isitors to Caulfield Park will have noticed the feverish activity within the old aviary adjoining Inkerman Road over the past few months. The enclosed area has been rejuvenated with a new river course and lake, bush paths, bridges, indigenous planting and native birds.

Glen Eira Parks Services manager Jens-Peter Coombes has designed the Glen Eira bushland flora reserve and bird aviary, and staff have enthusiastically helped prepare Glen Eira's newest attraction - both at weekly work sessions and in their own time.

Gone are the longtime weeds on the quarterhectare site, replaced by a view that has captured the attention of passersby, and keen interest from plant, gardening, school and environmental groups.

The next stage is a major planting of 4500 indigenous plants of Glen Eira, many of which have been propagated in the Parks Services nursery. They include saltbush, banksia, wildflowers, and 2500 grasses. Community planting sessions are planned before the reserve is opened to the public.

The aims of the development are to:

- Educate local residents and visitors about the beauty of Glen Eira's natural heritage.
- Attract birds and native animals to the area.
- Grow and demonstrate indigenous plant species with herbal and medicinal properties.
- Grow a source of local bush tucker species.

Jens-Peter is a horticulturalist with a keen interest in remnant species, and has researched

the indigenous plants of the area for the project. "The only location in Glen Eira with remnant species at the moment is Boyd Park," he says. "This reserve will be unique, combining native plants, animals and birds in an urban area."

Parks Services member Susie Roche recently returned to work after 12 months maternity leave and has enjoyed being part of the project. "Tve just come back and the aviary is looking fantastic. It will be great to have the public back in this area. The indigenous planting will also bring back native

animals and birds, like butterflies and kookaburras."

Susie was also pleased to see the characters of the two bird enclosures are still there, from Moby the talkative cockatoo to Dan the galah with an "extensive vocabulary. Spending time with them, you get to know their personalities and habits, and residents will be able to discover that too," Susie says.

The reserve's first community planting day is scheduled for Sunday 28 September starting at 10.00am. Meet at the Park Services office, 721 Inkerman Road, North Caulfield. All are welcome.

Glen Eira City Council has opted for an instalment-only system for rate payments to ensure it can maintain services to the community.

This follows significant State Government changes to the Local Government Act,

> different rating year, different instalment dates and lump sum payments systems optional for Councils rather than required by the Act.

Glen Eira City Council has decided not to offer lump sum rate payments for 1997/98 because the new lump sum deadline set by the State Government - two thirds of the way

through the year - would cause cash flow problems.

Mayor Alan Grossbard said: "We need more of our income earlier in the year. We estimate that if the 15 February 1998 date was implemented, it may have attracted 75 per cent of people to pay that way.

"Consequently, up to mid-February 1998, Council would have spent about \$17.5 million of rate income while receiving only \$3.5 million from people paying by quarterly instalments.

"Some people may have also had difficulty paying a lump sum in early February at the same time as back-to-school expenses, Christmas bills and summer holiday bills," he said.

Council's new system prefers that people pay evenly through the year, either by:

- · quarterly instalment, or
- · the free monthly Direct Debit service many of Glen Eira's senior citizens prefer this automatic service.

"However, we have said, on legal advice, that if

people particularly wanted to pay in one amount, they need to do so by the date of the first instalment as a pre-payment option. Of course, no one has to pay in this way unless it suits them."

Other benefits of the new system include:

- No one will pay any more than under the old system.
- Council will receive a regular cash flow to pay for the services that the community requires.
- Council will send out reminder notices before each instalment - a service improvement.
- Paying rates will become just like paying electricity, water or gas bills.

Cr Grossbard said other changes to the Act on rates payments were welcome. "For example, interest on overdue instalments is now calculated from the date of instalment rather than the date of the rate notice. While this is estimated to cost Council about \$20,000 annually, we consider it is a fairer approach."

Instalment dates for Glen Eira rates are: 30 September 1997, 1 December 1997, 2 March 1998, 1 June 1998.

Mayor's Column



You should have received by now your rates notice. Please note that you are paying for the next 12 months. Last year, you only paid for a nine month period. You can now pay in full by 30 September or pay in four instalments. Reminder notices are sent before the second, third and fourth instalments.

Our Service Centre is handling around 4000 requests a week. Over 90 per cent of these telephone calls are answered within 20 seconds. That's good customer service.

In the next few years, you may see a major facelift in the area surrounding the Caulfield Racecourse, Caulfield station and Monash University. Council recently adopted a visionary report supporting this area becoming suitable for redevelopment into an education, recreation and entertainment hub for this city. Derby Street shopping centre and surrounding streets are likely to be revitalised. This area has been called the Phoenix Precinct. Further community consultation on this concept will take place over the next three months.

Council approved \$200,000 worth of community grants to 84 organisations who will serve our city. Each application was processed by an evaluation panel, in consultation with senior management, key community representatives and myself.

Walking with care

COMMUNITY GRANTS awarded

Glen Eira City Council last month allocated the 1997/98 Community Grants to more than 80 local organisations.

This year, 174 grant applications were received from 134 organisations. A total of 90 applications from 84 groups were successful, for services covering senior citizens, recreation, culture, sports, kindergartens, playgroups, youth and community services. These included:

- McKinnon Greek Senior Citizens Club for fitness equipment.
- Chabad Institutions to purchase software for their Library.
- Arthritis Foundation to set up a model to improve access for all people in Glen Eira affected by arthritis

and musculoskeletal diseases, especially women from a Non-English Speaking Background who have a high incidence of the disease. Once tested, the model would then be applied further.

- Elsternwick Baptist Church Community Sewing Class to enable them to purchase a second hand overlocker.
- Glen Eira community based kindergartens which jointly applied for funding to purchase equipment for children with additional needs.
- Copelen Child & Family Services and Oz Child's joint application to conduct research into family service delivery needs in the municipality.

Council has shifted the Community Grants funding round closer to the start of the financial year to help community organisations in their financial planning. Request for grants were less than in previous years. A number of factors contributed to this, including the last funding round held within the previous six months. Feedback from groups indicated they clearly understood the community grants process, which may have resulted in more realistic requests for funding.

Mayor Cr Alan Grossbard commented on the diversity of activity that is occuring throughout the municipality. "The applications showed an exciting and important range of services, activities, programs, partnerships, innovations and volunteer contributions throughout Glen Eira. While it was not possible to fund all requests, those processing the applications were heartened by the commitment to this City reflected in the applications."

Access for all

Council is developing a Disability Policy and Action Plan to make Council buildings, public places, festivals, events and information and Council services accessible to all people.

A community advisory committee, headed by Cr Noel Erlich, is leading the way to remove unnecessary difficulties for people using Council facilities and services, and getting around the City of Glen Eira.

Council has appointed consultant Val Johnson to work on the Disability Policy and Action Plan. Over the next few weeks, she will organise a number of focus groups to consult people with disabilities and their carers.

Ms Johnson said: "All of us at some stage will have disabilities; whether they are temporary or permanent. It is estimated that 1 in 5 people have a disability at any one time. With an ageing population, the proportion in Glen Eira is likely to increase.

"People with disabilities are unable to do everything most of us take for granted, because of a difference in the way their body, mind or senses work. This may come from being born with different abilities, losing a part of the body, an accident, disease or illness, or learning difficulties."

Following consultation, the Disability Policy and Action Plan will be drawn up and Council will aim to remove as many disadvantages as is possible. It wants to ensure that all people who live, work or enjoy their leisure in Glen Eira have the same facilities, services and opportunities available to them.

Youngsters take the plunge into poetry

The highly successful Glen Eira Library and Information Service "Plunge into Poetry" competition attracted nearly 500 entries from children aged from six years to 16.

A large gathering of mums, dads, grandparents and other family members watched as prizes were awarded to winners in three age categories at Caulfield Library on 29 July.

The presentations were made by Mayor Cr Alan Grossbard, who also launched the anthology "Plunge into Poetry", containing a selection of the poems entered in the competition. The anthology will be distributed to local schools and copies will be for sale at the City's libraries.

The innovative poetry competition was divided into three age groups - children 6-8 years, 9-12 years and 13-16 years. Winners received a \$50 book voucher and four runners-up in each category received book prizes.

"Plunge into Poetry" - funded by a Victorian Government Arts 21 grant - has been a three-month program by the library service, which began with three writing workshops during the April school holidays. They were run by well-known facilitator and children's author, Jo Hinchliffe, and attracted 90 children.

Margaret Grabau, Program Development Librarian for the Glen Eira Library and Information Service, said: "We were astounded by the number and quality of the entries, and all entrants are to be congratulated".

Glen Eira Council's Youth Services has combined with Monash, Bayside, Stonnington and Kingston Councils and Victoria Police to set up a program to help young people cautioned for offences to find support and advice in their community.


The Cautioning Assistance Program, launched by Commander Noel Perry at Kingston Arts Centre in late July, aims to reduce the likelihood of young people re-offending by linking them and/or their families with youth workers and support services.

Inspector Carlisle, of Number 6 Division, Moorabbin Headquarters said the program "will enable our members to assist families to gain priority access to support services in their local areas".

The initiative has come out of a working party of Victoria Police and the five Councils set up 18 months ago. Its aim was to address relationships between young people (10-21 years), their families and the police, and look at the issues of crime prevention and risk taking behaviour among young people.

A common concern was the lack of both early intervention and support programs for young first offenders who have been cautioned for an offence. The Cautioning Assistance Program is a modified version of Knox Link, an initiative of the City of Knox Youth Services.



MEET YOUR Councillors

Writer Susanne Shaw begins a three-part series on Glen Eira's Councillors. This month she begins with the Council's Mackie Ward representatives.


Veronika Martens

Glen Eira, the well-established, secure municipality of present day Melbourne, Victoria, may appear to have no relation to the tumultuous times in postwar Germany.

Yet for German-born Veronika Martens, who has experienced both, the connection is clear: personal freedom afforded by a democratic system is a thing to be valued. In her role as a Glen Eira Councillor, she brings this message home with unapologetic vigor, commitment and passion. "Everywhere you look, it is a fight for freedom," she says.

Veronika lived as a child through a period of communist Russian occupation while her father was in a POW camp in Siberia. Gradually however, growing up, she witnessed the establishment of a new German Government and discovered how much can be achieved by people working together for a positive common goal. She admits her passion for people "taking charge of their own destiny" has not left her and probably never will.


"I do not want to be dictated to. No one wants to be dictated to. People can, and should be able to, take charge of their own lives," she says. "As a Councillor, I want to listen to the people. I like the idea of Local Government being the last sphere of government where people have access to their elected representatives... I would hate to go along with the suggestions made by many Councils, and most probably the State Government, that it should only be at the last resort that people should have contact with Councillors."



"Local Government may have changed over the years but it is still the people who are entitled to services paid for by their rates and it is still the people who must be listened to."

"I will not budge from my idea that Local Government should not be all business driven only. It must show compassion, it must be consumer friendly, people friendly. And you can achieve both if you put your mind to it. You really can be effective and efficient but you don't have to treat people like figures on a chess board - they are human beings."

In between serving as a full time Councillor and being a wife and mother, Veronika enjoys relaxing with a game of golf. Yet, she chuckles, until she feels she has nothing left to contribute to her community, she will pursue her beliefs "like a little Australian terrier".

as a young boy, Norman Kennedy can remember riding in his grandfather's old Fairlane through the streets of St Kilda during the lead up to the local Council elections. He would knock on people's doors and offer them a ride to the nearest polling booth.

"In those days," Norman recalled, "voting in Council elections was voluntary so it figured that if you gave people a ride to the polling booth, they would be more likely to vote your way."

His grandfather, P.B. Fryberg - "a larger than life character" - cut a colourful swathe as a St Kilda Councillor throughout the 1950s and 1960s. That was in the 'glory days' of St Kilda, when the buildings were grand and the lifestyle offered luxurious. Much has changed since then, both in St Kilda and its surrounding areas, and in Local Government.

Clearly, Norman is revelling in his role as a Councillor in the new era of Local Government in the 1990s. Since University days, acting as chairman of the Student Representative Council, and later, running as a candidate for two State seats, Norman has acted on his belief that it was "always better to get up and do something than to just sit back and whinge". Now 46, a husband and father of two, Norman is enjoying applying his expertise in engineering and computer technology to serving Glen Eira City Council - "one of the State's finest", says Norman.

"It's great to be part of something considered to be leading the way in a lot of areas. Glen Eira's community and child care program, for example, is considered to be one of the most efficient in the State, and Council's new Planning Approvals Process may well be used as a benchmark for other municipalities to follow," Norman explained.


Contributing to his local community is just one of Norman's passions - personally renovating his family home in Murrumbeena is another.

Californian bungalow, the home now has an upstairs attic cum office; a revamped, modern

kitchen, bathroom and laundry; an extended family room; and a new landscaped garden ready for planting. Undertakings which have needed clear strategic thinking, a sense of perspective, and an ability to bring a sense of order to disorder - traits which Norman says he is able to bring to his role of Councillor.

Times may have changed. There may no longer be an old Fairlane parked in the garage of the Kennedy household and becoming a modern day Councillor may take months of hard work, yet in a quiet street of Murrumbeena, a family tradition is alive and well.

Flamenco on film - Ole!

The theatrette of the Glen Eira Arts
Complex came alive in July to the vibrant
rhythm of the Madrugada Española Spanish
Ensemble, in a special filmed event.

Film-makers Emma Stone and Lucy Paplimska captured the commotion of clapping, castanets and much stamping of feet on video tape, to be screened later this year on Channel 31 as part of a new program on performing arts.

Judy Barclay of Madraguda Española described the scene: "Dressed in blazing reds, purples and oranges the dancers set the stage alight with their energy, exchanging many fiery glances along the way. Skirts and shawls twirled dramatically to the dynamics of the music.

"During one piece the performers characterised the haunting guitar refrain, aloof and poignant, and then suddenly snapped into a fast and furious choreographic confrontation as the music climaxed. With each new piece a new and different mood was established: from joyous celebration, to stark and foreboding, and then dignified and elegant - yet passionate."

Suburb names: our preferred model

Glen Eira Council has adopted its preferred plan to define suburb boundaries within our city, following nearly 800 individual comments received from the community.


The Victorian Place Names Committee has asked all Melbourne councils to look at their suburb boundaries and recommend their preferred options.

The Committee will formally assign suburb names by November this year. Council has asked that any changes not take effect until at least February 1998, to prevent disruption to postal deliveries during the Christmas period.

Note that the plan (right) is Council's preferred option only at this stage. The final decision rests with the Place Names Committee, which has also advised it will allow further comment before assigning or changing names. Look out for future editions of the Glen Eira News for details if and when changes come into effect.

Some important features of Council's plan include:

- Gardenvale and Elsternwick will be separately identified with the recommended boundary to run along the middle of Parnell Street, Nagle Avenue and down St James Parade. This area was the subject of over 230 comments and Council felt that this would be the most suitable boundary aligning to what is generally known by most residents.
- Caulfield East would be extended to include the streets between Queens Avenue and Grange Road and include Monash University Caulfield campus, Caulfield racecourse and the Derby Road shopping centre. The small area between Kambrook Road and Smith Street would remain Caulfield North following requests from residents in that area.
- Moorabbin would change to Bentleigh, and Oakleigh South would change to Bentleigh East, in line with requests from local residents and significant approval rates to previous Council surveys.
- The suburb of Ormond would be officially recognised above North Road as well as below.
- The west side of Poath Road, currently known as Oakleigh would become Murrumbeena.



• The east side of **Thomas Street** would remain **Brighton East**.

A number of residents asked that Bentleigh, Ormond and McKinnon extend from Tucker Road through to East Boundary Road. Other residents asked that Glen Huntly be extended to take in the streets east of Grange Road. Council has asked the Place Names Committee to further investigate these areas as well

as the Gardenvale / Elsternwick boundary, before reaching its decision.

The map also highlights the post codes that have been suggested by Australia Post should the boundaries be approved by the Place Names Committee. They have not yet been confirmed, so please don't start using new post codes yet!

Brown's technical command with linocut printing has been favourably compared with one of Australia's best and well known print makers, Margaret Preston.


The artist's subject matter ranges from domestic themes, still life and children's illustrations.


Kellyann Geurts

People who run businesses from home - within the municipality and from around Melbourne - came to hear several speakers and, most importantly, network with other small businesses.

The seminar, opened by Glen Eira Mayor Cr Alan Grossbard, was organised by Council in conjunction with local resident Peter Schmideg, who has worked from home for 16 years and this year published Your Guide to Working From Home - Getting Started, Getting Motivated, Getting Business.

Glen Eira City Council recognises that home business today is big business, with more than 343,000 Australians currently working from home (according to the Australian Bureau of Statistics). More and more people are using modern technology to set up home businesses in the rapidly growing SOHO (Small Office Home Office) market.

Speakers included Peter Schmideg, an accountant, Internet service provider, insurance broker and Council's business development planner Andrew Millen, as well as a panel discussion.

Mr Schmideg told the audience: "Home business is at the forefront of a new way of working, and a lifestyle without peak hour traffic, 9 to 5 hours and bosses, and providing fluid and flexible hours to integrate professional and personal time."

"I started out in 1981 with a golfball typewriter and a phone, and to say you worked from home was embarrassing. Today, with faxes, mobiles and Internet, geographical location doesn't matter, and home business is taking off."

"The challenge is to have the discipline and motivation to work effectively, know when to work and when not to work and deal with procrastination and isolation working at home."
