Trees galore! 30,000 new plants

Packer Park is being transformed as it nears the completion of the Stage 1 capital works program. But it's not bricks and mortar, pathways or even playgrounds, making the difference in this park, it's trees.

More than 30,000 plants are being planted as part of the Stage 1 works of this project— a significant contribution to the regreening of the area. From the beginning of public consultations for this project, residents have been keen to see this almost treeless park transformed through plantings of native trees and shrubs.

Many of the plants for Packer Park are indigenous species which have been collected from local seed stock. The plants will be positioned in keeping with the growth patterns of local native vegetation.

Of the 30,000 plants, 7000 to 8000 will be trees with the remainder of the tube stock being made up of rushes, reeds, bushes and shrubs. A great variety of plants will be used, including red gums, wattles, blackwoods and tussock grass.

While specialists will be undertaking a New to large proportion of the planting, it is anticipated schools and residents will be involved in planting days for the park. Advance notice of these days will be made through the local press.

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\$700,000 road funding cut

A restructure of the Victorian Grants Commission local road grant formula will mean cuts of up to \$700,000 in funding for Glen Eira roads over the next four years. The money will be redistributed to rural Councils.

The Victorian Grants Commission recently advised Council of a 60 per cent cut to the road grants, representing about \$400,000 per annum. This reduction in funding is to be phased in over the next four years.

The previous formula was based on population and road length within each municipality, providing a set level of funding across urban and regional councils. According to the Grants Commission it did not take into account changes in road use or the cost of preserving local road assets.

"Arbitrary" system replaced

The new formula will be based on road length, traffic volume, climate and soil conditions, and according to the Commission, replaces "an arbitrary system" with "a formula that reflects the relative local road funding needs of Victorian Councils".

It was developed from the findings of a review undertaken by ARRB Transport Research and the National Institute of Economy and Industry Research. The research examined traffic volume data supplied by local councils.

Ratepayers will suffer

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Noel Erlich said the impact of the cuts on Council's infrastructure maintenance would be significant. "It's all very well to say the Commission has consulted and taken road length and usage into account. But as we all know, some local Council's are already struggling to maintain or replace extremely old road systems. Some of Glen Eira's residential roads date back to before World War 1.

"Repairing and maintaining roads is something we can't just put on the backburner for 12 months. We have to maintain our roads, so the money will have to come from somewhere else. Ultimately, the impact will be on ratepayers."

Government advice is that additional funding via the Federal "Roads to Recovery" program (administered by the Federal Department of Transport and Regional Services) would not be affected by the new formula for 2000–2001.

Volunt Volunteers Week came around again last month, and what a fantastic week it was for recognising the contribution these people make to our community.

Always a special event in the calendar of our City, the week was made even more special by the United

Nations declaring 2001 to be the International Year of Volunteers. This is already a special year for Australians, our nation's 100th birthday— the Centenary of Federation.

On a personal level, the last couple of weeks have been a great learning experience. I discovered our country has one of the highest rates of volunteering in the world-almost three million Australians volunteer.

In Victoria, more than 700,000 adults volunteer their services. That's about 20 per cent of the State's population. The Australian Bureau of Statistics values this at about \$340 million per year—a staggering contribution to the community.

For this year's Community Service Recognition Awards, 45 organisations nominated 222 volunteers— 58 people were nominated for 500 hours of service, 48 for a contribution of 1000 hours, 67 gave 2000 hours and a further 49 people were nominated in the special category award. In total, the hours contributed by these people alone, represents 211,000 hours of service to the community during the past year.

One of the aims of International Year of Volunteers is to encourage even more people to volunteer and I hope this column and our regular features on Page 4 of the Glen Eira News will help to do that.

Becoming a volunteer brings benefits not only to those receiving the service but also to those who give of their time-volunteering allows young people to make a positive contribution to the community and helps develop skills to aid their employment prospects; for socially isolated people volunteering presents an opportunity to meet new people and expand social networks; recent retirees bring with them a rich expertise; and for people from the business community, volunteering offers an opportunity to support the communities that support them.

Throughout National Volunteers Week, I have been inspired by the people I have met. Volunteers unselfishly give of their time and rarely expect accolades. Council was extremely pleased to be part of showing these quiet achievers the City's appreciation.



Council appeal to State could save \$780,000

ouncil has appealed to Environment Minister ◆Sherryl Garbutt to allow it to extend the use of the 2000 general property valuation until 2004— a move which could save close to \$1 million.

The revaluation cycle was changed from four to two years by the former State Government, effectively doubling the cost to metropolitan Councils. The impact on regional Councils was even greater, as revaluation cycles were reduced from six to two years.

The first revaluations on this new cycle were carried out last year using computer assisted techniques for the first time—incurring a cost to Council in excess of \$780,000. Council costs for administrative staff and computer resources brought the total cost to \$1,100,000.

No additional revenue

Mayor Cr Noel Erlich said the shorter revaluation cycle would not generate any additional revenue as revaluations simply redistribute the tax burden amongst ratepayers.

"This is a major cost to the Victorian community for little, if any, benefit. The next value date is currently January 2002, that's only seven months away. Given a slowing economy, despite any further interest cuts, Council believes any rise in property values is going to be pretty nominal anyway," he said.

Benefits not justified by cost

"Completing the revaluation will satisfy State Government legislation, and provide more up to date valuations, but when you weigh this against the cost, the benefits cannot be justified," Cr Erlich said.

Section 13DD of the Valuation of Land Act states if Councils believe no general appreciable change in land values has occurred, application to the Minister can be made to extend the period of use of the existing valuations for a two year period.

At its meeting at the end of April, Council resolved to contact the Minister with a proposal to extend the use of the existing valuation until 30 June 2004. At time of going to print, Council had not received a response from the Minister.

Peace restored to Glen Huntly street

len Eira City Council has removed a noisy dog from a Glen Huntly property after its owner failed to comply with a Magistrates' Court order.

At a hearing at Melbourne Magistrates' Court in March, Michael Stubbs, of Waratah Avenue, Glen Huntly, had been ordered to enrol his male beagle with Barkbusters, a dog obedience training company, within 28 days and successfully complete the course within 60 days.

Magistrate Ms J Bowles further ordered Mr Stubbs to notify Council's prosecutor that he had taken these steps or Council would have the authority to remove the dog from the property.

Mr Stubbs had been charged with four counts of allowing a dog to be a nuisance by barking, as well as allowing his dog to be at large during the day time and failing to register it. In addition to the order, he was convicted and fined an aggregate of \$900 plus \$155 in costs.


The hearing followed numerous complaints to Council from neighbouring residents, about the dog's excessive barking over an extended period of

Council Civic Amenity Manager Carl Russo said that while Mr Stubbs booked and attended one training session with Barkbusters, he had failed to attend subsequent sessions in order to successfully complete the course.

Mr Russo said "the dog continued to bark so Council impounded the dog."

"It is the responsibility of all dog owners to ensure their dogs do not cause a nuisance to neighbours by barking excessively. In this instance the neighbours had tried to talk with the owner and even offered to exercise the dog, but to no avail."

The dog will be kept at The Lost Dog's Home where it will be assessed for its suitability for rehousing.

"Thanks again" to our volunteers

Glen Eira auditorium resounded with "thank yous" last month as almost 200 volunteers, representing 45 community groups, received Council's annual Community Service Recognition

About 420 people attended the night held during National Volunteer Week. Mayor Cr Noel Erlich presented certificates acknowledging 500, 1000 and 2000 hours of volunteer service, and special awards for support not quantifiable in hours.

Entertainment was provided by Glen Eira City Band. This year, a record 222 people were nominated by a diverse range of groups.

In his address, Cr Erlich said: "This year is Australia's 100th birthday- our Centenary of Federation— and it is also the International Year of Volunteers. It is therefore with a great deal of pride that our City honours and recognises the important and valuable work of volunteers in our municipality.

"Volunteers can be found working for national organisations like the Country Fire Authority, State Emergency Service, Surf Life Saving Association, Red Cross, and National Trust. In many instances this can be life saving work.

"At the local level, we have volunteers working in arts and culture, community support, family, youth and community services, sporting clubs and senior citizens clubs," Cr Erlich said.

He said based on the hours of service across the three award categories, this year's recipients represented a contribution of 211,000 hours of community support over the past year.

"Volunteers make a valuable contribution to the community and are often on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year in all sorts of weather. Volunteers enrich the lives of the people they come into contact with, and generally do not want accolades. They unselfishly give of their time and it is opportune in National Volunteers Week to be able to show them our appreciation of their work through this ceremony," Cr Erlich said.

The ceremony was attended by 193 of the nominees and award certificates will be posted to those who were unable to attend.

Volunteers— help for the whole family

n June, International Year of Volunteers celebrates the vast contribution made by volunteers in supporting families and the community. Volunteers work with community groups to provide a wide range of practical and emotional support for children, young people and adults in need. They offer transport services for the elderly and disadvantaged. They work as carers and companions for the elderly and for those with disability. They contribute to community health programs. Many services would not be able to continue without the dedication and time invested by volunteers.

Council funds volunteer support Glen Eira City Council has supported the Glen Eira Volunteer Resource Project for a second year by providing a Community Grant of \$31,700. This funding means the service can consolidate and develop the work it has already undertaken in creating a focus for volunteering in Glen Eira. The service aims to assist in recruiting volunteers, to help potential volunteers make informed choices about volunteering and to refer them to appropriate community organisations.

The Glen Eira Volunteer Resource Centre also offers opportunities for managers of volunteers to meet, to share information and skills and to be part of a network within the Glen Eira area. A home to go to

Last year, Anglicare South East needed more than 700 placements for foster care of children who were unable to live with their own families. These homes were provided by volunteer foster carers.

Foster care is needed for children for a number reasons. Sometimes parents feel isolated or lack the support of friends or family members at a time of crisis. Sometimes they suffer from physical or mental health problems, they may be imprisoned or may be drug or alcohol dependent. Some just need support in their parenting role.

Foster carers can make an enormous difference to children and their families by being there to help out during the tough times— in an emergency (when foster care is needed for a few days), or for extended periods (a few months or more than a year). The aim is for children to be reunited with their own families where possible.

Based in Elsternwick, Anglicare South East seeks more volunteers for its Foster Care program, to provide a safe and loving "home away from home" for children in the south eastern suburbs. Foster carers

are all ages and come from diverse backgrounds. They can be couples or singles, with or without their own children. They can be employed full time and still provide foster care for school aged children, with before and after school care available.

Weekend hosts help out

Interchange Southern seeks volunteers to look after a child with a disability for a day or a weekend a month as part of its host program. Currently 68 children have been matched with volunteer hosts, but more than 80 families in the southern region are waiting for a volunteer host to care for their child to provide much needed respite.

The host program is a winner for all concernedwhile parents receive a break, children have the opportunity to make new friends, and volunteers are rewarded by having the opportunity to give to a child and their family as well as give something back to the community.

Interchange Southern Program Manager Scott Sheppard said: "I am constantly inspired by the people involved with our program, their generosity of spirit, the support they provide and the difference they make in the lives of the children with a disability and their families. International Year of the Volunteer and Interchange Week are opportunities to spread the word that more volunteers are needed."

Hosts attend an information session before undertaking an assessment which includes police, medical and reference checks. Hosts are supported by Interchange program workers and undertake training before being matched with a child. The next information session is on Wednesday 27 June. Contact: 9532 0155.

Caring support in local community Do Care is a social support service which helps older

frail people and adults with a disability to be involved with and remain in their own community.

> The service is provided with the support of trained volunteers who offer social interaction and support with outings and activities.

Volunteering for Do Care is a rewarding opportunity to enhance the quality of life on a one to one basis with people who are socially isolated and who live independently in the community. Healthy activities for Heart Week

Children at Valkstone Primary school got a taste for healthy sandwiches when they were given the opportunity to make their own as part of Heart Week promotions last month.

Council joined forces with the East Bentleigh school, involving the school community in healthy activities to promote heart health awareness and this year's Heart Week focus— *Active Families*.

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
Think safe— think 50km on Glen Eira roads

Glen Eira drivers will have the opportunity to check their odometers while they adjust to driving at 50km in built-up areas over the next few months.

A radar speed observation sign will be in operation on local streets throughout the City to help drivers reduce their speed levels. The mobile sign uses a radar to detect and measure motorists' speeds. The sign displays the speed of the approaching vehicle and has a static display of the speed limit. The sign also records speed and volume data for analysis by Council's traffic engineers.

Council's Road Safety Strategy identified that every three days someone is seriously injured or killed on Glen Eira's roads and on average someone dies every 10 weeks from a road crash in Glen Eira.

Mayor Cr Noel Erlich said: "The need to reduce the speed of vehicles on Glen Eira streets is an issue identified in our road safety plan. We have supported the State Government in introducing lower speed limits on local streets and will continue to promote the need for drivers to slow down on our streets.



"The speed observation sign will alert drivers to the speed they are travelling and reinforce the need to slow down," he said.

Council will target those streets where the speed limits have been reduced to 50km but speeding remains a concern.

Did you know that the Caulfield Racecourse track and centre area are open to the public for recreational use?

This land, which is on Crown Land, has been permanently reserved, for use for "racing recreation and public park purposes". The course and centre car park area are open daily between sunrise and 8pm or sunset (whichever is later) except on days on which race meetings are held.

Dogs are permitted on the centre area between 4.30pm and 8pm or sunset, except on racedays. The centre area is leash-free but dogs must be leashed while entering and exiting the park.

There are four formally designated public access points to the course which are shown on the aerial photograph.

Signed public access:


I. Junction of Station Street and Normanby Road, next to the public car park opposite Caulfield Station



With the help of Council's Children's Services Resource and Development Officers Susan Brown and Merryn McDonald, the second annual expo was organised by the Inner South CSRDO Network Group comprising staff from Glen Eira, Stonnington, Bayside, Kingston and Port Phillip.

The expo gave staff from long day care centres, family day care schemes, occasional care programs, out of school hours and vacation care services an opportunity to explore materials and options to promote inclusive programming.

Ms McDonald said: "Play is a very important aspect of learning and can provide children with opportunities to explore diversity. Many people assume play is only spontaneous, and while this type of play is important, planned play experiences with specific props can be of great benefit in including children with additional needs."

"CSRDOs support mainstream children's services to develop inclusive programs which cater for children from birth to 12 years who have a disability or delay or who are undergoing assessment. We also support staff who work with children who come from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds," she said.

The materials displayed at the expo reflected ideas and resources targeted at these services and the children they include. It was well attended by appreciative staff who gave very positive feedback.

Margaret Porrit, of Feathers Boutique; Tony Standley of Retail Alert; Rick Berry of Fitzroys; Peter Hunt National Property Manager Woolworths; and Peter Haley of Elsternwick Main Street Committee. The speakers covered a range of topics from retail leasing to the importance of maintaining a healthy business mix in strip shopping centres.

Mayor Cr Noel Erlich launched the kit to the business community, reinforcing Council's ongoing commitment to supporting the retail business sector.

Beverley Honig of Honelight Enterprises chaired the morning and outlined the kit's benefits to the real estate agents, landlords and retailers attending the breakfast.

The kit comprises check lists to guide and reinforce the importance of placing your business or tenant in the best retail position to maximise the best possible long term return on your investment.

Glen Eira has 36 strip centres— from the small neighbourhood centres to the sub-regional and community shopping centres.

Strip shopping centres don't have the same management controls as larger shopping complexes, and their business mix has traditionally been governed by the landlord's fundamental and immediate need for tenants, with little or no consideration to what will compliment the centre, or survive long term.

The resounding message from of the breakfast was "consideration of the right business mix is vital to the survival, success and revitalisation of strip shopping centres."

Women's business begins

The inaugural meeting of the Glen Eira Women's Business Network was held recently after receiving a strong expression of interest from local women in business.

The group got off to a positive and enthusiastic start with 20 women attending, offering diverse business backgrounds and skills. The group were open in sharing their backgrounds, challenges and aspirations.

Guest speaker Anne Morrison of Kingston City Council's Business Women's group KB Connect talked about the group's background and what it's members have gained from its association in education, self development, mentoring support and networking opportunities. New rules for goods on footpaths

Glen Eira City Council is reviewing local laws governing goods on footpaths in an effort to improve pedestrian safety near shops.

The local law refers to goods such as footpath displays, items for sale, signage, and tables and chairs which traders place on footpaths in front of their businesses.

Civic Amenity Manager Carl Russo said the current guidelines were being revised to provide better access for people moving along footpaths, particularly those who were legally blind, mothers with small children and prams, the elderly and people with movement disabilities.

"We are looking at establishing three distinct areas along footpaths in shopping centres— a shop front corridor, a pedestrian corridor and a kerbside corridor," he said.

"We need to ensure pedestrian traffic can move through shopping centres safely, while ensuring local traders are able to conduct their businesses effectively."

Council's Manager Business Development Lynda Bredin said Glen Eira had a large aging population, who preferred to shop locally, but often travelled to larger regional shopping centres which provided better access. "These safety improvements to our strip shopping centres will help local businesses, by making local shopping more appealing to people who have access problems," Ms Bredin said.

Mr Russo said the draft guidelines should be ready for public display and comment from June. He said local business owners, traders' organisations and community organisations would be consulted during the process. The new guidelines are expected to be in place by 2002.



Ctudents at Caulfield Park Community School Indived, juggled and tumbled their way through a term of workshops with Council's "high flying" circus trainers.

As many as 12 young people were given the opportunity to learn performance skills, including juggling; stilt walking; head-stands and hand-stands; dive-rolls and tumbling; acrobalance and group formations as part of Council's school based Flying High Circus program.


