Getting into the 'swim' of things

G len Eira's pools have been enjoying record attendances this summer as people have taken advantage of the City's facilities to relax and cool off in the hot weather. Both the Bentleigh and Caulfield Swim Centres reported higher than average numbers for November and December registering an attendance of almost 44,000 people.

The change rooms at the Bentleigh Swim Centre have recently been upgraded and large shade umbrellas have been installed at both pools. All the favorites are operating, including toddler pools, water slides and outdoor heated pools.

The swim centres are open from: 6am–7pm Monday–Friday 8am–6pm Saturday and Sunday 8am–6pm public holidays

If the forecast temperature is 30° Celsius or more the pool hours will be extended to 8pm.

On average someone dies every 10 weeks from a road crash in Glen Eira and every three days someone is seriously injured on Glen Eira's roads. These are two of the alarming statistics highlighted in the draft Glen Eira City Council Road Safety Strategy.

Mayor Cr Veronika Martens said: "Pedestrians, cyclists, the young and the elderly are the most vulnerable groups in our City. Fifty two per cent of persons killed on our roads are pedestrians, with 46 per cent of all pedestrian fatalities involving persons over 75 years of age."

At a meeting in December, Council resolved to put the draft Road Safety Strategy on exhibition for public comment. The strategy aims to co-ordinate Council's efforts more closely with those of the police, VicRoads, schools and community groups, to make Glen Eira roads safer, and to encourage people to use roads more safely.

Cr Martens said: "To tackle the road safety issue

In August 2000, Council hosted a Road Safety Forum with participation from schools, community groups, traders, neighbourhood watch and government agencies. The participants debated the key road safety issues for Glen Eira and actions to tackle these issues. This work has formed the basis for the development of the action plans in the draft Road Safety Strategy.

The draft Strategy includes action plans for six key themes including: Co-ordination and Leadership, School Road Safety, Traffic Management, Young Children, Pedestrian Safety, and Bicycle Safety.

Cr Martens said: "We need community input and commitment to help achieve safer roads in Glen Eira. Road safety is more than just building more speed humps or roundabouts. It requires a multi-pronged approach and a change in individuals' behaviour."

epending on your point of view the Millennium year has either just finished or just begun. But whichever perspective you subscribe to, 2001 promises to be a challenging and exciting year for Council.

In December News we published an article

about the impact the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT) was having in the City when it, not Council, determined Planning Applications. I expressed my concern that what Council sees as unsatisfactory or inappropriate development, VCAT may deem otherwise. Often, the result in Council's view, is less than desirable and against residents' interests.

I have written to both VCAT and the State Minister for Planning. Their responses are totally unsatisfactory. The response from VCAT was particularly galling as its attitude appears to be that no-one is entitled to question its decisions except in the Supreme Court!

Until VCAT adopts a more transparent operating method paying due respect to our residents' interests, this Council will continue to raise this matter with the relevant State Government Ministers. Particularly the Minister for Planning who must take responsibility for his portfolio.

The project to add 60 beds to the Warrawee complex is underway. Having the second highest number of elderly people, this City needs to ensure it has the facilities to meet residents' needs- particularly high care nursing beds. A planning application is being processed and I hope the builders will shortly be on site to begin construction.

At the other end of the age spectrum, Council's proposal to build a multi-use sports facility in Princes Park is also progressing. For too long our younger residents' needs have been overlooked. Providing this facility will benefit the health and well being of young people- encouraging them to participate in a wide range of sports. Two hurdles still need to be jumped: the masterplan for the park and the planning application process. Both processes will involve significant input from the community. I am especially keen to ensure young people become actively involved in this exciting project— it is time for them to be heard.

I trust everyone had a happy festive season and I hope all of us have a prosperous and successful year ahead.



50km/h speed limit now a reality

The new 50km/h speed limit for residential streets which took effect on Monday 22 January was welcomed by Mayor Cr Veronika Martens.

"Under the new regulations, 50 km/h has become the 'default' speed limit in residential streets," Councillor Martens said. "This means that if there is no sign, it's 50km/h.


"The State Government's move to lower the default speed limit to 50km/h in residential streets in builtup areas will improve community safety, and has the strong backing of this Council."

"60km/h signs are being progressively installed to clearly identify those roads that will retain a 60km/h speed limit. Most, but not all, of these signs should be in place by the end of January. But, notorists are in any doubt as to the speed at which they should be travelling, I would urge them to 'Think Safe. Think 50'," she said.

In conjunction with RoadSafe Inner South East, Council will undertake publicity to help the community understand the new regulations and to encourage people to comply with the speed limit.

"These are our neighbourhood streets— where you and I live, and where our children play. We all need to remember that it is never acceptable to speed through residential streets and the reduced speed limit of 50km/h is a maximum guide only. It's vital that we all obey the new speed limit and work to keep our community safe."

There is capacity for speed limits to be reviewed over time. Any changes will involve extensive consultation between community groups, local police and local governments.

Glen Eira resident, 30 year old Sharon Henderson (above) writes about her experience as a volunteer.

As a volunteer with the Make A Wish Foundation, which grants wishes to children with a life threatening illness, I help out with data management for the organisation.

People might think volunteering their time to one of the many worthwhile organisations that need help means finding themselves shaking a can, manning a raffle booth or participating in a door knock to raise funds.

But volunteering offers a wide range of options for helping out. In the few times I have volunteered my services over the years I have given facials and manicures to the aged (with the Red Cross Cosmeticare Program); fought bushfires in the dead of night (alongside the Volunteer Bushfire Brigade); and worked with data and information management (my current role with Make A Wish Foundation).

I have always volunteered my time when I have been temporarily unemployed. I find unemployment a very isolating experience and, facing rejection after rejection makes it a very demoralising experience too. Volunteering has always helped me keep a positive frame of mind and made me feel useful, during these times.

I believe the trick to volunteering is choosing a cause and activity that you can be passionate about. In this way, volunteering can be an enormously rewarding and satisfying experience. Sharon Henderson— volunteering is a very positive

A place for everyone

Volunteers are always sought to offer their skills and support in a range of areas. People from all different backgrounds and areas of skill can become a volunteer— everyone has something to offer.

Activities-art-craft

Working with activity and socialisation programs for older people, for those in rehabilitation programs, for younger people with a disability, for people in hospital, for isolated residents and for those with psychiatric or intellectual disability. Opportunities include knitting or crocheting garments for needy people or tutoring others in a craft or skill.

Advocacy

Representing the interests of those with a disability and providing friendship, support and social contact.

Children

Supporting programs for children and young people while they continue their education. Caring for a foster child or hosting a child with a disability. Granting a wish for a child with life threatening illness.

Clerical-administrative work

Sharing skills and gaining experience while assisting with administrative duties— bookkeeping, reception work, data entry and word processing, telephone support, special projects, mail outs.

Committee work

Participating in management committee work.

Counselling-support-information

Providing telephone support to isolated residents and those who have been bereaved. Visiting and supporting those with mental illness and their families. Offering specific information and advice for those seeking assistance. Working with young people who have drug and alcohol related problems.

Fundraising

Raising funds for hospitals and welfare agencies through opportunity shops and specific projects.

History-heritage

Glen Eira is fortunate to have two National Trust properties where volunteers work as tour guides, in administration, catering and the retail shops. Local Historical Societies rely on volunteers to assist with cataloguing and recording local information.

Hospital-health

Volunteers provide support and practical assistance to patients in hospital and at community health centres and work with St Johns Ambulance at special events in the community.

Radio

Volunteers work with local community radio as presenters and assist with technical and administrative support.

Tutoring-teaching

Volunteer tutors share their knowledge and skills assisting others in activity programs and interest groups. They work as literacy teachers for those of non-English speaking background and assist others to develop their language skills.

Visiting

For older people who are isolated at home or needing companionship within residential facilities volunteer visitors are a lifeline offering friendship and support.



Volunteers are an important part of this community and make an invaluable contribution through a wide variety of organisations. Nominations can be made for 500, 1000 or 2000 hours of service or a special category (for work which organisations feel merit recognition but does not fit into numbers of hours of service).

A ceremony will be held in May in National Volunteers Week to acknowledge those nominated.

Good behaviour bond in dog attack case

Glen Eira City Council successfully prosecuted a Brighton dog owner over a dog attack in Glen Eira in July.

Kay Flanagan of 56 Glencairn Avenue, Brighton, was placed on a good behaviour bond for 12 months, fined \$100 and ordered to pay \$322.60 costs, by Magistrate Mr Peter Mealy in Melbourne Magistrates Court on 6 December last year.

Ms Flanagan was found guilty on four charges: • allowing a dog to attack another animal; Home ambulance was called out and a Council officer assisted in seizing the two dogs and taking them into custody.

The court heard prosecution evidence from the owner of the cat, and a number of other witnesses who saw the two dogs at large, including a Council after hours emergency response officer, a veterinary surgeon who was the animal control officer who impounded the two Siberian huskies; a Council animal control officer, two Senior Constables and a Bayside City Council officer, who was required to give evidence in relation to the two dogs which reside in the City of Bayside. The prosecution was led by a Council Local Law officer.

Good behaviour bond for spitting

An East St Kilda man was placed on a 12-month good behaviour bond for spitting— an incident which occurred while remonstrating with a parking officer over a parking infringement.

Mark Burgio, of East St Kilda, pleaded guilty in the Melbourne Magistrates Court to offensive behaviour, in that he spat in a public place in Selwyn Street, Elsternwick, on 30 May 2000.

- two counts of allowing a dog to roam at large at night; and
- failing to register a dog.

Ms Flanagan received a good behaviour bond on three charges, and was convicted and fined \$100 for failing to register a dog— a female Siberian husky.

A fifth charge of failing to register a dog— a male Siberian husky— was dismissed.

The charges followed an incident at approximately 10pm on 20 July 2000 in Whitmuir Road, Bentleigh. Police received calls that a cat had been attacked by a dog. The police contacted Council's emergency number and the Lost Dogs Ms Flanagan was defended by barrister Mr Hugh Burchill.Three defence witnesses gave evidence: Ms Flanagan, her daughter and an exchange student staying at Ms Flanagan's house.

Council, in the interests of community safety, is continuing its pro-active campaign to prosecute dog owners who allow their dogs to roam or attack. All cases taken to the Magistrates Court in the past three years have been successful. Magistrate Mr Roger Franich placed Mr Burgio on a 12-month good behaviour bond and ordered him to pay \$500 to the court fund and \$180 costs.


Mr Burgio was represented by legal counsel.

In Glen Eira City Council's summary to the court, Council's prosecutor said Mr Burgio had pleaded with a Council parking officer for a parking infringement to be withdrawn. However, when the officer advised he could not do this, Mr Burgio became abusive and spat.



A week in the life... of Glen Eira City Council





ach week Council staff deal with a huge range of inquiries and visits to the town hall and provide services and facilities to hundreds of Glen Eira residents and visitors. The following information was compiled from Council's business units to show you what keeps us on our toes in an average week!

Home and **Community Care**

- provides services to elderly and disabled people in their homes.
- 1300 older residents and people with a disability are provided with 1850 hours of support services in their homes.
- 110 older residents attend Council's two Adult Day Centres.
- 110 families of children with a disability are provided with 450 hours of in home respite care services.
- 65 older residents and people with a disability are provided with 90 hours of Home Maintenance service.
- 3700 meals are cooked at Glen Eira Food Services.
- 2000 meals are delivered through the Meals on Wheels program to 400 Glen Eira residents.
- 170 volunteers deliver the meals.
- 1600 meals are provided to external contracts, such as Stonnington Community Care and MECWA Community care.
- 50 assessments are made of residents requesting support services in the home.
- 145 residents receive 24 hour care in Council's low care facilities.
- 30 residents receive 24 hour care in Council's high care facility.
- 87 people are housed in Council's independent units- 50 males and 37 females.
- Hundreds of people in 36 groups participate in programs and activities at Council's Senior Citizens Centres.
- 350 older people participate in organised recreation programs

Child care and maternal and child health

- providing services to families
- 329 children are cared for in Council's child care centres.
- 225 children are cared for by family day care.
- 452 babies are seen by maternal and child health officers.

Recreation services

- About 300 contacts- phone, email, face to face- are made with the sporting community, including schools, club contacts, general inquiries, internal inquiries, planning and development.
- Approximately 20 schools per week use Council ovals.
- 3,000 people play sport in 34 clubs operating with 170 teams
- About 60 inquiries are made regarding recreation facility hire.
- An estimated 8,000 people use Glen Eira's parks to keep fit via jogging and power walking.
- Uncountable numbers of people use our parks for social walks, playground activities, walking dogs, and taking time out.

Parks Services

- Council proudly maintains the following:
- 50 sports grounds— representing 70 hectares— are



Cultural exchange for your

celebration of the cultural diversity of Jewish and Aboriginal cultures was held at Princes Park in December. More than 120 members of both communities attended a corroboree offering a cultural exchange of the two communities.

Glen Eira Access and Equity Officer Sharon Granek who attended the corroboree said: "It was a fantastic experience- listening to the music of both cultures, watching Israeli dancing, eating Aboriginal and Israeli food, learning a little about Koori culture, and witnessing the coming together of two very diverse communities."

The event was organised by a committee with the assistance of the Aboriginal Community and Health Services, and Jewish youth groups SKIF and Hashomer Hatzair.

The day began with traditional indigenous dances and a welcome by prominent Koori community member Joy Murphy who made a short speech and performed a smoke ceremony. Didgeridoo and boomerang-making workshops gave a valuable insight into the care, time and craftsmanship required to create these traditional objects.

Activities included traditional basket weaving, Israeli dancing and a range of Jewish and Aboriginal foods from falafel and bagels to emu burgers and kangaroo sausages. The day concluded with a symbolic apelin which all participants stood in a circle linking hands- in the tradition of SKIF youth camps.

"Participating in this cultural exchange was a most rewarding experience for all. The corroboree was a day of learning, appreciating and understanding for two very different cultures, both of which have such rich pasts but tragic more recent histories."

"In holding events like these, it is hoped that all members of our diverse community can learn from each other, have needs and concerns recognised and live in harmony together, regardless of cultural backgrounds," Ms Granek said.



Residential development for works depot site

At a meeting in late November, Council resolved to take a further step toward selling the obsolete Works Depot in Manchester Grove, Glen Huntly.

Having received the tenders from the tender process, Council exercised its right not to accept any of the tenders and decided to put the property back on the market for private sale. Council resolved that any sale of the land would be subject to a condition that the land would be used for residential development.

Mayor Cr Veronika Martens said: "Council is looking for a top result for the community from this process. Only about 20 per cent of the site is being used so the community is not getting good value for its asset. We have a responsibility to free up this capital for use in meeting the community's needs.

"At the same time, we need to do everything in our power to make sure that what gets built there enriches our community. A residential development would provide options for people already living in Glen Eira or for new residents looking to take advantage of what Glen Eira has to offer. Additional residents would also bring customers for our business community."

In February 1998, Council resolved "that the Works Depot is under-utilised, provides limitations to efficient service delivery and that Council has more capital tied up in this site than is necessary". Since then, Council has spent \$400,000 on decontamination of the site.



After public notice in July, Council resolved to sell the property in August 2000 and advertised it for sale by tender in late September. The tenders were assessed by Council's Tender Evaluation Panel and the decision to re-tender for private sale was made.

The future process will be conducted by Council's agents (Fitzroy's), Council's solicitors, and Council staff. Any sale could only be approved by resolution of the elected Council.



DTP (Diphtheria, Tetanus and Pertussis) **OPV** (Oral Polio Vaccine) MMR (Measles, Mumps and Rubella)

All children require a School Entry Immunisation Status Certificate to enrol in primary school. These certificates are awarded on the successful completion of the 4-year-old immunisations. To obtain a certificate, parents are required to bring written documentation of their child's immunisation history to Council or contact the Immunisation Team on the number below.
