Let the games begin

As the countdown to the Melbourne 2006 Commonwealth Games begins, Council is making plans to celebrate.

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Margaret Esakoff began the City's official countdown by announcing the English athletics team would train at Duncan Mackinnon Reserve in the lead up to the games.

"I am thrilled to also announce that Glen Eira will adopt a second team as part of the games the Bahamas Commonwealth Games team," Cr Esakoff said.

Cr Esakoff said a number of community events had been planned by Council to help Glen Eirans celebrate — a family fun run and gala sports day at Caulfield Park in November and a Commonwealth celebration day in Packer Park in February.

"The celebration day will have a sporting theme and cultural activities in support of the Bahamas Commonwealth Games team."

"Residents will also have an added incentive to get into the sprit of the games when the Queen's baton relay travels through the City just two days before the games begin."

To help announce Glen Eira's games festivities, the Mayor, Minister for Commonwealth Games Justin Madden and Member for Oakleigh Ann Barker joined some traditional English beefeater guards to add a touch of Britain to Duncan Mackinnon Reserve.

Mr Madden said the English athletics team's plans to train in the City was a special treat for Glen Eira residents and would give them a sneak preview of some games action.

## Council wins national reporting award

Council's 2003–04 Annual Report received a Gold Award at the 2005 Australasian Reporting Awards (ARA) last month.

The awards promote excellence in reporting and are open to all corporations, public sector bodies, charitable and community organisations in Australia and New Zealand.

## Twenty years of tapping toes

The Caulfield Over 50's Dance Group celebrated a milestone birthday last month in their favourite way — with music and dance.

The group commemorated its twentieth anniversary at its regular meeting place, the Glen Eira Town Hall, where dancers were joined in celebration by Glen Eira Mayor Cr Margaret Esakoff.

"The group has maintained a social outlet for Glen Eira residents to get out there and enjoy life," Cr Esakoff said.

"We are so pleased that Council's beautiful Town Hall auditorium, built in the 1920s, has provided the perfect backdrop for the group's dances."

Formed in June 1985, after being inundated with requests for a regular dance group for older Glen Eira residents, the group now boasts attendances of 120 to 130 people each week.

Members perform old-time, new vogue, ballroom and sequence dancing to tunes from the 20s, 30s, 40s and 50s every Monday afternoon.

Club president Tony Bell said the weekly dance group gave members a chance to reminisce and enjoy music from their younger years.

"It's a chance to be social while exercising and having a good time," he said.

Tony said the club has continued for so long because of the tireless efforts of the members who volunteer their time to organising the weekly meetings.

"We have people doing a lot of different things from organising music to setting up the dance area and preparing afternoon tea," he said.

"They have all taken the initiative to do these tasks themselves — they just step in and get the job done. Without them we wouldn't be able to run the weekly dances."

## Community centre nears completion

Council's Carnegie Library and Community centre is progressing with the building structure complete and work beginning to take shape on outdoor areas.

The \$10.4 million centre will include a library, community meeting and function rooms, a playground and multi-purpose building, and an open space area that will link to the vibrant Koornang Road shopping strip by a landscaped pedestrian walk.

Council's Director Community Services Peter Jones said the outdoor playground's innovative design would complement the centre's urban setting and act as a link between the new library and community centre.

"The playground is built around a bookworm theme, taking inspiration from Council's library mascot, Eira, and contains community-focused elements such as a mural wall," Mr Jones said.

"The playground has climbing equipment that fosters children's co-ordination and physical development while still including more imaginative elements for them to play with."

Floor tiling, light-fitting, plumbing installation and shelving is underway in both the library and community centre.

Mr Jones said while the fit-out of the library may take some time, the end result would be well worth it.

"We have 50,000 books and other items that need to be housed and displayed. We also need to install

computers and purchase furniture to provide library visitors with a comfortable environment in which they can read, study, research and relax," he said.

"The completed library will also include special furnishings for the children's area, along with a room for parents to feed and change babies, making the area user-friendly for everyone in the community".

"There is also a space in the library dedicated for library programs and events such as workshops, writers' evenings and holiday programs."

Council's Manager Park Services Laurie Unwin said the planting took place twice a year, both in the autumn–winter season and again in the spring–summer season with 60,000 seedlings planted in Glen Eira parks.

"Flowering displays are not only appreciated by residents and park users, but also the thousands of commuters who travel through Glen Eira each day," Mr Unwin said.

"Many residents live in units or flats where they have little room for a garden of their own. Glen Eira's parks and annual displays give them the opportunity to enjoy some colour and space or relax and wind down after a hard week."

Mr Unwin said planning and preparation began well before the first seedling touched the ground.

# Pedestrian safety stepped up

Pedestrian safety in and around Bentleigh West Primary School will be upgraded due to recommendations from a recent independent safety audit.

Manager Traffic and Parking Carl Russo said the audit, initiated by Council, highlighted areas of improvement to pedestrian safety on roads around the school.

"Council will reduce the width of the road by installing kerb outstands on both sides of the school crossing leaving less unprotected road for children to cross. This aims to encourage lower vehicle speeds and school crossing flags can be brought further out into the road, making them more visible to approaching motorists," Mr Russo said.

"Additional pedestrian warning signs will be installed on the approaches to the crossing."

"We will also review on-street parking to improve access to and from the school car park and install no stopping restrictions to the west of the car park driveway to improve sightlines."

"We have encouraged the school to consider what actions can be taken to discourage inappropriate driving by parents."

Mr Russo said Council will be working closely with the school to implement changes and improve safety in and around the area.

seedlings required are available," he said.

"The process also involves weeding, spraying, and adding compost and organic fertilisers. Removing and spraying weeds before planting enables the seedlings to thrive and creates a uniform effect."

Mr Unwin said beds were inspected regularly and frequent repairs were required due to vandalism and theft.

"Planting displays are only undertaken in selected areas to provide variety in the overall park presentation."

Council has already started planning for the spring-summer display and planting is scheduled to start in October.

"Some motorists fall into dangerous habits such as stopping too close to or on school crossings to drop off their children, ignoring school crossing supervisors, driving through crossings and parking in time-limited bays for longer than the set period — all of which endanger the lives of pedestrians," he said.

"Council is committed to improving road safety but community responsibility is also an essential part of a safe traffic environment. There will be no tolerance for motorists who put the community's safety at risk."

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# Heritage advice on hand

"Owners of heritage homes or homes in heritage areas are subjected to stricter controls. My job is to help people understand that heritage controls maintain the character of these special areas." Jacqui Brasher.

Changing or improving a house can be a challenge at the best of times — even more so if a home is located in a heritage area.

But help is only a phone call away. Council's Heritage Strategic Planner Jacqui Brasher answers queries about heritage controls and the impact they may have on home improvements.

Jacqui is part of a team, which includes a heritage architect, which gives property owners advice on altering, extending or demolishing a heritage property before they apply for a planning permit.

"We provide advice, for people planning external building works, on how to maintain the property's heritage features. We look at everything from the type of fence suited for a Californian bungalow to how to site a double-story extension on an Edwardian home," Jacqui said.

Jacqui is also responsible for writing heritage

### guidelines that shape the look of alterations and additions to the more than 2,000 heritage properties in Glen Eira.

"A significant part of my role is to write and update guidelines specific to each heritage area, whether the area is dominated by an Inter-war or Edwardian buildings. Each area has its own unique character.

Council's Heritage Advisory Service offers architectural and technical advice free to all Glen Eira property owners and can help with everything from major extensions to the colour or style of a fence.

## Council wins fight for fairer funding

**R**atepayers will receive fairer immunisation funding from State and Federal Governments following extensive lobbying from Council.

The State Government recently confirmed funding increases for immunisation administered by local



government — from \$6 to \$11 per immunisation for children aged 0–6 years and from \$2 and \$3 to \$8 for school-aged children.

Chief Executive Officer Andrew Newton said Council had lobbied for fairer inter-governmental financial arrangements, having more services paid by taxes rather than rates.

"Council has played a significant role in a recent local government immunisation costing study conducted by the Municipal Association of Victoria (MAV). The study analysed immunisation service costs across 12 councils, including Glen Eira, and funding levels provided by State and Federal Governments," Mr Newton said.

"The study revealed local authorities contributed between 61 per cent and 83 per cent of the overall costs of delivering immunisation services to children.

"The announcement is a significant win for Glen Eira ratepayers, effectively doubling funding levels. This means an average increase of \$30,000 per annum which eases the burden on local rates to meet non-local costs." Mr Newton said while general practitioners can receive up to \$68.70 in government payments for each child immunised, Council previously received a maximum of only \$6, despite a cost to Council of \$13.50 to deliver each vaccination.

## Plans for healthy Glen Eira

Council will be better equipped to deal with community public health issues after a recent consultation forum with local health agencies.

The forum, involving representatives from community health services, local hospitals, the Department of Human Services, the International Diabetes Institute and Arthritis Victoria, sought input into the *Glen Eira Municipal Public Health Plan 2005–08*.

Council's Manager Public Health Mark Saunders said the forum helped identify community health and wellbeing needs and issues and develop strategies to address them.

"The resulting plan assesses actual and potential community public health issues and outlines programs and strategies to prevent or minimise them," Mr Saunders said.

"Council will use the plan to work further with key health agencies and establish clear service planning and priorities for the next three years."

Under the provisions of the *Health Act 1958*, all Victorian local governments must prepare a plan every three years which must be reviewed annually and amended accordingly.

Mr Saunders said input from local health agencies was important to achieve better health and

wellbeing outcomes for the community.

"Council and community organisations in Glen Eira provide a significant number of health services and health promotion programs. Municipal public health planning plays an important role in ensuring a co-ordinated approach to identify local health needs, establishing clear priorities and appropriate action."

The *Glen Eira Municipal Public Health Plan* 2005–08 is scheduled to be completed by the end of August this year.

"The proposed immunisation funding still does not meet Council's cost to deliver each vaccination, falling well below the \$68.70 that some general practitioners receive. It is good to see the government giving GPs incentive to ensure children are immunised, we would like a similar level of support for councils."

# A helping hand — support and care from Council's community care services

Trail older people and people with disabilities can **C** continue to live independently in their own homes for longer with support from Council.

Through a range of in-home community-based services, Council aims to prevent inappropriate or premature admission to long-term residential care or acute care so older residents can continue to live in their own community.

## **Community care** services

- Assessment and review on referral, a team member assesses individual needs and care co-ordination.
- Home care carers assist with general housekeeping and daily living tasks.
- Personal care carers assist with personal hygiene, meals preparation and general monitoring.
- Respite care provides primary care-givers (parents, relatives) of children and adults with disabilities with a break from their caring role.
- Social support service (adult day activity) provides opportunities for friendship and social activities in a supportive environment and out of home respite for primary care-givers.
- Property maintenance assistance with minor repairs and modifications in the home.
- Community transport service provides transport to enable residents to attend community activities and facilities.
- Senior citizens centres provides opportunity for social and recreational activity through the provision of meeting spaces and facilities.
- Delivered meals service provides home-delivered hot and chilled meals seven days a week.

Services include home care, personal care, respite care, property maintenance, delivered meals, social support, community transport and senior citizens centres.

Council's Manager Community Care Michelle Marr said the services provided by Council make a real difference to the lives of both the recipients and their carers.

"The care provided is tailored to meet residents' needs and a professional and committed team ensures a quality service so we can produce the best outcome for each individual,' Ms Marr said.

"Council offers a wide range of services, but it is the people behind the care who really make the difference.

"For many carers and team members, the relationships developed with clients over the years of service have proven more rewarding than any job description could suggest."

Council's Community Care Services Assessment Officer Judy Hagerty believes Council's holistic approach to home and community care works best for clients.

"When we meet potential clients, we try to get to know them and understand their needs - physical, medical

and social. Some are fiercely independent, others really expect and rely on the services we can provide," Ms Hagerty said.

"We work to the best of our ability to give people the support they need as often as we can, it's really rewarding. The service is beneficial to clients, and rewarding relationships are built between carers, clients and often their families too."

Potential clients may be referred to the service by themselves, family members, or other agencies who recognise their need for additional support to maintain independence.

Assessment officers can recommend home or personal care and home-based respite for families of people with disabilities.

Complementing these in-home services is Council's social support service, providing social and recreational programs at a centre in Carnegie, to support clients and provide respite to primary carers.

Program officers are trained in nursing or aged care, but bring a range of skills from woodworking, rehabilitation and horticulture to cooking, crafts and even poetry to the service.

As a result, the facility not only provides for the social and mental wellbeing of participants, but ensures their ongoing physical needs are met through strength training and other programs.

The program operates five days a week from Council's newly refurbished Delivered Meals and Social Support Centre in Leila Road, Carnegie.

## Property maintenance team helps out hanging tap washers, light globes and fire detector

batteries and installing handrails are all in a day's work for Council's property maintenance team.

"People can, and do, rely on us," said Property Maintenance Officer Lindsay Robinson.

Lorna Grace.

"We take care of things people can't, or shouldn't, do themselves."

The team considers itself very safety-oriented, but

while the work can vary and provide problem-solving challenges, including one request for installing a "new kettle in the roof" (a hot water system), the job is so much more than keeping pensioners off ladders.

"Staff really like their work and gain a lot of personal satisfaction from a job well done and the friendships and understanding they have with their clients," said Mr Robinson.

"It's great to have someone to rely on, Lindsay has helped with everything around the house," Mrs Grace said.

The property maintenance team comprises five staff members who assist clients with minor maintenance and home modifications to maintain a safe and secure home environment.

In her eight years of working with Council, Tina has helped a number of clients remain independent in their homes. Tina helps elderly and disabled clients with everyday tasks that able-bodied people take for granted such as cleaning, meal preparation, showering and dressing and shopping.

len Eira's delivered meals service delivers more G than 112,000 meals to clients each year through the commitment and skill of eight staff and 160 volunteers.

Recipients are assessed for the service and can receive a range of hot and chilled meals, including special dietary requirements such as diabetes, low cholesterol, low sodium, and vegetarian options.

Delivered Meals Co-ordinator Stefanie Vranas said the service, operating seven days a week and 364 days a year, is much more than a food service.

"Clients not only receive their meals but their health and wellbeing is monitored by staff and volunteers. We have experienced many circumstances where a client has been in need of help after an overnight fall and it has been a delivered meals staff member or volunteer who has heard their calls for help and arranged assistance," Ms Vranas said.

Ms Vranas said the service relied heavily on its volunteers, some of whom had been delivering meals for 20 years.

"Our volunteers are very special people. They are very dedicated — just like the postman, they are out there rain hail or shine. But, of course, we are always looking for more people to become volunteers."

Husband and wife team, Margaret and Lloyd Morris have volunteered with the delivered meals service for more than five years and love every minute of it.

"When we retired, we wanted to do something that would benefit the community," Margaret said.

"But it's not just about delivering meals, we also keep an eye on the clients as we are sometimes the only visitors they have. We monitor how they are going and report back to base (Council)."

"Delivering meals to our clients and helping to keep them in their homes, living independently is so rewarding for us."

## Help a phone call away for local businesses

**F**or Kerry Lucas, owner of Flamingo Swimwear, managing the financial side of her business is now far less daunting.

Kerry is one of 85 business owners who have taken part in Council's *Mentor Partners* program which links small business operators with mentors to provide guidance and independent opinions.

Since teaming up with business mentor Jack Mitchell in July 2003, Kerry has seen some great improvements in the way she manages her business.

"Having a mentor means I have someone to talk to about things that arise in the business. Sometimes you can feel isolated and alone, but there are actually people out there who are willing and able to help," Kerry said.

# Mentors get their heads together

A recent brainstorming session brought together volunteer mentors and Glen Eira and Kingston City Council staff to look at opportunities to further improve Council's *Mentor Partners* program.

Mentors shared their experiences on working with local businesses and spoke about the challenges faced by small businesses and their different needs, depending on the nature of the business.

Council's Manager Business Development Lynda Bredin said the feedback session provided Council with some valuable information to further develop and improve the program.

"The open forum was a chance for current mentors to meet with Council staff from Glen Eira and Kingston to flesh out ideas, raise concerns, and discuss how they see the program working to date and in the future.

"We discussed the type of assistance businesses are seeking, the categories of business, industry needs and thoughts on survival, lifestyle and growth, and the businesses and mentors' expected outcomes of the program."

"It was a really worthwhile session, giving us valuable information to continually improve for the program," she said.



"Working with Jack has really helped me to have a better understanding about the business side of things. We have worked together on profit and loss statements, marketing projects and stock control."

Jack has been a mentor with the program since it began in 2002 and has helped four other small business owners like Kerry to run their businesses better.

"Kerry has been an absolute

delight to work with. We have worked together to analyse the processes of her existing business to see what is and isn't working," Jack said.

"I'm convinced she now has a better understanding of what she needs to do to be more profitable.

"Small businesses sometimes need advice about accounting, IT or other business matters and it is not always feasible or cost effective to see an accountant or IT specialist. The mentoring program can be of great benefit to businesses."
