State first for food safety

A Bentleigh café deli is believed to be the first retail food premises in Victoria to meet the State Government's stringent new requirements for safe food handling.

Gioni's Café Deli at 353 Centre Road has used food hygiene consultants Comton Pty Ltd to design and implement a food safety plan, covering all shop operations. All microbiological and health hazards are listed, and the measures and actions to take if something should happen.

This high achievement has earned Gioni's owner Mrs Nicky Petousis-Kyrou the Glen Eira City Council's prestigious five star rating in Council's award-winning Food Hygiene Audit program.

Opened in July 1997, Gioni's staff have already undertaken a food hygiene course at Barton TAFE as well as implemented the food safety plan, which are both required under the new Food (Amendment) Act.

The new State Government regulations require all food shops to do this within the next three years, which should see a dramatic increase in hygiene and safety levels in food shops.

Glen Eira City Council is at the forefront of food safety promotion, piloting programs which are now being adopted by other councils across Victoria. Already running a four-star Food Hygiene Audit, it launched the five star program in mid-1997 and Gioni's was the first food premises to meet the top rating.

Library branch leader Linda Baker said the Wild Action activity was a great success and was always popular with the children.

New sporting and recreation centre proposed

An initial concept proposal for redeveloping Princes Park and vicinity sport ovals and recreation centres into a sporting complex appropriate for community use into the next millenium has been presented by community-based sporting group Maccabi Group. Council has held two

consultative meetings and received many fruitful comments which need to be assessed. The next stage will be to invite expressions of interest from any other interested parties who would like to redevelop the area.

Our recreational and sporting facilities are around 30-50 years old and can benefit from a capital injection. By developing partnerships with community groups, we can provide the upgrade needed. But I must stipulate one condition - that our community can use these new facilities.






The big dry help save our trees!

ue to the extreme heat and dry conditions expected for the rest of summer and autumn, Glen Eira City Council's Park Services and Glen Eira Trees team are asking residents to help save our streetscapes by watering trees on the nature strip outside

Glen Eira Trees endeavours to water all newly planted and young trees, although with about 1000 trees being planted each year, this becomes a huge task. The Council's water tank is already working flat out watering these trees in the hot, dry conditions.

Council's parks facilitator Jens-Peter Coombes said: "We are asking residents to help out and water trees on nature strips regularly. This is easy for most newly planted trees because they have a black agricultural pipe placed at the base of the tree, which directs water straight to the root zone where it is needed most.

"10 to 20 litres of water twice a week in hot weather should go a long way towards ensuring a healthy long-lived tree.'

Councillor Veronika Martens, whose portfolio covers parks, said: "The Council and community can work together to protect our streetscapes during the driest weather in Melbourne for nearly 100 years.

"Without heavy and consistent rain soon, our trees will be in trouble - some already are. Trees are one of the City's best assets, and we need to all help water them to keep our beautiful streetscapes for the future."

Cr Martens said it was also important for traders to get involved. "Business owners can do the right thing and water trees outside their premises, and help save the trees in our strip shopping centres," she said.

Some "waterwise" tips for your garden

Lawns: Deep watering early in the morning 1-2 times per week is the key to maintaining healthy lawn areas in summer. Deep watering encourages deep roots, which helps lawns survive in hot weather. Another hint is to raise your lawnmower cutting blades, allowing the longer grass to shade the root zone, thus reducing evaporation from the soil.

Melbourne Water recommends 10 millimetres of water to be sufficient to maintain a healthy lawn in hot weather. One way to measure this is to place an ice cream container under your lawn sprinkler. When the container has filled to a depth of 10 millimetres, you can turn off the sprinkler.

Trees and shrubs: Deep watering is also the key to healthy deep-rooted trees. In particular, young and recently planted trees are expected to suffer in hot and dry conditions.

Other methods of maintain healthy trees and shrubs includes not allowing lawns to grow right up to the base of trees and out-competing them for moisture, as well as mulching around the base to help conserve water and reduce evaporation. Remember to keep mulch away from the trunk of trees to reduce the chances of collar rot occurring.

More free mulch

Glen Eira Park Services will hold another free mulch day, after the huge success of their November day. It will be held on Saturday 7 February from 7.30am to noon, at the rear of Caulfield Bowling Club, Caulfield Park (enter via the driveway on Balaclava Road). Residents are welcome to bring a trailer as often as they like during the morning, or bring a wheelie bin, garbage bag or car boot, and staff will load up the free mulch. The mulch comes from woodchipped prunings from around the City.

Collectors - be wary

Charitable collections play an important role in assisting worthwhile causes in our community. Throughout the year, many collections take place in Glen Eira including street "tin shakes", highway collections, raffles or door-to-door collections.

Residents sometimes raise concerns about whether the collector is appropriately authorised or carries the proper credentials. Council advises that every collector who solicits donations must have received prior approval from the Office of Fair Trading and Business Affairs and obtained a permit from Council's Local Laws office.

Collectors must carry adequate proof of identity on behalf of the charity they represent and produce evidence of authority if requested.

If you are unsure of the bona fides of any collector who approaches you, or if they are unable to produce proof of authority on demand, contact Council's Service Centre on 9524 3333. A Local Laws officer will be sent out to investigate.

Mayoral and Councillor allowances

The State Government has accepted the recommendations of a review panel of mayoral and Councillor allowances and determined that Councillor allowances will remain between \$5000 and \$12,000, while mayoral allowances have been set at three times this amount, ie ranging from \$15,000

The panel comprised council representatives, local government industry groups, the community and various interested parties.

Other recommendations included a Mayoral entitlement to a car and mobile phone (a package of between \$10,000 and \$14,000 annually), and an allowance of \$20 per approved council meeting or function (up to \$2000 per year) for councillors living more than 50km from the municipal offices.

Young artist recognised


ardenvale resident and classical guitarist Slava Grigoryan was recently awarded the National Medibank Private Arts Award in the 1998 Young Australian of the Year awards.

Slava said receiving the award was a great honour, not only for himself but for all classical guitarists, as this type of music doesn't generally get such recognition.

One of three Victorian finalists in the awards, Slava is already an accomplished guitarist at only 21 years old. He is described as an "electrifying performer with phenomenal technique and great musicality" and has performed publicly since the age of 12. He made his formal debut at aged 14 when he began performing as a soloist overseas.

Since recording his ARIA nominated debut Spirit of Spain at 16, Slava's career has progressed rapidly to encompass his debut in the Tokyo Guitar Competition; an Australian tour in 1996; feature soloist with the Australian Chamber Orchestra; and regular UK and European festival appearances.

Victorian Tan Le, winner in the Community Service category, was named the overall Young Australian of the Year, while another Victorian Ross Cunnington won his category – ACTEW Corporation Science and Technology Award.

MMC Precinct Structure Plan approved

Glen Eira City Council has approved the Monash Medical Centre Precinct
Structure Plan – a document which outlines a specific area around the Monash Medical Centre where medical centres and related uses are preferred.

This document acts as a guide to developers, Council planners and residents when submitting planning applications for such uses to Council.

Council hopes the Structure Plan will help to curb the encroachment of medical centres into residential streets surrounding the hospital by ensuring new medical centres are only developed within the defined precinct.

The Structure Plan contains a set of objectives and policies for the development of medical and related uses within this precinct. Proposals located outside, but in close proximity to, the precinct will be

discouraged. Proposals for medical centres within the Precinct will still require a planning permit and neighbours' rights of objection have been maintained.

The objectives of the Structure Plan, together with the guidelines for development in the newly approved Non-Residential Uses in Residential Zones Policy will ensure that any new developments are well designed and landscaped and have appropriate on-site car parking and hours of operation for the particular locality.

Street Tree Strategy

Glen Eira's tree-lined streets will benefit from a long term vision with Council's new Street Tree Strategy.

The strategy aims to avoid an ad hoc approach to tree selection and to minimise any negative impact of trees and maximise the benefits to the community. It presents a long term plan for attaining consistent avenues of appropriate tree species throughout the city.

Copies of the report are available at all libraries in the municipality, and at the Council's service centre and Town Planning counter, at the council offices.

4-year-old kindergarten central enrolment system

- For 3-year-old kindergarten enrol directly with the kindergarten of your choice

New contracts awarded

Council in December awarded two contracts for traffic management and animal control services to outside tenderers, while the Local Laws contract went to an inhouse team, Glen Laws.

Acting Mayor, Cr Barry Neve said: "Whilst the parking officers are no longer Council employees, they are still bound by Council policies and practices in terms of issuing and processing parking infringement notices.

"As far as the public is concerned there will be no discernable difference. Parking and traffic offences will incur an infringement notice now under exactly the same circumstances as before."

ECT, a company which has won similar contracts at neighbouring municipalities (Kingston, Monash and Stonnington), tendered successfully for traffic management, while the Lost Dogs Home was awarded animal control services.

Council found the Lost Dogs Home displayed an impressive attitude to pet ownership rather than focusing solely on the statutory requirements of dog and cat registration.

Residents are likely to see Lost Dogs Home employees in Council parks and gardens.

The tendering process will result in improved service delivery in all three areas of traffic management, animal control and business services. Cr Neve said this was the prime reason for awarding the tenders.

"In addition, these services will be delivered with considerable cost savings to rate payers – in the order of \$200,000. These cost savings could not responsibly be ignored," he said.

Community Consultative Committee

The Consultative Committee is being formed to allow community input into Council's consideration of proposals to develop a sporting and recreational complex at the above facilities.

The Consultative Committee will comprise broadly based community representatives, representatives of users of the facilities, Councillors and Council Officers.

A grand day at the fair was had by all... as Glen Eira residents and traders enjoyed four festivals at the end of last year; the McKinnon Village Fair, and the Elsternwick, Carnegie, and Bentleigh festivals.

Barbara Douglas, member of the McKinnon Village Association, said the seventh McKinnon Village Fair attracted about 10,000 people. She said the day was generously supported by traders, residents, police and Council.

An estimated 20,000 people attended the Elsternwick Festival in Glen Huntly Road to enjoy a variety of stalls and access to most traders.


Sara Jones (Elsternwick Main Street Committee) said the festival included a poetry reading presented by local schools and was a great show of community support and participation.


A little rain was not enough to dampen the spirits of people attending the Carnegie Main Street Christmas Fair – they simply put up umbrellas! And Humphrey Bear was not deterred but continued his performance under the shop verandahs.

The fair involved retailers, local community groups and organisations and both Father Christmas and Saint Nicholas attended the day.

Mark Mackie said the estimated 25,000 people who attended the Bentleigh Festival were very lucky with the day as perfect weather prevailed. He said the festival was a great success and surpassed previous years.







Park development proposed

Council will call for Expressions of Interest to develop the Princes Park/Maple Street facilities. The move comes after a proposal from Maccabi Victoria to develop the facilities, and after two public meetings held late last year.

A Community Consultation Committee will also be established in March to review development proposals, and to ensure that the views of all the community are considered.

Victoria Maccabi, an organisation which co-ordinates Jewish sporting clubs, approached Council in early November 1997 with a proposal to develop the sporting and recreational facilities at Princes Park and Maple Street in South Caulfield.

Council held two public meetings in December 1997 to gauge public response before Council Officers examined the concept in any depth, and for representatives from Maccabi to explain the concept.

Many people expressed concern about increased traffic, noise, parking demand and alienation of public open space. Others welcomed the concept as an ideal chance to replace rundown inefficient facilities with a state-of-the-art complex at little cost to the City of Glen Eira.

The Maccabi concept suggests replacing the existing Maple Street facilities with a modern recreation centre which includes a multi-use recreation area, a

gymnasium, change rooms, sports medicine clinic, function and meeting rooms and parking. The facilities would also include a 350 seat theatrette and a bistro.

Offices and meeting facilities for other Jewish organisations, which would not be open to the general community, are also part of the redevelopment concept.

The Bricker Pavilion in Princes Park would be replaced with a larger complex to house indoor basketball, table tennis, change rooms and club rooms. The concept would also relocate two tennis courts.

All of the proposed development's sport and recreational facilities would be open to the general community and access rights to existing tenants and users would be guaranteed.


Glen Eira Mayor Cr Alan Grossbard stressed the City of Glen Eira would benefit by having a first-class development provided for the community at very little cost

The concept envisages ownership of the land and facilities being retained by the Glen Eira City Council, and the balance of management control remaining with the Council. An independent professional venue management company would be engaged to operate the complex.

Inside and out

Open since early January, the stylish and engaging Containment has attracted strong audiences, and good press.

Containment is an exhibition that teases by playing on concepts of inside and outside. Despite its rather dry name, it does get down to asking some pertinent questions: What is the skin or the outside of an object hiding from our view? Can we judge the contents by the packaging? Can our eyes be trusted?

Curated by the University of Tasmania and toured by Contemporary Arts Services Tasmania, Containment includes ceramics by Gwyn Hanssen-Piggot and Zsolt Faludi, paintings by Debra Dawes and Mary Scott, and jewellery by Carlier Makigawa. Containment continues until 22 February.


Madness and creativity

Artists have long shown interest in alternatives to conventional social and community attitudes. They are searching for contradictions in received wisdom, sometimes poetically presenting new models, which ask: What if ..?


Madness and creativity have been linked together as concepts since the time of Aristotle and regularly updated ever since. Madness is romantically seen as offering special insights into the truth of human existence.

The exhibition Episodes (4-22 February) is an attempt to ask questions about art's interest in "madness". It features work by artists who have, and have not, experienced mental illness, and provides important insights into mental illness. It keeps at arms length the romantic and traditional stereotypes of art and mental illness. The exhibition catalogue includes an essay which maps social attitudes to the mentally ill, by outlining the history of treatment.

This event is funded by the Australia Council, and is one of the very first in a new wave of community art projects in Australia. The exhibition has been curated by David O'Halloran of the Glen Eira Arts Complex, and the Arts Officer of the Tasmanian Trades & Labour Council, John McQueenie. Artists featured in the exhibition include Gordon Bennett, winner of the 1997 James McCaughey prize at the National Gallery of Victoria, Mike Parr, British artist Graeme Harwood, Jane Burton, David Cavanagh and Rebecca Greenwood with Cindy Bennett, Annie Cornelisse, Sarah Gamble, Paul Malcom, Miki Parker and Colin Van Der Woude.

Reading into what you see

The written word, both handwritten and text organised as type, has long been utilised by artists. Staged to accompany the readings of the winning entries from the Glen Eira Writing Competition, Talking Pictures presents some examples of the use of written text by contemporary artists.

The phrase "down there in black & white" is evidence of the authority of the written word, which seems to so finally and completely provide unequivocal meaning. It is this sense of completeness, of the finality of the written text, that visual artists often wish to disrupt.

Lions to help Bethlehem Margaret – keen


arnegie Lions Club has the Bethlehem Hospice **Home Care Service its** major service project for 1998.

In particular, the club will raise funds to buy specialist equipment to assist people with motor neuron disease, multiple sclerosis and cancer, to help them stay in their own homes.

Based in Caulfield, the Bethlehem Hospice Home Care Service covers the cities of Glen Eira, Stonnington, Bayside, and parts of Kingston, Melbourne, Monash and Port Phillip. It helps care for people in their own home, from palliative care nurses and volunteers, to social work and pastoral care.

The service needs specialist equipment, including manual and electric high-low beds with knee and head elevation, reclining shower commode chairs and special toiletry equipment. This equipment helps nurses and carers to treat people in their own home.

Catherine O'Sullivan, Clinical Director of Nursing, Community Nursing Service, and Kathryn Turner, social worker for Home Care, Bethlehem Hospice, visited Carnegie Lions Club recently and spoke on

the importance of home care for patients.

Ms Turner said: "A number of our clients are severely disabled with advanced motor neuron disease and multiple sclerosis. Generally this group of people have very poor sitting balance, and slump forwards or sideways. They also have great difficulty holding their heads up. A reclining shower commode chair is adjustable and can be easily modified to suit different people's needs, providing safe and comfortable support."

argaret Farrands of Narong Road, Caulfield has been an Arthritis Victoria volunteer for three years.

She says: "I spend two days a week here, on average, and thoroughly enjoy myself. I've met wonderful people. I have a strong belief in contributing to the community and, at my age, volunteering gets me out of the house and keeps boredom at bay."

Margaret's cheery personality pervades the Arthritis Victoria offices in Kooyong Road, Caulfield.

She is well known for her favourite phrases such as "Love you, darling", "She's top dog", and "You're true blue" and for referring to the staff as "Flossy Blow" or "Dear Heart".

Margaret's work is very much appreciated by Arthritis Victoria and is always conducted at full steam.

Everyone from babies through middle-aged to older adults can suffer from this potentially debilitating, often painful, and sometimes fatal disease.

It gives volunteers great satisfaction to know that they are helping people with a common chronic illness.

The more people can help themselves the greater the chances of reducing the annual cost to the community, which is approximately \$4.5 billion.

Arthritis Victoria works with sports and arts organisations to promote a healthy lifestyle message: the benefits of exercise. VicHealth provides the funds for the sponsorship but pairs the sponsored organisation with a health agency such as Arthritis Victoria.

Arthritis Victoria needs more volunteers, particularly in health promotion and fundraising, to support the services available to Victorians with arthritis or diseases affecting the muscles, bones and joints.

A volunteer is needed to work for six to 10 hours per week to help administer the health promotion area and the fundraising unit needs volunteers to help with administration.

Councillors get into the splash!




Cr Grossbard had earlier unveiled a plaque and officially reopened the pool, as part of a program of activities to welcome back the pool after one season's



Never too old to learn

eturning to school or formal study after an Nabsence of many years has become more acceptable, particularly in computer and literacy cou. ses. The prospect is challenging and quite daunting but fears can be overcome with time and the help of a patient and understanding teacher.

Alan Morris (retired pharmacist and president of the Victorian Lupus Association) said the relaxed classes at Godfrey Street Community House have enabled him to do a lot more with a computer. He said going back to basics has made him a more rounded person: "better able to control the computer".

"The adult learning situation is reciprocal-I am learning from Margaret (tutor), and she is picking up interesting facets from me," he said.

Godfrey Street Community House tutor Margaret Smith teaches on an individual basis. She said adults returning to study often felt a high level of anxiety but teaching one-to-one allowed her to cater for all different levels, personalities and learning styles. She said taking a slow pace and having a good sense of humor was the key.

Margaret finds teaching adults very satisfying and enjoyable because they often disclose their fears and then gain in confidence. She said there was no "student/teacher" hierarchy and the information exchange was often two-way.

According to Moorleigh U3A Basic Computer Skills teacher Brian Horman the hardest challenge was getting his students over their fear of computers. He

tells them the worst they can do is corrupt a program which can easily be rectified by re-installing software.

Brian teaches four students per session, accommodating different abilities and learning rates. He said some students have been away from the learning environment for 50 years, and while some take to it "like a duck to water", others need to progress more slowly.

Another adult student Geraldine Hogbang was already computer literate but needed to bring her skills "up to scratch" to rejoin the work force. She said she enjoyed learning by choice and feeling relaxed. Her new skills will help her acquire a job.

Geraldine recommended this learning situation for adults without computer skills because of the individual teaching and the low cost: "If the inclination is there, give it a go, you have little to lose," she said.

Classes are offered at Moorleigh and Glen Eira U3A, Caulfield Adult Literacy Group, and Community Houses at Caulfield South, Godfrey Street, and Moongala. Deborah Randa

A mother talks about playgroup...

Seven years ago I joined Carnegie Playgroup- just after my second child was born. I became part of a

"new mothers group" needing a place for our very active two-year-olds and ever-enlarging group.

Over the years, other parents joined our group as we met each week to share the joys (and despairs) of parenthood and ideas on discipline, schools, children's concerts, recipes, tapes, gardening- in fact, absolutely anything.

Fitting in at Carnegie Playgroup is easy; the friendly informal setting allows us to sit and have coffee while the children play with their friends. We share the responsibility for running our group, all helping to pack up, washup and round up each time we meet and take turns at being Group Leader.

The activities vary depending on the children's needs. Sometimes we just open the toy cupboard, or set up painting, water play, or special activities like "Messy Days". While participating in all these activities the children are learning to share and communicate with other children.

When my third child was born four years ago with a moderate physical disability, playgroup was a haven where our established friends provided a wonderful support group.


