The project already enjoys \$2.5 million in funding under the Victorian Government's *Better Pools* program for the aquatic components of the project.

The project is estimated to generate 132 jobs during construction and more than 40 permanent jobs when it is operating.

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Helen Whiteside welcomed the Government's announcement.

"The Centre has been designed to provide facilities for all segments of the community from learn-to-swim pools for toddlers, sessional childcare and indoor and outdoor pools to a warm water program pool for rehabilitation," Cr Whiteside said.

"It is a true community facility and we are delighted to be in partnership with the Commonwealth and State Governments.

"Feature of the environmentally sensitive design include rainwater harvesting (300,000 litres of water storage); sun shades that move with the sun; and heat exchangers to capture excess heat from the gym and use it to heat the pool water."

The estimated cost to Council remains within the allowance made in Council's 2008 Strategic Resource Plan.

Council also plans to spend approximately \$200,000 at the Carnegie Swim Centre this winter in order to bring the Centre to the best possible condition for the coming summer. It will need to cater for all Glen Eira swimmers while the Bentleigh East Swim Centre is being redeveloped.

Have you ever wondered what you can recycle or how to make your household more sustainable?



Open space vital to Glen Eira's future

Frank Penhalluriack was born in Caulfield, lived there most of his life and continues to run his business, which has been in Caulfield for 34 years. He now resides in Kew with his wife and two sons.

Last November he was elected as a Councillor in Camden Ward.

Speaking to the *Glen Eira News*, Frank said there were many reasons why he decided to run for Council in the 2008 elections — the most important — the issue of public access to 146 acres of Crown Land at Caulfield Racecourse.

"One of my fondest childhood memories is catching yabbies from the lake at Caulfield Racecourse," Frank said.

"I remember going to the Racecourse on racedays and being escorted to the centre, which was abuzz with activity.

"But this has changed — the public is banned from entering the racecourse before 9.30am and completely banned on racedays and during major events, including the Caravan and Camping Show."

Don't waste open space

Frank said it's in the public's interest to open the Racecourse to all Glen Eira residents and any visitors to the area.

Frank said there were many reasons why he decided to run for Council in the 2008 elections — the most important — the issue of public access to 146 acres of Crown Land at Caulfield Racecourse.

"In 1858, Queen Victoria gave the people of Caulfield 146 acres of Crown Land for three purposes — a racecourse, public recreation ground and public park," Frank said.

"This Crown Land should not be wasted, yet it caters for only 20 race meetings per year.


"With more dwellings being built and backyards becoming nonexistent, we need all the open space we can get so people can walk their dog, play with their kids and enjoy the outdoors."

Green purchasing increases 32 per cent

Recycled crushed concrete, garbage bins and copy paper are just some of the environmental purchases that Glen Eira City Council has made as part of its commitment to the *Eco-Buy Program*.

The *Program* has reported on green purchasing performance for 2007–08. It reports a 32.4 per cent increase in Council's overall green expenditure.

In 2007–08, Council invested a total of \$3,147,013 on environmentally preferable products, up from

\$2,376,434 in 2006–07 (figure one).

This placed Glen Eira twice as high as the average members of the *Eco-Buy Program* and a third higher than comparable organisations (figure two).

"The increase is a result of improved reporting and a purchasing policy that requires Council to consider environmental purchasing," Council's Eco-Buy Committee Chairperson Aubrey Jansen said.

"Council also purchases goods and services through a competitive process to avoid paying a higher price for the same item."


The Report also indicates a significant increase in products purchased to help reduce greenhouse gas emissions and other water saving and low toxic products.

Shop of the Year 2009

McKinnon Village Bakery has been named Glen Eira City Council's Shop of the Year 2009.

Announced at Council's annual Food Business Awards in April, McKinnon Village Bakery received the award for achieving the highest food safety rating after being assessed by Council's environmental health officers during 2008.

To achieve a five-star food safety rating, businesses must operate in accordance with Victorian food safety laws; pass Glen Eira's Council's food hygiene questionnaire; pass all food sampling results; have no justified complaints within the previous 12 months; and achieve a food hygiene score of 90 per cent or above.

Businesses which successfully achieve a five-star food rating receive a five-star food safety certificate to display; a reduction in registration fees; and free advertising in Council's annual Safe Food Guide.

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Helen Whiteside said McKinnon Village Bakery has maintained a five-star food rating since 2002.

"McKinnon Village Bakery was also awarded a food hygiene rating of 100 per cent which is to be commended." Cr Whiteside said.

Caulfield Racecourse Taberet in Caulfield East, which has maintained a five-star food rating since 2006, was named Shop of the Year Runner Up.

There were 10 finalists for the Shop of the Year Award. Each business was nominated as the best performer in their particular category and presented with a highly commended certificate. Fifty-six awards were also presented to local businesses that participated in

The importance of immunisation

Immunisations protect children and adults from harmful infections.

It is important for two main reasons:

- it is the safest and most effective way of protecting against disease; and
- if enough people in the community are immunised, the number of infectious diseases will be reduced and may even be eliminated.

How does immunisation work?

All forms of immunisation work in the same way. When someone is injected with, or swallows a vaccine, their body produces an immune response in the same way it would following exposure to a disease but without a person contracting the disease.

If the person comes into contact with the disease in the future, their body is able to make an immune response fast enough to prevent that person getting sick.

When should my child be immunised?

Under the *National Immunisation Program*, it is important for children to be vaccinated at:

- birth;
- 2 months
- four months;
- six months;
- 12 months;
- 18 months; and
- four years.

Cameron told the Glen Eira News that immunisation is important as it can remove the chance of contracting horrific conditions, such as polio, almost completely.

"I know for our children to be able to avoid conditions such as chicken pox and measles is giving them a fantastic opportunity to stay healthy enjoy doing the things that kids do," Cameron said.

In an effort to prevent infection and disease, Council encourages all children to be vaccinated on time.

Please note: To receive the four-year-old vaccination your child MUST have already turned four.

Council immunisation sessions

Glen Eira City Council conducts 10 free community immunisation sessions at various venues throughout the municipality each month.

All vaccines recommended by the *National Immunisation Program*, as set by the National Health and Medical Research Council, are offered free of charge.

Council's Immunisation Officer Anne-Marie Gannon said the sessions have been designed to meet the needs of all families, from the stay-at-home parent to those who work full-time.

"We want to make our immunisation sessions accessible to everyone in the community," Ms Gannon said.

Liz of Bentleigh East takes advantage of Council's immunisation service and takes triplets — Kyan, Finlay and Ashlan — to sessions at Glen Eira Town Hall and also Bentleigh Bayside Community Health Service.

"There is a good range of session times to attend each month in the Glen Eira area," Liz said.

There are four morning sessions, one afternoon session, four evening sessions and one Saturday morning session.

No bookings are required.

What to bring to an immunisation session

When attending, you must bring the following:

- infant health record book;
- Medicare card (if you have one); and
- any other immunisation records, including records from overseas.

Special four-year-old immunisation sessions 2009

These immunisations can be given as soon as a child has their fourth birthday. Glen Eira City Council's Immunisation Service is offering immunisation sessions for four-year-old children during 2009.

All four-year-old children receiving their immunisation will receive a free show bag. Face painting, balloons and magic tricks will keep the kids entertained.

Children immunised overseas

Children who have been immunised overseas should have their vaccinations recorded on an immunisation history form.

The history form enables the Australian Childhood Immunisation Register and Medicare to keep track of immunisations children have received overseas.

The purple form can be completed by a doctor or at Glen Eira City Council. Patients must bring a record of any immunisations given overseas as well as their Medicare card (if they have one).

The importance of four-year-old vaccinations

With a recent increase in whooping cough cases, Glen Eira City Council is urging for all children to be immunised, especially those who have just turned four.

Whooping cough is a distressing illness causing bouts of coughing which can last for a few months.

The National Immunisation Program's current schedule for four-year-olds includes vaccination boosters for:

- Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis (whooping cough)/ Polio; and
- Measles/Mumps/Rubella.

These vaccinations should be given as soon as your child has turned four.

Vaccination boosters for whooping cough are also given to children at two, four and six months and finally when the child begins Year 10.

Council's Immunisation Officer Anne-Marie Gannon said it was important for all children to be vaccinated.

"By not having your child immunised, they are at risk of disease and illness." Ms Gannon said.

Ms Gannon said once your child has received the scheduled four-year-old vaccine, your immunisation provider will report the vaccinations to the Australian Childhood Immunisation Register.

"The Register will automatically generate an immunisation statement and it will be mailed to the current address you have listed with Medicare Australia," Ms Gannon said.

"This statement can then be used as your child's school entry certificate."

Special four-year-old immunisation session

Glen Eira City Council was one of the first councils to introduce special four-year-old immunisation sessions.

In 2008, six sessions were held with more than 380 children receiving their booster vaccinations. Following on the success of these sessions, eight will be held in

2009 (please refer to the schedule at the bottom of page six for the remaining sessions).

Ms Gannon said with immunisation rates for four-year-olds below that of other age groups, Council has been very pleased with the turnout at immunisation sessions so far this year.

"In February — on a 47 degree day — 72 children were vaccinated which is a fantastic result," Ms Gannon said.

"The tables turned a month later and we had 87 children vaccinated on a cold, winter afternoon in March."

Ms Gannon said all children who are immunised at the special sessions receive a free show bag and helium balloon and are entertained with magic tricks and face painting.

"We try to provide as many distractions as possible on the day because we are aware that as a child gets older, receiving vaccinations can be stressful for some children," Ms Gannon said.

"This is why we make the sessions bright, fun and cheerful for everyone who attends."

New night immunisation session

Glen Eira City Council has introduced a new out-of-hours community immunisation session in 2009.

The two hour session will be held on the last Thursday night of each month at Bentleigh Bayside Community Health Service between 6pm and 8pm.

Council's Immunisation Officer Anne-Marie Gannon said the free session is designed for those who are unable to make it during the day.

"We have received a lot of feedback from residents about the need for more night sessions," Ms Gannon said.

"We have three nurses available at the session, so people won't have to wait as long to be immunised."

Bentleigh Bayside Community Health Service is located on Gardeners Road, Bentleigh East.



Bentleigh Library works

Planned works to Bentleigh Library will commence mid-year.

Glen Eira City Council's Manager Buildings and Properties Fergus Chisholm said the library building originally opened in 1961.

"These works are an important step in ensuring the library continues to function effectively into the future," Mr Chisholm said.

"The result will be a much improved facility, better suited to the operation of one of Council's most popular libraries."

The entrance to the building will be upgraded and a range of interior improvements will be completed, including a better layout, improved lighting, additional seating and study facilities.

In particular, the new layout will offer a larger, brighter children's area which will provide a better space for programs such as *Storytime*.

New shelving will be installed, providing better access to and display of the collections throughout the library.

The airconditioning system will also be upgraded to provide more efficient heating and cooling and a better flow of fresh air.

For the convenience of library users, particularly those bringing children to the library, an all-abilities toilet will be installed. The car park will be upgraded to enhance access, improve the safety of traffic flows and provide wider car parking spaces.

The surrounding gardens will be landscaped with drought-resistant plants.

The project is expected to take nine months to complete. To maintain library services while the works are being carried out, Council will provide a temporary facility adjacent to the building.

Secure your car

With an increase in theft from motor vehicles parked in residential driveways and on streets in recent months, Caulfield Police is reminding all residents to lock their cars and remove any valuables.

Inspector Margaret Lewis from Caulfield Police said in 40 per cent of theft from motor vehicle cases in Glen Eira, the victim had left their car unlocked.

"We need the community to take responsibility for their property to assist us in providing a safe community."

"People assume that their vehicle is safe from thieves when it is parked in the driveway," Inspector Lewis said.

"However, they find they are wrong when they find contents from their car missing.

"Even more surprising to Police is the number of thefts reported from vehicles where the owner has not locked the vehicle while parked in the street." Inspector Lewis said money, Ipods, sunglasses, CDs, mobile phones, laptop computers and portable satellite navigation systems are all common targets for thieves.

"People need to recognise that the border of their property is no boundary to a thief," Inspector Lewis said.

"Brackets for mobile phones and portable satellite navigation systems are a tell tale sign to most thieves that there will be a phone or a navigation system in the glovebox or the console.

"We need the community to take responsibility for their property to assist us in providing a safe community."

Supporting new parents

Becoming a new parent for the first time is a joyous occasion, but it can also be very daunting.

The 3am crying and not knowing what's wrong, the constant feeding and nappy changing, colic, the list goes on.

To help those who are new to the world of parenthood, Glen Eira City Council's Maternal and Child Health Service facilitates new parent groups at each of the seven Maternal and Child Health Centres across the municipality.

The six week groups brings together new parents in an informal environment, allowing them to speak openly about their experiences while at the same time receiving professional advice from one of Council's highly qualified nurses.

Council's Maternal and Child Health Co-ordinator Ruth Hennell said all new parents need support.

"New parent groups offer health education and parenting support, build parenting capacity and foster community connections," Ms Hennell said.

"The groups are important as many new parents feel isolated. Some may also not have an extended family member living locally who is able to provide them with the support and advice they need."

Ms Hennell said new friendships are also formed, with most groups continuing to meet up for many years after the sessions have finished.

"Most groups either continue meeting at home or form playgroups through Playgroup Victoria as the babies become mobile," Ms Hennell said.

Ms Hennell said between six and 15 new mums or dads attend each of the groups and every week a new topic is discussed. In 2008, 638 new parents attended 62 groups in Glen Eira.

"Health issues are discussed as well as sleep and settling, safety around the home, health and childhood illnesses, play and development and the introduction of solids," Ms Hennell said.

GEMS Group

Ms Hennell said Glen Eira's Enhanced Maternal and Child Health Service offers a new mother's group for those who may be experiencing emotional difficulties since the birth of their baby.

"Glen Eira Mother's Support group (GEMS) was formed in April last year and gives new mother's an opportunity to meet with others who are experiencing similar difficulties, such as anxiety or depression, in a relaxed environment," Ms Hennell said.

"The eight week group covers a range of topics, including looking after yourself, interaction with your baby, relaxation and simple play strategies."

Following the completion of the group, participants are invited to attend Yumi Supported Playgroups, which are facilitated by Bentleigh Bayside Community Health Service.

Interactive information session

Surviving and enjoying the first months with your baby is one of the most popular information sessions held by Council's Maternal and Child Health Service.

The interactive session is for parents and grandparents of babies from birth to three months

and is presented by an early childhood educator and one maternal and child health nurse.

Parents and grandparents will learn how to:

- · understand normal baby behaviour;
- understand newborn sleep patterns;
- encourage a settled baby; and
- · reduce family stress.

Sessions are held on the first and third Tuesday of each month from Ipm to 3pm at the Glen Huntly Maternal and Child Health Centre, corner Royal and Rosedale Avenues, Glen Huntly. No bookings are required.

Council addresses bridge safety

Residents will be pleased to know that safety at the Brewer Road railway overpass in Bentleigh has been improved.

For a number of years, there have been concerns about the area's safety. Those concerns include:

- vehicle speeds near the railway overpass;
- limited sight distance because of the crest in Brewer Road created by the overpass;
- safety at the intersection of Brewer Road and Bendigo Avenue; and
- the potential for vehicles to break through the existing barriers onto the railway tracks.

In response to these concerns, Glen Eira City Council commissioned an independent road safety audit of Brewer Road between Phillip Street and Bendigo Avenue.

The audit found that a significant number of drivers were travelling over the bridge at speeds which were too high given the crest in the road. It was

recommended that measures be implemented to reduce vehicles speeds.

As a result two flat top speed humps were constructed at the Brewer Road railway overpass to reduce speeds. A section of road pavement was reconstructed, lighting was improved, pedestrian fencing was installed and signage was updated.

Kittens Carwash pleads guilty: penalised \$50,000

The company operating the Kittens Carwash in Bentleigh East has pleaded guilty in the Melbourne Magistrates Court for failing to comply with a planning permit issued by Glen Eira City Council.

Appearing before Deputy Chief Magistrate Jelena Popovic on 23 March, Jinne Pty Ltd was fined \$20,000 without conviction and ordered to pay Council \$30,000 in costs.

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Helen Whiteside welcomed the verdict.

"What a fantastic result for Council and the Glen Eira community," Cr Whiteside said.

"Council has fought long and hard for two years and we could not ask for a better outcome."

Jinne Pty Ltd was charged under section 126(1) of the Planning and Environment Act 1987 (Vic).

On I June 2001, Council issued a planning permit for the operation of a carwash, with a condition that only two staff be present at any one time.

However, after taking over the carwash on 20 December 2006, operators Jinne Pty Ltd breached the conditions of the permit. The company was seen by Council officers with more than two staff on 12 occasions during December 2006 and January 2007.

The verdict follows Council's successful application last May to the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal's (VCAT) to restrict the Warrigal Road carwash to operate within the constraints of the planning permit.

"Council has fought long and hard for two years and we could not ask for a better outcome."

VCAT found that the main activity on the land was not for a carwash, but in fact to promote sexually explicit entertainment venues. Costs orders were also made against Jinne Pty Ltd with respect to the VCAT matters.

The company was ordered to immediately cease using the land for this promotional purpose.





Bentleigh Bowls Club beats the drought and saves water

In 2007, the Bentleigh Bowls Club was worried about the state of its greens and wondered how they would survive if the drought continued.

However, the Club was fortunate enough to have an enthusiastic team which secured a State Government grant, through the support of Glen Eira City Council, to reactivate their bore and install a water treatment plant and water tanks.

Following the installation of the equipment, the results have been nothing less than outstanding for the Club. More than two million litres of potable water has been saved over the last 12 months.

For most of the past year, the Club has not used mains water for the watering of their greens. The only exception was in February when the Club relied on mains water for a few weeks to help cleanse their greens from a build up of salt.

With the bore now reactivated, the club are able to store 90,000 litres of water from their bore on-site ready for irrigating their three greens.

Council congratulates Bentleigh Bowls Club for its proactive approach to minimising mains water use and in ensuring the ongoing success of the Club.

Conflict: you and your teen

Do you often feel frustrated and annoyed after a conversation with your teenage son or daughter? Are you left feeling like they missed your point completely?

Communicating with a teen can be very difficult at the best of times. One day your teen would come to you for advice, the next — all you can get out of them is one word answers or a few grunts. One thing to remember is that you are not alone and there are many parents in a similar situation.

So how do you establish communication lines between yourself and your teen?

Conflict is a one of the main causes of communication breakdowns between parents and teens. This may be because of different beliefs or both placing value on different things. If your method of dealing with conflict with your teen has not been working as well as you had hoped, try a different tactic. Treat

conflict with your teen as you would in a work situation and be focused on problem solving.

Conflict resolution

- Listen to what your teen has to say.
 Stay calm and try not to play the blame game.
- Stick to the issue being discussed.
 Be open and creative when
 brainstorming solutions, and let
 your teen be involved in suggesting
 solutions to the issue.
- Discuss consequences for each solution you both come up with.
 Choose a solution that is a happy medium for all.

This process to resolve conflict may take some time. Don't start the resolution process if you are angry or hurt. Wait until you are both in a calm frame of mind. Remember — patience is the key.

Keeping the lines of communication open

To ensure you can resolve conflict with your teen, with minimal distress to your family, it's important to work on your everyday communication.

Talk to your teen everyday. Ask about their day or even their opinion on current issues in the media. You might feel you're not getting anywhere in the beginning, but teens often act like they don't want you to ask about their day. However, deep down they know it's a sign you still care about them.

Other ways to keep the lines of communication open are to try to understand your child's beliefs and values. Take an interest in some of the things they like doing and spend time with them, even if it's when you're driving them around to a friends place. The car can often be a great place to start talking to each other as your teen doesn't have to look you directly in the face.

Persistence is the key. It takes time to build up trust and there will be times when you try to make the effort only to be rebuffed with one word answers and grunts. But if you keep at it, the rewards speak for themselves.
