New community centre underway for Carnegie

Preliminary work on a new multi-purpose community centre at Carnegie is set to begin, following the announcement of a State Government grant towards the design of the facility.

Deputy Premier and Minister for Planning, the Hon John Thwaites visited Carnegie last month to announce a \$30,000 Urban Improvement Grant which will be matched by Council.

The announcement was attended by local community and civic leaders including Mayor Cr Noel Erlich, Member for Oakleigh Ann Barker MLA, Member for Caulfield Helen Shardey MLA, Carnegie Traders Association Chairperson Gerald Galatis, Carnegie Shopping Centre coordinator Patti Perkins and Cr Veronika Martens.

Centre to consolidate community services

The new community centre will consolidate a range of separately located community facilities and services and may include some of the following: library, youth services, playgroup, children's services, senior citizens', public health services and neighbourhood programs. It may also provide a community meeting space, business incubator, public open space and car parking.

The funding will go towards the external design of the centre and its immediate surrounds. This will involve the conversion of a section of the Jersey Parade roadway into a landscaped pedestrian space, linking the facility with the shopping centre and surrounding parking, transport and residential uses.

The initiative is part of Council's Urban Village Structure Plan which is designed to strengthen and re-invigorate Glen Eira's three major shopping centres, Carnegie, Elsternwick and Bentleigh. community services in Carnegie had been developed over a long period of time.

"Keeping our major centres alive and vibrant has been a key policy of Council for quite some time. With the significant competition from Chadstone and Southland, it has been a daunting challenge," Cr Erlich said.

"However, as I look at this City's major centres today, I believe we have succeeded and that the tide is now turning. I see centres that are not only holding their own, but are flourishing. I see members of our local communties renewing their bonds with their local shopping centres.

"Establishing a civic one-stop-shop here in Carnegie will assist in keeping this centre alive and will go a long way to re-establishing a real sense of community. It will also make it so much easier for our residents who use our services."

Even after having served as a Councillor for a number of years now, I never cease to be amazed at the volume and variety of issues handled by Councillors. It's a part time job with a full time commitment.

Over the coming year, I will use this column to keep you up to date with issues effecting the City and look forward to meeting as many of you as I can.

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Community plans Park's future

More than 100 local residents attended a community forum at the Glen Eira Auditorium last month to provide input into the development of a master plan for Princes Park in Caulfield South (Melway Ref: 68 B6).

The forum was conducted by Glen Eira City Council and John Patrick Pty Ltd Landscape Architects, appointed by Council to develop the Master Plan, in consultation with the public.

The firm has prepared several previous park master plans for Council, including Caulfield Park, Harleston Park and Hopetoun Gardens. They have also undertaken park master plans for the Fitzroy Gardens, Carlton Gardens and the Domain Gardens in the City of Melbourne.

Glen Eira City Council is in the process of developing master plans for all parks and reserves across the City.

Princes Park Community Liaison Group Chairman Cr Alan Grossbard said the landscape master plan would be a review of the past, a study of the present and a blue print for the future of Princes Park as a whole.

He said this would be undertaken through historical research, site and context surveys, community and stakeholder group consultation and a detailed analysis of the park's components.

"The product of these processes will be a list of recommendations addressing both problems and opportunities, with suggestions on how Princes Park can better meet the needs of residents, patrons, neighbours and the community, while preserving the character and integrity of the present park," he said.

During the forum, lively discussion took place about people's likes and dislikes of Princes Park and what opportunities existed for improvement.

Some of the positive aspects of the park identified were the open space for passive recreation, the balance between off-leash and on-leash areas for dogs and the number of trees. Dislikes included the proposed multipurpose sports facility, the fences, the existing buildings, the lack of bins, insufficient parking and traffic problems.

Opportunities for the park included a perimeter walking track, more trees for amenity and shade, more seats, safe children's crossings, better lighting, consolidating the tennis courts and upgrading the playground.

Making North Road safer

Glen Eira City Council, VicRoads and the Victoria Police have joined forces to improve pedestrian safety along the North Road Ormond Shopping Centre.

The busy shopping strip is the focus of a pilot project called Safer Routes to Shops, which is being funded by a \$15,000 grant provided through the statewide Saferoads Strategy.

A cleaner, safer place to shop

The project will examine ways of improving both pedestrian and road safety perceptions of the shopping centre, in order to make it a cleaner, safer and more appealing place to shop.

The draft Glen Eira Road Safety Strategy released in December last year, identified the high number of crashes involving pedestrians within strip shopping centres and while crossing busy arterial roads as one of the major road safety issues facing the City.

The strategy found that someone was seriously injured or killed on Glen Eira's roads every three days.

North Road— highest pedestrian accident rate in Glen Eira

Mayor Cr Noel Erlich said the number of pedestrian accidents which occurred along the North Road Shopping Centre was among the highest in Glen Eira.

"The North Road pilot project demonstrates our collective commitment to implement the actions of the strategy and support the local shopping centres," Cr Erlich said.

Pilot project for safety

"Community input is a key aspect of this project and we will be seeking comment from local traders, residents, commuters and schools on pedestrian safety concerns in the area.

"It is important for the success of the project that we hear from local people who use the North Road shopping centre about the issues that need to be targeted. Our actions will be driven by their needs."

Questionnaire to determine action

In late April and early May, Ormond residents, traders and schools will receive questionnaires about safety issues in the North Road shopping strip. Consultant traffic engineers will then examine the responses, complete a road safety audit and recommend appropriate actions to be taken.

Register your pets now



Be a responsible pet owner- register your pet now!

Council officers will begin door-knocking pet owner's homes in June to check that their cats and dogs are properly registered.

Annual registration fees were due on 10 April, however approximately 25 per cent of total registrations remain unpaid. All pet owners who failed to register their animals by the deadline will be sent reminder notices during May.

Council Civic Amenity Manager Carl Russo said if registrations had still not been paid by 1 June 2001, officers would start door-knocking homes.

He said owners would be given 72 hours' notice to pay the registration fee or receive a \$200 on-the-spot fine. If the owners are not at home, but their pets are at the property and unregistered, a penalty notice will be posted to them.

displayed publicly for community information and comment. Additional input received at this time will be incorporated into a revised plan that will be presented to Council for review. Fisit Caulfield's Bethlehem Hospital any Tuesday and you are bound to come across one of its longest-serving volunteers, Nora Ryan.

The sprightly 85-year old great-grandmother has been volunteering at the hospital for more than 15 years, ever since its volunteer program began. Her many years of dedicated service has resulted in her being acknowledged in the Glen Eira City Council Community Service Recognition Scheme this year.

Every Tuesday morning, Mrs Ryan catches a tram and a bus from her Carnegie home to spend four hours at the hospital helping patients and staff.

She will sit and talk with patients until their relatives or friends come to visit, get them a drink or help to feed them lunch. Other times she folds bed linen and helps out with some administrative tasks such as ruling up the day book.

"When I started here, there were no guidelines for what volunteers had to do, so I had to make jobs for myself," she said.

"Nowadays some of the volunteers massage people's feet and will go around and do their nails- the patients just love it."

Mrs Ryan said she had a relative in the hospital at the time when the volunteer service was originally being developed. She said when the Sister told her about the scheme, she immediately decided to become involved.

"I think I would have liked to have been a nurse," she said."I have three nieces who all were nursing sisters. I love hospital stories, I love hospital pictures and I love watching All Saints and RPA on television."

House numbers can save lives

Doorly lit or missing house numbers can cause Punnecessary delays for ambulance, emergency and police officers searching for a particular address in response to an incident- especially at night.

Acting team manager with the Metropolitan Ambulance Service Catherine Hiney said house numbers that can be seen clearly at night are essential for officers to attend quickly to call outs.

"We understand how stressful it can be when an ambulance is required. We want people to recognise the importance of identifiable house numbers on walls, fences or letter boxes, so that we can attend to emergencies with minimum delay," she said.

Proposed naming of Murrumbeena Linear Park

"Mallanbool Reserve"

ast year Council invited suggestions from the public to name the linear park opposite Duncan MacKinnon Reserve in Murrumbeena, at the corner of Leila and Murrumbeena Roads (Melways map 68 K8), which used to be part of the former Murrumbeena Secondary College site.

From the responses received, Council has chosen as its preferred option the name "Mallanbool Reserve"— an Aboriginal word meaning "pool of reeds" in the Wurundjeri people's language.

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"Contrasting colours, larger numbers and reflective material are the best options. And people are encouraged to think about minimising confusion- if for example their house number is located on one street, but the entrance is on another."

Council strongly supports the proper identification of properties, both business and residential, and the display of clearly visible numbers. A Local Law has been introduced which requires residents and traders to prominently display property numbers or face a fine for non-compliance.

Residents are required to maintain and display the property number on the property or a fixture associated with the property so that it can be readily seen and is clearly identifiable from the road or footpath adjacent to the property.

Properties which do not display adequate house numbering may be served a notice and further noncompliance may incur a \$50 fine.

4-year-old Kindergarten

Council operates a central enrolment system for community-based kindergartens within the City of Glen Eira. For children who will be attending 4-year-old kindergarten in 2003, applications can be lodged from I May 2001. Children whose birthdays fall between 1/5/98 and 30/4/99 are eligible to attend kindergarten in 2003.

\$10,000 boost for **Food Safety** Awards

ouncil has been awarded \$10,000 in funding from Food Safety Victoria to further develop Council's Food Safety Awards Program.

Food Safety Victoria offered five \$10,000 grants to Victorian Local Government Authorities for the best food safety projects or programs.

Chosen for innovative food safety incentive scheme

Council was chosen on the basis of its innovative food safety incentive scheme that rewards local food businesses for maintaining excellent food safety practices and procedures.

Local food businesses receive incentives including reduction in registration fees, free publicity and awards for maintaining good hygiene practices. Thus good food safety performance is rewarded and poor performance attracts sanctions in accordance with the Victorian Food Act.

Grant will fund new food safety standards

Funding will be spent on incorporating new food safety standards recently introduced by the Australia New Zealand Food Authority into Council's existing food safety inspection criteria and food safety incentive scheme.

This will ensure Council continues to set best practice in the area of food safety enforcement and education.

a group of women, who had taken a patchwork course, wished to extend their passion for the craft and continue the friendships they had begun.

The craft of patchwork was born of necessity in days when fabric scraps retrieved from old garments and blankets were stitched together to form a quilt top. Another layer of fabric was used as the backing, and the filling for warmth, was often recycled from old woollen garments, blankets or raw wool and cotton. All three layers were stitched together to provide much needed bed coverings. Today's Quilters use their techniques to decorate pieces, often commemorating a special moment or exchanging them as gifts. Reaching for the top

Derserverance is the key to personal success, reigning Brownlow Medallist Shane Woewodin, told young people at the City of Glen Eira Youth Consultation Forum last month.

A talented midfielder with the Melbourne Football Club, Shane recalled his own struggles to reach the top of his chosen field, as he officially opened the forum.

Shane spoke about his chilhood and the difficulties he faced growing up away from his family home, after he obtained a scholarship to play cricket at the age of 11.

He spent his teenage years in Perth, and realising his athletic talent, aspired to become a great football

player. However, his dream to play in the AFL suffered several setbacks.

After missing out on being drafted by an AFL Club a number of times, he was finally given an opportunity to try out for the Melbourne Football Club four years ago. At 20 years of age, he again moved away from home and arrived in Melbourne- a strange city where he did not know anyone. What drove him and kept him going, was his unshakeable desire to succeed. Succeed he did, last year taking out football's highest honour, the Brownlow Medal, and playing for his beloved Melbourne in the AFL grand final.

Shane's position as a high profile footballer has enabled him to devote much of his spare time talking with young people about participating, having a go and expressing themselves. Shane said his own avenue for self-expression had come through his talents as a footballer and his commitment to young people.

He said that perseverance and sacrifice were vital in helping him reach his ultimate goal. He said it was only through taking real opportunities as they came and making the best of these opportunities, that anyone could improve their circumstances.

Shane's story struck home with the young people at the forum, many of whom had experienced being away from family or having to be independent, at a very young age. They were clearly inspired by Shane's message and presented him with a gift of appreciation.

Forum tackles youth issues

Youth Consultative Forum involving young Apeople and community leaders from the City of Glen Eira has identified the key issues facing local young people and possible ways of addressing these problems.

A group of 19 young people, aged 15 to 18 years participated in the forum, held at the Glen Eira Auditorium on 5 April, as part of National Youth Week Celebrations.

Much positive interaction and enthusiastic discussion arose from all corners of the auditorium as the groups defined the key issues for their topics.

During the afternoon session, the groups began making recommendations and developing possible strategies to deal with each issue at a personal, local and state level. These recommendations were then developed into presentations which each group delivered to the audience- comprising Mayor Cr



The forum aimed to give young people from the local community an opportunity to voice their concerns on issues which directly affect them.

In the lead-up to the forum, participants had selected four topics which they considered most important for discussion. These were recreation and leisure; rights and responsibilities; education; and self expression.

All participants came to the forum, having discussed their topics with other young people in the community. The first session of the forum saw participants divide into four groups, each discussing one of the four chosen topics.

The presentations proved insightful and varied in format, from direct speeches, to role plays depicting various aspects of young people's lives.

Some of the potential solutions identified included more positive media portrayals, improved services, wider education choices, more lifeskills training, better facilities and increased entertainment options.

The forum was seen as a large step forward in the dicussion of youth issues within the local community. It provided an ideal opportunity for young people to discuss issues affecting their lives on a daily basis and

A report has been compiled documenting the issues and solutions discussed at the forum. This report will be distributed to key stakeholders in the Glen Eira community, to ensure the planning, development and implementation of programs in the future, appropriately responds to the needs of local young people.

It's all action at Park Developments!



Packer Park and East Caulfield Reserve redevelopments are fully underway. The contractors moved on site in late March and early April and have already made significant progress.

Much of Stage 1 of the works at

Packer Park will be centered on the eastern end of the park where the majority of the civil works will be undertaken. The frog hollow has been dug out to create a small wetlands area which will be representative of the wetlands that were originally part of the Carnegie/Murrumbeena area.

Major sections of the extensive pathway and trail network have been constructed with the contractor making good progress in the dry weather. The garden beds are being created in readiness for the tree-planting program that will soon follow. Construction of stage 1 of the playground will begin shortly.

> While all this action is happening in the park, contractors are also rebuilding the Packer Park Pavilion with demolition work and foundations now complete.

temporary access thoroughfare has been created from the Sir John Monash Drive car park, for people wanting to access this car park.

The pavilion upgrade includes, new toilets and showers, painting inside and out, a new roof, and access for people of all abilities. Future stages will include a new kiosk and extra toilet and shower facilities.

The East Caulfield redevelopment is a joint initiative of Council, Monash University and Monash University Student Union following the adoption of a master plan for the reserve in 1999. The Packer Park project is funded by Council with the Sport and Recreation Victoria jointly funding the adventure playground and pavilion.

The transformation of both these parks is an exciting undertaking and one that will be highly valued by the community. These major works are part of Council's ongoing commitment to upgrade parks in line with the Open Space Strategy. The result will be parks and facilities that will meet the needs of current and future generations.
