The new Glen Eira Service Centre has opened at the town hall, providing better services for residents. The new area, on the west side of the building, was opened to the public on 10 January and the official opening was held on 31 January.

Located off the town hall's Glen Eira Road car park the new Service Centre offers a number of benefits:

- a "one-stop shop" with most Council services available at the one place;
- full disability access, including access ramp, automatic doors, counter facilities for both residents and staff with a disability, and tactile elements on pathways and signage for people with a vision impairment;
- · interview rooms for private consultation; and
- more direct access to other town hall facilities.

The car park has also been improved to offer more space and safer usage, with clearly marked pathways.

Glen Eira Service Centre has been operating since 1996 and has grown significantly since that time. Its staff of 15 now handles 250,000 calls per year (keeping the average waiting time to less than six seconds), and deals with up to 15,000 inquiries at the service counter.

Mayor Cr Norman Kennedy, who officially opened the facility, said: "This is an exciting development for Council that will provide excellent facilities for residents. I invite people in Glen Eira to visit the new Service Centre and see the improvements."

The Service Centre caters for all general inquiries and payments, and for inquiries to the Building and Planning Departments. It will also be the access point for other departments within Council via the lifts.

Note: the old Service Centre entrance, off Hawthorn Road, is now closed.

Elections for the Glen Eira City Council will be held in March 2000. The City of Glen Eira is divided into three wards, with three Councillors to be elected for each ward.

Voting by post

The elections will be held entirely by post. If you are on the voters roll for the City of Glen Eira, a ballot pack of voting material will be posted to you from Tuesday, 29 February 2000.

Your completed ballot paper must be received by the Returning Officer by 6.00 pm on Friday, 17 March 2000 for your vote to be counted.

If your address has changed since 29 November 1999, or if you will be away when the ballot packs are mailed out from 29 February 2000, please write to the Returning Officer, Locked Bag 1111, Caulfield South Vic. 3162 by 4.00 pm on Tuesday, 15 February 2000, giving the address for redirection of your ballot

These elections are being conducted by the Victorian Electoral Commission on behalf of the Glen Eira City Council.

If you wish to stand for Council

If you want to be a candidate for Council, you must lodge a nomination form (together with a \$100 nomination fee) with the Returning Officer, Council Offices, cnr Glen Eira and Hawthorn Roads, Caulfield between Thursday, 10 February and 4.00 pm on Tuesday, 15 February 2000.



Warrawee Nursing Home's management committee has signed a landmark agreement to transfer management of the facility to Glen Eira City Council.

The agreement means that Council's proposed new \$7 million aged care residential facility— to be built on adjacent land— will become part of Warrawee in a single integrated facility.

The new buildings will provide about 80 additional beds. Council has appointed architects KLCK and construction is due for completion by the end of 2001.

Moorabbin City Council established Warrawee Nursing Home six years ago at 854A Centre Road, Bentleigh, under the management of Moorabbin Community Extended Care Society. Following Council amalgamations, Glen Eira City Council took over ownership of the site from the former City of Moorabbin, while the management committee continued to run the service.

The management committee has signed an agreement to transfer beds, funding and management to Council. The arrangements have safeguards to ensure a continued community emphasis and will go ahead during a transition period before the new buildings open in 2001.

Management committee president Neil Hamilton said: "This is an exciting development for Warrawee. The expanded facility will become a major top level aged lifestyle and care provider, with continuing guidance from committee members who will be part of a Policy and Philosophy Advisory Committee."

"The Warrawee philosophy broke new ground in nursing home care. The facility will be expanded from 30 beds to 110 beds and serve a wider range of the

ageing community of Glen Eira and the former municipal districts of Moorabbin and Caulfield," Mr Hamilton said.

Mayor Cr Norman Kennedy said: "I would like to personally thank Neil Hamilton and the committee for the significant work and personal contribution they have made to the development of the existing Warrawee facility. It is a great credit to the committee and is an invaluable service to the community.

"Council is committed to excellence in aged care. The integrated facility will be at the cutting edge of contemporary aged care services, and will build on the high quality work already undertaken by Warrawee.

"Council is looking forward to working with the committee members on the venture, which will represent one of the largest capital work projects undertaken by Glen Eira City Council. There will also be extensive community consultation in the development of the new buildings.

"This is a tremendous example of a community-based group and Council working together for the benefit of the surrounding community," Cr Kennedy said.

Council plans to build the new facility to replace the ageing Camden and Heathlands hostels, which are not expected to pass future Commonwealth Aged Care Building Certification Standards.

Training provides confidence and qualifications

Glen Eira City Council last year proposed a training program to give home care staff the opportunity to gain a qualification in personal care.

Thirty-five people took up the offer, and after committing to Saturday workshops, plenty of homework and the challenge of "returning to study", the whole group celebrated their graduation late last year.

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Norman Kennedy presented the certificates. The pilot project was a joint initiative of Glen Eira City Council, Chisholm Institute in Moorabbin and the Australian Traineeship Advisory Service.

Not only will the graduates have qualifications that are recognised Australia wide in the residential and community care industry, but they have already benefited from an increase in confidence and self-esteem, according to Jan Martin, Council's Community Care Manager.

"It has been wonderful to see the staff's development. For some, the prospect of doing a course was daunting, especially those who had not studied in more than 20 years. But they committed to workshops of three to four hours each Saturday and

worked very hard. There has been a visible increase in self esteem and confidence. Now some are considering further study for the first time."

The training was targetted at home care workers who had a desire to move into personal care, and those personal carers who had many years of experience, but no qualifications.

The graduates received either a Certificate III in Community Services (with personal care module) or Personal Care Certificate III (for current personal care workers who did not have formal qualifications).

"With a third of home care staff taking up the training offer, workshops were held on weekends to ensure minimum disruption to client services. This required a huge commitment from everyone with an outstanding result— 100 per cent successful completion," Ms Martin said.

Council is proud of the staff's achievements. Their qualifications will ensure a high standard in personal care and will enhance the multi-skilled resource pool drawn on to meet the needs of over 4000 residents each year.

I am proud to be part of the long tradition of local government, and greatly honoured to have been given the task of leading this community into the new millennium.

Since I was elected by my fellow Councillors in March 1999, I have had an extremely busy and rewarding time. I have attended a vast array of functions and had the opportunity to meet people from many walks of life and diverse interests in the community.

I have come into contact with such a diverse range of people, and really developed an understanding of how much the community depends on volunteers. The volunteer recognition scheme awards are a very important acknowledgement of the people who have put in many hours of tireless work for the benefit of the community, and I know the recipients are extremely proud to receive their certificates and pins.

My varied schedule as Mayor has taken me on the road to deliver a meal on National Meals on Wheels Day, hosting the Mayor and visitors from our Japanese sister city Ogaki during the wonderful Ogaki-Glen Eira Japanese Festival, visiting a fascinating 100-year-old resident who was involved in the birth of Melbourne radio, the pilgrimage to Sir John Monash's grave at Brighton Cemetery; and the incredible Children of Terezin art exhibition organised by Soka Gakkai International. There have been openings and AGMs and functions, special guests, speeches and launches.

I have found people in the community appreciate the Mayor giving the time to go to their function. It has been very enjoyable to meet lots of different people and find out directly what community groups do and what this Glen Eira community is all about. It's been fun and very enjoyable.

As can be imagined, I have no spare time! It's become

hard to go for that jog or compete in triathlons as I like to do. However, I've had opportunities for some "sporting" activity in my Mayoral year! The Global Walk at Caulfield Park for International Year of Older Persons, and the fabulous inaugural Charity Golf Day at Yarra Yarra Golf club were both excellent events to participate in.

I was also part of a team in the inaugural Relay for Life, a 24-hour relay around Duncan MacKinnon Reserve track for the Anti-Cancer Council. It's unusual running around the athletics track at 3am in the morning! But it was a fantastic success and a lot of fun for those who took part. The relay raised \$70,000.

Another track—the Packer Park velodrome—has provided me with the most adrenalin pumping experience of my Mayoral year. In launching the new surface, I was taken at top speed on the back of a tandem bike, with a full training session of riders whizzing past centimetres away, unable to see in front of me and having great trust in my front rider!

My job, of course, also includes chairing the Council meetings and our task has been extremely busy in the last 12 months, setting in place the Urban Village

Strategy Plans, the first round of heritage overlays, improving our financial position to be debt-free by next month, moving through our catch-up works on infrastructure, and opening the new \$1 million Murrumbeena House family centre and a new Service Centre at the Town Hall. Council has also been working more harmoniously and communications are at their strongest point. This augurs well for the future.

I would particularly like to thank Mayoress Nola Kennedy and my family; I couldn't have done this job without their wholehearted support.

Mrs Tyrrell had been nominated for this year's Glen Eira Citizen of the Year Award for her tireless work in the community. She received a Special Service award under the Council's Volunteer Recognition Scheme in 1989.

M oorleigh Community Village is home to a wide range of community groups and activities. Council services include maternal and child health, some family day care and related activities, and exercises for older adults programs.

South Central Migrant Resource Centre operates the Multicultural Resource Centre at Moorleigh Community Village. Council recently designated the Multicultural Resource Centre as a senior citizens' centre, which receives funding from both Council and the Department of Human Services, the same as five other senior citizen centres in the municipality.

Senior citizens groups at Moorleigh include: Greek Senior Citizen Club of Moorabbin, Argos Orestiko Greek District Club, Oakleigh Coptic Senior Citizen Club, Italian Senior Citizen Club of Moorabbin, Greek Retrenched Workers Club, Greek Senior Citizen Club of Glen Eira, Maltese La-Vallette and McKinnon Greek Women's Senior Citizen Club.



Ms Doherty said the event had been a great opportunity for the school and business communities to get together and the committee was looking forward to running a similar event next year.







The year also saw the implementation of the Meditrak system. In collaboration with the Caulfield Police Community Consultative Committee, the program offers a process of locating missing people with dementia or confusion, and will continue into the new year.



Community to create vision for local park

A draft master plan for Packer Park has been completed and is on display at the Town Hall and Carnegie and Bentleigh Libraries until 18 February for public comment.

Packer Park is a key local park located in Leila Road, Murrumbeena and offers facilities for both passive and active recreation—incorporating passive areas, a sports oval, a velodrome, pavilion, cricket nets, and a bowling club.

This draft master plan was prepared by a landscape architect for Council after extensive community consultation with residents and key stakeholders which highlighted a number of attributes important for development; including features such as diverse

recreation and play experiences, shared and improved facilities, disabled access, and sustainable landscape management.
