Glen Eira City Council is gearing up to Gcelebrate the International Year of Older Persons 1999 (IYOP). The aim of IYOP is to promote active change within the community, about the way older people experience life and how younger people consider older people. The theme of the year is "Towards a society for all ages".

Glen Eira's IYOP festivities kick off with the annual Senior Citizen's Week in March— a bumper 21 days of activity in Glen Eira, featuring events hosted by local clubs and Council.

Council spokeswoman Petrina Dakin said: "IYOP is an important year for Glen Eira, where more than a fifth of residents are aged over 65 years. The celebrations, and promoting the principles of IYOP—independence, participation, care, self-fulfilment and dignity— are a major emphasis for Council this year."

Council plans to put on an end-of-year event to celebrate, as well as highlighting activities run by Glen Eira's community groups and local organisations during the year, and opportunities to participate in statewide and regional events.

Council is also seeking interested residents who would like to be involved in an IYOP working group, to work on one or all of the four themes chosen for the year: celebration; "come and try" days; inter-generational links; and health and "active ageing".



Recognising our volunteers

Glen Eira City Council honours the work of volunteers each year with a Community Services Recognition Scheme Ceremony.

Volunteers are an important part of this community and make an invaluable contribution through a wide variety of organisations. Council will again hold a ceremony in 1999 to honour that work and organisations are invited to nominate volunteers.

Nominations can be made for 500, 1000 or 2000 hours of service or for a special category which recognises voluntary work that does not fit into

numbers of hours of service categories, but which organisations feel merits particular recognition.

Non profit, community-based organisations are invited to send nominations, on the appropriate forms, to Council for consideration. Information and nomination forms are available from the Service Centre, or by calling: 9524 3333.

Dog and cat registration fees set for 1999/2000 Fees for dog and cat registration for April 1999 to April 2000 have been set. Council adopted a modest increase in fees for dogs; \$3 (for sterilised dogs) and from \$1 to \$1.50 for other types. No increase will

apply to cat registration fees.

Fees for non-sterilised dogs will be \$81; sterilised dogs \$27. Fees for non-sterilised cats will remain at \$53; sterilised cats \$17. Separate fees continue to apply for other categories such as animals with micro-chips and reductions for pensioner owners.

Renewal of Registration forms are expected to be mailed to residents next month.

Long term Open Space Strategy approved A strategy outlining Glen Eira's long term approach to its open space areas was adopted following extensive community consultation. The strategy provides valuable guidelines over the direction of a range of Council facilities over the next few years, including its parks and reserves, halls, playgrounds, barbecues and sporting areas.

The strategy outlines a range of concept plans for various areas and incorporates comments made from the community as part of the consultation process.

Handling your mobile garbage bin

Council has put in place a set of guidelines on the correct handling of mobile garbage bins and recycling containers by residents and businesses. Key features of the guidelines include:

- Garbage bins and containers must not be placed out for collection earlier than 4pm on the day before collection, and no later than 6am on the day of
- · Bins and containers must be returned to the property by 12noon on the same day of collection;
- Placement should be as near as practicable to the kerb, at least 0.5 metres from other bins or obstructions, and with wheels facing the property;
- Lids on garbage bins must be completely closed to prevent litter.

Council's Local Law prohibits the misuse and mishandling of garbage bins and containers and provides penalties. If you have any queries about the waste collection service, contact the Council.



Governance advisor appointed

Glen Eira City Council recently appointed John Warburton as governance advisor, as part of recommendations from the Walsh Report.

Inspector Dr Greg Walsh, in his report released in September last year, recommended that Council appoint a governance advisor to:

- help develop and implement a Glen Eira Code of Governance, and
- advise and assist Councillors and senior staff to effectively respond to governance issues identified in the report, including a review of the current structure of representation, with a view to extending the number of Councillors from six to seven or nine Councillors.

Mr Warburton took up his duties early this year. He has had extensive management, business and consulting experience, and is currently chairman of Prahran Market, Tandou Ltd and the Local Authorities Super Board and is deputy chairman of Victorian Managed Insurance Authority and Hastings Port (Holding) Corporation, among many other corporate and community appointments.

He is also chairman of audit committees at both Boroondara and Moonee Valley City Council, and was former chief commissioner at Moreland City Council from 1994 and 1996.

Mr Warburton, 56, has also been a professional golfer, starting from age 16 through to 28.

Superannuation dispute explained

Glen Eira City Council has disputed a multimillion dollar claim from the City of Kingston, which Kingston says is for superannuation liabilities and retrenchment costs from the amalgamation of councils four years ago.

Glen Eira is seeking resolution through arbitration the process agreed on for dispute resolution in the Amalgamation Agreement signed by the two councils in 1995.

Mayor Cr Barry Neve said: "As a Council, our main concern in this issue has always been to protect the City of Glen Eira ratepayers from having to pay unreasonable costs."

Glen Eira has already paid Kingston approximately \$4 million for the retrenchment costs of implementing the amalgamation (when 45 per cent of the City of Moorabbin became part of the City of Glen Eira).

Kingston accepted a legal obligation to do an audit of actual costs up to 30 June 1995 so that the amount could be adjusted up or down. At this time, Kingston has not conducted this audit.

Also, Kingston has claimed an additional \$5.86 million, making a total of \$9.86 million. Kingston has stated that Glen Eira should pay \$4.99 million for Moorabbin employees' "redundancy costs"— even if employees have not been made redundant and there is no cost!

In a letter dated 4 June 1998, Kingston stated: "161 staff are Glen Eira's responsibility for redundancy purposes, regardless of whether an actual redundancy has occurred. That is, the Agreement is based on compensation for potential redundancy costs and is

not related to when or if they have been made redundant".

Lawyers acting for the City of Glen Eira dispute the City of Kingston's claim, and our Councillors have unanimously agreed to defend the Glen Eira residents and ratepayers against this claim.

In a letter the Mayor wrote to Kingston on 29 June, Glen Eira reiterated it was ready, willing and able to meet any obligation which it has under the 1995 Agreement, but that it had been continually frustrated by Kingston's failure to provide information to substantiate the claim.

Cr Neve said Council had concerns in relation to the Board of Inquiry: "Our concern is that the Board's terms of reference mean it can only deal with 15 per cent of the amount Kingston is claiming from Glen Eira. We need a process that can resolve all aspects of this matter as soon as possible."

"Finally, it's important to point out that there is an agreed dispute resolution process, which Glen Eira fully supported. The Agreement between the two Councils provides for arbitration under the Commercial Arbitration Act. Glen Eira activated this agreed process in July 1998. As a result, an Arbitrator who has the power to deal with all aspects of this matter has been appointed and has started the arbitration process." Cr Neve said.

He said: "Council is fully supportive of this process and optimistic of its outcomes. As this saga draws closer to its conclusion, we look forward to again being able to focus all our attention on our ongoing work to improve and assist the local community."

Brains, Bytes and Business strategy launched

Brains Bytes and Business— a Business
Development Strategy for the City of Glen
Eira— was launched recently at a function for Glen
Eira's business and community leaders.

Hosted by Council and held at 8 St Georges Road Elsternwick, the dinner was aimed at celebrating local business and at giving attendees the opportunity to network with each other and meet senior Council staff.

The concept of "brains, bytes and business" combines the resources of Glen Eira: the community and the workforce; new technology and value added skills; and current and future businesses.

Council and a group of volunteers comprising Council officers, prominent business and community leaders formulated the strategy. The strategy will be implemented over the next five years and aims to: attract investment to the area; build on existing strengths and develop the local resources; promote self sufficiency among businesses; enhance and promote shopping and business precincts; and create effective linkages to encourage business development.

\$31,000 rate debt to be paid

The owner of a Balaclava property has agreed to pay more than \$31,500 in rates and charges, following legal moves by Glen Eira City Council to recover the outstanding debt, which could have resulted in the house being sold.

Council negotiated a settlement with the owner in mid-December, which will see the full amount paid by the end of this month. Council had been seeking a court order to sell the property as a "last resort" to recover the outstanding debt, which went back nine years.

The settlement includes a "consent to judgement clause", which allows Council to reactivate selling the property, if the owner defaults on the payment of the debt.

No rates had been paid on the \$900,000 property since September 1989. The total debt of more than \$31,500 included rates, garbage charges, State Deficit Levy, penalty interest, and debt collection and legal costs.

Mayor Cr Barry Neve said: "We are very pleased to see this matter settled. Council will now target other properties with large and long-standing rate debts. There are 50 ratepayers who have unpaid rates going back more than three years, and that is money that should be available to be spent for the benefit of the community."

Esther hits 100,000 milestone

Seventy-seven year old North Caulfield resident Esther Poulter has helped Glen Eira City Council reach a milestone, by making the 100,000th request through Council's awardwinning customer service computer system.

Ms Poulter, who rang the Glen Eira Service Centre to arrange for her pruned tree branches to be collected, was chuffed to receive a certificate marking the milestone from Service Centre manager Kerrin Smithies late last month.

Ms Poulter has lived in the area for 27 years and she said the Service Centre staff were always "very kind, very friendly" in her dealings with Council. "Courtesy goes a long way, doesn't it?" she said.

Ms Smithies said the customer tracking system was developed by Council and Vitesse Communications in 1996, and since has been sold to six other Councils. It also won the prestigious National Award for Innovation in Local Government— Information Technology section— in 1997.

The innovative, integrated request management system not only allows a resident or staff member to monitor the progress of a request, it enables bookings for everything from community buses to halls to hard rubbish collection to be made quickly and efficiently.

"If staff are unable to provide an on-the-spot solution to a request or problem, the officer will determine the priority of the request and the right staff member to answer it," she said.

Ms Smithies said: "Any resident may follow the progress of his or her request with one telephone call. It also means that council, from Chief executive down, are able to monitor the service delivery levels."

Footbridge maintenance victory

Glen Eira City Council has won its year-long battle to stop the State Government from closing down two Public Transport Corporation pedestrian crossings, and efforts to shift responsibility for maintenance onto Council.

Transport Minister Robin Cooper has advised Council that the Oak Avenue Footbridge, Elsternwick, and Toorak Road Underpass, East Malvern, will be kept open, and that Bayside Trains will resume responsibility for maintenance. Mayor Cr Barry Neve said: "I am very pleased to receive this advice, which is in the interests of Glen Eira residents.

"Our stand on this issue has prevented the State Government from cost-shifting its responsibilities onto local government. Ongoing maintenance will be kept by Bayside Trains."

In March 1998, Council publicly criticised PTC plans to close down the two pedestrian links, which would have caused significant inconvenience to residents who used them each day to cross the railway line.

The PTC had written to Council late in 1997, stating that the links could only remain open if Council covered the cost of \$250,000 refurbishment and ongoing maintenance. The Council had been given 10 days to respond.

Please stop helping us - we can't afford it

A State Government rubbish levy, intended to boost kerbside recycling "cost-effectiveness", will only increase costs to Councils, according to Glen Eira City Council.

The Government has announced a \$1 levy on Councils, for every tonne of rubbish they take to the tip—added to the \$3 per tonne already paid by Councils. The funds raised are meant to help offset the cost of recycling and make it "sustainable".

Council will have to pay \$50,000 more a year—on top of the \$150,000 it already contributes annually.

The levy comes into effect on 1 July 1999, and runs for three years, during which time Council will pay approximately \$600,000 to the State Government to help recycling.

Mayor Cr Barry Neve said: "There is no guarantee that any of this money will be distributed directly back to Councils. For our \$150,000 contributed this year, we received only \$5000 in direct grants for a green waste trial. That's the sort of help we don't need.

"Councils had been asking the Government to force the packaging industry to make a contribution towards the cost of recycling. But instead of Councils receiving assistance, their waste management costs have been increased."

Cr Neve said the Government had already collected \$12 million from local councils through the rubbish levy over the past three years, "and it still hasn't helped to make recycling more cost-effective".

"The only way recycling can be made more costeffective for Councils is for the packaging industry to pay its fair share."

In addition to the levy, Glen Eira City Council pays nearly \$1 million a year for its recycling program, which is the payment to contractors who collect paper and recyclable containers. The figure is calculated on the gap between what the collection costs and what the contractors raise from selling the recyclable material. The gap is widening because of increased collection costs, declining prices for material, and lack of markets for the recyclables.

Overcoming disability barriers Sharon Granek, Glen Eira City Council's newly Sappointed Disability Advisor, knows first hand of the barriers that an all the last of the barriers that are all the last of the last

of the barriers that people with disabilities experience in the community.

At the age of 18, Sharon embarked on an exciting backpacking adventure overseas only to awake one morning in Holland with paralysis down her right side. She had suffered a minor stroke, which affected her physical mobility and speech.

Sharon's experience of not being able to speak was exacerbated by not being able to speak Dutch and she was treated as if she had an intellectual disability: "It gave me insight into how frustrating it is to want to be able to relay certain messages and have no one take the time to try and understand me," Sharon explained.

Sharon faced two years of rehabilitation back in Australia and got to the point where she had to decide if she "had a life or should hide under a rock forever". Shortly after this, Sharon found a job that boosted her confidence enormously and she then enrolled in a course in Welfare Studies. She felt her experiences gave her the needed empathy when dealing with people with disabilities.

"I wanted to encourage other people to have a go at life and not simply give up," she said.

Council has adopted a Disability Policy and Action Plan and Sharon has been appointed to assist staff in implementing the plan. She brings the same passion and dedication to this position where she knows she faces some big challenges. One being assisting in making physical access to council buldings and services easier for people with some form of disability. As always, money is a consideration when making any alterations to buildings, so Sharon is aware that the changes must be gradual.

Sharon's role involves developing Council's ability to include people with any form of disability in all Council activities—from planning and policy development to participating in community programs and accessing services.

"If someone comes into the service centre, can they see the person behind the counter? What if they have a hearing or speech difficulty? How do staff communicate with them? Things that other people take for granted can be major hurdles for people with disabilities," Sharon said.

She said she was delighted that training already undertaken by Service Centre staff has assisted in addressing these issues.

The other major challenge for Sharon is changing the attitudes and culture of council staff. People are often fearful about how to inter-relate with people with disabilities and Sharon will run further training sessions to help staff learn new skills and knowledge that will help them overcome these barriers.

Glen Eira council is one of only a few councils to lodge their Action Plan with the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission, which indicates a real commitment to change policies that embrace all members of the community. Helping hand acknowledged

ADASS moves house

Glen Eira's Adult Day Activity Support Service (ADASS) has moved to larger premises. The expanding service, which began 10 years ago and now has 164 clients, moved from Freeman Street, South Caulfield to new premises in Glen Huntly Road, Elsternwick.

ADASS offers services to the aged and young people with disabilities, and provides support to carers who look after a relative at home. The philosophy of the service is to keep people at home for as long as possible with the help of a number of support services, including meals on wheels, homecare, homebased respite and the day care centre.

ADASS Supervisor Angela Mancini said in order to really address client's needs, ADASS must tend to the needs of the family as a whole. Carers are supported both practically and emotionally while caring for their relative at home right through to when their loved ones may have to be placed in a nursing home. She said people can initially be reluctant to seek help, but usually feel very relieved once they have made contact with a service like ADASS.

To be eligible for the program, an assessment is made and the person is slowly integrated into the program's activities for short periods at a time until they feel comfortable enough to stay the day. ADASS also provides a community bus to pick people up and organises taxis to take people home.

Gino Michelutti— A Survey Opens Tuesday, 16 February at 7.30pm Continues to 5pm Sunday, 28 February

This exhibition is a survey of Gino Michelutti— a Caulfield artist whose white on white minimal art works of the 1970s compare most favourably with other works produced in that genre. Indeed, his selection into the world's most prestigious show case of international contemporary art, the Venice Biennale, not once but twice, is testimony to the quality of his work.

The beautiful white shaped canvas works contrast strongly with Michelutti's more recent dark allegorical paintings which, more overtly, paint for the viewer the European ideals and culture from which Michelutti comes.

Michelutti migrated from Italy to Australia in 1952. He had studied painting, restored frescoes and worked as a set designer. In Australia, Gino earnt his living as a draughtsman and worked on the drawings for the Snowy Mountains Scheme.

Gino's paintings demonstrate a deep knowledge of philosophy and the history of art. They are suburban treasures that richly illustrate personal and individual passions. Don't miss it.

Paintings by Judy Racz Opens Tuesday, 16 February at 6pm Continues to Sunday, 28 February

The paintings of Judy Racz bring together elements of her life including, religion, mathematics and music.

With painful war-time memories and the turmoil of the revolution in Hungary— Judy came to Australia in 1957, aged 16. She retired from teaching mathematics in secondary schools after 20 years to become a full time painter in 1991.

Although she has converted to Catholicism, her exhibition will feature a major series of paintings based on the 22 letters of the Hebrew alphabet.

The traditions of Jewish mysticism and the Kabbalah are depicted in the paintings, and are accompanied by explanatory text panels.

While the panels provide a guide to interpreting the works, they do not exhaust all meaning. Each letter of the alphabet has a numerical value,

a name and a special form that makes it unique, providing many levels relating to our personal lives and the universe.

Robert Fisher

Robert Fisher is a painter of landscapes. His paintings, often large in scale, bear the influence of Williams and Boyd in their loose and distorted perspectives of the Australian landscape. His work not only depicts romantic rolling hills and desert

soil, but also the bitumen roadways, pavements and back alleys of urban Melbourne.

Traces of life accrete in layers on the pavements, billboards get posted over and over, buildings and roadways fall into disrepair, sometimes revealing glimpses of lives gone before. Robert paints to draw our attention to these often minute and overlooked details.

Both the Robert Fisher and Ian Banks-Smith exhibitions represent a great opportunity to purchase high quality paintings before both of these artists become better known.

Ian Banks-Smith

Opens Tuesday, 2 March at 7. 30pm Continues to Sunday, 14 March

The paintings of Ian Banks-Smith bring together his interest in nature, particularly plants, and his interest in art with a transcendental edge.

His art utilises an expressive energetic movement of hand and brush to create an organic web of chaotic drips, dribbles and swirls. Colours, backgrounds and layers are carefully crafted, setting up a tension between order and disorder.

Banks-Smith's earlier paintings strongly display his interest in Jackson Pollock, and those included in this exhibition have the artist's own imprint layered over the top of this important influence.

These vibrant, colourful works seek to capture a metaphysical realm, to capture, if you will, the original energy of the cosmos; the energy that is the well-spring from which nature (including man) developed. If you want a less lofty metaphor think of the apparent random patterns of the natural world visible under a very powerful microscope, a randomness that is very much a part of a larger system and larger design.

Putting aside the metaphoric interpretations, these are well-executed formal paintings, with bright, colourful modern energy.





Notice of amendment to the planning scheme Glen Eira Planning Scheme Amendment 136

City of GLEN EIRA

Glen Eira City Council has prepared Amendment No. L36 to the Glen Eira Planning Scheme. The Amendment changes the Local Section of the Glen Eira Planning Scheme.

The amendment applies to a three hectare area of land located to the north of Station Street, Caulfield. The land comprises a large parcel of vacant land owned by the Victorian Amatuer Turf Club (VATC) and known as Members No. I Carpark, and a number of abutting residential properties also owned by the VATC. Also included in the land to which the amendment applies are two residential properties abutting the Members No. I Carpark which are owned by separate parties.

The land is generally bounded by Normanby Road to the north, Smith Street to the east, Bond and Heywood Streets to the west and Station Street to the south.



Park master plans on display

Good parks don't just happen; they are the result of careful and well thought out planning. What type and how many trees do you plant? Does a park require a playground? For what age group should it cater? Are BBQ's needed, and if so, where can they be best placed? These are the types of questions that need to be answered when undertaking such planning.

Draft master plans have been devised for three of Glen Eira's parks: Harleston, Hopetoun and Allnut Parks to address these and other issues. The planning process will establish proper parameters for any future park development and enable projects to be included in the Council's rolling capital works programs.

Implementing good planning means our parks will be well preserved for generations to come. Planning helps provide a vision for the park's development, and ensure such things as uniform furniture and appropriate signage.

During the planning process, the level of community use is highlighted which determines the extent of alterations needed; it may only need minor alterations such as a pathway being redirected or an extra piece of play equipment. But for other parks, planning may pave the way for future developments which add extra benefits to the park such as a playground or a significant tree planting.

The draft master plans for these three parks will be on display during February and public comment is invited. The plan for Allnut Park will be on display at the Bentleigh Library while the plans for Harleston and Hopetoun Parks will be on display at the Council offices. Safety is his business

Ensuring people's safety is the driving force behind most of John Bordignon's actions. As manager of Council's Building Services his primary role is to assess and ensure compliance with the myriad of building regulations which safeguard people's health, safety and amenity.

But having regulations and enforcing them is not enough. John believes Council also needs to play a role in raising people's awareness and educating them.

A builder and carpenter by trade, John has worked in local government for more than nine years— as a senior inspector and later as a surveyor. He came to his current role in 1998 and, as part of this role, is working to raise awareness of two specific safety regulations: smoke alarms and pool fencing.

Council has been given the responsibility of monitoring compliance with these new State Government regulations; which require all pools and spas to be fenced and all dwellings to have at least one smoke alarm installed.

But John's role is not just about enforcement, education is just as important.

"We need to let people know what the regulations are and the reasons behind those requirements. We're interested in giving people all the information and support they need to comply, rather than just fining them for failing to," he said.

"We want people to be aware of the dangers and take the necessary steps to prevent a tragedy."

Statistics show that in the five years preceding 1996, 550 people died in 451 fires in Australia, of those 131 deaths were in Victoria. During 1997 Victorian Fire Services figures estimated 144 lives and 529 homes were saved as a result of smoke alarms.

Australian Bureau of Statistics figures (1998) estimate 81.5 per cent of households have installed smoke alarms, but simply installing the units is not enough. John emphasises the need to test and maintain the smoke alarms in working order.

"Having a smoke alarm with a flat battery is no better than having no alarm. The battery needs to be changed every year, and the unit must be tested regularly."

Council's Manager of Building Services John Bordignon: "Regulations are not enough."

Likewise with pool fencing, John believes simply installing the fences can give a false sense of security.

"Having safety fencing in place doesn't exclude the need for supervision, children can be very clever at overcoming barriers," he said. "At the very beginning of summer, we'd had five children die in water-related incidents in Victoria."

"People are still dying, and often unnecessarily. Regulations aren't enough, but having them in place and ensuring they are met will help to minimise the risk. We're not going to start knocking on doors, but we want people to realise these things do need to be done," he said.

Are you smoke safe?

By 1 February 1999, all dwellings and sole-occupancy units were required by State Government law to have a self-contained smoke alarm installed in the appropriate position. Alarms should comply with the Australian Standard number AS 3786-1993. Residents could face a fine of up to \$500 in the Magistrates Court for failing to comply with the regulation.

All new dwellings are required to have "hard wired" alarms (wired directly into the property's electrical system) but existing dwellings can install battery-operated units.

Alarms should be placed on or near the ceiling between each area containing bedrooms and the remainder of the dwelling. As a general guide this means placing the alarm in the hallway outside the bedrooms, not more than 1.5 metres from the doorway of each bedroom.

Once installed, the alarm should be checked regularly by pushing the "test" button and the battery should be changed once a year. The unit needs to be gently vacuumed or wiped to ensure surface dust does not interfere with its operation.

Pool safety a must

Since June 1997, State Government laws have required all swimming pools, wading pools and spas with a depth of more than 300mm, to have safety barriers (including a fence, wall, gate or screen) to prevent young children from gaining access.

The City of Glen Eira has more than 1000 swimming pools, and although many have complied with the safety regulations, some no doubt are still without sufficient safety railings and gates.

Council's Building Department may visit sites at any time to ascertain whether safety measures are in place and meet the regulations. Pool and spa owners face an on-the-spot fine of \$200 if not compliant.
