Cr Martens leads the City

Cr Veronika Martens was unanimously elected Mayor for 2000–2001 at a special ceremony on Wednesday 22 March in the Glen Eira Council Chamber.

The new Council was sworn in, with each of the nine Councillors reading and signing the Oath of Allegiance, Declaration of Office, and Councillors' Code of Conduct before a packed gallery of delighted family and friends.

Five new representatives have joined Council's ranks following the March election. The Council also has an increased representation of women, from one to three— one in each Ward.

Glen Eira City Council at this year's election expanded from six to nine Councillors, following an electoral review.

The Council for 2000–2003 is:

Cr Martens, who was Mayor of Caulfield in 1991–92, gave a message of unity in her acceptance speech, focusing on the importance of working together— Councillors, staff and community— to be successful and to implement planned projects.

"Thank you to my colleagues for putting your trust in me to lead the City over the next 12 months. It is a great honour to be Mayor of Glen Eira. Leadership is very important and I need the support of my colleagues to be the leader you and the City deserves.

"Council cannot be successful without cooperation and working together, and being a cohesive team. Council is not removed from the community— we are part of the

Mayors join forces

Then Mayor Cr Norman Kennedy, together with the Mayors of Port Phillip, Boroondara, Stonnington and Bayside, recently combined forces to provide a united voice for residents in the region.

Through the new Inner South-East Mayoral Forum launched last month, the Mayors plan to lobby the State Government on key issues and policies, particularly planning.

Cr Kennedy said: "These five municipalities cover in excess of half a million people— more than the total population of Tasmania. More than 250 people attended the official opening of Senior Citizens' Week at the Discover Glen Eira in 2000 Expo and Variety Concert last month.

Residents had the opportunity to browse community information stands and ask questions of representatives. Then Mayor Cr Norman Kennedy officially opened the week's activities.

Older Adults Recreation Officer Cheryl Kennedy said: "There was plenty to see and do. We had active demonstrations including calligraphy, water colour painting, decoupage, counted cross stitch, Scottish country dancing, Israeli dancing and social dancing."

"After the formalities, everyone sat back and relaxed and enjoyed a delightful concert with the East Bentleigh Senior Citizens Marching Ladies and Magic Melodies favourites Jennifer, Adam and Craig," she said.

Ms Kennedy said Jennifer Lee also entertained at many of Glen Eira's local nursing homes and hostels during March so

A range of events were organised by 19 senior citizens groups during Senior Citizens Week from 16 to 30 March, including open days, social dancing, afternoon teas, picnics, lunches, outings and concerts.

Improved recycling facility for Glen Eira

Residents and industry in the City of Glen Eira will benefit from improved recycling services with the opening of an upgraded and more efficient Multi Recycling Facility.

The new additions to Council contractor Oakleigh Recyclers' existing facility were officially launched by Ann Barker MP, Member for Oakleigh last month.

The upgrade at the Oakleigh Recyclers Multi Recycling Facility (MRF), has been funded by an infrastructure grant of \$33,580 from EcoRecycle Victoria, as part of its support for priority programs identified by the South East Regional Waste Management Group. "This year we will be processing more than 3500 tonnes of steel and aluminium cans, various plastics, glass and milk cartons. With the increased capacity, we anticipate diverting over 10,000 tonnes of material from land fill next year."

"Upgrading the facility has been on-going over the past two years. These improvements represent the third phase of developments, which follow the rebuilding of the MRF structure, relocation of some infrastructure and operations and the installation of new bulk storage cages," Mr Wood said.

"We are an extremely important urban region of Melbourne with unique and valued streetscapes. It is vital we advocate on behalf of our residents on key issues," he said.

Cr Kennedy emphasised the willingness of the Mayoral Forum to work co-operatively with the Planning Minister to bring about better planning outcomes for residents— on such issues as the lack of weight given to Local Council policies by VCAT, the urgent need for a metropolitan planning strategy, and the need for a planning assessment technique for inappropriate single dwelling development that currently escapes planning scrutiny.

Improvements include the installation of a magnetic separator and conveyor for the automatic sorting of steel cans, which also controls the flow of plastic materials into the hydraulic press. The addition of a ducted heating and cooling system to the facility will provide an improved operational environment for staff.

Oakleigh Recyclers Director Eric Wood said the facility embraces the latest in recycling technology.

EcoRecycle Victoria Chief Executive Ian Coles said: "EcoRecycle Victoria has worked very closely with Oakleigh Recyclers to ensure the development accessed best practice standards, including expertise, technology and management information.

"This facility is part of a network of resource recovery and recycling infrastructure centres being upgraded across the state," he said.

The rooms will be primarily aimed at community use, but will also be used for staff training, receptions and other functions. The rooms can also be booked for full scale conventions, combined with the theatrette and auditorium in the town hall.

akes it away Cleanaway

Residents in the north of Glen Eira will have noticed that Cleanaway trucks are now picking up their weekly household rubbish collection- and not as early in the morning for some households.

Glen Eira City Council has awarded Cleanaway the household rubbish collection tender for the area formerly within the City of Caulfield. The new contractor took over from Pacific Waste on 29 February and will be collecting household rubbish for the remainder of the year.

Council's City Services Director Jim Mackinnon said: "The service has been operating since early March, and the new operators are becoming familiar with the intricacies of the collection area. There have been a couple of isolated areas that have been experiencing teething problems, such as non-collection on the usual collection day. But we are confident these teething problems will be sorted out quickly."

Mr Mackinnon said:"Overall, the new contract represents an improvement in service to residents. The increased number of collection trucks used by Cleanaway has eliminated the need for very early starting times and a "rush and tear" operation.

"Collection routes will be refined to optimise rubbish collection, and some residents will find their bins are emptied at a different time of day. For some residents, they won't be waking early-morning any more to the sound of a large truck's engine and their bin being emptied outside their house.'

Mr Mackinnon said another benefit has been the noticeable improvement in the cleanliness of streets following collection, after only a few weeks of operation.

"Glen Huntly" arrival commemorated

"We was becalmed at the time for three weeks. Then we had rough weather off the Cape of Good Hope. Then comes the long looked for at last- the Port Phillip Heads-I was in bed with the fever when we came in at The Heads ... "

These words from Olive Moore's book Flying the Yellow Flag report on the arrival of the Glen Huntly Government Emigrant Ship in St Kilda from Scotland 160 years ago.

To celebrate the anniversary of the arrival of the Glen Huntly, a series of commemorative events are planned for Sunday 16 April and Glen Eira will be a part of the festivities.

The Glen Huntly was quarantined on arrival in Australia in 1840 because of typhoid fever. This was Australia's first quarantine and comprised tents set up on the beach at Point Ormond. Melbourne had only been settled five years earlier.

What is now Glen Huntly Road became a critical path for the transport of supplies for the passengers and crew.

Reminders of this significant arrival in Melbourne can be seen at several locations in St Kilda and Glen Huntly- a sculpture of the Glen Huntly on the wall of Safeway in Glen Huntly Road and a replica of the anchor on the corner of Glen Huntly and Grange Roads. A memorial cairn with engraved plaques is located at Point Ormond and the St Kilda Cemetery

has historical reminders of the deceased from the

journey. So 160 years after its arrival, the Glen Huntly and its passengers and crew will again be remembered. The St Kilda Historical Society along with a number of other interested parties and official guests will tour significant sites in the area. They will make their way from the Glen Huntly replica anchor on Grange Road along Glen Huntly Road to the Point Ormond Reserve to view the cairn, to the St Kilda Cemetery and then on to a reception at the Port Phillip City Council offices in St Kilda.

Bentleigh Library was chosen as one of the first libraries in the State to receive the equipment due to the large area it services and its accessibility. Staff at Bentleigh Library have undertaken specialised training in all the new equipment.

Australia converges on Caulfield

More than 120 players and officials converged on Glen Eira for the fourth Milo Cup Under 17 Australian School Girls Cricket Championships recently.

Eight teams played in this round robin competition representing all states and the ACT. Victoria, being the host state, was allowed to provide two teams for the competition.



Recreation Services officer Byron Douglas said Council was delighted to have a Glen Eira sports ground chosen as the venue for this national event for emerging junior cricketers. The Championship was played at three venues: Caulfield Park, Glen Huntly Park and Moorleigh Reserve. The highlight of the five-day event was the final held at Caulfield Park on Friday 10 March.

Victoria and New South Wales played off in wonderful sunny conditions before a large crowd of spectators. New South Wales won the grand final with a score of 8/133 to Victoria 9/91.

Claudia Fatone from the Victorian Women's Cricket Association said the competition was "played in great spirits" and the competitors were excited to be playing on facilities of such a high standard. "For some it would have been the first time they had had the chance to play on turf!" she said.

Totems for Glen Eira's parks

Glen Eira's parks will be adorned with new totem signs to help users more easily identify park local laws. The old signage will be removed and the various signs combined into one totem.

About 160 totems will be distributed through Glen Eira's parks over the coming month.

The signs are made from recycled plastic, using waste plastic that would previously have been disposed of in landfill.

The signs are both cost effective and good quality, and do not pose the maintenance issues usually associated with timber signs.

Manager Recreation Services Linda Smith said: "These signs will further clarify the dog on and off leash areas introduced to the city's parks last year. They will make the regulations for park usage very clear for everyone."

Significant local laws pertaining to individual parks will be displayed. Almost all signs will display the "no golf" symbol, as golf is strictly prohibited in parks due to the dangers it presents to other park users.

Also included will be a sign asking all dog owners to clean up after their dog. There will be no excuse for not cleaning up and these local laws will be regularly enforced.

The signs are about 1.2 metres high and will blend in with the park environs. Where possible, they have been designed to use standard symbols making them easy to read. For further information contact City Services on 9524 3281.
