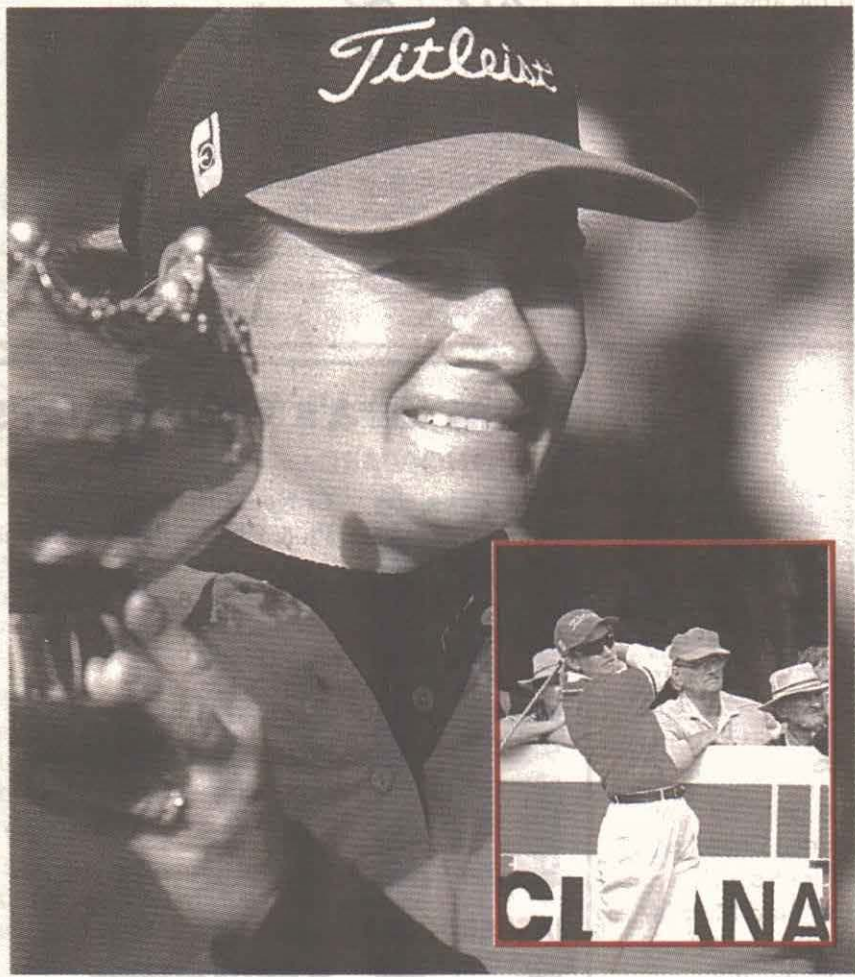


World's top golfers coming to Yarra Yarra

New home for Glen Eira U3A

The opening of a permanent home for Glen Eira U3A has been described as the "most significant event in Glen Eira for the last 10 years!"

University of the Third Age president Don Dunstan said the opening heralded a new era for the university by enabling them to have permanent classrooms and facilities for the first time.

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Alan Grossbard last month officially opened the new home at the former Glen Huntly Bowling Club. About 90 people attended the

opening and enjoyed a barbecue lunch before adjourning for the group's AGM.

The Glen Eira U3A, formerly Caulfield U3A, is run by volunteers and offers educational classes for people over 55. Mr Dunstan said the U3A had a membership of up to 800 students and offered 50 different courses on everything from art and painting to travel and philosophy and from languages to computers.

Mr Dunstan, who founded the group in 1988, said being involved with U3A gave him a "sense of achievement" as he knew the courses were useful to the citizens of Glen Eira. He said the demand for courses had grown dramatically and most classes were full.

The group has previously operated from several locations in the City, including Oak Tree House, adjoining Glen Eira town hall, which is to be developed as a community arts facility.

Glen Eira City Council organised to lease the vacant Glen Huntly Bowling Club from the Public Transport Corporation, and sub-let the

venue to the U3A. The group will be paying rent, and contributing half the costs of minor repairs.

Cr Grossbard said: "I am delighted that Glen Eira U3A now has a base where it can continue its excellent work, providing educational classes and workshops for older members of the community.

"As we all know, we never stop learning, and I am sure, this location will be a stimulating place for many residents in the years to come."

Glen Eira: A growing City

The latest census shows our city's population has grown by 3050 people. This is a modest increase of 2.6 per cent from census period 1991 to 1996. Glen Eira now has 120,226 residents, giving our city the fourth highest population in Melbourne.

The census brought to light some interesting points. The highest age group in Glen Eira is the 25-39 age bracket, but a large number of residents are also in the older age groups, and 21.4 per cent of our population are 60 years of age and above (compared with the Victorian total of 15.9 per cent). More than 35 per cent of the City's population was born overseas. Of these, the major countries of birth include: United Kingdom, Poland, Greece and Italy.

Future Plans for our City

Glen Eira Council recently launched its Corporate Plan 1997-2000. I urge you to read about the future plan for the City and how we will achieve it over the next three years. Copies of this publication are available at all our libraries and at the Town Hall. This is the framework for the future growth of our City, so your feedback would really be appreciated.

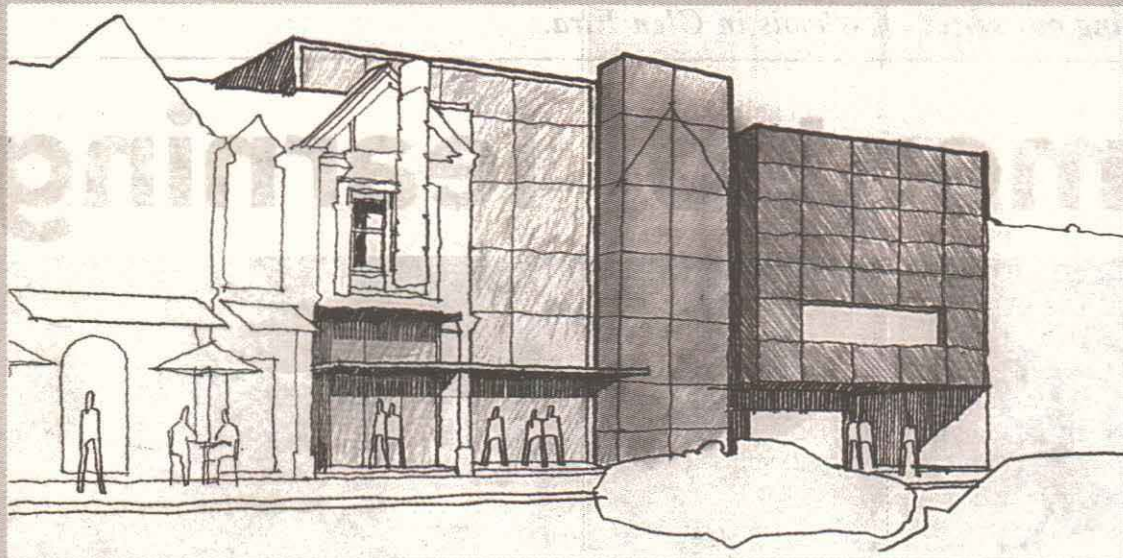

Cinema facelift approved



Glen Eira City Council has approved plans to redevelop the Elsternwick Classic Cinema, which will transform the existing building into a modern complex comprising three cinemas and seating for an additional 550 patrons.

The new complex will include office space, a multi-purpose children's party room, and a large foyer area which can be used as a public area for functions, exhibitions and displays.

Glen Eira Business Development Planner Andrew Millen said the proposal had been well supported and was expected to inject enthusiasm and rejuvenate the Elsternwick centre by being a catalyst for additional projects.

The proposal is in keeping with Council's corporate goal to "promote the concept of neighborhoods and urban villages which contain facilities, services, businesses and institutions which are mutually supporting".

The plans are consistent with this urban village theme for Elsternwick as they will add to the range of community facilities in the centre and to the

commercial and recreational activities, as well as enhancing the vibrancy of the centre.

The new complex will strengthen the concept of living, working, shopping and recreating in the same area, and increase the activity and public surveillance in the shopping centre in the evenings.

The redevelopment has also been supported by Elsternwick Main Street Committee. In a letter to Council on behalf of the committee, Elsternwick Centre Management said traders believed "the proposed expansion will assist in the revitalisation of the shopping strip by providing an improved entertainment facility" and will offer local residents and workforce "a choice of movies in state-of-the-art facilities".

The committee believed the redevelopment would "help to prevent escape expenditure" to Chadstone and Southland shopping centres, to the benefit of local traders.

"The expansion of the Classic will help Main Street in the redevelopment of Elsternwick and in the forming of an identity..." Elsternwick Centre Management said.

Continuing our series on schools in Glen Eira.

The excitement of learning



A short walk around Caulfield South Primary School clearly illustrates how education has changed and evolved. Gone are the days when the three R's, reading writing and 'rithmetic were the extent of a child's primary schooling.

These days the basics are enhanced with a multitude of exciting programs in which Reading and Literature come alive through activities. Excursions, visiting teachers, information technology and in-house celebrations all add to the excitement of learning.



Last month a colourful Book Week parade where each child chose a favourite literary character to portray celebrated the "Love of Literature".

In the science room students are given the opportunity to investigate and to invent and build gadgets and an annual school wide competition encourages families to join the fun of scientific

discovery as well. This year's challenge was to invent something which could fly.

A highlight of Term 3 was weekly visits from the Tri-Skills Gymnastics Team. These sessions gave each child the chance to develop new skills and confidence in this specialist area with help from the experts. Look out Sydney 2000!

Students to be immersed!

Caulfield Primary School is about to pilot an English / Japanese bilingual program, in which students will have some lessons in Japanese.

Unlike traditional LOTE classes, this is an 'immersion type' program, providing lessons in both English and Japanese. The fundamental idea is to teach through language, rather than about it, using the second language exclusively.

Caulfield Primary is one of only three primary schools nationwide chosen for the bilingual program. Funding comes from the Department of Education's Bilingual Schools Project.

Principal John Solomon said the project would be partly implemented in Term 4 and the full program would be up and running for Term 1, 1998.

"We're still developing the curriculum focus, however, we anticipate the program will include arts and maths classes," Mr Solomon said.

"Caulfield Primary School is ideally suited to a program such as this and will maximise its potential through our relatively small class sizes. While every year level will participate in the program, each class will average only 15-20 students at a time, providing the teachers with lots of scope for interaction with each member of the class."

The school will be making extensive use of computer-based learning programs including specially developed software, CD-ROM interactives and access to the Internet. Two full time teachers and a teacher's aide have been appointed to head-up the program. They will work closely with Caulfield's recently acquired sister school in Japan, as well as developing cross-cultural friendships with the Japanese School of Melbourne in Caulfield.

"Securing funding for the bilingual program further reinforces our commitment to providing a high quality, forward thinking LOTE program in Japanese", explained Mr Solomon. "There are real opportunities for innovation and curricula development in smaller schools that would not be possible in much larger schools."

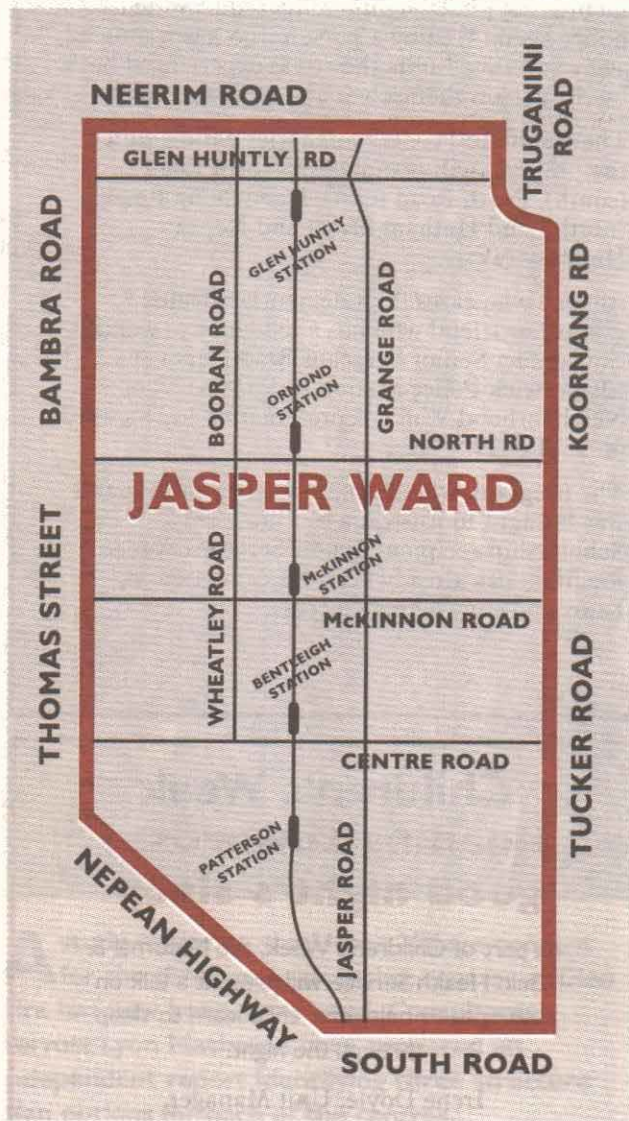

MEET YOUR Councillors

Writer Susanne Shaw continues her series on Glen Eira's Councillors. In this second instalment, she talks to the Council's Jasper Ward representatives.

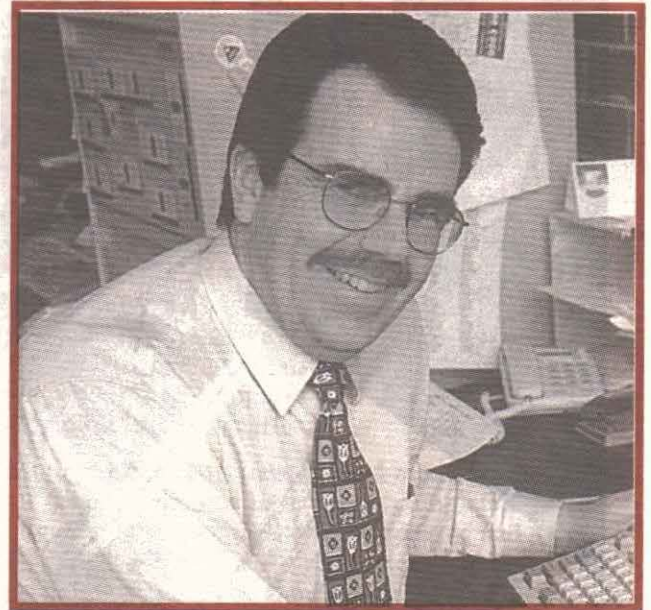
Time, according to Russell Longmuir, is a precious commodity. In both his demanding roles of running his own body corporate management business and as a Jasper Ward Councillor, time is a major factor and one not to be wasted. This perspective on life leads him to constantly look for new and creative ways to use time more wisely.

For the last 14 years he has brought this skill to his business, and most recently, to his latest role as a Glen Eira Councillor. His daily business comprises of quickly and efficiently resolving the myriad of issues raised by the owners of the buildings he manages – be it a blown light bulb or a burst water pipe. Running a municipality, says Russell, is no different. For both, it is a case of "simple organisation".

"I tend to look at things from a 'bird's eye view' and it comes down to a matter of prioritising. We have a municipality of 117,000 residents and to successfully manage it, we need to have rapid response mechanisms or systems in place to ensure any problems or issues are dealt with within specified time frames. It is no use taking an ad hoc approach to it," Russell explained.

As a long time resident of the City of Glen Eira, Russell says that he observed decisions made by both elected Councillors and State-appointed Commissioners and at times found himself questioning the wisdom behind them.

"I guess I have always been outspoken. Even as a kid, I would look around and ask why on earth would someone make a decision like that and not this way. In choosing to run for Council, I felt that I was at an age and had sufficient experience in dealing with people to understand



how things happen. I would rather spend my time where I can have the most impact," Russell explained.

Not surprisingly, Russell is a great advocate of the City's Customer Service Centre. Rather than have residents contact Councillors direct on any issue, Russell would like to see residents contact a Customer Service Officer who would be able to immediately take on board the problem and follow it through to completion.

"I have in fact been surprised by the lack of phone calls from residents," Russell says. "Now, that could mean one of two things: they are either not bothering or they are happy with the response from our Customer Service Centre. For me, if all the systems are in place and working well and my phone doesn't ring, well, that's the ultimate."

Barry Neve

Barry Neve is a practical, no nonsense type of man. Over 20 years serving in the Victoria Police force has given him less of a taste for "copious reams of paperwork and formalities" and more of a preference for "getting in there, rolling up the shirt sleeves and getting the job done". And this is exactly the approach Barry brings to his role as a Jasper Ward Councillor.

"I tend to look at things from a practical point of view," Barry says.

"Most of my contact with the public when I was in the police force was in a negative context, as it was either people being on the wrong side of the law getting caught or people on the right side of the law being victims. So there was a lot of negotiation, a lot of conciliation and arbitration and all that," he explained.

"As a Councillor, my main aim is to get the job done, not to spend a lot of time on what I suppose you could class as modern business principles. As much as I can appreciate the role of attending meetings, all the paperwork and reading, the formalities and all the reports, I sometimes find that they can actually stop you from doing the job. I am much more into the grassroots... how things work and how people's minds work."

Barry says he "fell into" community relations in the mid 1980s when, as a police officer, he established the then new local Neighbourhood Watch programs – an experience he found extremely positive.

"They weren't protest programs or anything like that – they were about people joining together to get something



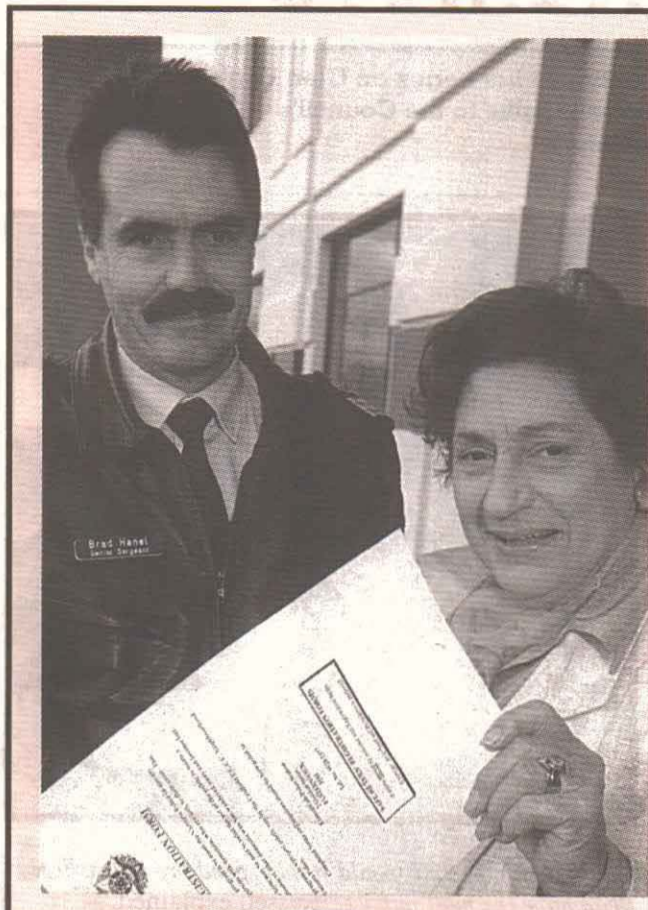
done. I suppose that really fitted into my personal approach: don't just sit back and whinge – get in there and do something and be positive about it."

Barry was first voted in unopposed to the former Moorabbin Council in 1988.

He admits he had no particular "burning desire" to become a Councillor, nor did he enter Local Government with a "reformist agenda, an axe to grind or a fight to light".

Instead, he simply had a clear mind of "what had to be and what should be done" and the practicality and confidence to achieve it.

For Barry, serving as a Councillor is not about promising to "move mountains or change the world". It is about being realistic about budgetary constraints, State Government laws and regulations and changing political agendas, and "getting in there and doing the best you can for everyone".



Ensuring a safe return

Minimising safety risks to dementia sufferers who may "wander" from their residence is the focus of the new Caulfield Safe Return Program.

An initiative of the Police Community Consultative Committee (PCCC), the program enables police to more quickly locate, identify and return the person to their carer.

The carer completes an application form with descriptive details, and a photo of the person. This information and the computer photo image is transferred to a central data base held at the Elsternwick Police Station.

Immediately a registered person is reported missing, the details and the photo image are faxed to local police stations for use by police in patrol cars. The details are also faxed to any nominated likely destinations the person may go.

The availability of the information and identifying photo significantly reduces the time police spend finding a person who has wandered away and thus limits the stress experienced both by the person themselves and by their carer.

The Caulfield PCCC boundaries within which the program will operate are: North Road (south), Poath Road (east), Dandenong Road (north), and Hotham Street and Nepean Highway (west).

Anyone who cares for a dementia affected relative or friend who has a tendency to wander, can contact Senior Sergeant Brad Hanel at Elsternwick Police Station on 9528 5577, or Neighborhood Watch representative Joy Steward on 9571 5429.

The program, which originated in America and was brought to Australia by Churchill Scholarship recipient Senior Sergeant Wayne Fielding, has already been implemented in Knox and shown great success.

Adult learners celebrate

Adult Learners Week was held in September, and the Caulfield Adult Literacy Group and the Adult Migrant English Service (AMES) in Malvern were ready to celebrate.

Caulfield Adult Literacy Group set up a display of language materials in Caulfield Library. The group runs classes in Conversational English, English as a Second Language and Adult Literacy, for people wanting to improve their skills in reading, writing and numeracy.

A new language class allows people to learn English while learning about Australian society, its history, and its political and social structures. The group is also hoping to start a basic computer class, depending on demand.

The AMES group held a multicultural luncheon, to which more than 100 students brought dishes from their home countries. Art and crafts, national costumes, and lessons in traditional dancing, including Bosnian, Greek, Ethiopian, Ukranian, and Aussie bush dancing were all part of the festivities.

Documents on public display

Council's Strategic Planning Department's recently completed draft 'Non Residential Uses in Residential Zones' Policy is now on public exhibition at the Town Planning counter, Glen Eira City Hall.

The Monash Medical Centre Precinct Structure Plan (Options Paper) is also on display. Council welcomes any written comments regarding either document.

The policy aims to ensure that non-residential uses are successfully integrated into residential areas with minimum impact and no real loss of residential amenity. The policy will act as a guide for developers wishing to submit a planning application for any non-residential use in a residential zone. Such uses include medical centres, childcare centres, nursing homes and veterinary centres. The policy details Council's objectives for a number of issues that affect all non-residential uses. These include: preferred location, siting and design, streetscape character, traffic and parking, landscaping, advertising signage, hours of operation, control of noise and lighting.

Also on exhibition is the Monash Medical Centre Precinct Structure Plan (Options Paper). The background report details three possible options for medical development within the precinct. Council

is seeking comment from local residents and businesses in the area (many of whom will be notified by mail). After the public exhibition stage, a preferred option will be adopted by Council and will form the basis of the Monash Medical Centre Precinct Policy. Medical centres and related activities proposed for this local area will be encouraged to locate within this precinct to ensure that future residential encroachment is restricted.

Exploring urban villages



A study exploring the Urban Village concept for the three main shopping centres of Glen Eira has now been completed. Consultants Perrott Lyon Matheson have prepared an independent report identifying three structure plan options for each of the centres.

Bentleigh, Carnegie and Elsternwick centres have the characteristics of "urban villages" – the important factors of public transport, employment and residential opportunities. The Urban Village Report investigates the centres' potential in terms of future development providing vitality and growth to the centre, and consideration as multi-purpose community centres.

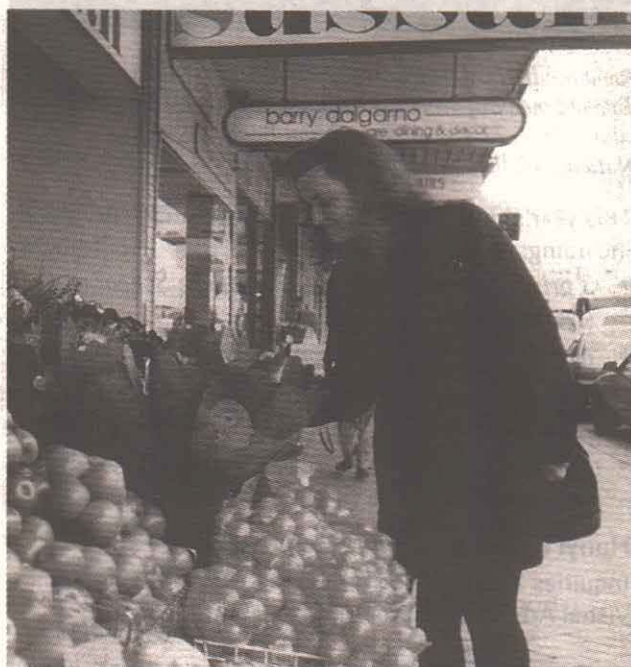
The report considers residential support in the centres via shop-top housing or high density housing, commercial development sites, carparking provision and the utilisation and connection of existing community facilities. Copies of the draft final report and maps are on display at Bentleigh, Carnegie, Elsternwick and Caulfield Libraries and at the Planning Counter at the Town Hall.

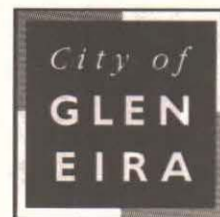

New crossing for walk with care

Pedestrian signals will be installed at McKinnon Road through the McKinnon Shopping Centre by July 1998, as one of a number of engineering measures being considered by Glen Eira City Council to increase elderly pedestrian safety.

In conjunction with VicRoads, Council has continued its pedestrian road safety campaign, "Walk With Care", which aims to reduce the number of road accidents involving older pedestrians by educating older people on how to plan trips carefully and how to ensure they are alert and visible around traffic.

The results of a recent survey identified a number of issues facing elderly pedestrians including the following:

- uneven/damaged footpaths and overhanging vegetation at various locations;
- cyclists/skateboarders on footpaths;
- shop goods on footpaths in shopping centres;
- cars failing to stop at the pedestrian signals at Centre Road, East Bentleigh;
- turning vehicles failing to give way to pedestrians

at Centre Road/East Boundary Road;

- lack of pedestrian crossing facilities at:
 - Kooyong Road, north of Gardenvale Road,
 - Kangaroo Road/Murrumbeena Road,
 - Alma Road at Orrong Crescent,
 - Booran Road/Woodville Road, and
 - McKinnon Road, McKinnon Shopping Centre.

Pedestrians in the 60 plus age group represent 35 per cent of all pedestrian accidents and 90 per cent of fatalities in the municipality. The City of Glen Eira has a high proportion of elderly residents, with 22.4 per cent aged over 60 in comparison to the state average of 15.2 per cent.

A key aspect of the "Walk With Care" campaign is informal discussion groups among the over 60s at senior citizens' clubs, bowling clubs, accommodation homes and other community venues. Discussion groups are currently being scheduled for October.
