We're ready for the first election

N EW ward boundaries have been finalised in the City of Glen Eira, in preparation for the first elections of councillors in March 1997.

After extensive community consultation, Glen Eira City Council has opted for six councillors across three wards - that is, two councillors per ward.

The eastern ward will be known as Mackie, the central ward Jasper and the western ward Orrong, named after major roads in each ward.

The wards have a north-south alignment to integrate them across both the former City of Caulfield and the former City of Moorabbin.

More than 90,000 people will be eligible to vote at the first elections in the new city, and will have the option of attending a polling booth on election day - 15 March, 1997 - or using postal or pre-poll voting facilities.

The Council compared several options and felt the three-ward, six-councillor system would best provide for:

- a cohesive, consensual forum, working together constructively and cordially for a common purpose, free of negative factionalism
- a council which gives attention primarily to making policies and setting strategic direction for the city as a whole
- an understanding of specific local concerns where they are relevant (eg, town planning), and an understanding of specific cross-sectional concerns (eg, age group interests, sporting group interests, religion, etc)

Elections tender goes inhouse

The first elections in the City of Glen Eira will be run by an inhouse team which successfully tendered for the contract last month.

That makes Glen Eira the only council in the metropolitan area to tender for the task of running the elections, to be held in March Index next year.

The election team

a council which is able to operate as a policymaking, performance-monitoring governing group and allows its executive management team to get on with the day-to-day business of delivering services.

The Minister for Planning and Local Government, Mr Rob Maclellan, has approved the plan. 1996

Elections will be held once every three years and ratepayers and residents 18 years and over are eligible to vote and/or stand for Council.



Vote – it's your right

oting is compulsory for all residents on Council's voters' roll under 70 years of age. However, only the following voters are automatically included on the voters' roll without having to apply.

- All voters on the State and Federal rolls.
- All first-named non-resident owners listed on Council's property records.

Voters who do not fit into the above two categories will need to apply if they wish to vote on election day. Examples are resident owners/ occupiers not on the state roll and nominees of corporations.

The final date to enrol is Wednesday, 18 December 1996.

A word from the Chief Commissioner

am happy to report that Council has achieved a great deal so far this financial year.

This month sees the completion of the recreational needs study, after wide ranging community consultation. The outcomes of the study will be assessed and an implementation schedule agreed after consideration of the report by the Recreational Advisory Committee.

A model for electoral representation was adopted in June and we now need to ensure Council's voter rolls are up to date. We are delighted that the inhouse team has won the tender to conduct the elections. Another pleasing result is the success of the internal bid for the Health and Community Care (HACC) tender. The team worked extremely hard and delivered an excellent result showing that they can deliver better service to the community more effectively than in the past.

The service centre has lived up to its expectations and has become the central contact point for all Council enquiries. The highly trained information officers have been busy assisting residents and directing enquiries to the appropriate departments. The centre will benefit greatly from the new communication system installed in early September.

Another new City project is the "Year 2020 Vision". A committee comprising community representatives, the Chief Executive and myself is leading the development of a vision of the City to the year 2020. We are seeking community input through a series of workshops that will be held during October. Several advertisements inviting interested persons to attend have been placed in local newspapers.

Questionnaires are also available to those who would like to make input but cannot attend a workshop.

The upcoming election is featured prominently in this issue of Glen Eira News and will continue to do so until the elections are held in March 1997.

The Why? Generation

MAGAZINE for young people is about to hit the streets of Glen Eira - and it's all being put together by a dynamic team of volunteers.

Keen journalists, editors, sub-editors, photographers, marketing gurus, graphic artists and layout whizzes all aged 12 to 25 years - are putting the finishing touches to "The Y Generation" ready for its launch in late October.

The big launch will also include the release of an information directory for young people, and a WHO card, listing emergency numbers and doubling as a discount card for local businesses, including Tin Pan Alley, Mean Jeans, Virtuality and Prince's Pool Centre.

The Y Generation supervising editor, youth media and promotions officer, Joe Losinno, said: "We've got 70 volunteers working on the magazine, but it could have easily been 200!'

The City of Glen Eira Youth Services pilot project started out as a plan for a five-page newsletter to reach Glen Eira's huge youth population: there's 22,000 young people out there, aged 12 to 25.

However, the enthusiasm of the young people who have come forward has been so great, the publication has turned into a mega 24 page magazine. Even with the expanded format, the team is crying out for more space to inform, educate and entertain the municipality's young people, covering everything from local musos to surfing the Net.

The volunteers come from secondary schools and local youth venues (and marketing students from Barton College of TAFE). Some hope to get jobs in newspapers, some are unemployed, some have worked in the industry. All are keen on fun and a challenge.

Joe says: "It's very important to challenge the belief that this generation is apathetic towards everything and anything."

"We want the newspaper to be as professional as possible, providing training and invaluable experience and understanding of the media industry. It also integrates volunteers across all ages and gives them an awareness of the business side, such as marketing and distribution."

Each volunteer has received specially prepared kits for their particular task, such as the editor pack, journalist pack and marketing pack. These start-up systems could become a model for other places to launch youth publications.

The Y Generation, to be issued quarterly, will have a first print run of 2000 - 3000 copies, distributed to schools and local facilities.

But one of the biggest challenges is funding. Joe Losinno says: "This is a community-based project

and we need local business and residents to support it. We desperately need funds from an outside source to keep going."

"What we offer to sponsors and advertisers is a huge market of 22,000 young people through our pages."

The group is also looking for support through donations or use of equipment, such as a computer printer or scanner, and printing the magazine.

Jackie Antes, 14, of East Bentleigh, who goes to McKinnon Secondary college, said: "It's a good experience and heaps of fun. I wanted to write about arts but I drifted into



doing part of the music section. We've done a survey on 'What Music Means to Me' among young people, and who are their favourite bands. I also want to give vocal warm-up tips from people who sing in different areas, such as opera or heavy metal.

"I'm glad it's taking off. The paper will be a real asset to Glen Eira."

Skye Holcombe, 15, of Murrumbeena, who also goes to McKinnon Secondary College, said she was working on a major feature on drug and alcohol addiction. The team has also done a survey and spoken to health professionals in their investigation.

"I want to be a journalist, and this is a fantastic experience. It's fun and the chance to meet lots of new people."

Derek Wiseman, 15, of Ormond, is equally impressed by the magazine project. The Caulfield Secondary College student is the youngest editor in the arts section.

"I coordinate the sub-editors and journalists and do research. I think it will help me when I'm seeking an arts career in the future," he said.

WORKS: a 2001 odyssey

NHOUSE team GlenWorks has won five of the eight works contracts tendered by the City, against strong competition from the private sector.

GlenWorks has been contracted to provide services until 2001 in routine road maintenance, road rehabilitation, drain clearing and maintenance, concrete maintenance, and bluestone road, path and kerb and channel maintenance services.

Outside contractors will provide services in weed control, road linemarking, and sign and street furniture erection and maintenance.

City works co-ordinator Kerry Martin said staff were delighted by their success, after a year preparing for Compulsory Competitive Tendering. The five-year contracts in five areas has secured employment for 30 staff, while four people have taken redundancy packages.

"GlenWorks was successful largely due to the commitment shown by staff and a willingness to make changes to work practices. It is also a recognition by management of the quality of work that staff have been doing for a number of years," Mr Martin said.

Chief executive officer Margaret Douglas said: "It was a team effort to produce a competitive bid, and shows a pride in the workplace. Bid leader Kerry Martin did an exceptional job. "Over the next five years, the city looks forward to continuously improving quality of service under the works contracts.

"There was competition on a level playing field with up to eight tenderers for each contract - and we are pleased the council staff was successful in five areas.

"Three external organisations have also won tenders, based on their quality service, price and best return to the resident, and with the combination of internal and external contractors, we look forward to continuously improving quality of service for ratepayers."

Shopping strip centres - and their bustling future - were the focus of a Melbourne-wide conference hosted by Glen Eira Council last month.

The Conference, a joint Council and StreetLife initiative, attracted more than 120 participants including traders, and representatives from local government, state government, industry bodies, and the education sector.

> The conference was a roaring success according to Andrew Millen of the City Planning Department. "We received a lot of positive feedback from all the participants who found it informative and practical - and we even received calls from people who didn't attend but had heard about it."

> The two-day conference included a tour of strip shopping centres in Elsternwick, Bentleigh and Carnegie.

> The joint group will facilitate business networks across the State and its aim is to strengthen business ties between Council and traders to create a better future for the competitive retail market.

Council decisions....

This will be a regular feature of the Glen Eira News, listing recent decisions made at the monthly ordinary meeting of the Glen Eira Council.

Suburb name change...

A section of South Oakleigh west of Warrigal Road could be renamed as East Bentleigh, following strong support from residents.

More than 90 per cent of residents who responded to notices and a questionnaire about the proposal supported the name change. This represents nearly 80 per cent of all households in the area.

Council wrote to the Places Names Committee in August, requesting the name change in the area bounded by North Road, Mackie Road, Warrigal Road and the Yarra Yarra Golf Club.

It is now awaiting a final decision from the Place Names Committee.

... and another change

Residents living in the area between Patterson Road and South Road, Moorabbin, will recall a similar proposal to change the name of their suburb from Moorabbin to Bentleigh.

This proposal, which received nearly 80 per cent support from local residents, is also currently awaiting final determination from the Place Names Committee, and an announcement is to be made very soon.

Laneway closed

Council has decided to discontinue and sell a council-owned accessway in Booran Road, adjoining Caulfield Racecourse, for safety reasons.

Council felt that the lane, which has been closed to public access since late 1994, would pose a potential safety risk as it exposed pedestrians to a horse track.

It acknowledged there would be some inconvenience for local users, however, alternative entrances to the racecourse at Glen Eira Road and Glen Huntly Reserve could be used during daylight.

AAT rejects appeal

The Administrative Appeals Tribunal has supported a Council decision to issue a permit for alterations to Elsternwick Private Hospital.

The AAT turned down an appeal against council approval of alterations and additions to the hospital at 494-498 Glen Huntly Road, and conversion of a house at 13 Shoobra Road, Elsternwick, for rehabilitation facilities, to be used in conjunction with the hospital.

Old school becomes ... a school

The former Holy Cross Primary School at 701 Glen Huntly Road, Caulfield South, is to be converted to an education centre for courses in management studies.

Pool hits a snag

Serious leakage and other problems at East Boundary Road Pool means it will not open as usual at the beginning of November.

School groups and learn to swim classes will be accommodated at Caulfield Pool while Council examines the cost and time to repair the East Boundary Road pool.

Annual Report

The 1995/96 City of Glen Eira Annual Report has been audited and will be presented to Council at its October ordinary meeting.

Federal Government cuts child care subsidy

The Federal Government will end the operational subsidy to child care from 1 July, 1997 - currently worth \$165,000 across Council's five child care services.

Unfortunately, this will place an additional cost on parents of about \$25 per child per week, and many parents will face further increases because of more stringent means testing of child care assistance and rebates.

... and change for Aged Care?

Major change to Aged Care funding was also signalled in the 1996 Federal Budget. Although the specific impact on Council services and clients is not known at this stage, it would seem the distinction between hostels and nursing homes looks likely to be blurred, and entry contributions are likely to be introduced for nursing homes. A national, means tested fee structure is to be implemented for home based (HACC) services.

Opening up Glen Eira

Council's draft Open Space Strategy is available for public perusal at all five libraries in the municipality. The Caulfield and Bentleigh branches also have special displays on open space.

Each library has comment cards, for the community to put its views on how best the Council can plan for the future, to improve and expand our open spaces.

Public submissions on the draft strategy can be made until 18 October.

Leash free areas for dogs

Glen Eira City Council has recognised the need to identify open space areas where dogs can be exercised off the leash, and after eight months of extensive consultation the Dog Leash Free Areas Strategy has been implemented. A comprehensive brochure outlining all the necessary information and criteria will be distributed to all households. Signage marking the "Leash Free Areas" will be clearly visible in the City's parks and reserves. The grants have been made through the Arts 21 Strategy, which has provided more than \$1 million funding for public libraries throughout Victoria. The Statewide Summer Reading Club aims to promote libraries, promote reading for children, encourage children to become regular library users and to foster cooperation among city and country libraries.

The club is non-competitive and has operated successfully since 1989/90. Interest in the club and its activities has grown year by year, and last year's Quest Club involved 213 branch libraries in 42 library services, and attracted about 17,000 children.

The second grant went to Plunge into Poetry, a competition designed to encourage children to write poetry and it will include a series of workshops and a published collection of the children's work.

The competition will begin in early 1977 and involve all five branches of the Glen Eira Library and Information Service. For more details, contact Margaret Grabau on 9524 3441.

Time to break even BREAK

M OST of us like an occasional flutter - a spell at the pokies, a bet on the horses, a night at the Casino or a Tatts ticket," says Paula McCann, a community education liaison officer for BreakEven Southern.

"For most people, it's just entertainment. However, for some people, gambling can become a problem which affects their lives and those around them."

This is where BreakEven Southern comes in. The rvice provides counselling for people who have problems caused by gambling - ranging across financial, relationships, legal, employment and emotional issues.

BreakEven Southern, auspiced by the East Bentleigh Community Health Centre, was set up 18 months ago and is funded by the State Government's Community Support Fund from gaming machine taxes.

It is the biggest and busiest regional problem gambling support program in Victoria, assisting 420 clients in 1995/96. The service extends across the cities of Glen Eira, Kingston, Stonnington, Port Phillip, Frankston, Mornington Peninsula, Greater Dandenong, Casey and Cardinia.

The region also has a high number of gaming machines. The City of Kingston tops the list with

1170 gaming machines, followed by the City of Glen Eira with 650 machines (as at January 1996).

The largest number of BreakEven clients come from Dandenong, Oakleigh, Clayton and Brighton.

BreakEven provides individual counselling, as well as group sessions and family support. It also has an extensive community education role, through public talks to community groups and liaising with the gaming industry on "responsible gambling".

Paula McCann said the biggest area of gambling among clients was on the pokies. "We found in 1995/

1996, 70% of clients spent \$200 on poker machines, three days a week. Another 19% spent \$400 at the TAB, three days a week."

A profile of clients found that job income was generally \$40,000 a year or less, and half earned \$20,000 or less. There were even numbers of employed and unemployed people, and also males and females, an unusual feature as

overseas experience is that men are the predominant gamblers. The mean age was 40 but the service has clients ranging from 18 to 85.

Paula said gambling difficulties can extend from having problems dealing with grief, relationship issues, social isolation or trying to escape problems. It's important for people to see gambling as a form of entertainment. My best advice is, "don't go in expecting to win the rent and don't chase your losses. If the fun has gone out of gambling, seek help." If you want to know more about gambling problems, contact BreakEven Southern on 9579 2333 or phone G-Line on 1800 622 112.

Heritage Management Plan - have your say on heritage

C ouncil's heritage adviser Andrew Ward has spent the last six months undertaking an extensive study of Glen Eira, to produce a comprehensive heritage report and draft management plan.

Part of the heritage study involved a field survey of every street and individually viewing each building in the southern part of the municipality to assess its heritage significance.

Information from this field survey has enhanced an earlier field study of the northern half of the municipality as part of the Caulfield Urban Conservation Study in the early 1990s.

The result is that Andrew and his research team have developed an extensive history of the built environment of the entire municipality. The draft management plan is now on public exhibition until the end of the year, and recommends:

- Designation of Heritage (or Urban Conservation) Areas in the Glen Eira Planning Scheme
- Introduction of statutory planning controls for individual buildings and places
- Preparation of Heritage Guidelines for Houses in Glen Eira, to implement Planning Scheme Controls
- Council to set an example in the community through public works initiatives
- Ensure implications and recommendations of the study are thoroughly canvassed and understood by the community

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 Maintenance of the existing heritage advisory service. The Heritage report has four parts: Background History, Historic Areas, Individual Buildings and Places, and the Heritage Management Plan recommendations.

he innovative Glen Eira Service Centre has been an enormous success since it opened in July.

Coordinator Irene Barratt said the seven staff at the one-stop information and assistance centre have been busy handling more than 10,000 enquiries in the first month, and the number of calls and visits is growing.

These included 2008 entries in the computer tracking systems seeking action on specific issues, 1156 counter enquiries and 8660 phone calls (including the Council's reception and switchboard duties).

Residents can play their part in the quality of the service by having all the details of their query ready when they call. This includes the specific location, for example if a tree has blown over in a storm. By giving the street name and the nearest intersection, it gives staff or contractors the ability to attend as quickly as possible.

Ms Barratt says the Service Centre needs some requests in writing.

These include situations where there has been a financial loss or personal injury, the caller wants to make a claim against the Council, or a decision of Council is required.

Precise details in writing are also needed for requests to have several matters investigated by Council, which is likely to involve several council departments and officers.

Vhat YOU wanted to know

Here's a summary of the main issues raised by residents during July, and the answers provided:

Recycling

What can be put in your recycling crate/bin: drink containers (glass, plastic and milk cartons); glass jars, aluminium cans, steel food cans, aerosol cans, empty dry paint tins.

Material which is not recyclable and shouldn't be put in your crate or bin: coloured plastic containers (for example, ice cream, margarine containers, fabric softener, shampoo/conditioner bottles), ceramics, coloured glass, mirrors or sheet glass, or plastic shopping bags. All these items should go in the normal household garbage bin.

Hard rubbish collection

Please have a list of the material to be collected, ready for the service centre when your ring to make a booking.

Green waste collection

This material must be cut and tied to the correct lengths for collection. The Service Centre has detailed brochures on this or can explain the requirements over the phone.

Hard rubbish, green waste and paper collections are not provided to commercial properties.

Grass is greener at the tip!

Council does not collect weeds, grass cuttings, weeds or leaves, to stop disease and the spread of weeds. Please don't put them in the usual rubbish: the bins are only for household garbage, otherwise soggy, rotting grass makes the bin too heavy and can't be lifted for collection.

Access to residential streets

Sometimes, Council services are disrupted because private construction works block access to parts of residential streets. It's best if residents approach the company involved for completion dates. Council has no control over these works and will resume services when access is restored.

Try 013

Need a general telephone number but can't find it in the phone book? Then ring 013 it's a free directory service. Ringing 013 rather than the Service Centre will help free up staff to answer queries about the Council and its services.
