On Friday 13 June, Glen Eira City Council hosted the Look Before You Leap campaign in the wonderful and safe surrounds of the Caulfield Park Playground.

The Mayor, Cr Alan Grossbard officially launched the program and was joined by Civic Mutual Plus chairman Ms Anne Murphy, national director of Kidsafe, Mr David Howlett, Mayors from other participating Councils, Freddo Frog, and Grade 2 children from Caulfield North Primary School.

Glen Eira City Council is one of many Councils involved in the statewide local government child accident prevention campaign, 'Look Before You Leap', aimed at reducing the number of accidents that occur in playgrounds throughout Victoria.

The campaign is being spearheaded by Freddo Frog, one of Australia's most famous children's characters on the internet site: www.greenweb.com.au/lookleap. The site contains lots of information for young people, parents and teachers - so hop on and be taken on a journey of fun and interesting games as well as learning all about safety.

The Caulfield Park Playground is featured on the website as being one of the best designed and safest in Victoria, and Council was thrilled that the Park was chosen to launch the campaign.

The Mayor, Cr Alan Grossbard said: "Local government has a responsibility to promote community awareness of safety within the playground, particularly when Councils have so many of them in their areas."

Council is extremely keen to promote this safety awareness campaign to ensure that people using Council facilities are aware of safety issues and are educated in how to prevent accidents.

The campaign will continue throughout the year and as a special offer to school children, Council will give away 10 Freddo Frog t-shirts to the first 10 entries to colour in the

Several Glen Eira restaurants and cafes contributed to what Quit have labelled as the "overwhelming success" of its inaugural Smokefree Saturday.

"Over 650 restaurants across the state went smokefree for the day on Saturday 31 May, to celebrate World No Tobacco Day and encourage our eating places to be healthier and more enjoyable," said Debbie Sandler, Projects Coordinator from Quit.

The participating restaurants were listed in both the Herald-Sun and local papers in Quit advertisements.

Quit had very positive feedback from the restaurants in Glen Eira that participated. Gary from Fusion cafe said that the day "went really well" and he was happy.

Going smokefree is not just a matter of 'doing the right thing' by providing an environment free of passive smoke. Providing smokefree areas responds to the overwhelming customer demand which now exists for eating without someone else's smoke. In a recent

Quit survey, it was found that 75 per cent of people don't smoke and 15 per cent of smokers prefer smokefree dining.

Quit says it is very important for customers to let restaurant owners know they would like smokefree dining by always requesting a smokefree area when booking, and complementing those food outlets that are totally smokefree. Food shops will respond to what the overwhelming majority of customers demand.

Those food outlets in Glen Eira that go smokefree, or provide a smokefree area, also qualify for the first component of Glen Eira's successful Taste 4 Health program. Those who also provide healthy food choices and score 3 or 4 stars in the hygiene audit are rewarded with the Taste 4 Health award as well as publicity in the Glen Eira Food Shoppers Guide.

Open space



Keen interest in open space

Council held 12 public meetings and workshops in May as part of community consultation on Glen Eira's draft Open Space Strategy.

The meetings, held at different venues around the city, attracted a total of 315 participants, who provided valuable community feedback on our open spaces.

Issues identified at the workshops included:

- Amount of open space
- Recreation opportunities/Diversity of open space
- Landscape character of open spaces
- Quality of open space
- Personal safety in parks
- Other comments on open space issues
- Comments on specific parks

The workshops were promoted via advertising in local newspapers, signs in parks, letters to schools, sporting clubs, interest groups and individuals who had registered interest in open space issues, plus 8000 fliers delivered to houses adjacent to parks.

A summary paper outlining all the comments raised at the workshops will be made available for public comment in Council's five libraries, and on Council's web site from 14 July to 1 August in the "What's New?" section. The Home Page address is <http://www.gleneira.vic.gov.au>

Walk with care

Council, in conjunction with VicRoads, is running a pedestrian road safety program called Walk With Care, which aims to reduce the number of road accidents involving older pedestrians.

Pedestrians in the 60-plus age group represent 35 per cent of all pedestrian accidents and 90 per cent of fatalities in the municipality. The City of Glen Eira has a high number of elderly residents with approximately 22.4 per cent of its population over the age of 60 in comparison to the Victorian average of 15.2 per cent.

The Walk With Care program aims to tackle this serious problem by educating older people on how to plan trips carefully and ensure they are alert and visible around traffic.

Walking is a valued means of independence, health, pleasure and exercise for older citizens. However,

because many older people suffer from deteriorating reflexes, eyesight and hearing, this increases the risk of being involved in an accident. By adopting safe pedestrian habits discussed in the Walk With Care program, older people will benefit with a great understanding of traffic hazards and how to avoid them.

The program will include several informal discussion sessions with people over the age of 60 to be held at senior citizens clubs, bowling clubs, accommodation homes and other community venues. Pedestrian issues identified during the program will be considered and implemented.

Surveys are being distributed at the moment and data collated. Discussion session dates will be held in July. For more details, contact Margaret Roche, Community Support and Development Officer, on 9524 3448.

family historians swamped the enrolments. She therefore began running specialised workshops, with her advice soon to be released in book form.



• TRAVEL BACK IN TIME •

A rare piece of history can be found in the beautiful garden setting of Joyce Park, Ormond - a wooden cottage first built in the 1850s, and now a museum housing the Moorabbin Historical Society.

Box Cottage, named after a family who lived in it, was discovered intact at nearby A. Lewis & Co. Timber Merchants in Jasper Road in 1977. It had survived after being sheltered for many years under a large shed built over it, and used as a storeroom.

But the old structure wasn't up to a move. Most of the aged timber disintegrated while it was being carefully dismantled. With Moorabbin Council support, an exact replica was built at Joyce Park, using old building methods and the expertise of Highett builder Arthur Smith, and an expert shingle cutter and roof maker from Tasmania, who prepared the black peppermint wood split shingles. Builders also used newspapers to line the cottage and coated them with whitewash, in the old style.

There is one section of wall which is a piece of the original cottage, showing the authentic timbers used last century to house the Box family. All new timber was donated by Laurie Lewis.

The Moorabbin Historical Society's new home was opened in 1984, and Box Cottage displays its collection of clothes, implements, crockery, ornaments, photos, genealogical charts, maps and much more, covering the former City of Moorabbin area.

Box Cottage, Joyce Park, Jasper Road, Ormond, is open on the last Sunday of each month, from 2-4.30pm, and events include guest speakers and special displays. Contact Moorabbin Historical Society secretary Mrs Hazel Deam on 9578 7060.

Rhubarb, cabbage and floods

Back in the days when Laurie Lewis Senior was a boy, Ormond and surrounding districts were covered in market gardens and dairy farms as far as the eye could see.

Rhubarb grew well, cabbages stretched all the way to McKinnon station and mushrooms grew under the box thorn hedges ("I used to get 7 and 6 for a bucket," said Laurie). Ponies and carriages travelled on the dirt tracks, and Elster Creek still flowed adjacent to what is now Joyce Park - and regularly flooded local streets.

Laurie's grandfather started a timber mill in Ormond, which still operates today with the fourth generation of the Lewis clan.

He had a young start. He went to work in the mill at the age of seven. The business closed temporarily during the Depression, however, and Laurie made money by carting wood from Monbulk in his Model A Ford and taking gardeners to Victoria Market to sell their produce, before resurrecting the mill.

The Lewis family has a strong connection with historic Box Cottage, which was found at the Lewis timber mill, and with timber in general. Laurie hopes to set up a timber museum adjoining the mill, featuring different styles of building and wood choices over the years, as well as a large collection of old carriages.

Now retired, he still can't keep away from timber and makes bird feeders of red pine and red cedar.

Looking back 130 years

Bruce Jackson dropped in to Box Cottage while we were visiting, with a shopping bag full of old photos of his ancestors who settled in Bentleigh back in 1865.

Grandparents Thomas and Jane Callow came to Australia from the Isle of Man, and lived on 25 acres in Tucker Road (now a block of flats). The couple increased their family from three children to 14 in their new country. Thomas was a bootmaker and gardener.


Jane's sisters Mona, Matina and mother Gertrude Callow started a private hospital at 154 Tucker Road.

"Nursing new mothers was different then," Bruce said. "When a child was born, the nurse would go out on a pony to the mother's house twice a day for five days after a baby was born, and once a day for the next five days."







Don't let overhanging trees and shrubs get in the way

Did you know that overhanging trees and shrubs must not be lower than 3m off the ground?

If you answered no to the above question, it is time to take out the garden trimmers.

With the wet season truly upon us, it is most important that residents trim back overhanging trees and shrubs and keep them at the minimum safe level of 3m high. The most important aspect of trimming overhanging trees and shrubs is for pedestrians walking by and to prevent injury.

Council's local law officers will be patrolling the streets on the look out for overhanging trees and shrubs. Notices will be issued to property owners found offending.

Meals: providing care as well as service

Meals on wheels

Council's Food Services kitchen in Carnegie is a vital part of community care in Glen Eira, preparing and delivering 1200 meals a day to frail aged people and people with disabilities.

Volunteers are the linchpin of the service, delivering meals throughout the City each weekday morning, either as drivers or jockeys on one of 25 rounds.

Most meals are delivered chilled, for reheating later, and provide a balanced, nutritious meal, individually prepared to each person's dietary needs as well as preferences. This includes soup (in winter), main meal (meat and vegetables), a sweet and juice. Sandwiches and salad can be chosen instead of the main meal.

The cook-chill kitchen has 25 staff and produces meals for both the cities of Glen Eira and Stonnington.

Council's Human Services general manager Judy Leitch said: "The role of volunteers is critical to the overall service. Many of the residents using the service have little other social contact and volunteers become cheerful and reliable friends who monitor the health and safety of their clients. Many family members are grateful for this role, as it is often hard for them to call in on a daily basis to check their loved ones and they feel reassured that someone has called in."

Meals on wheels coordinator Ross Moraes said: "We particularly need more helpers at the moment. Several regular volunteers take a break in winter and head north to the warmer weather."

"The volunteers do a great job, and the feedback on the health and safety of the clients is an essential part - the monitoring is done very well."

"If you can spare one morning a week, a month or fortnight, it would be a great help to us. Each driver receives a \$5 petrol voucher."

"The volunteers also have their own room where they can have a hot drink and chat before they go out on a round, and lunch is provided at the end of the deliveries."

People like a cheery smile and a chat, not just delivering a meal and racing off. 



"Students can produce assignments through the multimedia facilities, which combine sound animated pictures and video. Audio visual facilities are located within the centre.


In Japanese classes, Shelford students can link via the Internet to sister schools in several cities in Japan and talk directly with students there.






