### City starts capital works boom

Council's 2003–04 Budget has been adopted, bringing with it a capital works boost of more than \$21 million for the City.

The cash injection will go towards major capital works projects set to start in the next 12 months.

Community facilities, parklands, children's centres and sports grounds will all benefit from Council's push toward improving amenities for current and future Glen Eira residents.

Major works for Princes Park in Caulfield South and Bentleigh/Hodgson Reserve in Bentleigh are due to begin this year, as is construction of a new library and community centre in Carnegie and the State Government-funded Curraweena independent living units in Caulfield South. Significant upgrades are also planned for playgrounds and park facilities throughout Glen Eira.

Other areas to benefit from the increased budget spend include infrastructure, assets and community services including enhanced disability access and free vaccination programs.

Recent additional costs placed upon local government such as the compulsory superannuation scheme levy, increases in public liability insurance and cuts in Government grants have placed pressure on Council to find extra funds for necessary projects and investing significantly in the City's future amenity.

The result has been an average rates increase of 6.59 per cent for residents and average rates which continue to be well below those of neighbouring councils.

Council's Chief Executive Officer Andrew Newton said Council's own costs had risen by less than the inflation rate. He said the rates rise had been caused

by the costs imposed on Council by Government agencies and external factors such as public liability insurances. Renewing public places and community facilities continues to be the top priority.

"Our own houses go through stages where money needs to be spent on repairs, upgrading or redevelopment and the City's assets are no different. Many are run down and need investment to continue to serve their purposes and avoid even higher costs later on," Mr Newton said.

"Despite external forces running against us, Glen Eira maintains the lowest cost for day-to-day running of vital community services compared to that of neighbouring councils."

### Help plan Glen Eira's future

Glen Eira residents are being called on to help plan for the future of the City.

Council is about to embark on development of its next five-year community plan and is seeking input from residents and ratepayers.

The community plan provides Council with a framework that guides its budgetary, planning and policy decisions and shapes Council's work program. It outlines Council's long-term goals, its priorities for the next five years and its actions for the coming financial year.

A series of four community forums has been planned over the next four weeks to discuss the community's issues, needs and expectations. Each forum will focus on a different aspect of community life such as economic development, community wellbeing, and developing and renewing the City.

Council's Chief Executive Officer Andrew Newton said consultation was a major part of corporate planning.

"The community plan will be developed in full consultation with the community. These workshops are just the first step," Mr Newton said. "Council will also

arrange community focus groups to concentrate on specific issues."

"Assessing current needs of the community and visualising future needs of such a diverse community as Glen Eira is a complex task and that is why community input is essential."

Mr Newton said the community plan was the road map to the City's future, providing direction and setting a framework to guide decisions and develop policies over the next five years.

"The corporate plan is a living document that guides the City towards the objectives and expectations of those that live and work in our community," he said.

"It also gives us the opportunity to update our goals and objectives as new challenges and better solutions come our way.

"The new plan will be developed taking into consideration the views of the community and formulated into a five-year plan."

t a recent citizenship A t a recent cut ceremony I welcomed 113 new Australians to the City of Glen Eira and was starkly reminded of the diversity of culture and needs in our City. Nearly one third of Glen Eira residents were born overseas, and more than 16 per cent of the City's

population is over 65 years of age.

Meeting the current and future needs of such a diverse community is Council's mandate, and requires a good deal of foresight and planning.

Council delivers an amazing range of services to the residents of Glen Eira. From maternal and child care services through to road reconstruction and the provision of sporting facilities, public libraries and care for the elderly, Council is committed to nurturing, developing and caring for the community now and in the future.

Allocating funds for day-to-day services and support, as well as providing for the ongoing growth of the City, is no mean feat and Council has thought long and hard over the past months about how to best serve the needs of the community given the financial constraints placed upon it.

The result is the 2003–04 Budget — and a strategy which aims to fix up our ageing assets and community facilities while maintaining essential services at not less than current levels and keeping day-to-day costs and rates well below those of our peers.

Glen Eira's rates are generally 12 per cent lower than the average of similar councils, and the cost of running day-to-day services is 24 per cent below the average of seven neighbouring councils.

Meanwhile, we give the greatest financial assistance to pensioners of all Victorian councils (a \$110 rebate over and above the State Government rebate), and are providing for more than \$21 million of capital works growth in the City in the next 12 months.

Budgets are never easy, and preserving essential services while also planning for the future growth and needs of the City is not something Council takes lightly.

Council is about to start developing its next five-year community plan — a plan for the future of the City and as an advocate for community input, I urge all residents and ratepayers to provide their feedback and thoughts.

A series of community forums will be held to discuss the community's issues, needs and expectations and develop a corporate plan that will act as a living document to help guide Council in its long-term goals and priorities for the City.

The community plan will be a reflection of the economic, social and cultural diversity and needs of the City now and in the future — your future.

### Restoration makes a grand entrance

**B**righton Cemetery's entrance gates at Hawthorn Road in Caulfield South have been restored to their former glory.

The restoration of the gates was made possible by Council's success in obtaining a \$24,000 grant and \$25,000 low-interest loan for the works from the Melbourne Heritage Restoration Fund.

The Melbourne Heritage Restoration Fund also funded the restoration of the Brighton Cemetery's gates at the North Road entrance in 2000.

Councils Strategic Planner (Heritage) Susan Ross said the gates looked fantastic and would do so for the next 80 years.

"The Melbourne Heritage Restoration Fund has now helped the Brighton Cemetery with two separate grants to restore both of the main entrance gates to the cemetery," she said.

"Given the expense of each project, the cemetery would not have been able to carry out this work on it's own."

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ouncil is helping to make local streets ✓safer by introducing a speed detection trailer to educate drivers about speed.

The speed detection trailer will be parked on the side of Glen Eira roads. The unit measures and displays the actual speed of approaching vehicles using a radar and a screen mounted to the top of a trailer for easy mobility. A sign that publicises the relevant speed limit for that road will sit below the vehicle's detected speed.

The purchase of the trailer is part of Council's Road Safety Strategic Plan and was initiated by the Glen Eira Community Safety Committee.

Chairman of the Community Safety Committee Cr Veronika Martens said the trailer was not an enforcement device but a Council education initiative for drivers.


"This is a proactive approach by Council to educate drivers about speed limits in local streets and their own driving habits," Cr Martens said.

The speed detection trailer also downloads data including the number of cars using the road and vehicles' travelling rates.

Representing the Victoria Police on the Community Safety Community, Inspector Greg Parr said after a week of educating drivers on a particular road, enforcement would be the next step.

"The purpose of the speed detection trailer is to create awareness among drivers of the speed at which they are travelling. After this process the next step will be enforcement. Police will utilise other speed detection devices including radars with a view to issuing penalty notices," he said.

Other representatives on the Community Safety

Committee include the Department of Sustainability and Environment, VicRoads, Department of Human Services, Department of Education and the Metropolitan Fire Brigade.

"By working together the Community Safety Committee can tackle problems and come up with solutions that are particularly relevant to Glen Eira," Inspector Parr said.

"The road safety strategy is particularly important to this area. Being an older area with many wide main roads that are long and straight means that speeding is a problem."

Council will inform residents by way of letterbox drop if the speed detection trailer will be set up in their street.

## Keeping litter clear of waterways

newly installed litter trap in Mitchell Street, Bentleigh is proving successful helping to keep local waterways free from rubbish.

Council officers recently inspected the gross pollutant trap for the first time since its installation in April this year. Large quantities of bottles, cans, plastic bags and other rubbish were found collected in the trap rubbish that would have otherwise ended up in local waterways.

Council's Acting Director Infrastructure Kerry Martin said the trap captured any litter that washed into stormwater drains which serviced the one kilometre length of nearby Bentleigh Shopping Centre.

"By installing the new trap, Council is taking positive steps to protect the environment by preventing litter from continuing through the stormwater system and entering Elster Creek, Elwood Canal and ultimately Port Phillip Bay," Mr Martin said.

The trap is designed to use its water flow characteristics to divert litter to an entrapment sump and allowing non-polluted water to continue flowing. It works in tandem with an existing unit in nearby Bendigo Street, Bentleigh. Together, the units are expected to remove most of the litter from the Bentleigh Shopping Centre.

The Mitchell Street trap has the capacity to collect one cubic metre of litter that will be emptied by Council every three months to ensure drains are not blocked. It was installed as part of Council's recently adopted Litter Prevention Strategy.

The litter trap was designed by Swinburne University and jointly funded by Council and the South Eastern Regional Waste Management Group.

### Beware of imposters

ouncil is warning residents to be aware of people →posing as Council officers visiting Glen Eira homes and asking for cash payments in return for selected services.

Several incidents have been reported to Council over the past month where people have visited the homes of residents claiming to be from Glen Eira City Council and demanding money for services such as painting house numbers on kerbing.

Council's Chief Executive Officer Andrew Newton said Council officers who visited homes always carried identification.

"Residents should ask to see this identification before giving any information or inviting anyone into their homes," Mr Newton said.

"If they are still unsure about the identity of the person, they should call Council's Service Centre on

> 9524 3333 to verify the person is indeed a Council employee."

Mr Newton said it was highly unusual for Council officers to visit homes without first phoning the resident to make an appointment.

"Council officers would also never request money to be paid on the spot — an invoice would be sent for any service provided," he said.

Residents who have any concerns about the authenticity of visitors claiming to be from Glen Eira City Council should check with Council's Service Centre on 9524 3333 or contact the police.

### New Australians welcomed to Glen Eira

len Eira is home to 113 new Australians Ifollowing a citizenship ceremony at Glen Eira Town Hall recently.

Making their Australian citizenship pledge before family and friends were men, women and children from England, the United States, Russia, South Africa, India, China and New Zealand.

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Dorothy Marwick led migrants through their pledges and presented them with a certificate of citizenship, the final step to becoming Australian citizens.

Cr Marwick officially welcomed the new Australians into the Glen Eira community and congratulated them on their decision to become Australian citizens.

"I, too, chose to make Australia my home," Cr Marwick said. "Thirty years ago I married an Aussie. I was born in Northern Ireland and was raised and educated in Cape Town, South Africa.

"Growing up in South Africa, under the laws of Apartheid, I witnessed first-hand, extreme intolerance. I now know that I live in a country of great tolerance."

Cr Marwick said about 45,000 of the 124,000 people who lived in Glen Eira were born overseas.

"Our country and our City are the wonderful places that they are today partly because of the contributions made by the diverse migrant groups and we are grateful," she said.

After making the pledge, each new citizen received a

gift of an Australian flag and small native tree. Pianist Blanka West and singer Danielle Matthews then got the patriotic juices flowing with a moving rendition of I am Australian.

Council conducts citizenship ceremonies under the authority of the Minister for Citizenship and Multicultural Affairs and is prescribed by the Australian Citizenship Act 1948. Since 1948, 3.5 million migrants have become Australian citizens, residing all around the country.

### Calling Australia home

he three young Kark boys, Eran, Ariel and Asher, may be missing their family back home in South Africa but new friends, great beaches and sport have helped them settle into Australia and call it home.

Eran aged 8 years, Ariel 9 years and Asher 11 years, became Australian citizens along with parents Mervyn and Laurine at a ceremony held at the Glen Eira Town Hall recently.

The Kark family arrived in Melbourne four years ago after deciding that if they didn't move from Johannesburg as a family, the children would leave South Africa eventually.

Mrs Kark said Australia was their number one choice for migration because of the weather, culture and outdoor lifestyle which is similar to Johannesburg.

"South Africans generally find it very easy to integrate into the Australian society which is what makes this country preferable to live," she said.

Moving to Australia meant the Kark family had to start over. Mr Kark started a business in

McKinnon installing Automatic Teller Machines (ATMs) and has since employed 26 full-time permanent employees.

Glen Eira's newest Australian family planned to celebrate its citizenship status with a special night out in the city.



Cushioned netball courts and a regional athletics track are part of a \$330,000 capital works upgrade for Duncan Mackinnon Reserve in Murrumbeena. Over the next 12 months Council will resurface the Reserve's athletics track and eight netball courts which are heavily used by local clubs and schools.

Allnutt Park in Bentleigh and Greenmeadows Gardens in St Kilda East will also benefit with public toilet facilities listed for installation as part of the budget.

Council continues its commitment to providing allabilities access playgrounds at local parks, with a new playground to be built at Koornang Park in Carnegie. Minor upgrading works to local children's centres will also be undertaken to meet Government accreditation requirements.

A further \$210,000 has also been allocated for disability access programs to create a more accessible community.

Over the next 12 months Council will spend \$21.5 million on improving roads, drains, footpaths and buildings as well as increasing the amenity of parks and sports grounds and other community facilities.

More than \$8.4 million will be spent maintaining the City's infrastructure, including:

- repairs footpaths at a cost of \$1.2 million (an increased allocation of \$200,000 from the previous budget);
- upgrades to underground drains at a cost of \$1 million; and
- a total of \$3.5 million towards road reconstruction. an increase of \$840,000 from the previous budget.

Ageing concrete roads will be given priority as part of Council's pavement management system. Roads such as Moira Street, Carnegie, were originally built over swamplands in the 1930s and will be reconstructed to preserve their heritage qualities.

But the biggest chunk of the budget goes to new capital works around Glen Eira. Major capital works for 2003–04 include:

- Stage 1 landscaping works as part of the Princes Park redevelopment in Caulfield South at a cost of \$1.8 million;
- a \$3.2 million upgrade to Bentleigh/Hodgson Reserve in Bentleigh including a new all-abilities

### Ratepayer dollars at work

Rates are a necessary part of community life, and the revenue raised goes towards an important end — providing vital services and maintaining facilities for day-to-day living in the City.

From every \$100 raised through rates, Council spends \$8.35 to fund the maintenance and upgrade of community infrastructure and assets such as roads, drains, footpaths and buildings.

A further \$31.14 is spent on capital works, \$7.17 on home care, meals on wheels and other aged care programs, \$5.02 on youth and children's services and \$6.11 on providing a more than 200,000 book library service.


Funds also go towards immunisation, checking the safety at swimming pools and the hygiene of food shops, operating school crossings and waste management.

Council's Chief Executive Officer Andrew Newton said that on average, each Glen Eira household would pay \$853 in 2003–04 for rates and waste management services — the equivalent of \$16 per week in return for the multitude of services Council provides.

"That's about the same as the average home phone bill and the same as the average person pays in tax on their petrol each week," Mr Newton said.

"On average, residents are paying \$2 per week to have their garbage collected, \$6 for their roads, drains, footpaths and facilities to be maintained.

"That leaves only \$8 per week for the provision of hundreds of services such as libraries and maternal and child health centres and to cover government charges."

## Not such a super scheme

Glen Eira City Council recently received a bill for \$1.9 million from the Defined Benefits Scheme — a superannuation fund set up by the State Government in the 1940s. Council has elected to pay the compulsory levy in two instalments — \$900,000 this year and the remainder from next year's budget.

The Defined Benefits Scheme provides a prescribed payment based on the number of years employees were members of the scheme and their salary at the time of retirement. The scheme closed to new members in 1993 and only 20 per cent of current Council employees still belong.

Historically, the Defined Benefits Scheme has been fully funded with assets worth more than \$1 billion. Victorian councils were advised recently that due to falls in international and local share markets, assets had fallen below estimated future liabilities.

The number of past Council employees who were members of the scheme, as well as current staff, was taken into account when determining the prescribed levy.

Council's Chief Executive Officer Andrew Newton said the amount was a large component of Council's budget.

"More than 80 per cent of current Glen Eira staff are in a regular accumulation scheme where what staff get out depends on how much we have put in," Mr Newton said.

### Council keeps costs low

### Debt free. Low cost. Investing in the future.

When it comes to running a low-cost council Glen Eira is one of the best.

Glen Eira's average rate increase of 6.59 per cent is lower than that of Stonnington, Port Phillip, Bayside, Kingston, Monash, Boroondara and Yarra councils. Also, while the average debt of Victorian councils is nearly \$14 million (and some as high as \$21 million in debt), Glen Eira remains debt-free.

Despite external funding pressures, Glen Eira has upheld its additional pensioner rebate of \$110 and increased spending on much needed infrastructure

and capital works projects while maintaining the lowest rates among many of its neighbouring municipalities.

Council's Chief Executive Officer Andrew Newton said a policy of providing for the community in an efficient and cost-effective manner had driven Glen Eira's financial position.


"In 2002–03, the cost of running day-to-day services for the City was 24 per cent below the average of neighbouring municipalities," Mr Newton said.

"Glen Eira City Council is a low-cost council. Increases above the Consumer Price Index have gone to meet externally imposed costs."

City assets and infrastructure will be improved to the tune of \$21.5 million in the next 12 months and, while other costs will not decrease, Glen Eira will still offer a pensioner rebate of \$110 in addition to the State Government's rebate of \$135.

### Library members very satisfied

ommunity satisfaction of Council's libraries has strengthened over the past 12 months, with 91 per cent of members happy with the service.

The survey, which is compiled annually, was completed by 210 members who had visited one of Council's libraries during the past three months. It also showed that satisfaction with the service of information staff remained high at 94 per cent.

Council's Director Community Services Peter Jones said according to the survey the Glen Eira Library and Information Service's strongest points were the range and size of collections, staff courtesy and attention, and staff assistance with queries and questions.

"The key attractions of libraries continue to be the availability of library materials, the overall service they provide, the reference and information service and the range of operating hours," Mr Jones said.

Bentleigh is the most popular library with 41 per cent of members surveyed visiting this branch most often. Caulfield is the second most popular (36 per cent) followed by Carnegie (13 per cent) and Elsternwick (10 per cent).
