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Historical Mayoral election

ouncillor Bob Bury created history last month when he became the first councillor in Glen Eira's nine-year history to win the City's Mayoral election in a contested public ballot.

It was the first time in the municipality's history that

more than one Councillor was nominated to become Mayor at the public Special Council Meeting held annually to elect the civic leader. Cr Bury received five votes to fellow first-term Councillor Jamie Hyams' four votes.

About 60 people gathered in the Council Chamber to see Cr Bury sworn-in as the eighth Mayor of Glen Eira. He takes over from 2003-04 Mayor Cr Dorothy Marwick to whom he paid tribute. Under changes to the Local Government Act, the current Mayoral term lasts until December 2004.

Cr Alan Grossbard said a longstanding tradition had been broken by the contested election, which paved the way for other changes in the future.

"Maybe this is a lead to a very new type of Council with traditions of the past being broken and new ventures in the future being able to be expounded and developed so that this community and this Council can grow," Cr Grossbard said.

Cr Veronika Martens said she hoped the forthcoming year with Cr Bury at the helm would be a fruitful one. "I know that you will be acting in the interests of our municipality and the municipality will benefit from your Mayoralty," Cr Martens said.

In his first Mayoral address Cr Bury said being elected Mayor of Glen Eira was an honour and the fulfilment of a dream.

He said he hoped the Councillors could leave some of their infighting of the past 12 months behind them and work co-operatively together for the good "our great City of Glen Eira".

"I will endeavour to heal those wounds. I know this will not be an easy task, but if we are to move forward, we cannot be taking a backward step all the time," Cr Bury said.

"We must improve the principles of good governance. Good governance is all about meeting the highest

standards of public accountability, using our resources effectively, being accountable, transparent, responsible and law abiding.





"If we remember some or all of these elements, our Council meetings will hopefully be of a high standard."

Cr Bury said public consultation, communication and keeping all Glen Eira stakeholders fully informed would be high priorities during his term as Mayor.

"I will continue to encourage our debt-free situation, keep rate rises to a minimum, continue with our capital improvement program, those being the Carnegie Library, Bentleigh Shopping Centre upgrade, Princes Park Master Plan, Bentleigh-Hodgson Reserve Master Plan and hopefully working on upgrading the Glen Huntly Shopping Centre," he said.

Cr Bury was elected to represent Jasper Ward on Council in March last year. He has lived in Jasper Ward for more than 36 years and currently resides in



McKinnon with his wife Marney. They have three children and four grandchildren.

Cr Bury has a background in banking and recently retired as Chief Executive Officer of Marriott Support Services. He has been involved with many community organisations and service clubs including Scouts, local schools, Rotary, Freemasons, Wattle Tennis Club and Yarra Yarra Golf Club. He currently serves on Council's Audit Committee, Environment Committee and is Chairman of the Community Grants Committee.

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Sushi Plus is tops in food safety

Bentleigh East Japanese takeaway restaurant Sushi Plus has been named Glen Eira's Shop of the Year for 2004.

The business, which was set up by husband and wife team Tadashi and Paula Nakase four years ago, won the title at Council's annual food business awards ceremony last month

Former Glen Eira Mayor Cr Dorothy Marwick announced another Bentleigh East business, Bakers Delight, as this year's Shop of the Year runner-up.

Companions count at Glen Eira

Local residents with disabilities who require a companion to attend Council events will benefit from Council's decision to join the State Government's Companion Card program.

Council has become an affiliate member of the scheme and will accept Companion Cards when they are presented at Council programs and events that charge an admission fee.

Companion cards are available for people with a permanent disability who need a companion to enable them to access venues and participate in community activities. The card enables companions to be admitted at no charge.

Council's Director Community Services Peter Jones said that Council already largely provides free access to companions when accessing venues and services.

"The Companion Card will allow Council to formalise this procedure and further recognise the right to fair ticketing of people who require a companion," Mr Jones said.

"The Companion Card program will enhance access for people with a disability to Council services and activities."

The companion card is a wallet-sized photo identification card that can be presented to organisations when purchasing tickets as proof that a companion is required to access a particular venue or activity.

Cr Marwick said that as part of Council's Safe Food program Council's environmental health officers conducted safety assessments of food businesses each year against the strict hygiene standards developed by Food Standards Australia.

"These two businesses have not only had a five-star food rating but have also achieved the highest and second highest food safety ratings during 2003 out of the 750 registered food businesses within the City," Cr Marwick said.

"Council is unique in that it works in partnership with local food businesses to achieve better food safety outcomes for people eating within the city."


Council's Manager Public Health Mark Saunders said Sushi Plus won the Shop of the Year award because it demonstrated the best performance in food safety over the past 12 months.

"Sushi Plus has achieved a five-star food rating every year since it began operation and has also participated in Council's *Taste 4 Health* program every year," Mr Saunders said.

At the awards ceremony Cr Marwick launched Council's *Safe Food Guide* which lists food businesses within the municipality that received a five-star food safety rating during 2003.

Cr Marwick said with today's busy lifestyle, more and more families relied on meals prepared outside the home.

"This guide is a great tool to assist local residents and visitors to Glen Eira in deciding where to purchase food within the municipality," Cr Marwick said.

Council's *Taste 4 Health* nutrition program recognises local food businesses that offer customers healthy meal choices. Businesses are encouraged to highlight menu items that have been assessed by a dietician as being healthy.

Council consults on draft community plan

Council is seeking community input into its draft six-year community plan *Glen Eira 2010*.

Council will hold a public meeting at Glen Huntly Pavilion, in Glen Huntly Park, Glen Huntly on Tuesday 27 April at 7.30 pm to discuss the draft community plan for 2004–2010 and is also inviting written submissions. All submissions will be considered at Council's ordinary meeting on Monday 3 May.

About 1,000 people have already participated in the early developmental phases of the plan which has included four community forums, a series of focus groups and a telephone survey of more than 600 residents — the largest survey of its kind ever undertaken in Glen Eira.

The community plan provides Council with a framework that guides its budgetary, planning and policy decisions and shapes Council's works program. It will set Council's priorities for the next six years, during which Council will spend more than \$400 million.

The draft plan analyses Glen Eira's current situation, future trends, community views and Council's goals and responsibilities. It includes specific strategies and objectives for 2010 and indicators to measure progress towards them.

Council's Chief Executive Officer Mr Andrew Newton said consultation was an important part of corporate planning as it helped to identify community priorities and areas for improvement.

He said consultation had focussed on Glen Eira as a place to live, not merely the activities of Council. "Council needs to plan for the long-term. We provide essential municipal services which the community depends on all their lives. We own assets with very long lifecycles and we make decisions which affect the environment," Mr Newton said.

"At the same time, we need to respond to a dynamic community — Government programs change, our legal obligations can be remade abruptly by courts or parliaments, the community's needs and priorities evolve."

The telephone surveys found most residents are positive about living in Glen Eira, with 90 per cent rating quality of life as excellent or good, 72 feeling secure, 72 per cent ranking the City's appearance as excellent or good and 67 per cent rating recreation and leisure opportunities highly.

Issues which emerged include concerns about railway stations, traffic and parking, facilities for teenagers, new residential development, the environment, and opportunities to contribute to future planning.

All residents and community members are invited to attend the public meeting or make submissions. Written submissions on the draft plan must reach Council by Tuesday 20 April and should be addressed to: Chief Executive Officer, Glen Eira City Council, PO Box 42 Caulfield South 3162.

Pitching in to clean up Glen Eira

Former Glen Eira Mayor Cr Dorothy Marwick joined students at Bentleigh West Primary School in Bentleigh last month to help clean up the school grounds and neighbouring streets as part of *Clean Up Australia* day.

Along on the day to give a helping hand were Federal Minister for the Environment and Heritage Dr David Kemp and *Clean Up Australia* Chairman and Founder Ian Kiernan.

The group donned gloves and armed themselves with rubbish bags to collect rubbish and separate it into



Council has instigated a range of traffic management and road safety initiatives at a busy Bentleigh hotel complex to help ensure the safety of neighbouring residents, motorists and patrons.

Since November last year, Council has been liaising with management of the Nepean Hotel on South Road, Bentleigh and local police to introduce a range of measures designed to help residents of the area, patrons of the hotel and passing motorists move in, out and around the complex safely.

Council's Director City Development Jeff Akehurst said Council has implemented a strategy where neighbouring streets of the hotel, such as Corbie, Barry and Plym Streets, are temporarily closed during the hotel's busiest hours.

"These small streets provide entry and exit ways for partons of the hotel but are also residential streets," Mr Akehurst said.

"Water barriers are used to temporarily close the streets to hotel patrons from 8pm to 3am on Friday ound Saturday evenings so that residents of these streets are not inconvenienced by increased traffic flow and noise.

"The aim of the street closures is to ensure patrons of the hotel are using the main entry and exit points of the hotel located in South Road, Nepean Highway and South Avenue."

Mr Akehurst said Council had implemented this strategy on a six-month trial basis to assess the benefits to residents and patrons of the hotel.

"We are confident that this process has been positive for the residents of the neighbouring streets and Council has already received thank-you letters from residents."

Parking restrictions already apply in the neighbouring streets and Council has zoned the area as residential.

Council is also proposing to install a permanent safety fence in front of the hotel along the north side of South Road, between Nepean Highway and the main entrance to the hotel.

The safety fence is a steel tubular structure that acts as a barrier between the pedestrians and traffic.

Mr Akehurst said Council and the hotel would share the cost of the fence.

"The proposed fence will be erected to protect the amenity of the area," he said. "It is a very busy intersection and Council hopes the safety fence will improve the safety of not only hotel patrons but also pedestrians using the intersection."

recycle bins — some for plastics and others for cardboard and cans.

In addressing the students, Cr Marwick said Clean Up Australia day was an important day on the environmental calendar when the whole community could come together, clean up the environment and show how much they cared about the earth.

She said Council had arranged a special collection of rubbish that the school collected and was proud to help the students in their efforts to keep the environment clean.

"I know your school has already taken many steps to recycle and reduce waste and litter at the school, and that teachers have attended several *Waste Wise* workshop sessions."

Dr Kemp also congratulated the students on their commitment to the environment.

"I'm delighted to see so many keen young

environmentalists, not only picking up litter but also sorting the recyclable items," Dr Kemp said.

"This school is an example to us all of how to put environmental sustainability at the centre of everyday life."

In February, Cr Marwick presented Bentleigh West Primary School with a sign recognising its commitment to becoming a *Waste Wise* school.

The school has many programs and initiatives as part of its pledge to care for the environment. Students recycle food scraps and general waste, have vegetable and cottage gardens, an enclosure to keep chickens and geese and a rainwater tank to help conserve water.

Drains, rains and autumn leaves

Autumn has arrived and with it comes fallen leaves, possible rain and potential drainage problems.

With this in mind, Council is issuing residents with a call to action — to help ensure the City's vast drainage system remains free of blockages in the lead-up to winter.

Council's Director
Infrastructure Kerry Martin
said Glen Eira had a good
drainage system, comprised
of underground pipes and
inlet pits, that is maintained
regularly and is being
constantly improved
and extended.

"Council sweeps Glen Eira streets on a monthly cycle and undertakes additional sweeping in areas of heavy leaf fall during autumn. This helps to prevent leaves and other debris getting into the drains and causing blockages," Mr Martin said.

"Cleaning of drains and pits is also done partly on a
regular cycle in known problem areas and partly in

regular cycle in known problem areas and partly in response to specific requests from residents."

Mr Martin said that while Council had a major role

to play in keeping the City's drains clean, residents

could also play their part by regularly checking and cleaning their roof gutters, down pipes and drains.

He said stormwater drainage pipes on nthe property are the resident's responsibility, including the section from the property boundary to where the drain connects to Council's drain or the street kerbline.

Other tips which can residents can use to keep drains clean include:

- dragging the leaves off blocked pit grates with a rake;
- installing a rain water tank to reduce the run-off into the drainage system in winter and provide a source of water for the garden in summer;
- always placing litter in a bin;
- using leaves and lawn clippings as compost and mulch on the garden, not sweeping them into drainage pits;
- keeping lids of Council drainage pits clear of obstructions; and
- checking with nurseries before planting any trees or shrubs to ensure they don't have intrusive root systems that will get into drains and cause blockages;



Frogs leap back to park

Frog Hollow in Packer Park, Carnegie, has lived up to its name with sounds of croaking being heard emanating from the park's wetland area in recent weeks.

Frog Hollow was created as part of the redevelopment of Packer Park in response to community pleas to have the park resemble its original state.

The park's wetland area is based on evidence that a waterway used to flow through the park, with the area now known as Frog Hollow being used as a watering place for horses and as a place that children explored for tadpoles and frogs.

The park redevelopment was completed in March 2002 following an extensive community consultation process.

Council's Manager Recreation and Youth Services Linda Smith said the hollow was currently teaming with tadpoles, which was a good sign that there would soon be an abundance of frogs.

Fishing and surfing

Local young people have the opportunity to learn thow to fish or surf during two one-day recreational programs Council is holding this month.

Let's go fishing, to be held on Tuesday 6 April, includes fishing on the banks of the Yarra River and a trip to the Melbourne Aquarium.

The program is free to young people aged between 9 and 14 years who live or attend school in Glen Eira. Lunch, snacks and drinks are provided. All participants will be required to register before the program starts and will need to complete an indemnity form.

Council, in conjunction with Taskforce Community Agency, is running a surfing program on Tuesday 20 April at the Island Surf School on Phillip Island. The program is free and open to young people aged between 15 and 19 years who live or attend school in Glen Eira.

"Council hoped that by restoring the natural habitat, we would see several species of local frogs returning to live in Frog Hollow," Ms Smith said.

"We spent a lot of time, energy and effort making sure the area was in keeping with the orginal land forms and flora, so that it would be attractive to the local frog species, some of which are now endangered.

"Now that the plants are established enough to offer shelter and food sources, we are seeing the frogs return."

Ms Smith said while Council encouraged local residents to enjoy the park and its wildlife, it was important they respected the environment.

"We ask that people don't remove the tadpoles or the frogs or damage their habitat," she said. "Now that we finally have them back at Frog Hollow, we want them to stay."

Apart from Frog Hollow, there are many other aspects of Packer Park that residents can enjoy. It has more than two kilometres of all-weather pathways, an all-abilities playground and toilet facilities, picnic facilities, cricket practice nets, a velodrome, and a Birdie Cage golf practice facility.

Holiday respite fun

ocal children and teenagers with a disability have the opportunity to participate in a range of school holiday programs during April thanks to an innovative project called *Enhancing Vacation Care*.

The project, developed and facilitated by Joint Councils Access for All Abilities (JCAAA), is open to all people with disabilities aged 5 to 18 years old, who live or go to school in the cities of Glen Eira, Bayside, Port Phillip and Stonnington.

It aims to get young people with mild to moderate disabilities into mainstream holiday programs, where they can take part in fun and safe activities. It also provides respite for their parents and carers.

Council opens new golf cages

ocal golfers can now practise their golf much closer to home following Council's completion of four new Birdie Cage golf practice facilities in Glen Eira parks.

Council has installed the facilities in Centenary Park in Bentleigh East, EE Gunn Reserve in Ormond, McKinnon Reserve in McKinnon and Caulfield Park in Caulfield.


The four new facilities follow on from the success of the first Birdie Cage golf practice facility which opened at Packer Park, Carnegie in May 2002. The inaugural facility, believed to be the first of its kind in Australia, won the Civic Mutual Plus Award for Excellence in Risk Management and was also a finalist in the safety initiative category in the 2002 Sport and Recreation Industry Awards.

The Birdie Cage facility is similar to a cricket practice net, only totally enclosed. It has a pad to hit off from and a net to hit in to. The facility is available to all residents and is open during daylight hours each day. For safety reasons, only one person is allowed in the facility at any one time.

Council's Manager for Recreation and Youth Services Linda Smith said the new facilities meant that golfers could now practise their golf legally and safely at their local park.

"Golf is one of the most popular sports in Glen Eira, however it is not allowed in any of the City's parks due to the dangers it posers to other users. There is also a lack of public golf practice facilities close by," Ms Smith said.

"The aim of the Birdie Cage facility is to provide a safe alternative for people wishing to practise golf and a safe environment for people wishing to relax in the park. The facility also helps to reduce damage to park infrastructure."
