For the second year running, Glen Eira City Council, in conjunction with the VATC, will hold its annual Carols by Candlelight concert at the Caulfield Racecourse.


To be held on Sunday 20 December, the event looks set to be bigger and brighter than ever with more than 200 cast, crew and volunteers involved in the preparation and presentation.

Fees and guidelines set for use of footpaths

A new set of fees has been adopted for the use of footpaths by commercial properties. The fees are imposed on businesses that place goods and furniture on footpaths outside their premises. They cover Council's costs in regulating and in ensuring that such use is safe to customers and pedestrians. Tables, chairs, umbrellas, windbreaks and retail goods are becoming increasingly popular at most of our strip shopping centres and Council also adopted a new set of guidelines to assist traders with acceptable standards when applying to use footpaths.

Council held a special meeting to discuss the outcomes of the City's 1997/98 Annual Report. The Annual Report provides a comprehensive summary of Glen Eira's performance over the last financial year and assesses the extent to which Council has achieved the objectives previously set in its Corporate Plan.

Council to sell house Can you help?

Ien Eira City Council recently decided, as a last Gresort, to move to sell a \$900,000 private property to recover outstanding rates and charges going back nine years.

The property, adjacent to the "Golden Mile" of Caulfield, has an outstanding debt of \$31,484.30. No rate payments have been received since September 1989, making it one of the largest and lengthiest rate debts in the municipality.

This is the first action by Council under its tough new policy to pursue ratepayers who have been in default of their obligations for many years.

Overdue rates and charges accrue a 12.3 per cent interest charge. However, Council would prefer to collect the outstanding debt, so that the funds are available to be spent on the community.

In a report to Council on 4 November, corporate assets manager Tim Frederico wrote: "The decision to move to sell a property to recover a debt is not taken lightly. This does not appear to be a case of financial hardship or extenuating circumstances."

Mr Frederico wrote: "Several judgments have been obtained in the Magistrates Court. However no attempt has been made to tender any payment. While most ratepayers will make contact and attempt to negotiate an outcome, no contact has been received from the owner."

"In reaction to receiving the 1996 and 1997 rate notices, the owner lodged objections to the valuation (both were disallowed) but made no attempt to discuss, or pay, the debt ... it is considered that the only course of action available is to move to sell the property to recover the debt."

Council is now awaiting a hearing date for judgement in the Magistrates Court within the next few weeks.

The property has a land area of 2100 sq metres (more than half an acre), and has a brick attic style post-Edwardian residence of about 39 squares. It has a Capital Improved Value of \$900,000.

Council will obtain a valuation by an independent assessor and appoint a real estate agent to proceed with an auction. Other councils- Whittlesea, Knox and Manningham- have followed this course to recover debt, and found that in a great majority of cases, the debt is paid prior to the sale proceeding.

It is anticipated that if the sale is to proceed, the auction will take place in February, 1999.

The search is on for any information regarding an historic tablecloth which was embroidered by women in the Caulfield area during World War I. Lent to the City of Caulfield some years ago, the tablecloth's whereabouts are now unknown.

The Hamilton Tablecloth comprises patches of hand-worked linen sewn around a central panel containing the logo or coat of arms of the City of Caulfield. The finished work is believed to measure about 5' by 9' (1500cm by 2700cm) and consist of approximately 15cm squares.

Each patch, so one story goes, bears the signature of a City of Caulfield Councillor or a contributor to campaign funds. Another version of the story says the signatures were of soldiers recovering at the Repatriation Hospital. The signatures were believed to be embroided in blue with the coat of arms embroidered in red.

In 1989, Elizabeth Hamilton (who it is believed worked on the tablecloth) lent it to the City of Caulfield for the benefit of present and future citizens of Caulfield. Then in 1992, the City of Caulfield sent the tablecloth to the Centre for Conservation of Historic and Artistic Works for "stain removal, cleaning, repair, lining".

Records show it was returned from the Centre, but has not been seen since. Council is keen to hear from anyone who may have information regarding how or why it came into existence or any details which might lead to its return.

Mrs Hamilton's son, Mr William Hamilton, is anxious that the work be found. So is Glen Eira Council. Readers who have seen the cloth or had any involvement with it at any stage in its long history, are invited to write in sharing their experiences. In addition to providing information on what it looks like, being able to trace its movements and when it was seen will be valuable in helping locate it. We would like to be able to document the full background of the piece.

Of course, best of all would be the reader who rings to say "I know where it is."

Major change for food shops

Under new State Government requirements under the Food Safety Act, food premises will have to gain approval for Food Safety Plans.

Council's Environmental Health Department has responsibility for administering the Act for the State Government. Characteristics of the new Food Safety Plans include: -

- · identification and management of food safety hazards
- increased training and education of food handlers
- audits to verify compliance with the approved Food Safety Plan
- annual review of the Food Safety Plan

Council's City Development Director Jeff Akehurst said: "The above measures are totally supported as a means of improving food hygiene standards and minimising the risks of food poisoning outbreaks in the community."

The State Government has established four classes of food businesses, with the following deadlines to implement Food Safety Plans. The classes relate to risk.

Class A (eg, nursing homes) 31 March 1998 Class B (eg, most restaurants and cafes)

30 September 1998 Class C (eg, takeaway businesses) 30 June 2000 Class D (eg, businesses selling pre-packaged food

products only) 31 December 2000 Glen Eira has 720 food premises to which the

legislation applies. Council has a clear role under the legislation — that

of review and approval of Food Safety Plans.

It is likely that many small businesses will have to seek expert assistance and advice in preparation of their Food Safety Plans.

In practical terms, compliance with the State Government's Food Safety Act will translate into additional costs for food related businesses in terms of both Food Safety Plan preparation — by individual businesses and approval — by Council.

Mr Akehurst said: "Council has an excellent record in the area of promoting food hygiene with initiatives including "Five Star Food Hygiene Audit", "Shop of the Year Program" and the "Food Shoppers Guide". In addition, Glen Eira has the first shops in Victoria to achieve the Food Safety Plan requirements."

"In summary the legislation is supported as a means of improving food hygiene standards but it comes at an additional cost to food businesses which may eventually flow on to the community."

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Heritage amendment on exhibition


Glen Eira City Council recently resolved to act on Ga number of the recommendations of the Glen Eira Heritage Management Plan. As the major part of this, Planning Scheme Amendment L33 has been prepared to introduce heritage overlay controls to the areas and properties identified in the heritage plan.


The Glen Eira Heritage Management Plan identifies 17 Heritage Areas and initially some 70 individually significant sites in the City of Glen Eira. The areas were selected because they demonstrate important eras in the growth of the municipality and survive with a comparatively high level of integrity. The individual properties have been identified for their local, regional or statewide heritage significance.

Amendment L33 commenced its exhibition period on Thursday 19 November 1998 and submissions will be received until Wednesday 23 December.

What controls will be introduced?

The heritage overlay controls that will be introduced into the Glen Eira Planning Scheme by Amendment L33 are based on controls prepared by the State Government and are the standard provisions to be used throughout Victoria. Amendment L33 will affect all properties located within the 17 heritage areas and those individually listed.





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The new controls will require a planning permit for the

- following: • demolition of
- buildings,subdivision or
- consolidation of land,
- construction of a building,
- external alterations,
- displaying signage, and
- painting of previously unpainted surfaces.

In most circumstances, a

planning permit would be required to undertake any of these works for properties within the areas or individually listed. Properties which are not in a proposed heritage area or individually listed in the Heritage Plan are not subject to these heritage controls.

Some of the individually listed properties have more specific controls proposed which relate to internal alterations, paint colours and tree protection. Owners of these properties have been advised of the proposed controls.

> To assist Council in assessing applications for works, Heritage Guidelines are being developed which will provide advice on maintenance and repair of buildings and the design of alterations and new buildings.

Interim demolition controls

A major concern when introducing heritage controls is that properties of heritage significance may be demolished before the amendment to introduce heritage overlay controls to protect such houses has been exhibited and debated.

With this in mind, Council has requested that the Minister for Planning approve an interim shortterm amendment which requires a planning permit to be sought for the demolition of a building located in a proposed heritage area or individually listed in the main amendment L33. The interim demolition controls commenced on 20 November and will operate for a period of nine months.

What is the Glen Eira Heritage Management Plan?

The City of Glen Eira Heritage Management Plan is an overall strategy to maintain and enhance buildings and areas identified as having historic significance. It is comprised of a Conservation Policy which provides Council direction and a Conservation Strategy including both statutory and non-statutory initiatives. The statutory initiatives include amending the Glen Eira Planning Scheme to introduce Heritage Overlay controls. The nonstatutory measures include detailed

policies and guidelines, the Heritage Advisory Service and the establishment of a reference library of conservation literature.

The Heritage Management Plan identifies, and recommends for designation, 17 Heritage (or Urban Conservation) Areas and a number of individual properties, identified for their local, regional or statewide heritage significance.

Your rights- how to have your say

Your views on the Heritage Management Plan and its implementation are important to Council.

With the introduction of heritage controls, Council will have the right, for the first time, to take heritage matters into consideration when deciding upon specific planning issues. Residents will have the right to participate in the development process in their neighbourhood in areas where previously no rights existed.

During the exhibition period for Amendment L33 you have the opportunity to view the amendment and its accompanying documents and make a submission which will be taken into consideration by Council when it next considers the Amendment.

When the controls are introduced you will, depending on the particular proposal, have the ability to comment on some proposals. If the proposal is a formally advertised planning permit, you will be able to make submissions to Council and have the right to appeal any Council decision.

• Two potential locations in close proximity to the shopping strip have been identified.

• The Centre should ideally contain the existing facilities in the one building if possible, ie library, kindergarten, and maternal and child health centre.

• The Centre should ideally provide new facilities, such as meeting rooms and public toilets.

• The Committee considers refurbishment of the existing library building as unlikely to provide a quality facility. A new building for the Centre is encouraged.

• The total number of public car parking spaces in the two locations will remain the same (as a minimum.)

OPTION I: STANILAND GROVE

The area involves the existing library site, kindergarten and maternal and child health centre, and the two adjacent car parks.

Redevelop the existing site of the library for the new Centre.

The Centre could be two or three storey, yet designed to complement the residential nature of the heritage area.

* The car park to the north of the existing library should be sold for a multi-unit residential development.

Council should sell 16 Staniland Grove.

The vacated kindergarten, and maternal and child health centre land should be combined with the adjacent car park area. This whole area should be redesigned for carparking. The slope of the land could allow for a tiered carpark. Vehicle access from both Orrong Road and Staniland Grove should be maintained.

. If Staniland Grove was selected as the location for the new Centre, the alternative location should continue to be used for car parking. However it should be redesigned to provide more car parking spaces.

OPTION 2: ORRONG ROAD/STANLEY STREET

The area involves the car park behind the shops on the corner of Orrong Road and Stanley Street.

The Centre could be two or three storey. It should have frontage to Orrong Road and be seen from Glen Huntly Road.

The design should be respectful of the existing residential nature of the area.

The Centre would occupy only some of the existing car parking area. The unused area should continue to be used for car parking, however it should be redesigned to provide more spaces.

• If Orrong Road/Stanley Street was selected as the location for the new Centre, the existing library site and car park north of the library should be sold for a multi-unit residential development. The kindergarten and maternal and child health centre land should be combined with the existing adjacent car park and developed with tiered car parking.

• The community's comments on the preferred location of the new Community Centre are sought.

In early 1997, Council commissioned PLM P/L, planning consultants, to prepare a report containing structure plans for Glen Eira's three main shopping strips- Bentleigh, Carnegie and Elsternwick. The report presented three options per centre and was broadly advertised in October 1997 and community meetings were held in December. The community expressed concern about the lack of notification and the complex nature of the report. In response to this, Council formed a community consultative committee for each of the study areas, to work with Council officers to form one structure plan.

The Elsternwick committee, consisting of two traders and six residents, has convened regularly since April this year. It has developed the three options originally presented by the consultants into one option, taking into account previous comments received from the community and the members' own experiences. The map below and description of each precinct defines the option prepared for the Elsternwick Urban Village Structure Plan.

The suggestion for a new Community Centre includes the identification of two potential sites. Council wishes the community to express its preference.

Should you wish to refer to the original report prepared by the consultants, it is available for viewing at the Carnegie, Bentleigh, Elsternwick and Caulfield libraries.

PRECINCT 2 -**MEDIUM DENSITY HOUSING**

- Retain the residential function and maintain the distinction between retail and residentia
- Medium density housing is encouraged where appropriate. Development should respect the character of the area
- Two-storey dwellings are encouraged in Rippon Grove.
- · All developments should provide adequate offstreet parking.

PRECINCT 4 - RETAIL HUB

- · Retail activity should be concentrated on Glen Huntly Road and discouraged from side streets.
- Length of retail strip is appropriate and should not be extended
- The character of the shopping strip should be preserved by refurbishing buildings and facades.
- · Encourage traders to provide rear access to their premises from car parks.
- Retail activity should be diverse to maintain quality convenience shopping particularly for local residents

- The Elsternwick Baptist Church should be retained. • Ensure that the future plans of nearby schools and
- Coles Supermarket are considered when conducting traffic and parking studies.

panel, or

b) abandon the entire amendment



Yes, our under 16 Victorian Basketball team won the Australian Basketball Championship and I was a part of it.


We were famous for a week, because everyone knew who Vic Metro was, having won the same Championship last year. When we first arrived we felt intimidated and did not think we would make the finals.

Childhood memories - truth or fiction...

Goat on a Hill is full of warm and funny stories capturing a family and community struggling to deal with the aftermath of war. It is full of the scrapes and adventures of a childhood where kids had to create their own entertainment, even if at the expense of others!

In writing an autobiographical account of his life, Robin Stewart discovered how difficult it is to decipher fact from fiction. Many of his viewpoints about his childhood and family life were contradicted by other members of the family, so in the end he decided to turn his book into a work of fiction. In doing this, he feels he may have inadvertently ended up with a closer version of the truth.

Goat on a Hill is about a young boy growing up in Caulfield in the late 1940s and early 1950s. The book starts three years after the return of Robin's father Race, from World War II. Robin remembers that as a child, ex-servicemen appeared very mysterious and frightening. "The one thing they all had in common was their silence." They were full of secrets and a deep melancholy and could stop a mischievous lad dead in his tracks with just a glance.

Haunted by his war time experiences, Race began drinking as a coping mechanism in the Air Force when stationed in New Guinea. Robin explained that this was very common. "They used to drink before they went flying, and he was up there as a navigator trying to figure out where he was going. It was the only way they survived it. When they came home, they just turned up and were expected to go back to normal again."

This was to prove impossible for Race and the many men who returned psychologically scarred from the war. Race continued to drink at home, which caused a lot of tension within the household.

Robin believes neither of his parents could truly understand what the other had gone through. The war for his mother meant sharing a house with her parents and three children. Her last two children, twins, were born on the eve of her husband going away and they didn't see each other for five years,

except for one brief leave. She lived on a meagre wage and had shortages to cope with. And, according to Robin, "she didn't take to it too well!"

But, her husband Race saw her as having a troublefree war, with none of the horrors he had to contend with. Unfortunately, he wasn't able to communicate with her, saving his stories for other servicemen down at the local club over a couple of drinks and a bet on the horses.

Like many who lived through childhood during the war, Robin grew up in a house where three generations were thrown together. This made for torrid family dynamics at times but gave the added benefits of having other family members to turn to when his parents were too caught up in their own affairs. Robin's mother's parents also lived in the house and Robin's love for his Grandpa comes across very clearly in the book. Robin describes him as a "physically hard old man" who dispensed wisdom with great humour. Although in his nineties he would cut wood for the family every morning in the woodshed, a place of great significance for Robin as this is where all the great family secrets were unraveled bit by bit.

"The terrible sisters," Robin's aunts were also an important part of his childhood and their presence always added extra drama and glamour to any family function. Robin remembers his aunts as "having a particular talent for warfare" and following their trials and tribulations in the book provides wonderful insights into the difficulties women of the era faced.

"Half the sisters were divorced, and the other half

lived in fear of divorce." Divorce was granted only in strictly defined circumstances, the most popular being adultery, but this had to be proved with photographic evidence. Robin tells what happens when one of the sisters has finally had enough of her philandering husband, and they set off on a family hunt for the adulterer. The scene where they find him is well worth reading!

Robin recalls Caulfield as being a very sectarian place where migrants were viewed with much suspicion at first, but gradually these barriers were slowly broken down and friendships formed. One of the first girls Robin had a crush on was a little Jewish girl in Grade 6 who had a number tattooed on her arm which he did not fully understand the significance of until he was much older. She gets taken home for lunch and given a sample of his mother's cooking, which according to Robin was enough to stop a potential romance in its tracks.

Robin remembers his father as an eternal optimist who lived on the dream fed to him by his mother that he had noble blood running through his veins and would some day receive the inheritance and title due to him. The title of the book was based on an expression Robin's exasperated mother used to describe his father. She would scoff at her husband's claims and say: "He has high ideals, like a goat on a hill." As it turns out, there was truth to the story but we have to wait for the sequel to the book that Robin is currently writing to find out if his dreams were ever fulfilled.





Three world cycling records!

Members of the Carnegie Caulfield Cycling club Peter Homann and Paul Lake recently competed in the International Paralympic Committee World Championship at Colorado Springs in America. Over 300 of the world's top disabled cyclists competed in road and track races.

This was the first time the event was held in the USA. The IPC World Cycling Championships take place every four years, two years prior to the Paralympics.

Both Peter and Paul were very successful in their events. Peter won gold and broke world records in the one kilometre time trial and the 3000m pursuit. He also won gold in the 20km-road race and silver in the 5km-road time trial. Paul also broke a world record, won silver in the 4000m pursuit, bronze in the 20km time trial and came fifth in the 70km road race. We extend our congratulations to these two promising cyclists.




