Minister approves move to nine Councillors

The State Government has given approval for the increase in Glen Eira Councillors from six to nine at the next Council elections, to be held in March 2000.

Minister for Local Government Bob Cameron approved the change in the Orders in Council published in the Victoria Government Gazette on 28 October 1999.

Mayor Cr Norman Kennedy said: "I am pleased that the Minister has accepted our proposal to increase the number of Councillors to nine. This move is designed to provide better representation for our 120,000 residents. Our community endorsed this proposal as their preferred option during the community consultation held earlier this year."

Cr Kennedy urged Glen Eira residents to consider standing for Council next March. "This is a valuable way to contribute to our community. From next March we will have three Councillors in each of the three wards: Mackie, Jasper and Orrong."

Glen Eira City Council's elections will be run by the Victorian Electoral Commission and be conducted by postal vote. Voters will receive ballot papers, statements and indications of preferences supplied by candidates and reply paid envelopes, by mail.

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Parks go online

In what could be an Australian first, Glen Eira's Parks and Leisure Guide has gone online on the web. In an exciting joint project with computer students from Monash University's Caulfield Campus and Council, an interactive leisure guide has been developed for residents and visitors to the city.

This project began in March with an assessment of Council's needs and a discussion on what was possible with the internet. The aim was to construct a user-friendly interactive leisure guide to provide up-to-date information on parks and be integrated with the new Out and About Leisure Guide.

The interactive map will take people into the heart of recreational possibilities in Glen Eira and the guide can be accessed through the internet from either a home computer or through facilities at libraries.

The main map displays places of interest in Glen Eira with hot links to websites— click on the Rippon Lea icon and you'll find yourself in the Rippon Lea web site. There are four key areas of the guide, including a map of parks, dog walking areas, the interactive map and a park search facility.

Major parks and their services are listed individually, including links to the appropriate sports clubs and contact details and training times. Parks can be searched either by suburb or facilities.

\$1 million children's centre to open

Glen Eira families, child care staff and maternal and child health nurses will celebrate the opening of the new Murrumbeena House with a teddy bears' picnic on Sunday 12 December.

Mayor Cr Norman Kennedy will unveil a plaque to mark the opening of the \$1 million facility, which brings together maternal and child health, child care, family day care playgroup, parents' groups, occasional care, and community meeting facilities.

Glen Eira City Council provided \$700,000 for the project, while the Federal Government contributed \$300,000, under its Capital Replacement and Upgrade Program. The new child care centre will provide 45 places and replaces the former Ormond and Murrumbeena children's centres.

Maternal and Child Health has been operating in a refurbished Edwardian house on the new site at 105–107 Murrumbeena Road since August. The new section for child care and other services is now complete and will open its doors on Monday 13 December.

Cr Noel Erlich, who is chair of Council's Human Services Advisory Committee, said: "This is an integrated solution to the provision of family services in the City of Glen Eira.

"The new building has been designed to blend in with its surroundings. For example, Council has sourced second-hand terracotta tiles and chosen bricks that blend with the older building which houses maternal and child health. The design also takes advantage of natural light and energy efficiency, and has full disabled access."

GlenCare funding— Crs call for help

A new Department of Human Services funding system will continue to leave Council's home and community care unit GlenCare with insufficient funding.

Council's Human Services Director Laurie Harkin said the demand for services was already higher than Council could provide: "All disability, home care and adult day care services currently have waiting lists and referrals for new clients has increased by 20 per cent in the last year."

"But government funding for these services has increased by only 2 per cent over the last three years," he said.

"The government funding system has changed over the last couple of years, and all home and community care services will be funded for the next financial year in a significantly different way from the 1999–2000 financial year. The new system is based on a unit cost for service arrangement which has been determined by the Department of Human Services.

"But in introducing the Unit Costing system, the Department specified an amount that was below the industry benchmark. We've already negotiated a unit cost that is closer to the benchmark for the current financial year, but the Department won't increase the funding to meet that amount— instead we will be expected to reduce the amount of service hours we provide to fit the current funding."

Council's GlenCare Unit currently provides 175,000 hours of service per year, representing assistance to more than 4000 people. About 24 per cent (almost \$800,000) of the total \$3.5 million GlenCare budget is provided by Council itself.

GlenCare provides a comprehensive and integrated range of support services for frail aged and other people with disabilities and their carers; services which enhance their quality of life, help them be more independent, and assist them in remaining connected to their local community.

A report to Council recommended having Councillors pursue appropriate avenues of additional funding by directly lobbying the relevant local parliamentary members, government departments and by actively lobbying through the Municipal Association of Victoria.

Cr Noel Erlich, whose portfolio is Human Services said: "Council is dependent on government funding for more than 60 per cent of its community care programs. Council's contribution of \$800,000 is well in excess of the minimum Government requirement."

"Measures are already being taken to improve efficiencies in the home care program— we've achieved a lower unit cost than the Department's specified amount in both the Home Maintenance and the Adult Day Centre programs. For example, our actual cost for home maintenance is \$28.97 per hour compared to the Department's \$31.57 per hour."

"We're working hard to increase the number of hours of service we can provide, but there is a limit to what we can achieve. We'll be calling for the Department to further review its contribution and more realistically address its responsibilities," he said.

What do Portfolio Advisory Committees do?

This month we publish the final in our series on Council's Portfolio Advisory Committees and their input into Council's activities and services— covering Business Development, Arts and Culture and Recreation Advisory Committees. Council's Advisory Committees comprise Councillors, community representatives and consultants and Council staff, and meet to discuss issues and make recommendations for future directions.

Business Development Committee

The Business Development Committee was established by Council specifically to develop a Business Development strategy for the City, and comprised a cross section of local business representatives. The strategy developed by the Committee, sets the blueprint for the next three to five years and was approved by Council in August 1998.

This Committee evolved into an Implementation Work Group, the task of which is to complete the actions of the Business Development Strategy, according to the five Strategy Objectives, namely to:

- attract investment;
- build on existing strengths and develop local resources;
- · promote self sufficiency amongst businesses;
- enhance and promote shopping centre business precincts; and
- create effective linkages to encourage business development.

The Implementation Work Group now comprises Business Consultant Peter McNabb, Council's Executive Director Andrew Newton, and Manager—Business Development Unit Andrew Millen, under the leadership of Cr Alan Grossbard.

Council's Business Development Unit has been in operation at Council for about four years, and with the direction of the Committee and later the Work Group, is well advanced with the implementation of its actions. Some of its key achievements are:

- beautification and physical works in Carnegie,
 Bentleigh, Alma Village, Caulfield South/Hopetoun
 Gardens and Elsternwick Shopping Centres;
- the development of the new format 1999 Glen Eira Guide/Business Directory;
- the establishment of the business membership Buy Local Alliance and Business Events Calendar 1999/2000;
- the establishment of the Business Development Unit brand to the business and residential community;
- the development of information and business related publications including the Glen Eira Economic brochure and the Business Development Unit information brochure;
- public forums on business developments held in the Town Hall;
- Business Victoria grants to assist business exceeding \$50,000; and
- further enhancement and development of the Glen Eira Mainstreet Program.

Other exciting projects to be completed later this financial year, include the Glen Eira Retail/Commercial Strategy and business sector, industry and community profiles.

The Business Development Implementation Group is strategically focused with a plan to attract investment, support existing businesses and to provide exceptional leadership for the City of Glen Eira now and in the future.

The Arts and Culture Advisory Committee has assisted Council in considering issues surrounding the provision of quality arts programs and management of venues.

The Committee's main consideration has been to enlist support and advice on the implementation of the Arts and Cultural Strategy for the City of Glen Eira and to deal with other issues as they have arisen.

These include the establishment of a Friends of Glen Eira group and a Caulfield Cultural Forum; the marketing of the Arts Complex venues and its programs to Glen Eira and the wider community; to oversee the refurbishment of Oak Tree House; and the preparation and implementation of a Business Plan and marketing strategy for Oak Tree House.

As a result of the interest expressed in having a closer working relationship with our sister city Ogaki, an extremely successful Japanese Festival was held in March 1999. This event attracted more than 3,000 people (including 500 students) and attracted wide media coverage.

The Arts Advisory Committee has tackled many arts and cultural issues such as the refurbishment and development of the Town Hall facilities, a marketing strategy for the Theatrette, membership of the Committee itself, the formation and support of the Glen Eira Youth Orchestra, programming opportunities, and the marketing opportunities for a consortium of south eastern suburbs cultural institutions including the Glen Eira Arts Complex, Australian Racing Museum, Jewish Museum of Australia, the Holocaust Museum and Research Centre and Rippon Lea Estate.

The opportunity to participate in the arts and cultural activities of Glen Eira has always been paramount to this community. The Arts Advisory Committee looks forward to ensuring these services continue to provide the City with quality special events and programs.

Recreation Advisory Committee

The major project undertaken by the Recreation Advisory Committee was the Glen Eira Long Term Open Space Strategy which was passed and adopted by Council in December 1998 and implementation is well under way.

Open space is an important issue for all residents. Glen Eira is fortunate to have quality parks and open space that is the envy of other municipalities. To ensure these areas are used to their full potential, the committee identified the need to have a proper long term strategy for open space that enables Council to make budget provision for projects to go ahead.

After extensive public consultation a draft report was written and Council called for public comment. Most of the responses received expressed support for the strategy's broad principles which are to:

- retain existing open space;
- discourage alienation of public open space for restricted uses;
- · encourage local users of sports facilities;
- · create trails and links between open space;
- · increase landscaping in parks; and
- increase community involvement in the design, development and management of open space.

Since the adoption of the strategy, Council has undertaken the development of master plans for six parks. As identified in the open space strategy, master plans for parks enable their redevelopment (where necessary) in a staged process. Together with Council, local residents and park users identify the needs for each park. A landscape architect then prepares a draft report and a plan for community comment. The final plan and report is then adopted by Council. Council places a high priority on community participation.

The committee is pleased to see that the groundwork put in to develop the long term open space strategy is already bearing fruit through the establishment of these park master plans. A direct result of the Allnutt Park planning process has been the complete redevelopment of the park. From the successful upgrade of this park it is quite clear that the planning approach undertaken by Recreation Services is a success. The committee is delighted to see the results of the process established by the strategy which it was instrumental in putting in to place.

As Chairperson of the Recreation Advisory
Committee Cr Martens also chaired the Princes Park
Community Consultative Committee that assessed
expressions of interest into proposed development of
Princes Park. This committee comprised Councillors,
local residents, sports clubs and Council staff.

ADASS celebrates Carers Week

Glen Eira City Council's ADASS centre recently celebrated Carers Weeks with an afternoon tea for carers to recognise the enormously valuable service being performed by carers in the community. About 60 people attended and were entertained by music students from De La Salle College.

Human Services Advisory Committee chairperson, Cr Noel Erlich, said: "Glen Eira's adult day centre provides programs for older people or people who have a disability and are unable to participate in community activities.

"Participants enjoy a broad range of activities such as gentle exercises, music therapy, creative art, t'ai chi,

outings to restaurants, beaches and other places of interest. The centre also provides the opportunity to meet new people, make friends, and have fun. All this activity adds an extra dimension to the lives of the group members."

Cr Erlich said the day centre also provided a vital "time out" for the carers. This respite allowed them the chance to undertake their own activities and social outings, and recharge before resuming what is usually an extremely demanding full-time role of caring for their partner or family member.



Council and local food businesses

working together for improved hygiene in a changing world

Our eating habits are changing. Increasingly, more meals are prepared and consumed away from the home and the demand for convenience foods of all kinds has increased.

But, without proper food handling and hygiene, risk of food poisoning also increases. The Public Health Association of Australia reports that 11,500 individuals become ill every day after consuming contaminated food or drink. Food borne illness, including food poisoning and gastroenteritis, costs the community more than \$2.6 billion each year.

Now for the good news. Council congratulates Glen Eira's food businesses for their co-operation with Council to meet the required hygiene standards.

The City of Glen Eira has 66 A class food businesses (refer to table). All A class food businesses have submitted food safety programs to Council for approval. Council's Environmental Health Department has assessed the content of these programs for compliance.

Council will continue to work with local food business to ensure high levels of hygiene are maintained.

Council's Environmental Health Department has conducted a number of food safety workshops to help local food businesses understand and comply with the Victorian food laws. These food safety workshops will continue to run in early 2000.

Environmental Health Officers are also currently inspecting all local food businesses to assess hygiene standards and to provide information about how to improve hygiene standards.

Local food businesses are encouraged to develop and submit food safety programs as soon as possible and introduce new hygiene management practices. Council has already received food safety programs from 26 B class premises and 13 C class premises. Council's Environmental Health Officers are currently assessing these programs.

All local food businesses complying with the new food laws and following good hygiene practices are eligible for a 5 Star hygiene rating. All 5 Star food businesses are awarded a certificate that is usually displayed inside the premises.

Council also produces the Safe Food Guide which provides details of all local businesses of 5 Star rating. This guide is also available in Council's resource guide.

The Victorian Government has introduced dates when food businesses must submit food safety programs to Council. This applies to all Victorian food businesses.

Help us help— recycle your newspaper

Council's paper recycling collection is not being as well-utilised as expected, according to Waste Management Engineer Doug Griffiths.

The service was changed from a monthly collection of all paper and cardboard to a fortnightly newspaper and magazine collection about four months ago. Although more newspaper has been collected than for the same period last year, the increase has not been as significant as expected.

Mr Griffiths said the response was disappointing because customer surveys had indicated that the convenience of a fortnightly collection would encourage more residents to participate.

He said newspaper recycling is the most efficient form of recycling: "Because newspaper is heavy and Council receives a good return on the sale of the collected material, recycling newspaper gives the greatest reduction in tip fees at the least cost."

"Newspaper is also the largest part of the general household waste stream that can be recycled," he said.

Mr Griffiths reminded people that only newspapers and magazines were now being collected. Cardboard and all other paper, such as envelopes and office paper, should be placed in the regular garbage bins. Council ceased collecting cardboard because a reliable market could not be found for the collected material.

"The specification for the paper we can sell to Fletcher Challenge Paper is very strict. People need to be sure bundles contain only the right material. If



The countdown to December 31 1999 is underway, and many Glen Eira residents will be at parties or major public events, celebrating the arrival of the Year 2000 as the clock ticks over at midnight.

It's also the countdown to whether the so-called "Millenium Bug" has an impact on a large range of utilities. After careful reviews and planning during 1999, Glen Eira City Council is in a state of Y2K readiness, through its Muncipal Emergency Management Plan.

Council has followed the lead of the emergency services and is not anticipating a "Y2K emergency" on New Year's Eve or New Year's Day. Rather Council will be prepared to deal with any emergency that happens, irrespective of its cause.

Should the need arise to communicate with the community at large (if other communications systems are not working), Council has put up community notice boards at Centre Road Bentleigh (Bentleigh Plaza rotunda) and Glen Huntly Road Elsternwick (at the corner of Staniland Grove). Another board will soon be erected in Carnegie at the corner of Koornang Road and Jersey Parade.

However, the major impact on New Year's Eve is probably going to be the extraordinary level of revelling throughout the community. The sheer numbers of people crowded together, coupled with enthusiastic consumption of alcohol by many, is bound to cause a number of emergencies.

With this in mind, Council wishes the community a Safe and Happy New Year— take care on the road and keep your family safe to enjoy the new millennium.

they contain contamination of envelopes or the like, they cannot be collected and the newspaper is wasted," he said.

Telephone books are not collected either and should be taken to BP service stations and placed in the "book muncher" bins for separate recycling. These bins are made available for a short time when new phone books are issued.

Paper recycling crate

In addition to the "paper baler" which has been available for some time, Council has now also made a "paper recycling crate" available for purchase. The crate is similar in size to the black recycling crate but has been specifically designed for paper— eliminating the need to bundle paper and reducing litter. A government grant provided the original crates, but similar grants are not available for the new crate. Council is selling the crates for \$6 each— less than the cost price.

Mr Griffiths appealed to residents to purchase a crate and continue to recycle newspapers and magazines: "The production of newspaper from recycled paper uses much less electricity, thus helping to reduce greenhouse gases. It really is worth the effort."







Almost End of Term Report Card for:

Glen Eira City Council March 1997-March 2000

General comments:

Glen Eira City Council has demonstrated its ability to operate effectively and efficiently in providing services and facilities to the community. It has performed well against the targets it has set for itself and against those required of it by others. Council has been rated the best in Victoria for customer contact and achieved an overall community satisfaction rating of 83%. A great term's work.

I. Willingness to support the community

Throughout its term, Glen Eira City Council has demonstrated a commitment to the community through the following projects:

Community Grants— more than \$600,000 worth were awarded.

Volunteer Recognition Scheme— Council has presented **486 awards** to acknowledge the significant contribution volunteers make to the life of the community.

Disability Policy and Action Plan—exceptional work. The policy was launched in November 1998 and implementation is well under way addressing building access, staff training, recreation and more.

2. Promoting health awareness

Immunisation— more than 11,000 people have been immunised.

Implementing State Food Safety legislation— Council has taken on implementation of these regulations with enthusiasm and should be proud that the City had the first shop in Victoria to comply with the new food safety rules.

Special achievement: Council has the highest rate of implementation of all Victorian Councils.

3. Developing new facilities

Council has almost completed work on the \$1 million Murrumbeena House— due to open on 13 December. The centre will provide child care, maternal and child health and community facilities.

4. Willingness to support individuals

Council has shown consistent commitment to addressing the needs of individuals in the community.

Service Centre— continuous improvement. Now takes almost **1000 calls or visits a day**. Most calls are handled by the staff member who answers the phone— well done!

Libraries— outstanding work! One million visits are made to Council's libraries each year.

Meals on wheels—more than 430,000 nutritious meals delivered to Glen Eira residents. A great effort.

Maternal and Child Health— Council has assisted more than 1000 families.

Aged care— Council is working on a new project to build a \$6 million Aged Care residential facility in Bentleigh.

Citizenship— nearly 2,000 people have become Australian citizens through ceremonies auspiced by Council.

5. Commitment to the environment

Making Glen Eira a clean, safe and enjoyable place to be has taken a high priority for Council.

Parks— Council has commissioned two new parks: Memorial Park (Kooyong Road) has been completed and another is under way near the former Murrumbeena High School.

Council has really cleaned up!

Street cleaning— 900 kilometres of kerbs and gutters on the City's roads have been cleaned 12 times each year; 8 kilometres of shopping centre kerbs, gutters and footpaths have been cleaned six times per week.

Recycling— **22,000 tonnes** of recyclable material has been collected.

Garbage collection— 120,000 tonnes of rubbish removed.


6. Supporting commercial enterprise

Council has supported the development of commercial enterprise in the City. Some \$2 million has been spent on physical improvements to retail shopping strips through Council's Mainstreet Program.

Feedback from other Councils, shopping centre managers and business operators has confirmed the Mainstreet programs in Bentleigh, Carnegie and Elsternwick are among the most successful in Victoria.

Roads— a million square metres of road pavement has been resurfaced. That's enough to resurface the MCG about 50 times!

Drains— Council has cleaned on average 1200 drainage pits and replaced 240 lids per year. Some 600 major drains are cleaned each year, representing an average of 21,000 metres of drains.

8. Ability to plan ahead

Council has put enormous energy into planning over this time. The Planning Department has overseen more than \$300 million worth of development.

It should be proud of the very low rate of planning appeals by objectors.

Adopted new Glen Eira Planning Scheme.

Council has worked hard to address the financial position of the City and made significant progress during this term, by:


· paying off \$6 million of inherited debt and not borrowing a cent. Council is on schedule to be debt-free in March 2000, and



Allnutt Park a winner

The decision was unanimous— Allnutt Park is a winner!

Mayor Cr Norman Kennedy officially opened the park redevelopment at a recent celebration. Although heavy rain was present for an hour or so, the general enthusiasm was not dampened as participants enjoyed performances by students from Katandra Primary school, McKinnon Kindergarten, and Bentleigh West Playgroup.

The redevelopments have been brought about through careful planning and community consultation. This process, identified by Recreation Services and the Open Space Strategy, recommends master plans be created for parks to ensure proper staged developments.

Allnutt Park is the first park to undergo this process from planning through to the completion of building works. Planning began in October 1998 and the final plans were endorsed by Council in April this year. The main construction work was carried out through June and July and minor works have since been completed— bringing the park back to life through innovative planning, design and works.

A significant amount of unseen work has gone into Allnutt Park's refurbishment; irrigation and drainage systems have been installed to help maintain the park. Many of the changes are obvious—the extensive tree planting program, the new and upgraded playground, new park furniture (including barbecue shelter and pathways). A toilet has also been installed and the park has been designed to give maximum access to people of all abilities. The new play equipment is wheelchair accessible and everything from drink fountains to toilets have been considered to enable maximum access.

Allnutt Park has been upgraded with good planning and community consultation— a partnership which has rejuvenated an important Council asset.

Governor-General opens Glen Eira research centre

Governor-General of Australia Sir William Deane recently opened the new Hadasa and Szymon Rosenbaum Research Centre in Elsternwick.

About 700 people, including Glen Eira City Councillors and Israel Ambassador Gavriel Levy, attended the official ceremony which was televised live from the marquee into the auditorium.

Describing the afternoon as a "very special occasion", Sir William unveiled a commemorative plaque. The new two-storey building has six 6 metre columns; *Pillars of Witness* created by sculptor Andrew Rogers, and an arresting eternal flame by sculptor Peter Schipperheyn.

The new building will play a major research role and assist with visits by people studying the Holocaust, Nazism and combating racism and intolerance. Since its inception in 1984, more than 210,000 students from Victorian schools have visited the Holocaust Centre, which, except for a paid secretary, is run by 80 volunteers, mainly Holocaust survivors.

Did you 'number it in November'?

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Norman Kennedy last month backed the Neighbourhood Watch campaign "Number it in November" to encourage residents to improve street numbering on their property.

Cr Kennedy said: "This is an important initiative, because every day, the response times of emergency services are severely hampered because residents don't have clearly visible house numbers.

"For the police, ambulance and fire brigade, not being able to find house and shop numbers quickly can lead to critical delays. Instead of attending to the fire, intruder, medical emergency or other call-out, the officers sometimes are forced to use valuable time driving slowly up and down a street looking for house numbers."

Glen Eira City Council strongly supports the proper identification of house numbers and is soon to consider introducing a new Local Law requiring residents to prominently display house numbers.

Large-sized house numbers of white or reflective materials are easier to read whereas brass numbers on a dark brick background are almost impossible to detect at night time.

"Shop and business owners can also make a huge difference by prominently displaying their street number— and it's good for business to make it as easy as possible for customers to find premises.

"Help to make our community safer and check your own house or shop numbering— your life might depend on it," Cr Kennedy said.

Neighbourhood Watch State Co-ordinator, Acting Senior Sergeant Karen Rendell, was involved in promoting the "Number it in November" campaign and encouraged people to make a concerted effort to ensure their own and their neighbour's house numbers are clearly seen.

She said the following checklist would help people ensure their house could be found in an emergency.

Think about you own house number now and go outside and look to see if:

- your house number is clearly visible;
- the number can be clearly seen by passing motorists;
- the number is visible/reflective during the evening.

If your home has a lane or right of way at the rear, paint your house number and street name on the back fence or garage door.

If you live in a block of flats or units, make sure it is easy for the street number, block number and individual flat numbers to be identified.

Two new members have recently joined the team at Glen Eira City Council Immunisation Sessions.





Let's 'get wet'! graffiti diversion program

Schools, the Victoria Police and Glen Eira Youth Services have recently pursued a new tactic in the fight against graffiti in the community by developing the "Get Wet Graffiti Diversion Program".

The program encourages young people to design and display their creative talents through the painting of legal "community art pieces".

The Victoria Police, Police Schools Involvement Program (PSIP) in conjunction with Glen Eira College have worked with 12 students on creating legal pieces in the community and raising awareness of the consequences of engaging in illegal graffiti. School Focused Youth Service

he School Focused Youth Service for the Cities of Glen Eira, Port Phillip and Stonnington, is in the process of distributing brokerage funds to assist schools and agencies in the development of programs as part of new initiative between the Departments of Human Services and Education.

A total of 27 schools and agencies applied for assistance through the brokerage scheme—all have been successful with a total of \$57,000 being allocated to school-based programs.

More than 1000 young people are expected to participate in the programs aimed at the promotion of positive mental health and resilience. Many of these programs will help students develop conflict resolution and problem solving skills, relationship and life skills.

Other students will participate in tutoring programs, counselling sessions, recreational activities and camps. Families will also benefit from the brokerage funds through a series of parenting programs being offered by several schools and agencies.


