Lest we forget...

ore than 150 people attended the Caulfield RSL sub-branch service for Anzac Day on 20 April.

Returned servicemen and women marched to the cenotaph in Caulfield Park, led by the Glen Eira City Band, on a lovely Sunday afternoon.

The band performed in conjunction with the Glen Eira City Choir during the program, which included laying of wreaths at the cenotaph, hymns and speeches. Glen Eira City Band secretary Graeme Patching played the Last Post on the bugle in what was a moving ceremony.

The service was attended by RSL members, friends, family, Glen Eira councillors and officers, Scouts, Guides and many others. Official guests included Glen Eira Mayor Alan Grossbard and Mayoress Judi Grossbard, Glen Eira chief executive Margaret Douglas and Major Grantley Lord from Oakleigh Barracks.

Guest speaker was Caulfield RSL president Tom McLean, who said those assembled had come to "pay respects and give thanks to the men and women who died in the service of our country in time of war, who have passed on since the end of hostilities and to those, who even today, bear the burden of war related illnesses and injuries".

"1995 was the year of Australia Remembers' - a year when many personal experiences and memories of the war years were written down, often for the first time. These projects are to be encouraged. I recently read a story written by a man whose father had spoken to him of his wartime experiences 50 years after the ear ending.


"Unfortunately, time is running out as the number of World War I veterans drops to single figures and the majority of World War II veterans are in their mid-70s. We must ensure wherever possible, their stories and memories are recorded so that future generations can learn where the legend of ANZAC was born, how it was enhanced in later conflicts and the price that was paid to ensure the freedom we enjoy today.


"It is ever our fervent hope that there will never be another generation of veterans, that young Australians will never again need to defend Australia and that our contribution to the maintenance of peace in the Asia Pacific region will ensure that the freedom won for us at such great cost is guaranteed," Mr McLean said.

Mayor Cr Alan Grossbard said: "Even though I was born after World War II, I lived in a country that was ruined by war. I can still vividly remember the destruction a war did to the landscape and housing in France, a country saved by our Allies, one of which was, of course, Australia.

"The destruction also affected for a long time after, the hearts and souls of all the soldiers and innocent victims who survived the war. Let us all hope that never again will circumstances arise that will call upon anyone to lay down their lives, as those to whom we pay tribute today, did."







Suburb name changes are on the way

Some of Glen Eira's suburb boundaries have been earmarked to change under a proposal by the Victorian Place Names Committee.

The Committee wants to define all Glen Eira's suburbs and assign names which are readily identifiable and meaningfully reflect the communities of interest concerned, and which will avoid the need for further changes in the long term.

There is often confusion about where some suburbs begin and end, with mail often being addressed to the incorrect locality and postcode.

Council will be examining the Place
Names Committee's proposal at its
next Council meeting on 5 May, and
will then invite community comment
before making its own submission to
the Committee. Watch out for the article and map on

Residents who previously commented on the proposed suburb change from Moorabbin to Bentleigh and South Oakleigh to East Bentleigh should note that a final decision on these names will be made in conjunction with the above proposal.

Rates Instalment Due

If you are paying your Glen Eira
City Council rates by instalments, the 3rd
instalment is due by 2 June 1997.

If you miss the payment, interest will be charged at a rate of 12% per annum from 7 October 1996 (the date Council struck the rates). You may pay your instalment at any bank.

However, banks other than the National Australia Bank may charge a transfer fee. If you have mislaid your Rates Instalments credit slip (issued in February), contact the Glen Eira Service Centre on 9524 3333 for a copy.

Food Hygiene Audit

The food hygiene audit is an assessment tool that reflects the requirements of the State Government's Food Premises Code. The aim of the audit is to increase hygiene standards within the food industry by utilising customer demand and marketplace pressures.

The audit was created and pioneered by the Glen Eira environmental health team in 1994. It is used by environmental health officers to assess standards of hygiene, food handling and personal cleanliness in food premises. It is designed primarily to assess the risk of transmission of illness to the customer through food produced, stored or sold at the food premises.

The audit is backed by a comprehensive program of incentives to the food industry and publicity. The incentives provide industry with additional market-ing tools and link registration fees to performance.

The publicity provides consumers with information on which premises have achieved a standard of excellence. Consumers are therefore empowered to use hygiene as a factor in deciding where to shop thus creating consumer demand for good hygiene.

The 1997 Food Shoppers Guide (pictured) has recently been released. 20,000 copies will be distributed during the year. The guide lists all 210 premises that achieved a 4 star rating in 1996 as assessed by the audit. This is a 40% increase over 1995.

As consumer demand comes to bear businesses face a choice of either raising standards to that required by the market or losing market share. Decisions to improve hygiene standards are therefore taken by the business and are based on commercial considerations and so are sustainable in the longer term.



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Partnership in play


A partnership between Council and a local playgroup has resulted in an exciting new outdoor play area. The Glen Huntly Combined Playgroups investigated, costed and developed a proposal to the 1996/97 community grants program which resulted in a grant for outdoor play equipment.

Council's Recreation Department provided support and advice. The Playgroup raised funds and volunteered many hours of work to dismantle the old and set up the new. The result was an exciting new set of outdoor play equipment. Families using the Glen Huntly Maternal and Child Health Centre will also benefit from this initiative.

Most importantly, users of the equipment find the deal most satisfactory and have begun spending many happy hours sliding, climbing, crawling and generally testing the equipment to its limits.

Enrolments for 4 year-old kindergarten

Enrolments are now open for children who turn 3 between 1 May 1997 and 30 April 1998, to attend 4-year old kindergarten in 1999.

A central enrolment system operates for most community-based kindergartens. Forms are available from kindergartens, or by telephoning the Glen Eira Service Centre on 9524 3333. Parents are encouraged to make contact with the kindergarten of their choice.

Parents are reminded that children who turn 4 by 30 April 1998 are eligible to attend 4-year old Kindergarten in 1998. Offers of places are made by kindergartens from the central enrolment register early in Term 3, 1997 for children to attend 4-year old kindergarten in 1998.

Garbologist's plea to residents

are making a plea to residents on two fronts to help make the service better and keep our streets cleaner.

The first is to ensure that loose items such as dust, small containers, grass clippings etc are wrapped or enclosed in bags. This prevents these smaller items from being blown or spilt onto the roadway during the tipping process. Using a large bin liner is even better and also helps to keep the bin clean.

The second is to avoid where possible placing the bins behind parked cars or parking in front of bins already placed out for collection. This situation requires the operator to manually bring the bins up to the collection vehicle and greatly reduces the efficiency of the collection system.

was introduced to the City of Glen Eira by Pacific Waste Management and although the system does cause minor inconvenience to some residents it has significantly reduced the cost of collection.

len Eira City Council's Food Services business unit has won its bid to supply meals to Stonnington Community Care, serving residents in the Prahran district of the City of Stonnington.

Stonnington Community Care is Stonnington Council's in-house team, providing a range of services to aged and disabled clients in the municipality. Through a partnership arrangement, Glen Eira Food Services will work closely with Stonnington Community Care to ensure their clients receive meals which are fresh, healthy and appetising, and meet their particular dietary requirements.

The two-year contract is worth \$260,000 annually.

Glen Eira Food Services already provides meals for the Malvern district of Stonnington through its contract with MECWA Community Care.

Major changes at Glen Eira Food Services over the last 18 months have seen the introduction of a quality control process known as the Hazard Analysis Critical Control Point (HACCP) system. With this system, every step in the food production process is carefully controlled to ensure that the food is safe from contaminants. All staff are trained in food handling techniques as well as the HACCP system.

Glen Eira Food Services is well known for its high quality meals. It is also known for its specialist knowledge of the particular nutritional needs of the aged and disabled. This gives it an advantage over some of the large general catering companies tendering for Council contracts.

The unit has been providing meals for other Councils for over three years. It has proven itself to be competitive by winning external contracts and has therefore not had to go through the Competitive Tendering Process in the same way as other Council services.

The contract with Stonnington Community Care was to start on 1 May.

The planning looks at the determinants of health including the social, physical and biological environment.

The State Government now requires all local councils to produce a Public Health Plan every three years, with annual reviews.

The team looking at this task includes planners from both the South East and Eastern Health Care networks, chief executive officers of both Caulfield Community Care Centre and East Bentleigh Community Health

Centre, as well as representatives from the Migrant Resource Centre, Council on the Ageing, Jewish Community Services, general practice and Masada Hospital.

There are also seven Glen Eira staff members, including deputy chief executive Vin McKay, who said:

"The findings and recommendations will be built not just into Council planning and services, but also into all health agencies policy and operations. We are developing a wholeof-community plan and want the community to have ownership of the process and the outcomes.'

Implementation includes developing a Council policy which defines its Public Health role, and to identify key areas for action and timelines.

Continuing our series on schools in Glen Eira visited by Council's chief executive Margaret Douglas.

Caulfield Grammar School

St Kilda East Principal: Stephen Newton

Caulfield Grammar, a co-educational school with over 2000 students, is the largest Anglican school in Australia. It currently has four campuses: Elsternwick: Year 7-12 with over 800 students; Wheelers Hill: preschool to Year 6 with 300-plus students; Yarra Junction: a rural property of more than 100 hectares, where students of all levels undertake outdoor and farming activities.

Recently, the opening of a new campus in Nanjing was announced and for a tuition fee of \$1700, Year 9 students can choose to attend for a five-week program. Mandarin is taught from primary levels onwards, so that by Year 9, many students are reasonably fluent in the language.

The principal is chairman of the Association of Independent Schools in Victoria, and Victorian delegate to the National Council of Independent Schools.

Caulfield Grammar's Arts Week in April was a big success. It combined the Drama, Music and Visual Arts departments and included an exhibition of student art, performances of the senior drama production Spring Awakening, storytelling sessions by professional artists and band performances.

At a special ceremony, Vicky Fairfax opened the Fairfax Room in memory of her late husband, George Fairfax, a former student of Caulfield Grammar. The room is the school's drama facility.

Sholem Aleichem College

Elsternwick Principal: Eric Aufgang

The school was established in 1975 to cater for preschool and primary school children. It is one of only two Jewish secular schools (ie, religion is not taught) in Melbourne.

The school is the only full-time day school in the Western world which teaches the Yiddish language. Yiddish is taught as a second language from preschool and Hebrew is also taught from Grade 3. Classes are held in English. Thus, by Grade 6, most students are fluent in English, Yiddish and Hebrew.

Sholem Aleichem was a writer, born in Odessa, Russia, and was the Shakespeare of the Yiddish language. His story of a milkman became the musical "Fiddler on the Roof".

Of the 160 primary school children, over 100 come from families of Russian heritage with a major influx of immigrants in the last 10 years, and a large percentage speak Russian in the home.

The school has a musical group which has recently won a number of prizes in competitions and often performs for Jewish elderly citizen groups, singing songs in Yiddish.

Valkstone celebrates with a reunion


Valkstone Primary School held its 40th anniversary celebrations on 5 April, with past pupils and teachers mingling with current families to share memories and experiences.

News from Bentleigh

Bentleigh Traders Association has asked Council to continue the special rate for the Bentleigh Main Street program.

The special rate, which has operated in Bentleigh Shopping Centre for three years, will expire on 30 June. Funds raised are used to employ a part-time co-ordinator who markets the centre, an annual festival and other events, and other promotional work such as a business directory and street banners.

Council sought comment from all businesses in the Bentleigh Shopping Centre and received an "exceptionally positive" response, according to a report to Council on 7 April.


Before making a decision, Council will undertake statutory advertising of the proposed special rate and invite further comment.

The proposed special rate would be 25 per cent of Council general rates between 1 July 1997 and 30 June 2000, and 30 per cent of Council general rates between 1 July 2000 and 30 June 2002.

The Glassic Cinema

The past

The oldest surviving cinema in Melbourne, the Classic is a prominent local landmark which has known many tenants, and many dreams.

Established in 1888 by the Elsternwick Public Hall and Skating Rink Company Limited, the planned use for the site was as a community hall, skating rink, shop, club house and lodgings.

The increasing popularity of "motion picture entertainment" at the start of the 20th Century saw the placement of a rough canvas screen illuminated by incandescent gas lamps slung across the back of the stage. The projectionist had his equipment mounted on scaffolding inside the hall. Thus was born the fledgling filmhouse that is now the Classic Cinema.

Many renovations, improvements and stylistic additions evolved over the years. A theatre entrance vestibule, supper room, espresso counter, dress circle and projection room were added at various stages, unmistakably defining the building as an evolving cinema.

Frank Richardson, a prominent theatre architect whose cinema buildings in Melbourne include the Rivoli theatres, completed alterations in 1911 to what is now the Classic. Over the decades, owners came and went. War, fire and economic circumstances all took their toll on the ability of the local community to participate in the venue. At one stage, during the Depression, the hall was re-opened as a dance palais.

As it changed hands over time, the building was variously renamed The Astor, Dorchester Hall, the Esquire Theatre, and the Sharon Cinema (one man's tribute to his wife).

The future


The Classic Cinema in Elsternwick reopened in March with a screening of "Kolya", the delightful Czech film which won the 1997 Academy Award for Best Foreign Film only the night before.

The cinema has undergone extensive renovation, retaining period features, while upgrading technology and patron comfort with new seating, the cafe Classic Food in the old foyer, and an opening program which included the children's film "James and the Giant Peach" and the late-night screening of "Scream".

The cinema had closed down in January, but new tenant Eddie Tamir refurbished the building in only eight weeks and has plans for a bigger and brighter future.

These include showing top-shelf arthouse films, both foreign and English language, select mainstream commercial 'winners', a series of theme or director-based festivals and retrospectives, and daytime weekend programs dedicated to children. The Classic's former tradition of hosting children's birthday parties is to be revived.

Late night screenings are planned for weekends, as are nostalgia matinees for weekends. "Shorts" will also be revived with short animated films by local filmmakers played before main sessions.

The existing coffee shop has been renovated to become Classic Food, in partnership with international chef Aviva Graeve, with an imaginative contemporary menu, board games and arty magazines.


reg Healy began his career as a junior with Edithvale/Aspendale before joining Melbourne's Under 19s in 1984, playing in a premiership.


Healy played 145 games, forced into retirement in 1993 - aged just 28 - because of a serious knee injury.

Operation Safe Pool

The backyard swimming pool or spa provides many hours of great family entertainment. Tragically, it also claims the or consult a private building surveyor. lives of small children and infants. The high incidence of fatal and serious injuries to children has prompted the State Government to review its current safety requirements and from 1 July 1997, new State laws governing pool and spa security will come into effect.

The State Government's retrospective building regulations stipulate that all owners of swimming pools and spas constructed before 8 April 1991 are required to have safety barriers installed (which can include a fence, wall, gate or screen as well as locks, latches or other devices to doors, gates and windows) to prevent young children from gaining access to these areas.

What should a pool owner do?

If you are in doubt about the barriers that are already in place or about those that you plan to install, you

should seek advice from Council's planning department

How long do you have?

All swimming pool or spa owners must have fully installed protection barriers by I July 1997. That means that if pool owners do not already have a barrier in place, they need to act immediately to ensure that the barrier is installed by this date.

Are there any penalties?

Yes. If pool and spa owners to do not comply with the requirements by I July 1997, a fine of \$200 will be imposed and possible further legal action.




