And of course a Christmas event would not be complete without the man himself - Father Christmas has been booked for a special appearance.


Sponsored by Tattersall's, the concert is free and, by arrangement with the Victorian Amateur Turf Club, will be held at the racecourse for the first time. Families are encouraged to bring along a picnic dinner and relax on the lawns of the Terrace Whittier Stand. Should the weather turn doubtful, the stands will provide shelter for up to 2000 people.

The evening will begin with candle and program sales by the Caulfield Girl Guides at 6.30pm (programs \$2 and candles 50 cents with proceeds going to the Glen Eira Community Information and Resource Centre Emergency Relief). From 6.45 to 8.15pm, the pre-carols entertainment will get into full swing and includes the High Wire Circus Performing Arts Group, McKinnon Secondary College Stage Band, and children's entertainer Sasha LeFevre. The carols will begin at 8.30pm.

Decision makers' dinner

Eighty-six people, including Members of Parliament, chief executives of both private and public companies, and mayors of surrounding municipalities, attended Council's first Decision Makers' Dinner in October. Other guests included presidents of service clubs, principals of major schools, Glen Eira councillors, main street organisers, and real estate agents.

Held at Yarra Yarra Golf Club in East Bentleigh, the dinner provided the opportunity for Council to inform community leaders of its activities and provide a vision for the city for the year 2020.

Glen Eira Chief Executive Margaret Douglas spoke about the developments taking place within the city at the moment and planned for the next three years, then Mayor Cr Alan Grossbard addressed the vision of Glen Eira for the year 2020. He talked about a number of issues, including Glen Eira's population size and mix, housing, environment, education and learning, business and tourism, and the role of Council.

Suburb name changes - what's happening?

Residents' poll - Elsternwick/Gardenvale area

Residents will be aware that earlier this year Glen Eira Council was directed by the Victorian Place Names Committee to recommend an option which would define all suburb boundaries within the municipality.

Following representations from a number of local residents, in late October the Council undertook a second survey of residents in the area bounded by Parnell Street, Nagle Avenue, St James Parade, Elster Avenue and Kooyong Road, seeking comments on whether they preferred their suburb name as Elsternwick or Gardenvale.

The results were:

Total properties (approx.)	380	
Replies in favour of Elsternwick	121	54.5 per cent of replies or 31.8 per cent of all households
Replies in favour of Gardenvale	97	43.7 per cent of replies or 25.5 per cent of all households
Replies for both names (different views within same household)	4	
TOTAL REPLIES	222	58.4 per cent of all households

Council has subsequently decided to refer these results to the Place Names Committee, which will have the final say on all suburb names. Council did not express an opinion on what this area should be called, and believes this should be a matter for the Committee to decide.

Thank you to all residents who participated in the survey.

A further chance to comment

The Victorian Place Names Committee has recently published a notice in the local press advising that any objections to Council's proposal to define its suburb boundaries must be lodged with the Committee by **23 December 1997**. We are unaware of when the Place Names Committee will be making its final decision on assigning the names, however it probably won't be until **early 1998**.

Horses yes - but much more

Victorian Amateur Turf Club marketing manager John Bennetts loves horses. From attending the races with his father at age seven, to buying a share in a racehorse with his first-ever pay packet, John has been involved in horses and horse racing most of his life.

It's no surprise to him then that he has "ended up" at the VATC at Caulfield Racecourse where he has worked as marketing manager since July 1994.

Managed by a board of trustees and the VATC committee, the Caulfield Racecourse site held its first horse race in 1859. The jockeys rode through rough bush and heathland and "snake infested patches of swamp"! The VATC held its first meeting in 1876 and in 1879 the club introduced the Caulfield Cup to its events calendar.

But Caulfield Racecourse offers much more to the public than horse racing. Racing events occur on 31 weekends and public holidays, but for the remainder of the year the area is open for passive recreation and hosts a range of events, festivals, and trade shows. And this year Caulfield Racecourse will host the City of Glen Eira Carols by Candlelight on Sunday 21 December.

The area is also used by associations and hobby groups such as the Caulfield Light Aircraft Club, and by members of the community for weddings and other celebrations. A number of annual festivals and conferences are held at the racecourse on non-race

days, and Monash University students attend exams twice a year at the complex.

John said the VATC was keen to make the Crown land on which Caulfield Racecourse is built, more attractive and accessible to the public. He said the area had undergone a number of changes over the last few years which opened it up to the public, including new open metallic spear fencing which replaces the solid corrugated iron fence.

He said much of the area was either being or had been landscaped, making the course a much more attractive recreational area. The public are welcome to fish for trout in the lake in the centre of the course, which is restocked with trout every six months.

John said many people who would never go to the races were discovering the area.

"Many people who may otherwise never set foot on the place come along to a 'Talk to the Animals' conference or a trade show, and realise there are a number of other options here," he said.

Another feature of Caulfield Racecourse is the museum of racing memorabilia, consisting of donated and loaned material from racing lovers, which was opened by the Queen in 1981. The museum is open on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10am to 4pm and on race days.

Glen Eira's got 33,000 jobs!

Did you know that the City of Glen Eira has more than 5500 registered businesses with an estimated 32,940 jobs?

A report, commissioned by Council to provide an economic profile of the City, has provided information on business and industry locations and employment structures which will help Council in planning and developing policies.

The municipality hosts a wide range of industries. The employment emphasis seems to be on service-oriented industries such as education, health and community services; the retail sector; finance, insurance, property and business services; and the entertainment industry, which includes cafes and restaurants, and cultural and recreational services (see Table 1).

Together with personal and other services, government administration and defence, and communication services, these service-sector industries make up almost 80 per cent of all jobs available in the Glen Eira economy.

At June 1996, according to the ABS registry of businesses, the City of Glen Eira had 5525 registered business locations. The finance, insurance, property and business services sector makes up the largest component at 33.9 per cent, representing almost 1900 businesses. Next is the wholesale and retail trade 23.7 per cent, and then education 12.7 per cent (see Table 2).

Many of the businesses in the finance, insurance, property and business services sector are relatively small, employing fewer than five people, and a significant number are home-based businesses. Glen Eira has a significant number of businesses in entertainment industries, such as cultural, recreational and other services and accommodation, cafes and restaurants.

The report has been used in preparing the Glen Eira Municipal Strategic Statement, which is used as a reference tool by Council, and also in the preparation of the Business Development Strategy.


If you like the contemporary and the very beautiful, then this exhibition is for you. If you think contemporary art and craft is unapproachable then this exhibition will change your mind.

Episodes

People have long made the link between the idea of artistic genius and madness. For some, this link is a stereotype, that is, a disservice to both artists, and the mentally ill. For others, the concept of madness questions ideas of what is normal. This exhibition seeks to investigate these two positions, through art work by artists who have, and by artists who have not experienced mental illness.

Artists featured include Mike Parr and Gordon Bennett, both very well known Australian contemporary artists. Jane Burton was commissioned to take photographs of a psychiatric hospital, and David Cavanagh powerfully represents the experience of depression. British artist Graham Harwood's CD Rom, Rehearsal of Memory, tells the stories of some criminally insane, the very extreme minority in terms of the mentally ill, in a way that poignantly questions notions of responsibility, insanity and the law. Tasmanian artist Rebecca Greenwood in collaboration with 5 other artists have produced work comprising sculpture, photography and poetry that looks at the social and bureaucratic language of madness.

Talking Textiles Textiles by Petrina Dakin

What are textiles? I asked. The three artists laughed at the magnitude of my question. Yes, they found a formal answer -"fibre based work" - but as they talked about their own explorations. I began to understand that textiles were an almost limitless opportunity for expression in many different forms.

Martine van Zuilen works in felt, Nicola Cerini prints furnishing fabrics, Naomi Ota explores traditional Japanese themes in fabric sculptures. They, along with silk screen printer Lyn Menon, will be the voices of Talking Textiles, on Sunday 14 December from 10.30am to 4pm at the Glen Eira Arts Complex Theatrette, organised by Council's arts programmers. Martine van Zuilen has just returned from an incredible trip to Russia and Mongolia to study feltmaking - taking a massive 2500 slides to record her encounter with the traditional, living uses of felt: as clothing, as housing. She will be sharing some of the images in her slide talk Felt Like a Nomad.

Martine said: "It is the oldest textile in the world. I was very inspired by my travels, and it was important to connect with the beginnings of felt. I met people who live in felt tents."

Martine makes her own felt - formed from wool using compression and heat - and takes her art from the raw material to finished piece. She is inspired by felt's flexibility: "There is no limit to size or shape. It can be used for footwear, rugs, 3D sculpture..." She has been a feltmaker and teacher for 12 years, and her enthusiasm has helped create a surge of interest in Australia. She is also vice-president of Victorian Feltmakers.

Nicola Cerini is a textile designer/maker, specialising in furnishing fabrics, whose work has been acquired by the National Gallery of Victoria. She has also featured in Vogue magazine and is a Northern Territory Craft Acquisition Award winner.

"I'm now on my third range of furniture fabrics. The last one, I printed designs for various furniture, then cut them up and resewed them as a patchwork. The third range is on hemp and cotton, for things such as cushions, ottomans, deck chairs, material lengths. My design is commercially printed and there is a growing appreciation (for specialist design). I'm selling through shops here, and now in Hong Kong and elsewhere overseas."

Part of the work, of course is marketing. Nicola is aided by her selling agent - her mother. She also enjoys taking part in exhibitions, where she prints one-offs on different textures, such as dressing room screens, wall hangings and reupholstered furniture. Nicola is also a teacher and is involved in a Filipino women's

workshop. "I love to encourage others and the share the enjoyment of working with textiles," she said.

Naomi Ota is a textile artist and winner of the Grand Prix at the Kyoto International Textile Exhibition she will speak about the evolution of her work, combining traditional knowledge with contemporary developments.

Naomi says she had a traditional education in textiles but discovered on a visit to Indonesia that for these people, creating and using textiles were closer to their daily life than she had previously encountered. She realised that her native Japan was losing its traditional ways.

She has sought to recapture traditional symbols and to develop the spiritual side of her work, in striking sculptures using cloth.

Lyn Menon (not pictured) is a textile designer and silk screen printer, who has successfully run Menon Art Designs for over 10 years. An inspirational speaker, she will be sharing marketing tips and her business knowledge, as well as displaying her work.

Talking Textiles - a must for textile lovers, artists and students, Sunday 14 December, 10am-4pm, Glen Eira Arts Complex Theatrette.

Listen to four fabulous speakers and see slides of their work and travels, browse the bookshop, watch demonstrations of textile products, find out about courses, associations and suppliers, view an exhibition and perhaps purchase an original textile artwork.

A place to learn and share ideas

'Community houses' bring people together to learn and share ideas and revitalise community life. Established in 1988, Caulfield South Community House has evolved through several names, locations and coordinators, to develop its own direction and style.

In February 1996, Caulfield South Community House was officially opened in a former church at 450 Kooyong Road. In its short history, the house has run some very successful programs and courses, including bookkeeping, counselling skills and anger management for women. Personal tuition in basic word processing helped some people overcome their fear of computers, while a 'developing study skills' course prepared yet another group for tertiary study.

The program includes a singing and drama group which develops confidence through drama and uses breathing exercises, relaxation and meditation, and music for selfhealing. A discussion group meets to talk about selected topics and a communication group explores 'What do you say after you say hello?' and 'Feel the fear and do it anyway'. The house also has a massage course for couples.

All courses are available at a cost of \$2 per session. 
festival of Jewish learning

t is said that learning is the lifeblood of the Jewish people. The study of the Torah (the Bible) and its commentaries and the traditions of Jewish law and philosophy – with their practical observance-have preserved the identity of the Jewish people throughout their dispersion around the world.

Nowhere does this come more into focus than in the period of communal study termed Yarchei Kallah.

The concept originated 1800 years ago in Babylon. The Rabbis of the time designated certain months of the year in which people were to take time off from their normal working routine and devote themselves solely to the study of Torah. Through these intense sessions, the Babylonian Talmud – the great corpus of discussion of Jewish law – was completed over a period of 60 years.

The tradition of Yarchei Kallah has been revived, and for the past 14 years it has generally been held in Melbourne over eight days from 25 December to 1 January. Men and women have a full morning's learning available each day. Topics range from thestudy of Jewish philosophy, law and biblical commentary, to problems of the application of Jewish law, and contemporary social issues.

The program has also contained lectures on the relationship of Judaism and science on Jewish history. This free program is run by the Melbourne Kollel Lubavitch under the auspices of the Yeshivah Centre. Creche and child minding facilities are available, plus classes for older children. For details,

The service station is no ordinary place – there is something quite different about it. When my host mother drove past, I noticed with curiosity that there were no pumps. Before I could ask where they were, I found them. They were hanging from the roof. Technology!!



Country of vending machines

On my first visit to Japan, one of the things I noticed was the large number of vending machines. They are everywhere: beside railway lines, in quiet residential areas, along footpaths, in front of shops and even in the rice fields.

But why are they so popular? Well, for a start, they are accessible 24 hours a day, unlike most shops in Japan. Another reason is that no human power is needed except for reloading them, whereas a shop requires constant attention. Also, Japan is one of the most advanced countries in the world technologically, so they naturally invent a lot of versions of the vending machine. Yet another reason is they take up less room in a shop and, in Japan, space is absolutely vital.

Vending machines sell a huge range of things from railway tickets to cigarettes, video tapes, umbrellas and even flowers. They also sell things that can be hot or cold, like coffee and tea. Some vending machines have cartoon characters to attract children's attention; like an ice-cream truck playing a tune. The particular one I saw was selling popcorn. It had a character called "Hello Kitty" on the front. Rumour has it there is even a potato chip maker that deep-fries chips while you wait, and coffee machines that let you pick your choice of coffee beans.

40 years of service

From a small meeting of interested community members on July 18, 1957, a 40-year tradition of fundraising was born.

The jointly run Caulfield Voluntary Workers Shop and Lions Club Inc Volunteers Op Shop raises money through the sale of donated goods to support a range of community organisations, from the Caulfield Memorial Youth Centre to the Elderly Citizens Club.

Over the years, the shop has donated \$22,000 to the youth centre, \$4600 to the elderly citizens centre, and a grand total of \$200,000 to the Council welfare and nursing home. Recent donations also include goods and clothing for needy people and school books for children.

First opened near Imperial Avenue in Glen Huntly Road the shop moved to Hawthorn Road in 1971. When it burned down in 1985, it was forced to move again to Glen Huntly Road. In 1993, Caulfield Lions Club joined the volunteers and set up the present shop at 770 Glen Huntly Road.

FAREWELL TO JESS

On 1 November, with the death of Mrs Jess Green aged 88, Carnegie lost one of its most dedicated and hardworking community volunteers. Her late husband Bill was a Caulfield councillor for many years, and Jess was Mayoress of the City three times: 1956, 1960 and 1968.

From 1949 onwards, she served on many committees including those of the local school and bowling club, the Carnegie auxiliary of the Southern Memorial Hospital (now Caulfield General Medical Centre), and the baby health centre's ladies' committee. But her greatest achievements were in founding and literally running the Carnegie Elderly Citizens Club and its associate opportunity shop in Rosstown Road. The elderly citizens club was opened in 1957 and still flourishes in Neerim Road.

The 'op shop' opened in 1961 – the first day's takings were 12/6 – and when it was reluctantly closed in 1994, more than \$300,000 had been raised.

Jess Green's many contributions to the City and its citizens should long be remembered.

Swimming Pool and Spa Safety

The domestic swimming pool or spa provides many hours of great family entertainment. Tragically, it can also claim the lives of small children and infants.

A high incidence of fatal and serious injuries to children prompted the State Government to review safety requirements and, as a result, new State laws governing pool and spa security were introduced on 1 July 1997.

These retrospective Building Regulations stipulate that all owners of swimming pools, wading pools and spas which have a depth of more than 300mm, constructed before 8 April 1991, are required to have safety barriers installed (which can include a fence, wall, gate or screen as well as locks, latches or other devices to doors, gates and windows) to prevent young children from gaining access to these areas.

Does this law affect you?


All swimming pools and spas should now have fully installed protection barriers. That means that if pool or spa owners do not already have a barrier in place, they need to act immediately to ensure that the barrier is installed to comply with Victorian legislation.

If you are in doubt about the barriers that are already in place or about what you need to install, you can seek advice from Council's Building department or consult a private building surveyor.

Are there any penalties?

Yes. Counci's Building Department may visit your site at any time to be certain safety measures for your swimming pool or spa, are in place and are adequately maintained. Pool and spa owners who have not complied with the requirements risk an onthe-spot fine of \$200 and further legal action for breach of the Building Regulations.

Information kits for pool and spa owners, prepared and provided by the Building Control Commission, are available at Council's building services department on 9524 3201. Also, Council's Building Department provides an inspection service to assess your property's requirements and issue a compliance certificate (a \$120 fee applies).




A fun-tastic day
