Council improves children's access to key age and stage visits

len Eira City Council's Maternal and Child Health Service will be implementing a number of initiatives in 2007 to improve access and attendance of children to key age and stage visits.

The initiatives, which are part of Council's Municipal Early Years Plan 2006–09, include offering key age and stage visits to local child care centres, kindergartens and the Caulfield Community Health Service.

International research has provided evidence that the first six years of a child's life are vital and directly influence wellbeing later in life.

Council Maternal and Child Health Co-ordinating Nurse Ruth Hennell said during the initial visits at two weeks, four weeks, eight weeks, four months, eight months and 12 months there are a 90–99 per cent participation rate.

"However, we have found that due to a number of reasons children attending visits at 18 months, two years and three and a half years has reduced," Ms Hennell said.

"Many families have busy lifestyles, particularly if both parents work, and this can make it difficult for them to access the service during business hours.

"By implementing these initiatives, not only will this give every child access to this free service during the day, but it will allow early identification of any health and development issues."

Council's service, following the early detection of a sight problem in their daughter, Sasha.

Mark told the GE News it was during Sasha's three-and-a-half year old assessment that the nurse identified a potential problem with her left eye.

"The nurse recommended that we take Sasha to see an opthomologist, which resulted in us finding out that Sasha is long sighted," Mark said.

Mark said Sasha's condition is reversible and she will now be wearing glasses for a period of time.

"It is good that we caught the problem early as the reversal time will be a lot quicker," Mark said.

Key age and stage visits

During the key age and stage visits, which includes an assessment at the child's home following their discharge from hospital, the nurse assesses the health and development of the child, which includes:

- a general health assessment this may include heart, lungs, hip stability, vision and hearing;
- growth, including head circumference, length and weight. This information is then plotted on a percentile chart;
- fine motor skills;
- gross motor skills, including crawling and walking;
- speech and language development; and
- advice about breast feeding and sleep and settling issues.

Monique told the *GE News* that having your child assessed is invaluable for peace of mind.

"Not only do you know where your child should be at a particular age, but the nurse gives you heads up on what to expect in the coming weeks, for example when your baby should smile for the first time," Monique said.

Monique has also taken advantage of Council's open clinic, which is open every Wednesday.

"This is an excellent service for first-time mums as they are able to answer any questions you may have," Monique said.

Glen Eira City Council held its first Australian citizenship ceremony for 2007 at the Town Hall in February.

One hundred and thirty nine men, women and children can now call Australia home after making their Australian citizenship pledge in front of family and friends.

It is a great honour to be the Presiding Officer for Council's citizenship ceremonies, with the second of probably eight in total for the year to take place this month.

Around 40,000 of our 120,000 residents in the City of Glen Eira were born overseas. Our country and our City are the wonderful places that they are today, partly because of the contributions made by the diverse migrant groups and we are grateful.

After extensive community consultation, the implementation of the exciting Joyce Park Masterplan is underway. The works at Joyce Park in Ormond will see a much improved, safer and more accessible passive recreational park for the use of Glen Eira's residents.

A new all abilities playground at Joyce Park has already been installed and is now open for public use. The landscaping and other works are expected to be completed by the middle of this year. The landscaping alone will include the planting of over a hundred trees, more than a thousand shrubs and several thousand smaller plants.

Joyce Park is just one of the many parks within the City to be redeveloped over the last few years. Bentleigh Hodgson Reserve in Bentleigh, Princes Park in Caulfield South and Packer Park in Carnegie have also been redeveloped as part of Council's *Open Space Strategy* to upgrade both active recreational parks and passive recreational parks within the City. Since the upgrades, passive park use has increased enormously and it is fantastic to see people of all ages and abilities getting out there and enjoying these improved facilities.

"My main role is to do minor repairs and modifications in the home with the aim of creating a safe, secure and healthy living environment for clients," he said.

Kuni's extensive property maintenance skills allow him to assist clients with a variety of situations.

"The jobs I perform vary from week to week. At times I find there will be a flood of requests to install handrails and mobility aids. The following week I am changing tap washers, freeing up hard-to-turn taps or replacing light bulbs or smoke detector batteries," he said.

Can the Can, Graffiti is a Crime

len Eira primary school students will soon be receiving a visit from the boys in blue, but not for the reasons you may think.

As part of a Glen Eira Anti-Graffiti Initiative, Glen Eira City Council has produced 10,000 anti-graffiti stickers, which will be distributed by Caulfield Police to Grade five and six students.

The sticker, Can the Can — Graffiti is a Crime, was designed by former Coatesville Primary School student, Leah Meredith, who was one of 400 students involved in the initiative in 2006.

Council's Community Safety Committee Chairperson Cr Nick Staikos said it is hoped the initiative will assist in educating students on what graffiti is, inform them of the consequences and discourage their involvement in the first place.

"Ultimately, it is hoped to give them the confidence to not get involved and deter others," Cr Staikos said.

Inspector Margaret Lewis from Caulfield Police said the initiative was formed after it was identified that some of the young offenders, who were being caught by their undercover Graffiti Tasking Unit,

started dabbling in graffiti in their late primary school years

"As a result we came up with the idea to have a proactive approach to compliment the Tasking Unit's reactive approach to graffiti in Glen Eira," Inspector Lewis said.

The initiative comprises three parts:

- a 40-minute lesson plan on the definition of graffiti, the law, how it effects the community, how it effects the offender's future and what to do if students see or know of someone that is involved in graffiti;
- a poster competition where the students make up a slogan and/or picture and display it on a poster to deter young people from becoming involved in graffiti; and
- the winning poster, which will be displayed at the Glen Eira Street Beat Festival, is then made into a sticker. This sticker is distributed to Grade five and six Glen Eira primary school students at the beginning of the new school year.

The initiative will run again in 2007 and interested schools are encouraged to contact Caulfield Police on 9524 9508 if they would like to participate.

Stage three water restrictions

Glen Eira residents are reminded garden watering is restricted to two set days a week, depending on whether you live at an odd or even numbered property.

A bucket, filled with water directly from a tap, can be used to wash car windows, mirrors and lights and for spot removing corrosive substances.

Existing pools and spas of less than 2,000 litres may be filled by the use of a watering can or bucket filled directly from a tap. Existing pools and spas greater than 2,000 litres can be filled in accordance with a water

conservation plan.

Use collected shower water immediately

Water users are encouraged to use any water collected in buckets from the shower immediately.

The call follows the release of a National Red Alert by Kidsafe Victoria over the high level of drowning risk to toddlers in homes storing water in buckets.

Kidsafe Victoria President Dr Mark Stokes said parents need to be alerted to the drowning dangers of storing water.

"Each bucket represents a potential drowning situation or near drowning which can leave children with severe brain damage," Dr Stokes said.

"Isolate the buckets of water from your children or empty them immediately is our clear and simple life saving message."

nder State legislation all cats and dogs over the age of three months must be registered.

Glen Eira City Council Manager Civic Compliance John Bordignon said that registering your four-legged friend will not only save the owner a lot of heartache and a possible fine of up to \$210, but it will assist Council in finding the animal's owner as soon as possible should their pet be found wandering.

Mr Bordignon said the current maximum registration fee for dogs

Safe Food Guide

Glen Eira City Council's annual Safe Food Guide recognises the achievements of local food businesses within the City that demonstrated excellent food safety standards when assessed by Council's **Environmental Health Officers.**

All of the food businesses listed in the Guide (206) achieved a five-star food safety rating in 2006. The guide also lists 66 businesses that achieved a Taste 4 Health Award. Council launched the Taste 4 Health Kids and Access 4 All programs in 2006 with 12 and 30 businesses respectively receiving these

is \$109 and \$70 for cats, however, substantially reduced fees are offered.

"Reduced fees apply for pets that are sterilised, microchipped, are more than 10 years old, have had obedience training, are kept for work stock or breeding purposes or are registered with the Victorian Canine Authority or Feline Control Council," he said.

"Pensioners who have a valid concession or health care card are also entitled to a discount."

When you register your pet for the first time you will be given a book of vouchers worth \$40 to popular attractions and discounts to a wide range of services.

Mr Bordignon said a State Government levy of \$2.50 for dogs and \$1 for cats is included in the fee.

"This levy is primarily used to fund responsible pet ownership education programs," he said.

For existing registered pet owners, renewal notices for 2007-08 will be sent to households this month. A new registration tag and a Certificate of Registration will be issued, however payment must be received by the 10 April 2007 to ensure that your pet is re-registered.

Change your clock, change your smoke alarm battery

with the end of daylight savings near and the winter months creeping upon us, now is the time for Glen Eira residents to change their smoke alarm batteries.

According to Metropolitan Fire Brigade (MFB) records, since 1992 around 714 lives have been saved as a direct result of a working smoke alarm.

Therefore, the MFB offer the following helpful tips to residents to keep them and their families safe.

Testing and maintaining

Testing and maintaining your smoke alarm is simple and the MFB recommends that residents:

- test smoke alarms each week by pressing the test button with a broom handle;
- vacuum the alarms monthly to clean the vents;
- change your battery at the end of daylight savings to ensure correct operation. This not only applies to your home of residence, but also your holiday home or caravan; and
- think of others who may need assistance in testing and maintaining their smoke alarms, particularly the elderly who may struggle to get up a ladder.

Installing smoke alarms

Smoke alarms should be installed outside each sleeping area. Additionally, if a person sleeps with their bedroom door shut, an alarm should also be placed inside the room.

Smoke alarms for the hearing impaired

There are special types of smoke alarms

available for people who are hearing impaired. Some have a flashing strobe light and/or a vibrating pad that can be placed under the pillow, and these activate when the alarm sounds.

Managing the effects of drought

Glen Eira City Council has a number of initiatives in place to help manage the effects of drought.

Council's Manager Park Services Laurie Unwin explains what is being done.

Street and park trees

Under current Stage three water restrictions, potable water normally utilised by our tree watering trucks from hydrants cannot be used to irrigate trees. Council is currently using the Caulfield Park bore to water around 4,000 young and mature trees that are at risk.

To ensure trees within the City of Glen Eira have enough moisture, mulch is being placed around young trees and other mature and significant trees.

Council is also investigating whether the two bores within Lords and Bailey Reserves may be suitable for tree watering requirements.

Residents are encouraged to assist with watering their recently planted naturestrip tree by collecting their excess shower water in a bucket and applying to the tree.

Garden beds

Council is using hand held hoses with trigger nozzles to water a very limited number of garden beds where watering is essential and only on the days and times that South East Water has permitted us to water.

Garden beds are also heavily mulched to assist the plants during the dry conditions

Sportsgrounds

Council is restricted to irrigating only 13 of our 45 sportsgrounds, and only for limited times and days.

The 13 grounds granted exemptions for limited watering by South East Water were identified to:

- protect the recent considerable investment on the grounds to convert the surfaces to drought tolerant grasses;
- grounds that have sub-district cricket status.

Council is inspecting the grounds regularly to check the surface hardness conditions and results are posted at www.gleneira.vic.gov.au to assist clubs in deciding whether conditions are suitable for their play.

The drought impact on Glen Eira's sportsgrounds has limited their capacity to accommodate winter season sports. Restrictions to sportsgrounds will impact on school bookings, casual bookings and special events, pre-season training and the 2007 winter sports season.

Council will be undertaking seeding works on the sportsgrounds to encourage grass cover, but these works cannot commence until there is sufficient rainfall to thoroughly moisten the grounds, after which Council will be forced to rely on natural rainfall to keep the grass thriving.

Options have also been investigated for the use of bore, recycled and tank water, but due to the significant volumes of water required to irrigate Glen Eira's ovals these are not presently viable alternatives for irrigating sportsgrounds.

Ms Bredin said businesses based in the Cities of Glen Eira or Kingston which have been in operation for 12 months, or are not a franchise operation are eligible to seek mentoring assistance through the Mentor Partners program.

"Business operating under partnerships must have a commitment sign-off from all partners and must demonstrate a level of commitment and availability," Ms Bredin said.

Due to high demand and limited mentor resources the program is now available in two intakes per annum — April and October. All businesses are eligible to participate for an initial six month period, however an application for an extension of time can be submitted for consideration.



TRAINING OPENS MANY DOORS

On the job training has opened many doors for Personal Carer Gisela.

When Gisela first commenced employment with Glen Eira City Council in August 2004, she initially worked as a Home Carer.

However, in-house training provided by Council has given Gisela the opportunity to complete her Home and Community Care (HACC) Certificate III in Aged Care, allowing her to undertake a career in personal care.

Personal Care services are provided to assist older people and people with disabilities with the personal tasks they would usually do for themselves but, because of illness, disability or frailty, are unable to manage on their own

Gisela is seeing between 32 and 34 clients a fortnight, assisting them with showering, grooming, shopping, making breakfast and taking them to medical appointments.

"I find Personal Care not only satisfying and rewarding, but it gives me a sense of belonging to the community," Gisela said.

"I admire the clients I look after and I value their life experiences."

Currently, Gisela is furthering her training by undertaking the HACC Certificate IV in Aged Care, which is being provided by Council to a group of 12 Community Care staff.

"Council provides many opportunities for staff, which allows us to grow in our roles," Gisela said.

"These types of courses not only allow you to improve your skills, but they open the door to so many other job opportunities."

REWARDING EXPERIENCE

The service aims to assist frail older people and people with disabilities to undertake duties where illness, frailty or a disability prevents them from doing the range of household tasks themselves.

"Being a Home Carer is very rewarding and does not feel like work to me," Sharlene said.

Priscilla said one of the best things about her job is putting a smile on a child's face.

"I love everything about my job. Children are so innocent and humble and when I put a smile on their face, I know I have made a difference," Priscilla said.

"Respite Care is not only fulfilling, rewarding and challenging, but it sets you up for fantastic job prospects in the future."



Exhibition of Glen Eira artists

Public Space/Private Life is an exhibition of vibrant and diverse work from artists who live, work or study in the City of Glen Eira.

The exhibition will feature the work of Marc Alperstein and Amélie Scalercio, Ruth Carrol, Marian Crawford, Luke Doyle, Storm Gold, Jennifer Gray, Stephanie Hicks, Karyn Lindner, Naomi Pitts, Yael Rayman and Georgia Szmerling.

The exhibition will showcase a wide range of approaches and media, from an unpredictable collaborative performance presented on video to contemporary, large-scale watercolours drawing from longstanding traditions of portraiture. Artists capturing the moodier side of our suburbs at night contrast with abstract paintings reminiscent of shimmering fields of flowers.

While the scope of the exhibition is broad, strands linking each artists' work

give viewers a path to follow through these series of works.

Marc Alperstein and Amélie Scalercio have been working collaboratively since 2003 after they met as students at Monash University Caulfield. They have exhibited extensively throughout Australia on numerous projects and utilise a range of mediums including drawing and video to highlight the performative aspects of their practice.

Their particular brand of collaboration emphasises the lack of control each artist may have over the finished form the work takes. The struggle between the two of them to gain control of a drawn mark, or to one-up each other in a performative video, lends freshness and unpredictability to their work not gained by working alone. For Public Space/ Private Life they will present Command Return Return, a video work from 2006.

Karyn Lindner works within the established poetics of watercolour and portraiture. Her larger than life sized portraits of children are drawn from photographs and usually displayed in a tightly spaced grid.

The images work towards giving her subjects a voice they may have been denied. She aims to challenge what we traditionally may expect from a portrait or carefully composed family photograph. Lindner is more interested in producing portraits that provide a liberating and alternate view of the self.

Jennifer Gray creates sculptural objects made from materials as diverse as string, mirrors, elastic, bamboo and pipe cleaners. The sculptures are specifically developed with the final exhibition site in mind and often reference her travels as a textiles buyer throughout Asia. She lets her inexpensive materials speak for themselves by allowing the unique properties of each material help dictate the final form the work will take.

Ruth Hennell, coordinatrice del servizio di assistenza materno e infantile "Maternal and Child Health", ha rilevato che le visite iniziali offerte allo scadere delle due settimane, quattro settimane e otto settimane di vita, al quarto mese, all'ottavo mese ed al dodicesimo mese presentano un indice di partecipazione del 90—99 per cento da parte degli utenti.

"Purnondimeno, abbiamo rilevato che per diversi motivi si è ridotto il numero di bambini che vengono sottoposti a controllo alla scadenza del 18° mese, a due anni e a tre anni e mezzo" ha affermato la Hennell.

"Molte famiglie hanno parecchi impegni, specialmente se entrambi i genitori lavorano, e ciò può rendere difficoltoso l'accesso al servizio durante l'orario di lavoro.

Implementando queste iniziative, non solo verrà offerta a ciascun bambino l'opportunità di accedere al servizio gratuito durante il giorno, ma si potranno anche identificare precocemente eventuali problemi relativi alla salute e allo sviluppo del bambino stesso".

В 2007г. Служба здоровья матери и ребенка муниципалитета Glen Eira внедряет ряд инициатив для улучшения наблюдения за здоровьем и благополучием детей на ранней стадии развития.

Эти инициативы предусмотрены муниципальным планом на 2006 – 2009гг. В местных центрах по уходу за детьми, детских садах и в Общественном медицинском центре Caulfield будет проводиться прием детей самого раннего возраста для наблюдения за их здоровьем и развитием.

Различные международные исследования показывают, что первые шесть лет в жизни ребенка имеют критическое значения для его дальнейшего благополучия.

Координатор муниципальной службы здоровья матери и ребенка Ruth Hennell говорит, что 90 – 99% родителей приводят детей на контрольные приемы в самый начальный период – в возрасте 2, 4, 8 недель и 4, 8, 12 месяцев.

"Однако процент детей, приходящих на контрольные приемы в возрасте 18 месяцев, 2 года и 3.5 года, по разным причинам уменьшается," отмечает Ruth Hennell.

"Во многих семьях просто не хватает времени – особенно если оба родителя работают и поэтому не могут прийти на прием в рабочее время.

Наши новые инициативы позволят каждой семье воспользоваться этими бесплатными услугами в удобное время и обеспечат раннее выявление возможных отклонений в развитии и здоровье ребенка."

Stage one of Joyce Park redevelopment completed

The first stage of the redevelopment of Joyce Park in Ormond, a new all abilities playground, has been successfully completed.

The redevelopment is the result of a lengthy master plan development process, which has involved extensive consultation with residents, park users, sporting clubs and community groups.

Other works to be completed to make the park safer and more accessible for all park users include:

- a new all abilities Exeloo toilet;
- park furniture;
- access all abilities pathways;

- pathway lighting;
- defined park entrances;
- bike racks;
- barbecue facilities;
- added rotunda (near playground);
- widespread tree and shrub planting;
 and
- the reshaping of the access roadway between Tyrone Street and Glen Eira McKinnon Bowls Club.

Glen Eira City Council Manager of Recreation and Youth Services Linda Smith said the redevelopment aims to ensure the park will better meet the community's needs, whether providing upgraded recreation facilities and open spaces or better access in and around the park.

"A major redevelopment such as this one will enable the park to meet the needs of both current and future park users and ensure the park will be well preserved for future generations," Ms Smith said.

The new playground will remain open throughout the duration of the works, which are expected to be completed by the end of June.


