

Council has put strong arguments to the Local Government Board for the name Caulfield to remain and this has been supported by the community including a significant proportion of the northern Moorabbin

residents, the Victorian Amateur Turf Club, Caulfield Racecourse Reserve Trustees and Monash University - Caulfield Campus.

At a public meeting held on October 27, where about 200 residents attended at extremely short notice, the decision to retain the name of Caulfield was unanimous.

At the same meeting, the community demanded petitions to be prepared to seek wider support from the community to keep the name Caulfield. A similar petition was called for seeking the views of the community in Caulfield and northern Moorabbin on the proposed boundaries of the new City.

In addition to the responses

from the public meeting there were over 100 calls to Council's Hotline from those persons unable to attend the meeting.

"The responses from the survey's, hotline and public meeting, clearly indicate that the community of the City of Caulfield want Caulfield to be the name of their City," said Cr Barrett. "Council will continue to fight for the retention of Caulfield, however, if this cannot be accepted then the new community should be granted the right to name their new municipality."

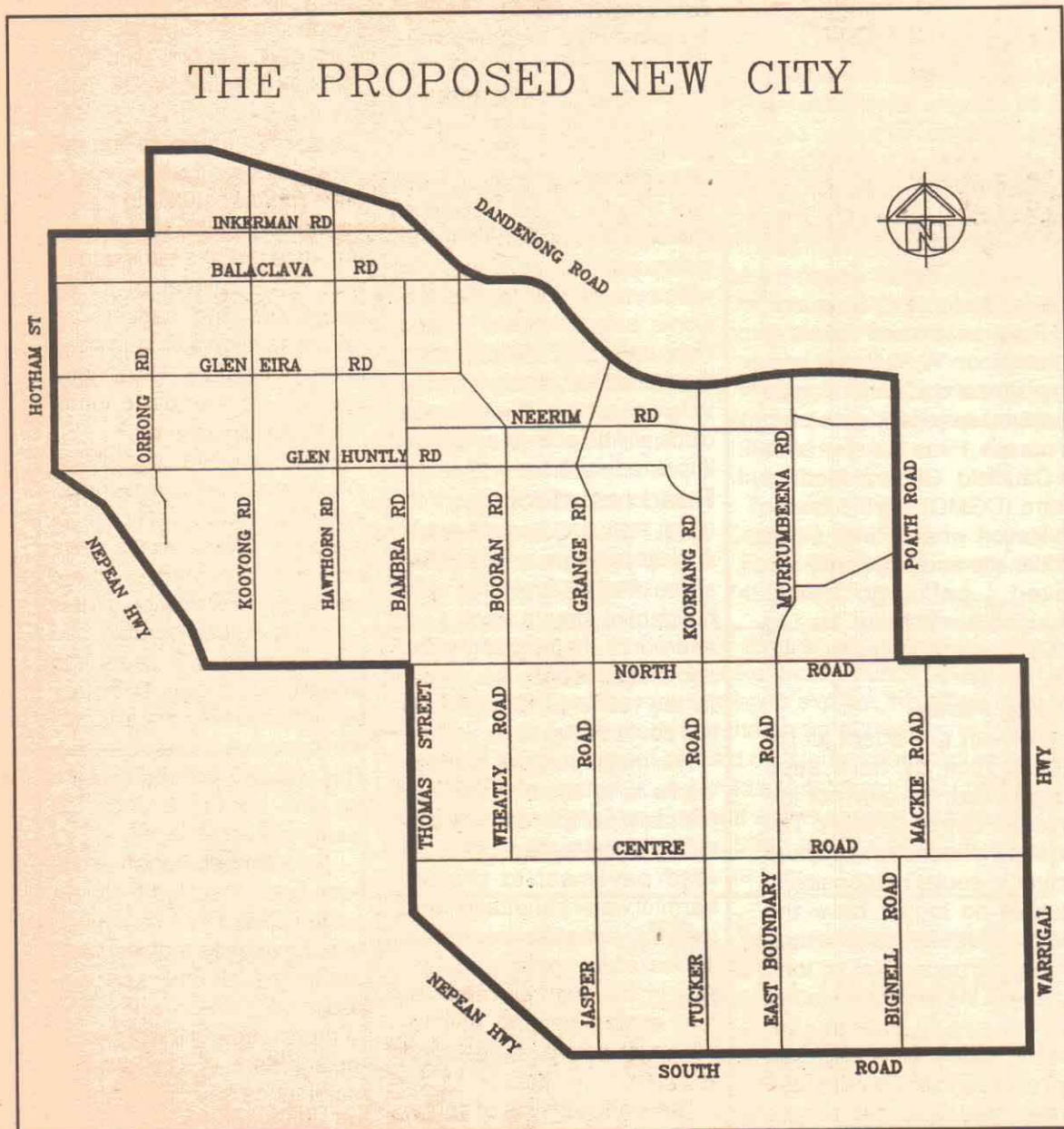

LOCAL LAW COLUMN

Keep your trees well pruned

THERE is nothing worse than being slapped in the face or dripped on by a wet branch as you casually walk along the footpath. If you have ever been obstructed by a tree or shrub hanging over the fence, don't curse the Council - it is up to the property owner to keep trees and shrubs under control. If a Council officer leaves a notice for you to cut back your trees, you must do so within 14 days. Trees must be cut to a height of three metres above the ground and vertically in line with your property boundary. If you fail to comply with the notice, Council will carry out the work and bill the owner. For details, contact Council's local law department on 524 3381.

Engineering update

Resurfacing of athletics track

CAULFIELD Council's athletics facility at Duncan MacKinnon Park is soon to be upgraded with the installation of a new synthetic polyurethane running surface.

This will bring the already popular venue up to an international standard, vastly improving the conditions for track users. The contract has been organised by Council's engineering department following extensive consultation between Council, the committee of management, and various sporting bodies affiliated with this regional facility. The existing worn rubberised bitumen surface will be removed, a new asphalt base layer installed and then the polyurethane surface laid over the top.

The contract has been let to Wm. Loud (Aust) Pty Ltd with works planned for commencement late this month. The cost of the project will be approximately \$420,000 with funding provided by the Council and the committee of management with a grant of \$50,000 from the State Government. Once works commence, the track will be unavailable for use until works are completed in mid February 1995, after which time athletes ranging from the veterans to the little athletics clubs will be able to enjoy the improved surface.

Road resurfacing

CAULFIELD Council has an annual program to resurface approximately one ninth of its residential streets each year and works are programmed to commence in early November for the 1994/95 year end. This will cover 100 streets.

The major purpose of these works is to improve the skid resistance of the roads by providing a new surface, seal the road pavement to prevent harmful water penetration and thereby increase pavement life, take out some irregularities in the road pavements, and enable general maintenance of previously patched areas.

The work consists of spraying a thin film of a bitumen based emulsion onto the road surface and this is then overlaid with 7mm (1/4") stone which is rolled onto the emulsion.

The road is then left for approximately one to two weeks before any loose material is swept up - this is to allow sufficient time for the materials to

bind to the road surface.

Oakleigh Rd reconstruction

OAKLEIGH Rd, between Koornang Rd and Murrumbeena Rd will be one of the major road reconstructions in this year's program.

The project will involve installation of new concrete kerb and channel on both sides of the road, installation of stormwater drainage and re-sheeting of the road pavement with new asphalt paving.

Council has recently advertised this project for tender and envisages to appoint a successful contractor later this month. The project will be funded by the Federal Government Local Roads Program.

Glen Huntly Park landscape improvements

GLEN HUNTLY Park has recently undergone some landscape improvement works as part of Caulfield Council's 1993/94 Capital Works Program.

Council's urban design department prepared a master plan for the parkland. The overall aim of the plan was to enhance the aesthetic quality and visual appeal to users, spectators and passers-by, and to develop a unique character for the park. The master plan will be a guide to future landscaping in the park.

Works have been completed in the barbecue/playground areas in the south west corner of the park. These works have included patterned concrete paving and installation of new seats. A timber pergola has been erected with seats and picnic tables inside. To further enhance this area visually, garden beds have been created. This will also provide screening and enclosure once the plants are established.

New timber bench seats have been installed throughout the park. The pine log bollards have been replaced with decorative chain-linked bollards.

Future works will include the replacement of the existing metal fence and upgrading of the playground equipment is scheduled for 1995/96.

About 30 deciduous autumn colouring trees have been planted which will provide a vibrant display of yellow, orange and red foliage each year. A number of evergreen trees, including conifers and gum trees have also been planted. Future planting will include more than 50 indigenous trees.

"This proposal is totally rejected by Caulfield Council and its community," said Cr Barrett.

It is imperative that, in an effort to retain the Caulfield name, the community write to state government ministers includ-

ing the Hon. Roger Hallam, Minister for Local Government, 17th floor, Myer House, 250 Elizabeth St, Melbourne, strongly supporting retention of the City of Caulfield name.

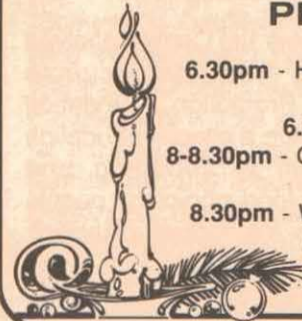

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Local care centre has plenty to offer

THE Caulfield Community Care Centre, 240 Kooyong Rd, Caulfield South provides community health services throughout the Caulfield municipality.

The Centre has a wide range of direct care services, health promotion and health education programs, and is involved in many community work activities. These services and activities are available to people who live, work or study in the Caulfield municipality.

The direct care services include dietetics, occupational therapy, community health nursing, social work, physiotherapy, podiatry, clinical psychology and speech pathology. Clients may be seen on an individual basis either at the Centre or in their home.

Twenty eight regular health education programs are offered. Examples of these programs include:

- healthy weight and lifestyle
- relaxation and stress management
- parenting
- heart-lung resuscitation

The Centre is also actively involved in community work. The Community and Resource Extension Service (CARES) provides an invaluable service, visiting at home, shopping, driving, assistance with group outings and in the pool, and other small in-house tasks as required by the community.

Self-help groups such as the Alzheimers Disease and Related Disorders Society (ADARDS) and the Arthritis Self-help Groups are encouraged and supported by the Centre.

In 1992, the Centre set up the 'Access' program from Community Services Victoria. 'Access' is a service available to people with an intellectual disability who require specialised assistance to access and

integrate into community based services.

This year the Centre received funding from the Victorian Health Promotion Foundation to develop a special education program in shopping and healthy food choice for people with an intellectual disability. The project is now well underway and a kit will be developed and released by February 1995.

The Centre also received funding from the Department of Health and Community Services and the Alfred Group of Hospitals to pilot a discharge brokerage program. The program provides services for patients discharged earlier from the Caulfield General Medical Centre acute wards, than had been possible with the traditional community services.

The Centre provides Do-Care. Do-Care aims to increase the social networks of older isolated people through the establishment of a one-to-one friendship with a volunteer.

The Centre also operates a needle Syringe Exchange program.

These are just a few examples of the wide range of services and activities available at the Caulfield Community Care Centre. If you would like to know more about the Centre, call 523 6666.

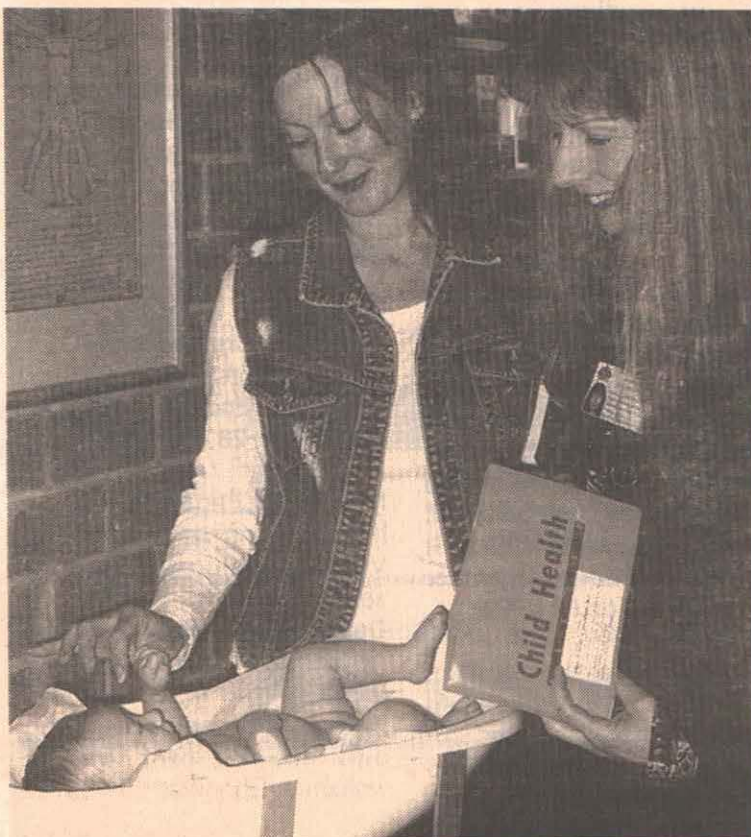


Child health centre moves into local pharmacy

In education, students of high intellectual potential may apply to the Foundation for advice, fees, fares and necessary items such as books, computer paper etc. for their participation in out of school intellectual enrichment activities. Examples of these are the *Tournament of Minds*, *Mentor Programs*; *CRA National Science Summer School*; *International Olympiads in Biology, Chemistry, Mathematics, Physics*; *BHP Engineering Summer School*; *Mathematics Summer School*; *Australian Academy for Youth*; *Junior ANZAAS*; *Alliance Francaise Pre-VCE Vacation Courses*; *MUNA*; *Rotary*; and *Shell Australia's Operation Livewire*.

Equipment, clothing, fees and accommodation costs are often expenses participants have to find before they can take part in state, national or international non-sponsored sporting competitions. Some sports are given support through the Victorian Institute of Sport, and some aren't.

To compliment the compost bins already available for purchase from the Council, residents can now purchase the **Worm Factory.**

For several years Caulfield Council has sold 210 and 280 litre compost bins at very competitive prices in order to encourage residents to compost garden wastes on their properties, thereby reducing the quantity of waste placed in garbage bins for tipsite disposal.

Both the compost bin and worm factory are made from recycled plastic. The worm factory is a container with lid and internal trays which enable food scraps and other wastes to be reduced by worms to form a rich organic soil conditioner.

The compost bins are more suited to garden wastes which take longer to degrade. The cost of the worm factory is \$44 which includes an instruction manual and optional support legs. It is necessary to purchase an initial supply of worms for the process. A list of worm growers is available.

Residents are welcome to inspect the compost bins and worm factory at the Council depot, Manchester Gve, Glen Huntly.

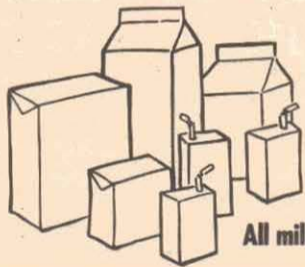

of the Neurological Unit.

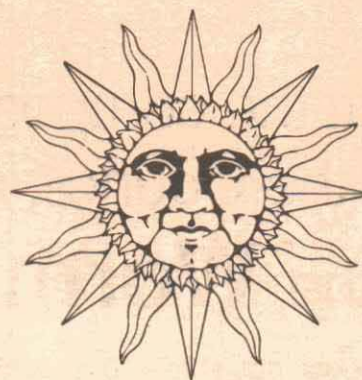

this vehicle is that it is purpose built and the wheelchair hoist, together with the quality and comfort of the van, ensures the patients feel secure and comfortable. Additionally, as the van does not require a specially endorsed licence and is easy to drive, it provides us with a great deal of flexibility in transporting patients," said Mr Gallagher.

The Mazda E2000 is equipped to carry three wheelchair patients. Its modifications include a raised roof to provide sufficient head room clearance for occupants, installation of a heavy duty flat floor covered in high quality non-slip rubber and wheelchair anchorage points.



Overdone in the sun is no fun...

SPRING is finally here and the SunSmart Campaign has warned Victorians not to overdo it in the sun as spring is a dangerous time for sunburn and skin cancer.

"If you haven't already begun thinking about sun protection, now is the time to start," said Craig Sinclair, manager of the SunSmart Campaign.

"Many people get caught out in spring and end up sunburnt and sore. This shouldn't happen because it's so easy to protect yourself from the sun," he said.

Harmful ultraviolet rays can be surprisingly strong at this time of year even though

MORE than half Victoria's young people were sunburnt last summer and compared to older people, were burnt more often during the season despite a higher awareness of SunSmart, according to new research by the Anti-Cancer Council of Victoria.

"60% of Victorians aged 14-29 were sunburnt last summer, compared to 30% of older people," said Dr David Hill, director of the Centre for Behavioural Research in Cancer.

"Young people were also more likely to have a burn over a large area of their body, and almost three times more likely than people over 30 to get sunburnt more than once during summer. This could have serious consequences later in life as research suggests that sun exposure and sunburn in particular, in adolescence significantly increases the risk of melanoma," he said.

temperatures are still relatively cool compared with summer standards. This means people are inclined to stay in the sun longer and not think about protection to the same degree as they would during summer.

This burst of spring weather could catch many people unaware while they're enjoying the outdoors.

Be SunSmart and follow these simple tips:

- avoid the sun in the middle of the day
- wear a hat which shades your face, neck and ears
- cover up with a long sleeved shirt
- apply SPF15+ sunscreen to all exposed skin

"It's disappointing because awareness of SunSmart is much higher among young people but they are not putting this awareness into practice," Dr Hill said.

The reason for this among teenagers may be found in other Anti-Cancer Council research in which the majority of secondary school students surveyed said that the things they like to do on the weekend cannot be done in the shade.

"It appears that young people are prepared to take the risk in order to do the things they like. Either that or they get careless because they're enjoying themselves."

Young people have modified their behaviour to a degree by covering up with clothing and hats, and wearing sunscreen. However, staying out of the sun entirely (being in the shade) is a much safer place to be.

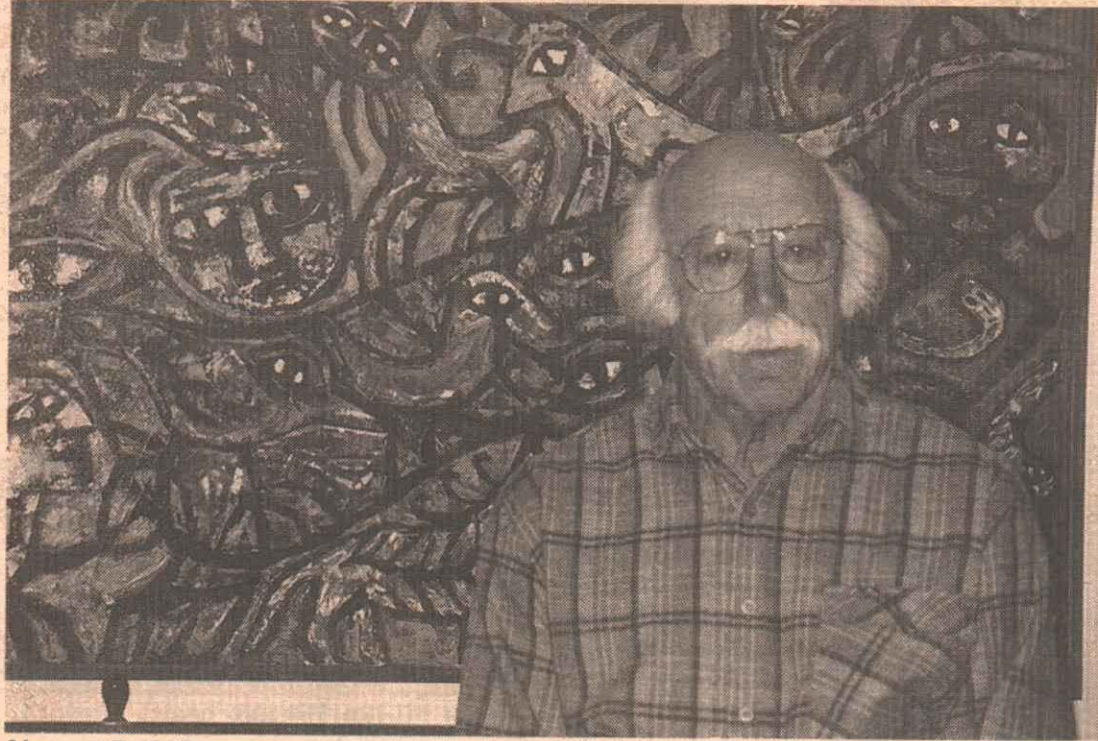

Alice Bale art award

November 14-27

THE work of Australia's finest traditional and realist artists will come together in an exhibition at the Caulfield Arts Complex from November 14-27, 1994.

This exhibition will feature a selection of entries for the Alice Bale Travelling Scholarship and Art Prizes. The prestigious Alice Bale awards are highly sought after by realist and traditional artists and have been established to perpetuate the memory and ideals of Miss A.M.E. Bale, a distinguished Australian artist of the first half of this century.

To compete for the Travelling Scholarship, the artist is required to enter a landscape, a portrait, a still life and a nude study. Cash prizes of \$4000 and \$2000 are also awarded in each of the two categories - oil,

acrylic and watercolour.

Miss Bale never married and when she died in 1955 the bulk of her substantial estate was applied to the establishment of an art scholarship bearing her name. It was to be awarded to artists of promise who are dedicated to the furtherance of the European tradition exemplified in the works of the Old Masters. The Award is administered by Perpetual Trustees Victoria Ltd and is judged by the Twenty Melbourne Painters Inc. which was established in 1918 and is one of the oldest art societies in Victoria. Miss Bale was a prime mover in the foundation of the society and its founding secretary - an office she retained until her death in 1955.

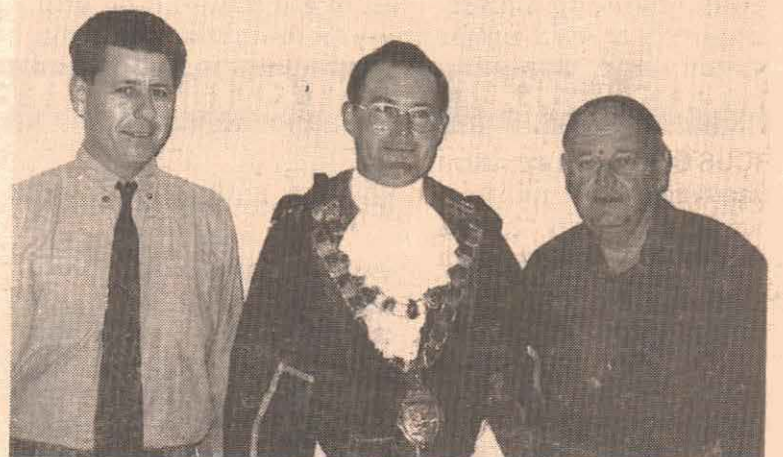

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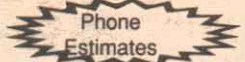
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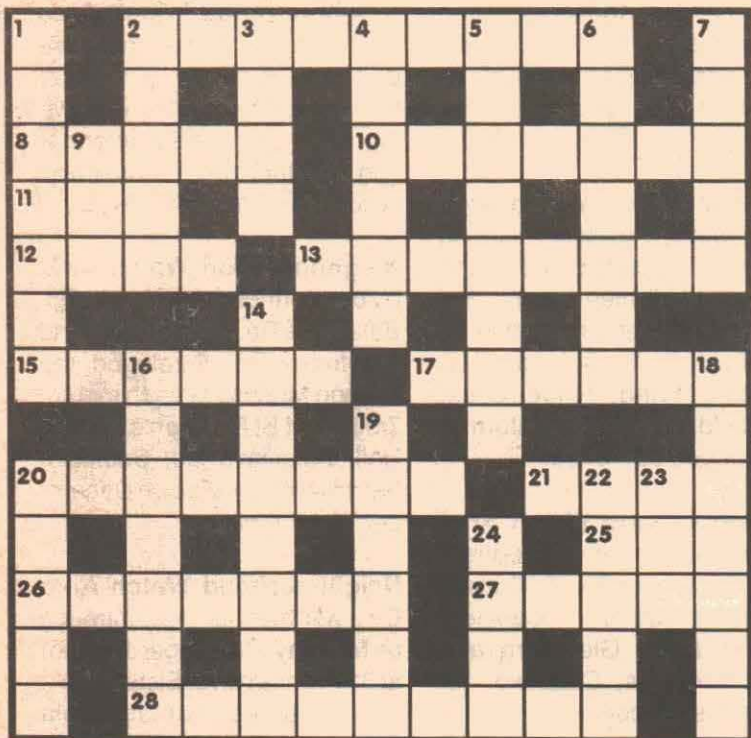
