Help stamp out unsightly illegal rubbish dumping

There has been a large increase in illegal rubbish dumping over the past six months.

Large quantities of rubbish have been dumped in quiet dead end streets, entrances to laneways and Council car parks.

To make matters worse, once the rubbish has been dumped it appears that other unknown people add more rubbish to the pile.

Council's Works Manager Roger Dunn said that rubbish dumping shows a blatant disregard for Glen

Eira's beautiful leafy environment and considerably stretches Council resources.

"Illegal rubbish dumping spoils Glen Eira's appearance," said Mr Dunn.

"There is no need for people to dump rubbish. Council offers residents a weekly waste collection service, a fortnightly recycling collection service as well as the opportunity for residents to book hard rubbish collection throughout the year.

"Residents can phone Council's Service Centre and find out when the next monthly hard rubbish collection is and register their address and the type of items they need collected.

"People who choose not to take this step and illegally dump rubbish significantly stretch Council's resources, especially when it involves commercial quantities," said Mr Dunn

Council would like to take action against those responsible and asks residents for assistance.

If residents see illegal dumping taking place, please take note of the vehicle registration number, the exact location, time and date, and then report the incident by phoning Council's Service Centre on 9524 3333.

Recycling in the City

B y now, you should be using your new green 240 litre wheelie bin with the yellow lid for collection of recyclables.



Recycling collection is now fortnightly — use the calendar located within the information kit *Recycling in the City* to ensure that you place your bin out for collection on the correct day.

Recycling bins will not be collected if they contain non-recyclable materials.

The information kit and the label on the underside of the bin lid detail what can and cannot be placed in the recycling bin. recycle smaller paper and cardboard items without causing windblown litter.

You are welcome to keep the old crates. They can be used for gardening, planting or storage. If you want them taken away, just ring Council's Service Centre to have them picked up.

MAYOR'S Pools open for summer

fter calling for community A input to help decide the future of Glen Eira's two public swimming pools, Council will open both the East Boundary Road and Koornang Road swim centres for the coming summer season.

Glen Eira Mayor Cr David Feldman said the decision to open the pools for the summer season was a positive step forward.

"The details of redevelopment will be decided after phase two of the consultation period this winter. The time needed for design and project management requirements mean that redevelopment will not start this summer.

"In the meantime we're pleased to be able to make both of the pools available for community use over the summer," Cr Feldman said.

"Council will undertake works to minimise water loss as far as practical

What consultation involves

Council's pools consultation strategy comes as a result of long standing issues relating to the condition of the City's two public swimming pools. The pools are structurally, financially and environmentally unsustainable.

Phase one of the pools consultation strategy involved four public forums to discuss the future of Glen Eira's pools. The process drew out community views, needs and priorities.

"The water slides are beyond repair

and will not operate this summer; replacements will be considered in the redevelopment phase," Cr Feldman said.

Phase two is currently underway — Council is short-listing the proposed options and working out details and costs for further public comment.

The expertise and commitment of Council staff members directly affects the quality of life in our City — the park services staff who check the safety of every playground in the morning; the team who converted a former bowls club house to a wonderful new headquarters for meals on wheels and adult day care; the crews who repair 25km of footpaths each year make an enormous day-to-day difference to our lives.

Australia faces an acute skills shortage. Nurses, town planners, engineers, accountants, child care workers, public health workers and many other categories of staff are in demand. The quality of life in the City is influenced by our ability to attract and keep good people working with us. Losing staff members disrupts services, loses knowledge and incurs costs in filling the position.

In many cases the experience and expertise of staff allows them to provide service at the highest standard. Recently our Maternal and Child Health nurses detected a hip displacement in an eight week old baby. The early detection allowed prompt treatment and will help to achieve a better outcome. The baby's mother was kind enough to go out of her way to thank these nurses.

Staff members help us to deliver the best possible services to our community. Whilst we face a skills shortage in many key areas of Council's services, the challenge will be to attract people into these areas of study and work to ensure that the community continues to receive high

After experiencing traumatic time in her own life, and realising that there was little support for others within the community who were dealing with grief, Annette joined *Grief Line* and has not looked back.

Annette's dedication to volunteering was acknowledged in May at Council's *Volunteer Recognition* ceremony, where she was recognised for 10 or more continuous years of service to the Glen Eira community.

Changes to planning permit system

Recent changes to Victoria's planning permit system by the State Government do not remove existing requirements for obtaining building permits.

Under the new system, home owners may still require a building permit for home improvement projects including decks, pergolas, sheds and swimming pools.

Glen Eira City Council delivers hundreds of varied services to its 124,000 residents every day. The work of Council is a 24-hour operation, with many services performed outside normal business hours to fulfil the community's needs or minimise disruption. Starting at daybreak, and ending 24 hours later, here is a comprehensive look at the front-of-house and behind-the-scenes services that are provided by Council.

6am

 Council's waste collection trucks arrive in Glen Eira at the crack of dawn. The eight garbage collection trucks, six recycling trucks and one green waste truck start emptying more than 10,000 garbage bins, 16,900 recycling crates and 750 green waste bins. By the end of the day 150 tonnes of garbage, 37 tonnes of recyclables and 8 tonnes of green waste has been removed from the City.

• The delivered meals despatch officer arrives at work and starts packing meals into eskies to prepare for the days deliveries.

6.30am

- Council's drainage crew begins routine maintenance for the day on Glen Eira's 16,000 stormwater pits and pipes to stop blockages. The drainage team will clean about 70 pits before 3.15pm today.
- The asphalt crew begins repairing roads and footpaths. The crew will have repaired about 46 square metres of pavement by the end of the day.
- In-home support workers arrive at client's homes to assist with personal care needs such as showering and dressing. More than 22,000 hours of personal care are provided every year.

- The two concrete crews begin their day's work to replace about 79 metres of old and damaged footpaths.
 - Parents begin to drop off their children at one of Council's 32 family day care providers.

7.15am

 Inspections, maintenance and repairs begin on park seats, tables, barbecues, shelters, pathways, fences and lighting within Glen Eira's 163 hectares of parks and reserves.

 Litter is collected and lawns mowed at Glen Eira's 52 sportsgrounds.

• Council's horticultural specialists care for the annual and perennial flower beds and shopping centre landscapes.

7.30am

- At Council's three residential aged care facilities — Rosstown, Spurway and Warrawee — overnight staff prepare to leave by handing over to the morning shift of nurses, care and support staff.
- Council's children's centres open their doors to care for 160 children aged 0–5 years.

8am

• Council's Service Centre opens its doors, ready to help more than 1,000 people who will visit the front counter or phone today. Phone calls are answered in an average of seven seconds and operators

8.30am

- Council's property maintenance workers arrive at the home of older residents or residents with a disability to change light globes, install rails and ramps and undertake other maintenance tasks.
- In-home support workers start to arrive at the home of their first client to assist with household tasks, shopping and errands. More than 63,000 hours of care are provided each year.
- Council's four community buses are picked up by groups who have booked them for their activities.
 - Maternal and child health nurses begin work and will support 550 new families this week.
 - Town planning support officers begin their day responding to customer enquiries. The statutory planning department assess

approximately 1000 applications, receives 20,000 phone calls and 8000 counter enquiries per year.

- More than 350 residents who have pre-booked into Council's hard rubbish collection service will leave hard rubbish on the nature strip to be collected.
- Street sweepers start cleaning 46 kilometres of the 470 kilometres of local streets.

- A courier moves more than 1,500 new and returned items between Glen Eira's four libraries.

Council's eight MCH centres are located in Bentleigh, East Bentleigh, Moorleigh, Elsternwick, Glen Huntly, Caulfield, Murrumbeena and McKinnon.

The MCH centres operate Monday to Friday, with additional evening and Saturday morning consultations offered for working parents.

Доставка новых контейнеров для сбора отходов на утилизацию

К концу июня во все дома и квартиры в муниципалитете Glen Eira будут доставлены новые контейнеры для сбора отходов на утилизацию. Новые, зеленые контейнеры на колесах емкостью 240 литров заменяют старые ящики для сбора отходов.

На желтой крышке нового контейнера вы найдете специальную брошюру — *Recycling in the City*. В ней рассказывается, что можно, и что нельзя класть в новый контейнер, а также приложен специальный календарь, в котором указано, в какие недели будет происходить сбора отходов на утилизацию на вашей улице.

Это будет теперь происходить раз в две недели. Если при этом изменится день недели, то это будет указано отдельно. Сбор обычных бытовых отходов по прежнему будет происходить еженедельно. Сбор садовых (растительных) отходов по прежнему будет происходить раз в две недели: одну неделю сбор садовых отходов, другую неделю сбор отходов на утилизацию из новых контейнеров.

Вечером, накануне дня сбора отходов на вашей улице, вам нужно будет выкатить свой контейнер для сбора отходов на утилизацию и поставить его возле дороги, рядом с контейнером для сбора обычных бытовых отходов. Между контейнерами должно быть расстояние примерно полметра.

При этой новой системе вам не нужно будет разделять различные виды отходов для утилизации – это будет теперь делаться автоматически на предприятиях, занимающихся переработкой отходов.

Вы также сможете утилизировать дополнительные виды пластмассы. На внутренней стороне крышки нового контейнера указано, что в него можно класть.

Старые ящики для сбора отходов вы можете оставить себе или, если они вам не нужны, позвонить в муниципалитет, чтобы их забрали.

Информация по поводу сбора садовых (растительных) отходов, сбора ненужных вещей и уборки улиц приведена в специальной брошюре.
