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Ogaki Mayor visits Glen Eira

Ties between Glen Eira and its Japanese sister city Ogaki were strengthened during a two-day visit by Ogaki Mayor Mr Bin Ogawa last month.

Mr Ogawa led a delegation of four from Ogaki including Vice Chairman of Ogaki City Assembly Mr Masoto Ishikawa, Managing Director of Ogaki International Exchange Association Mr Hiroshi Okuda and Secretary of Ogaki City Mr Shigeki Nakashima.

The Friendly Cities relationship between Glen Eira and Ogaki began in January 1990 to give Glen Eira residents the opportunity to learn about Japan, its people and culture.

Last month's visit was Mr Ogawa's first to Glen Eira and had been organised to consolidate the two cities' close relationship and offer new goals and objectives to enhance the Friendly Cities program.

A highlight of the visit was the unveiling of a marble monument given to Glen Eira by the City of Ogaki to commemorate the relationship. The monument stands in Council's Japanese Garden at the Glen Eira Town Hall.

Cr Marwick welcomed the delegation to Glen Eira before taking them on a tour of the town hall, including the auditorium, Service Centre, art gallery and art collection. Later, they were invited to participate in a Council meeting in the Council Chamber.

The group also met with Glen Eira Councillors and Executive in Council's Ogaki Room, a meeting room dedicated to the Friendly Cities relationship containing Japanese prints and memorabilia. The meeting discussed future plans for the Ogaki–Glen Eira Friendly Cities program.

Cr Marwick said Glen Eira and Ogaki had enjoyed a close relationship for many years.

"We are honoured that you (the Mayor of Ogaki) have been able to visit us and your personal involvement makes our relationship even stronger," Cr Marwick said.

"Glen Eira is a multi-cultural community and while we cannot have sister city relationships with all of the many parts of the world that are part of our story, our relationship with Ogaki demonstrates that we recognise we are part of a bigger context."

Chairperson of Council's Glen Eira-Ogaki Friendly Cities Committee Cr Alan Grossbard spoke of a five-

year plan the committee hoped to develop with the support of the Ogaki Mayor.

"We are very excited about the prospects of the plan," Cr Grossbard said. "It means the Friendly Cities committee and Council can have a vision that we can look forward to with events that can benefit both cities."

Mr Ogawa took the opportunity to suggest future programs and initiatives to further enhance the relationship.

"We have been actively involved in the exchange program between our two cities since its initiation and would like to present further goals and objectives to further develop and strengthen our ties," Mr Ogawa said.

"We have had discussions to promote and further

develop the program and the future looks promising."

The group's Glen Eira visit included tours of Caulfield Racecourse and historic Rippon Lea Estate, as well as lunch at Bentleigh East's renowned Yarra Yarra Golf Club.

The Japanese delegation also visited Shelford Girls' Grammar School in Caulfield where they witnessed a live internet exchange between the school and Nakagawa Primary School in Ogaki, using visual and audio technology.

Caulfield Primary School in Caulfield South also hosted a visit from the delegation, holding a special school assembly in its honour. The assembly included a rendition of the school song in Japanese.

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Butt out cigarette litter

ouncil has launched a campaign to raise awareness and reduce the incidence of cigarette butt littering in Glen Eira streets and shopping centres.

Council has visited food businesses in the City's major dining precincts to distribute 200 cigarette butt bins and educate business operators about the Council's Butt it then bin it program.

The stainless steel butt bins have been placed at cafés and restaurants throughout the city in an effort to reduce the amount of litter created by diners who drop

cigarette butts were one of the most significant contributors to litter in Glen Eira.

"There has been a significant increase in the number of cigarette butts dropped in Glen Eira streets due to smoking bans in food businesses and shopping centres, and the popularity of on-street dining,' Mr Saunders said.

Council's Manager Public Health Mark Saunders said

"The cigarette butts are consequently washed through our drainage system into rivers and beaches affecting the environment and wildlife.

Mr Saunders said that it was everyone's responsibility to prevent littering and the detrimental effect it has on waterways and marine life.

"Cigarette butt littering is also an offence under Council's Local Law and on-thespot fines of up to \$200 can be issued by Council's Local Law and environmental health officers," he said.

As part of Council's education campaign, Butt it then bin it posters and pamphlets have been distributed to food and tobacco retailers to increase public knowledge of cigarette butt littering and the responsibility of smokers. Contact Council's Service Centre on 9524 3333 for a copy.

he services Council provides at its four children's centre have received accreditation from the National Childcare Accreditation Council (NCAC) for the next two and a half years.

The NCAC is an independent body that runs checks on the quality of services provided by child care centres and is funded and supported by the Federal Government.

It examines such areas as relationships with children, respect for children, partnerships with families, staff interactions, planning and evaluation, learning and development, protective care, health, safety and managing to support quality.

Council's Director Community Services Peter Jones said all centres were accredited for their child care services late last year after an extensive process involving self assessment and validation.

He said each of the services received a near perfect accreditation score.

"The children's centres were required to undertake a 10-point service check under the NCAC quality improvement and accreditation system," Mr Jones said.

As part of the accreditation, the centres underwent a self-study of the services provided to children and their families and were required to prepare an action plan for areas of improvement which was shown to parents and the community for feedback.

Parents were also asked to fill out a survey on the services provided in accordance with the 10 principles and comment on the centre's service provision. The NCAC validator then spent two days in each of the centres checking services against the 10 principles.

"This was an interactive self assessment which allowed Council, children's centre staff and parents to be involved with the improvement of the service," Mr Jones said.

"We are delighted with the result as the services at Council's children's centres are now accredited."

Glen Eira's Olympic excitement reignites

The 2004 Olympic Games torch relay will travel through Glen Eira on Saturday 5 June as part of a global journey to pass the flame and unite the world.

Glen Eira is one of only six Melbourne Unicipalities chosen to be a part of the torch's route to Athens where the Olympic Games will be staged in August this year. The exact route the relay will take through the City is yet to be finalised.

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Dorothy Marwick said it was a great honour for Glen Eira to be chosen as one of the few areas the torch will pass through in Melbourne.

through Glen Eira, the first being for the 2000 Olympics," Cr Marwick said.

"This is an opportunity for residents of Glen Eira to be Australia is the first international port of call for the part of this special international event as either torchbearers or spectators,"

There will be 120 torchbearers selected in Melbourne including Olympians, Melbourne identities and members of the general public, nominated by the community. Glen Eira residents can nominate someone in their community to be a torchbearer.

"This is truly a once-in-a lifetime opportunity for Glen Eira residents as this is the first time in Olympic history that the flame will visit all previous host cities of a summer Olympics," Cr Marwick said.

"It is also a special occasion for Glen Eira, given our large Greek population."



"This is the second time the torch relay will have passed Local residents can relive the excitement of the Sydney 2000 Olympics when the Athens Olympic torch relay passes through Glen Eira in June.

torch which will visit Sydney on Friday 4 June before heading to Melbourne the next day.

The torch relay will then visit Tokyo and continue its 34-city global journey back to Athens for the opening ceremony on 13 August.

The Olympic torch is designed to resemble an olive leaf and is made of both metal and olive wood. The design was selected to enhance the flame and to ensure its durability during the six-continent journey.

s my Mayoral term nears the end I have taken some time to reflect on the past 12 months.

As an incoming Mayor, I talked about the Nolan Principles which are used as a guide for public office in the United Kingdom. These principles demand selflessness, integrity, objectivity, accountability,

openness, honesty and leadership. I believe these days, more than ever, it is essential to publicise the requirements of public office. In recognition of this concept, the State Government has recently updated the Local Government Act to include a requirement that each council adopt a code of conduct. The code must include processes for the purpose of resolving internal disputes between councillors and that lay down standards of behaviour for councillors. I would like to see Glen Eira City Council's code include the Nolan Principles, and anticipate community input to the development of this code.

Community input has been an important feature of the past year. Residents' comments and feedback were sought for Council's community plan, changes to the Bentleigh streetscape, Council's annual budget, Ormond Shopping Centre upgrade, park redevelopments and many other projects which will shape our City in the future.

Council has continued to work hard to improve Glen Eira's amenity through an extensive capital works program and the further development of facilities and services. Providing for the community is Council's first priority and we have met the challenge head on from upgrading ageing facilities to advocating on behalf of the community.

But it hasn't all been hard work. There have been many opportunities to celebrate our rich cultural heritage through community events such as Party in the park, Carols by Candlelight and street festivals and to recognise the commitment and endeavours of our residents through the Glen Eira Citizen of the Year awards, Volunteer Recognition Scheme and even 100th birthdays. In my role as Mayor I celebrated many of these occasions with you, and presented our wonderful City to visiting dignitaries such as delegations from Ogaki, our sister city in Japan, and the Governor of Victoria John Landy.

In closing, I would like to thank my eight Councillor colleagues for their contributions, my family for their support, and the many Council officers and community members with whom I have worked and come into contact with during my Mayoral year. Being the Mayor of Glen Eira is, and was, an honour and a privilege and I am both proud and grateful to have had this opportunity to serve and work with the community of Glen Eira.



School gets wise on waste

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Dorothy Marwick has presented Bentleigh West Primary School with a sign acknowledging its commitment to become an accredited Waste Wise school.

In a school assembly last month Cr Marwick congratulated students and staff on their efforts to reduce waste and litter at the school and their commitment to meet the statewide criteria for excellence.

"I know the school has already taken steps to recycle and reduce waste and litter and teachers at the school

Read the signs for safety's sake

Council is urging Glen Eira motorists to obey road rules and parking restriction signs when driving on roads.

Glen Eira motorists are reminded to take note of parking restriction signs, in particular red signs, which restrict parking for safety reasons.

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Dorothy Marwick said parking restriction signs were located around the municipality to ensure safe traffic flow.

"The red no stopping signs have been placed at locations such as intersections and near pedestrian lights," Cr Marwick said.

"These locations are particularly dangerous because the view of drivers can be obstructed by parked cars."

Cr Marwick said it is the responsibility of all motorists to ensure that their vehicle is legally parked at all times.

"Failure to do so can result in an infringement notice being issued," she said. "It is not acceptable for motorists to claim they simply didn't see the sign."

The fine for parking in a no stopping zone is \$100, an amount that is set by the State Government under the provisions of the Road Safety Act 1986.

Cr Marwick said that Council treats road safety issues very seriously and as a result parking signs are constantly being changed to improve traffic flow and safety in Glen Eira.

have attended a Waste Wise workshop session," Cr Marwick said.

"This sign shows the community that the school is educating for waste and litter reduction and of course, the school is saving money and conserving resources in the process."

The students currently recycle paper and cardboard, cans, cartridges, corks and plastic. Each classroom has a bin for food waste, which is either placed into compost bins in the gardens or given to chickens and geese kept in an enclosure at the school. The school has also installed rainwater tanks to help conserve water.

The school has a deciduous garden, cottage garden, an indigenous garden as well as a vegetable garden where students grow their own tomatoes, pumpkins and other produce.

Cr Marwick said the school now had about a year to achieve the statewide standards, under the *Waste Wise* program.

"We look forward to perhaps later this year presenting the school with a sign stating Bentleigh West Primary School is a fully accredited *Waste Wise* school," she said.

The Waste Wise program will enable the school to continue to achieve a whole-school approach to its waste and litter education and make a commitment to become waste conscious and conserve resources, reducing environmental impact and cost savings to the school.

The Waste Wise program was developed by EcoRecycle Victoria and is supported by Glen Eira City Council through its Waste Wise Education Strategy, as well as the Gould League and the South Eastern Region Waste Management Group.

Learning about the seasons

A bout 40 children from Council's Murrumbeena Children's Centre learnt all about the seasons during an interactive puppet show last month.

Children aged from six months to five years old enjoyed Let's go 'round the seasons, an hour-long show of singing, dancing and puppetry performed by Jack and Molly.


The show taught the children about the weather and what happens to plants and animals during the seasons.

Time to register pets

ouncil is calling on local pet owners to remember to renew their animal registration when renewal notices are sent out this month.

Under the Domestic (Feral and Nuisance) Animals Act 1996, all dogs and cats over six months of age are required to be registered with Council. Last year more than 17,700 dogs and cats were registered in Glen Eira, a figure which is expected to increase this year.

Council's Manager Civic Amenity Carl Russo said not only was registering dogs and cats a legal requirement, it was also a safeguard for pet owners if they lose their animal.

"Ensuring pets are registered and that they always wear their registration tags makes identification much easier

Two problems, one solution

Innovative thinking on the part of Council's parks services staff recently saw two water-related problems resolve each other.

The main oval at Caulfield Park suffered extensive flooding during heavy rainstorms in late January, while nearby Caulfield Park Lake was in danger of drying out due to extended drought conditions and current water restrictions.

Council staff made good use of the two situations by pumping the excess water off the oval and into the lake, thereby solving both problems at once.

Council's Director Infrastructure Kerry Martin said that a drain running through the park had caused water to overflow onto a gravel path in the park next to the main oval.

"This gravel section is adjacent to the main oval and extensive flooding occurred to the oval because of a low spot in one section," Mr Martin said.

"Because the oval is used by many local residents and sporting clubs, Council needed to take quick and immediate action to fix the situation."

Mr Martin said Council staff had come up with the idea to pump the water off the oval and into nearby Caulfield Park Lake to replenish its low water levels.

The excess water was pumped out of the main oval using two mechanical pumps that were attached to 200 metre hoses.

"If the lake had dried out it would have caused serious damage to the clay liner at the bottom of the lake," Mr Martin said.

"Council found itself in a situation where it was faced with two urgent problems and one solution that could solve both problems with one action.

"This solution was the most beneficial and the most efficient way to restore the park's facilities to their full potential."

if Council's animal management officers find the animal wandering," Mr Russo said.

"Last year Council was able to reunite more than 150 wandering dogs and cats with their owners simply because they were registered with Council and wearing their tags.

"Registration is such a simple act which can save pet owners a lot of heartache. It is also one of the most important things a responsible pet owner can do for their pet."

Glen Eira pet owners should expect to receive Council's 2004-05 dog and cat registration renewal notices within the next two weeks. The notices must be paid before Saturday 10 April.

Once registered, owners will receive a new registration tag which their pet must wear whenever it is outside the owner's property.

Mr Russo said new pet owners or owners who have yet to register their pets should contact Council's Service Centre for a new pet registration application form so they can register their pets.

Reduced fees apply for pets who fall into a range of categories including those which are desexed, microchipped or more than 10 years old.

"Failure to register dogs or cats can result in a \$200 fine per animal," Mr Russo said.

"Registration fees help Council to provide important pet-related services in Glen Eira such as animal control, pet identification and community education about responsible pet ownership."

Owners who have lost a pet can check the new lost dogs and cats register on Council's website at www.gleneira.vic.gov.au to see if it has been picked up by Council's animal management officers.

len Eira pet owners will have an opportunity to Get their pets microchipped at a reduced fee at Council's upcoming Party in the Park celebrations.

Council is offering microchipping for cats and dogs at a reduced rate of \$20 each, offering a substantial savings to pet owners.

Council's Manager Civic Amenity Carl Russo said that both Local Law officers and animal management officers would be available at the parties to answer residents' queries about general amenity and pet ownership issues.

"The officers will be accepting payments for pet registration at each of the parties so pet owners can have their pets microchipped and registered at the same time," Mr Russo said.

"Council will also be giving away spot prizes to responsible pet owners which include pooch

pouches, kitten show bags, cat litter and discount pet food vouchers."

Mr Russo said microchipping permanently identified pets which enabled them to be quickly returned to the owners should pets stray.

"However, owners must be reminded that microchipping is not an alternative to registration microchipped pets must also be registered with Council," he said.

"One bonus is that pet owners are entitled to discounted registration if their pet has been microchipped."

The Party in the Park celebrations will be at Packer Park, Carnegie on Sunday 14 March and Allnutt Park, Bentleigh on Sunday 28 March. Each event runs from 12pm to 4pm. For more information on Party in the Park turn to page 16.

Council's Director Community Services Peter Jones said Council hoped the seminar


would educate senior residents on the causes of changes in memory.


Youth leadership Wildcats prepare for winter

Council plans for centres' future

Council has engaged consultants Planisphere and Associates to prepare urban design framework plans for the three activity centres. The project is due to be completed in June this year.

The purpose of the urban design framework project is to articulate an overall design vision for the villages and their relationship with surrounding neighbourhoods based on Council's Urban Villages Policy.

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Dorothy Marwick said the design visions for the three urban villages are the final planning stage in what has been a major focus for Council over the last five years.



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"The urban design frameworks strive to bring together the activities of living, working, entertaining and recreating all within an area well served by public transport and have this recognised in a set of urban design guidelines and action plans for each centre," Cr Marwick said.

"This is a very exciting opportunity to enhance the vitality and vibrancy of these three key activity centres."

Cr Marwick said the framework would produce tangible benefits for the three communities.

"It will identify themes to enhance the distinctiveness of each urban village and, where possible, to increase the viability of business and trading centres," she said.

"It can be used to

identify how a business mix in a shopping centre can be improved, based on the needs of the community and supporting local business growth."

A public transport plan will be developed to identify improved use of public transport facilities and land and access connectivity. This will include a pedestrian, cycle, traffic and parking study and a strategic action plan.

The project will examine and document the cultural, social and material history of each urban village, and identify places that are special to the community.

"These urban design principles, objectives and guidelines will help enhance and develop Glen Eira land in a manner that contributes positively to the community," Cr Marwick said.

The project is jointly funded by Council and the

Department of Sustainability and Environment under the *Pride of Place* program.

The project will involve extensive community consultation through a project reference group which includes community representatives from each urban village. A stakeholder workshop will be held in April to discuss issues, opportunities and design options and another in July to discuss the draft frameworks for each village. Community input vital for planning review

Council is seeking community feedback as part of a review of its Municipal Strategic Statement (MSS).

The MSS outlines the key land use, strategic planning and development objectives for Glen Eira, as well as policies and strategies for achieving these objectives. It also forms part of the Glen Eira Planning Scheme.

The MSS summarises significant planning directions for Glen Eira and provides the strategic basis for the application of the zones, overlays and particular provisions in the Glen Eira Planning Scheme.

Under the Planning and Environment Act, every Council is required to review its MSS once every three years.

Council's Director City Development Jeff Akehurst said the MSS provided an opportunity for an integrated approach to planning across all areas of Council.

He said the review was an audit of the MSS's performance and provided an opportunity for community involvement.

"The review looks at what Council has achieved over the past three years, particularly in terms of strategic projects," Mr Akehurst said. "The aim of the review is to assess the performance of the objectives and strategies in the MSS and determine whether the implementation tools such as zones and overlays have been effective in achieving these objectives."

"It will also provide the opportunity to review the future vision for land use and development within Glen Eira and help identify any gaps where the MSS can be improved."

Council will hold a community workshop to gather information and feedback on the current performance of the MSS and seek suggestions for its improvement. The workshop will be on Tuesday 20 April at 7.30pm in the Caulfield Cup Room, Glen Eira Town Hall, corner Glen Eira and Hawthorn Roads, Caulfield.

Recreation reation

New-look park

takes shape

Princes Park in Caulfield South will become one of Glen Eira's signature parks once a major redevelopment project is completed, according to Council's Director Infrastructure Kerry Martin.

Works to transform the park are well underway and are on track for a June completion date.

So far the soccer ground has been relocated, a retaining wall constructed near the tennis courts, new concrete pathways, entrance ways and kerbing installed, old park furniture removed, subsoil prepared for landscaping and palm trees relocated to the rear of the bowls club. New fencing is being installed at the soccer ground.

As part of the landscaping works, 98 trees have been removed after being identified by professional landscape architects John Patrick and Associates as being diseased, obsolete or inappropriate species.

Towever, more than 15,500 new plants will be incorporated into the park environment, as well as 277 advanced trees of both exotic and native species.

Redevelopment of the park has been split into two stages according to the type of work involved — landscaping works (stage 1) and building works (stage 2). Current works involve only stage one of the project, with a final design yet to be developed for stage two.

Mr Martin said that during the next month new irrigation would be installed at the soccer ground,



pathway and entrance way construction would be finalised, grass planting would start, subsoil drains and drainage pits would be built and new gardens beds would be installed and mulched at the southern and eastern ends of the park.

Construction work will also start on the park's new sensory garden — the first of its kind in Glen Eira. The garden will feature scented foliage, brightly coloured flowers and textured plants to stimulate the senses. It will be set on different levels and have access for people with disabilities.

Design and specification of the park's new playground has been advertised for tender, with a contractor expected to be appointed next month and installation work due to begin in April.

Mr Martin said the redevelopment of Princes Park was part of Council's ongoing commitment to upgrade the City's parks.

He said the project was the culmination of a lengthy master plan development process which involved extensive resident, park user, sporting club and community group consultation.

"Residents who would like to get an indication of what Princes Park will look like once the redevelopment is completed should take a look at Packer Park in Carnegie," Mr Martin said.

"Packer Park was uninteresting and under-utilised before the redevelopment. Now it is one of the most spectacular parks around and is filled with people and activities most days of the week.

"The current master plan redevelopment at Princes Park will make it an equivalent area to Packer Park — something which all residents can look forward to."

BusEd links students looking to gain practical business experience with business owners who have ideas to grow their business but lack the specialist skills to bring them to fruition.

Since the program started in July 2002, more than 20 local businesses have benefitted from the program including hardware, catering, clothing and video retailers, a massage therapy business and multimedia and graphics organisations.

The projects have involved more than 100 students from eight primary, secondary and tertiary educational institutions who have worked on projects ranging from website design and complete information technology systems integration, to photography, community arts projects, market surveys and design and production of promotional materials.

Council's Manager Business Development Lynda Bredin said BusEd pulled together the resources of student teams from around Glen Eira, and the knowledge, mentoring and experience of local business owners, to achieve mutually positive outcomes.

"Business owners register their projects with Glen Eira BusEd and are matched with a team of students studying a relevant discipline," Ms Bredin said.

"Business owners get access to information, resources, skills, talents and knowledge to help get projects off the ground and increase their business, while students gain

real-life experience in a business environment and the opportunity to transfer their technical knowledge into practical experience."

Ariella, from costume design studio Ariella Pty Ltd in Caulfield, is one of the program's many success stories. A team of students from Monash University worked with Ariella to create a website for the business which included a database of costume samples, work history and an email facility.

Ariella said the website was aimed at increasing the profile of her business and ultimately sales, while also decreasing the amount of time she spends on the phone and away from her work.

"The students are no problem. They are organised and make everything easy to understand," Ariella said. "I didn't realise the amount of work involved in creating a website, but the students explain it in easy terms.

"BusEd has given me an opportunity I couldn't get elsewhere. It has enabled me to get fresh ideas and think more creatively."

To get involved, businesses provide details of their potential project to BusEd and prepare a brief for the student team. The students, with the support of their lecturers, work with the business for one term are assessed on the success of the project in meeting, and often exceeding, the business's expectations.

Ms Bredin said BusEd currently had students with skills

Maureen Crawford's symbolic and abstract imagery finds its source in the mythical and bestial figures that lurk in the realms of her imagination. Sometimes stories

she hears or poems she has written will be the starting point for a series of paintings.

Crawford describes her painting process as spiritual journeys which grow slowly over time. Her process is a meditative one through her ponderings on the nature of things, as much as it is spontaneous through her vivid and gestural mark-making. This is an insightful and fun exhibition.

There is a sensuality in Rosa Purbrick's painting, and this includes a passionate relationship with cultivation of fine wine.

Rosa Purbrick's residence and winery by the Goulburn River provides her with an endless source of inspiration and nourishment as an artist. The scenic banks of the river, the vineyards and the parched landscape continue to appear as partial views or details in her paintings and also through objects found in the landscape and some of Pubrick's more recent mixed media collages.

Given an intense look at the variety of spaces, colours and textures to be found in the Australian landscape,

Purbrick sees a broad spectrum of perspectives. Her recent visit to the Northern Territory has brought new lighter hues to her paintings.

The beauty of Purbrick's painting is that she is able to capture a strong sense of place whether it be through realistic renditions of a local plant species or her more abstract paintings awash with colour.

Purbrick's paintings are subtle and perceptive, always aware of the passage of time and the predecessors of her environment.
