n response to the deteriorating conditions of Glen Eira's sportsgrounds, Council has accelerated its warm season grasses conversion program.

Commencing in April, three ovals on the south side of Caulfield Park will be converted to a low maintenance, low water usage and drought-tolerant turf to provide a more sustainable surface for both active and passive recreation.

Class A recycled water will be used to water the new turf and water tanks and drip irrigation systems will also be installed.

"By early spring the grass would be fully established and the surface available for the 2009–2010 cricket season and for passive users."

Council has converted approximately three grounds per year under this program, including Marlborough Reserve in Bentleigh East, Bentleigh Reserve and Glen Huntly Park oval in Caulfield East. This program has included both resurface works and total ground reconstructions.

Council's Co-ordinator Ground Maintenance Peter Todd said the lack of rainfall and recent extreme temperatures have had a significant impact on Glen Eira's grounds.

"The most effective action to improve the condition of grounds would be to accelerate the conversions to warm season grasses," Mr Todd said.

"Although the preferred time for laying grass is spring, there are some benefits to laying it earlier in the

During the upgrade, the new turf will be fenced off from April to September and clubs which normally use the ovals will be relocated for the 2009 season to other grounds.

The works will also involve demolishing the grey hex pavilion and returning it to open space, realigning some of the grounds, planting 120 new trees and removing 15 and establishing new paths.

Another program of conversions of grounds to warm season grasses is planned for September in other areas of the City.

Class A recycled water will be used to water the new turf and water tanks and drip irrigation systems will also be installed.

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Helen Whiteside said Caulfield Park is the City's largest park and is used not only by sports clubs, but also walkers, dog walkers, joggers and community festivals.

"Conversion to more sustainable surfaces will benefit all users of the Park," Cr Whiteside said.

"Council apologises for the temporary inconvenience caused, but this intervention is necessary if we are to put our parks and grounds on a more sustainable footing."

Applications for community grants now open

More than \$300,000 will be awarded to local community groups through Glen Eira City Council's 2009–2010 Community Grants Program.

Applications for the *Program* opened last month and will close at 5pm on Friday 29 May.

The *Program* supports and assists not-for-profit community based groups within the municipality to implement projects and activities.

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Helen Whiteside said Council was committed to investing in the community.

"This program allows Council to support projects and services that address local issues," Cr Whiteside said.

In 2008–09, more than \$323,000 was distributed to 129 not-for-profit community groups.

Grants were awarded to a wide variety of groups including citizen groups, playgroups, arts and culture organisations as well as sport and recreation groups.

CEO's column



Glen Eira City
Council has been
increasingly effective
at attracting
co-operation
and funding from
other levels of
government.
Recent examples
include:

- the construction of a roundabout at the intersection of Thomas Street and McKinnon Road, McKinnon. Council received a \$180,000 grant from the Federal Government, while both Glen Eira and Bayside councils' have contributed more than \$200,000;
- \$460,000 in Federal Government funding for local recreation improvements and water conservation measures in the stimulus package;
- \$2.5 million from the State
 Government's Better Pools
 program towards the
 redevelopment of the aquatic
 components of the Bentleigh East
 Swim Centre;
- grants from the State Government for conversion of sportsgrounds to warm season grasses;
- the Showerhead Exchange Program in partnership with South East Water;
- increased funding for home and community care (joint Federal and State Government funding); and
- the agreement in principle to transfer control of the former
 Glen Huntly Reservoir to Council for use as public open space.

Council currently has a major submission before the Federal Government for funding from the stimulus package for the redevelopment of the Bentleigh East Swim Centre. We also have funding proposals for *Blackspot* funding for traffic lights and other safety improvements.

These co-operative arrangements are important. Local Government collects only three per cent of all taxation in Australia. A high level of co-operation is needed so that local facilities and services are better supported from the taxes that people have already paid.

Have your say on proposed residential zones

The State Department of Planning and Community Development is inviting comment on proposed new residential zones.

The zones have the potential to change what development is permitted in residential areas, including the density of development.

Glen Eira City Council's response to the proposals will concentrate on ensuring that any move to the new zones does not weaken the restrictions which Council currently has in place.

The zones have the potential to change what development is permitted in residential areas, including the density of development.

The three new residential zones are:

- The Substantial Change Zone
 which provides for housing growth
 by a mix of housing types that
 includes medium to higher density
 housing in appropriate locations.
- The Incremental Change Zone
 which allows for a variety of housing
 types including medium density
 housing provided it respects the
 character of the neighbourhood.
- The Limited Change Zone which enables specific characteristics of the neighbourhood to be protected through greater control over new housing development.

Roundabout works commence

Construction of a roundabout at one of Glen Eira's most dangerous intersections has commenced.

Work at the Thomas Street and McKinnon Road intersection in McKinnon commenced in late February and is expected to be completed by May.

Glen Eira City Council and Bayside City Council have contributed more than \$200,000 towards the construction, while the Federal Government has put forward \$180,000.

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Helen Whiteside said the notorious intersection, which is located on the border of Glen Eira and Bayside, had been identified as a blackspot.

"According to the Glen Eira Road Safety Strategy, the intersection has a history of casualty crashes," Cr Whiteside said.

"It is hoped that the construction of the roundabout will help improve road safety in the area."

Cr Whiteside said the roundabout has been designed not only to improve safety for motorists, but to also provide improved safety and access for cyclists

by way of separate bicycle lanes with a green textured surface.

"Pedestrians will also benefit as the roundabout is designed to reduce vehicle speeds and formalised crossing points will be provided," Cr Whiteside said.

Bayside City Council Mayor Cr James Long said making the roundabout safe for the community was a priority.

"This roundabout will benefit the community by improving safety, reducing traffic congestion and allowing traffic

to move better. It's great to know the works have begun," Cr Long said.

Cr Whiteside warned that during the construction phase there would be some road closures.

"Council asks for the community's understanding during the construction of this much needed roundabout and apologises for any inconvenience caused," Cr Whiteside said.

Caulfield Racecourse — getting the balance right

Glen Eira City Council is working hard to protect the interests of residents and businesses in the vicinity of Caulfield Racecourse.

Public use of public land

A large part of the area is Crown Land. The Crown Land is reserved for three purposes — a racecourse, public recreation ground and public park. Council supports increased park land and recreation opportunities, in addition to horse racing. However, we need to get the balance right.

In mid-2008, Council and the Melbourne Racing Club (MRC) reached an agreement.

The full text can be found on Council's website but, in brief, the MRC and Council agreed that:

- the training of horses should be relocated from Caulfield to a more suitable venue;
- land on Neerim Road currently used as stables should be incorporated into Glen Huntly Park as additional public open space (Area "E" on the map); and
- the area around the lake should be beautified as passive open space and made easily accessible (area "C").

In early 2009 the industry body, Racing Victoria Limited (RVL), published a draft document on future strategy for the industry. It designated Caulfield and Flemington as training venues for up to a combined 1,200 horses. The MRC has assured Council that it stands by the agreement. Council has written to RVL asking it to bring its industry strategy into line with the agreement between Council and the MRC and confirm that the future of racing at Caulfield does not include training.

Major development north of Station Street

The MRC has developed concepts for future development on the land north of Station Street ("A" on the map). As previously reported, the proposals envisage more than 1,000 units of residential accommodation (dwellings, hotel rooms, serviced apartments or student accommodation) and some 35,000 square metres of retail and office development.

On 4 September 2007, Council resolved that it was prepared to place an amendment on public exhibition, but not the amendment in the form proposed by the MRC. Council reserved its right to determine its position on the issues after hearing community views (eg. parking, traffic, the mix of retail, office and residential and access to open space).

On 29 October 2007, the Minister for Planning asked the State Government's Priority Development Panel (PDP) to advise him about the MRC's proposed amendment. The PDP supported Council's view that the original form of amendment was not appropriate for exhibition. No decision emerged from the PDP process.

The proposal is at conceptual stage and a long way from construction. There has been no public exhibition or other



public process to enable the community to be properly informed or to comment on any proposal. The matter has now been out of Council's hands since 29 October 2007. Council has sought a meeting with the Minister for Planning to clarify the process for considering the proposals, including proper opportunities for community input.

Land swap

The MRC has proposed a land swap. Under the swap, the MRC would gain ownership of the triangle of Crown Land bounded by Normanby Road, Station Street and Smith Street ("B" on the map). The MRC proposes that the triangle be included in the commercial development mentioned above and be developed with a 15 storey building. In return, the MRC is offering land that it owns on Booran Road adjacent to the Kambrook, Glen Eira and Booran

Roads roundabout ("D" on the map).

Council has opposed this swap. The land being offered is on a busy five way intersection. There is little parking and there is no access from the block to any other public land. The eastern part of the block is not under any observation and would not meet the established Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) principles used by Victoria Police.

Council has asked that, if any swap goes ahead, the swap include land of equivalent value. Given that the triangle is very valuable, a larger and more appropriate area of land should be made available for public use in return.

The swap would require the approval of the State Government and legislation to remove the Crown Land status from the land. The parties to the swap are the MRC, the Trustees responsible for the Crown Land and the State Government. There has been no process of public consultation to date.

Potential

The intensity of urban development is increasing. It is more important than ever for residents to have access to an adequate quantity and quality of public open space. The fact that there is a large area of Crown Land in such a strategic location near the Caulfield Railway Station provides enormous potential for community benefit. The current restrictions on community use mean that potential is not being realised.

Council will continue to work with all parties to ensure better parklands, improved access to passive and active open space — as well as racing — and well located appropriate development. We need to keep working to get the balance right.



The benefits of dog training

Whether you have just purchased a new puppy or have had a dog for years, dogs of all ages, sizes and breeds will benefit from training.

Dog training not only teaches the dog how to behave better, but it will teach the owners the skills and strategies required to help prevent and minimise conflict.

Glen Eira City Council's Manager Civic Compliance John Bordignon said one of the responsibilities of being a dog owner was ensuring that your dog was well behaved and manageable in a public environment.

"Proper training can assist the dog owner in effectively controlling their

dog and help to prevent any incidents from occurring between dogs in off-leash areas," Mr Bordignon said.

"Having a well trained dog also helps ensure the safety and comfort of other residents who may be using the park."

Other benefits

Mr Bordignon said training your four-legged friend has other benefits.

"Training your dog — particularly from an early age — will help your dog socialise not only with other dogs, but people too," Mr Bordignon said.

"Dogs are very similar to children and need to learn right from wrong. Training will help them to learn some simple manners and household rules as well as basic commands, such as sit, walk, come and drop."

Reduction in pet rego fees

Under the Domestic (Feral and Nuisance) Animals Act 1994 if a dog has successfully completed dog obedience training with an approved organisation a reduction in pet registration fees will be offered.

Substantially reduced fees will also be offered if your dog is:

- · desexed and/or microchipped;
- · more than 10 years of age;
- · kept for working stock; or
- kept for breeding at a domestic animal business conducted on a registered premises.

Reduced fees will also be offered if your dog is registered with Dogs Victoria (previously known as the Victorian Canine Association).

Pet registration renewal notices for 2009-2010 have been sent to existing registered owners.

The maximum registration fee for the 2009–2010 registration year is \$122 for dogs.

A new registration tag and a Certificate of Registration will be issued, however

payment must be received by 10 April to ensure that your pet is re-registered.

Under State legislation all dogs over the age of three months must be registered







Stella has a long list of things she can't tell. The op shop in the next town, where they bought her first high school uniform last year. Her father's occasional second job. The "brand new" bike they'd given her little brother Ben for Christmas; it had been hers until a few years ago. And she especially can't tell the thing about her mother, who's lived on the farm for 13 years but still cries when the calves are loaded up for the sales on Sunday mornings.

There's just one problem lately. With all that not telling, her words sometimes dry up. Last week, it happened after something her mother said. "Do you ever thing what it'd be like to live in the city, Stell?"

"I guess I don't see the point really," Stella finally replied. Her mother sighed. "There is a life beyond this place

Stella knew. They'd occasionally drive down the highway to visit Aunt Denise in the city. Her mother loved pointing out landmarks from her childhood. The school, the swimming pool, the coffee shop where she'd worked to pay for a P&O cruise with Denise when she was 18. "If I'd known I was going to meet your father, I probably would have gone to Queensland instead," she'd laugh, and her father would smile too, so everybody knew they were in the joke together.

It's been ages since one of those trips. Her mother seems to have given up on jokes and her father has stopped smiling. Neither parent notices that Stella can last through dinner, help wash up and watch TV without saying a single word all night.

The best thing about not telling is that sometimes people start filling in the gaps themselves. Like today, when Mr. Gordon slows his truck as Stella navigates her bike around the sharp stones on the side of the gravel road.

The backpack is bulging with the promise of Stella's first worry-free afternoon for days. The automatic doors appear like a committee wishing her well on her return journey. They're already open when Stella feels the hand on her shoulder. It's Carol Jackson, a manager here.

"Stella, what's in your bag?"

"Oh it's just school stuff," she manages.

"I think we better call your parents," Carol says. Stella can't tell. That her mother has left, and her father is missing too.

And it's probably all Stella's fault.

Stella feels her panic dilute with relief when Carol puts down the phone.

"Well, there's nobody there." she announces, looking at the TV screens that would have given away Stella's secret. "Why don't you just tell me what's wrong?"

Stella shakes her head; she can't choose from all the possible answers.

Carol stands and gestures to cups and biscuits on another table. "You look awfully pale. Eat something and then we'll

Stella is not locked in this room. She could just sneak past the bananas and cabbages and home to her brother, who'll be peering down the laneway by now. But nestled among the memos to order more bread rolls and sign rosters, Stella feels



safe. She can even picture herself filling out the order form for the bakery supplier.

Stella's an intruder though. Worse that that, a thief. The door opens to remind her. Carol is accompanied by a man she introduces as Bob. Stella has seen him before, but can't remember where.

"Listen," he begins then tugs furiously at the tie tightening around his neck. "I don't believe in getting the police to collect teenage girls. But I can't let you walk out with fifty bucks worth of groceries either."

Stella wonders what's happened to her backpack. God, Ben must be starving by now. Maybe she should tell them.

Stella could always leave out her part. That the fight had started because she'd been so greedy, blind to the fact that asking could be a lot worse than not telling.

She'd had to squeeze her question after Ben's stories from football practice, and her mother's announcement she might apply for some cleaning shifts at the motel on the highway.

"Lily has asked me to Queensland for the holidays. Can I go?" she'd blurted.

Her mother was pleased. "But it's a long way, love. How would you get there?"

"Lily's parents will pay the airfare. It's going to be her birthday

Her father put down his fork. "I don't think so, Stella," he said. "We're not taking charity from strangers."

It was like he'd slapped her. Lily wasn't a stranger. Didn't he remember the weekends she'd come and help round up the cows for milking? She was useless at it, used to scream so much the whole herd would run away. Her father just laughed and said if he could make a farm girl out of Stella's mother, he'd make one of her friend too.

Trees given new lease of life

More than 3,000 drought affected street, park and reserve trees have been given a new lease of life — thanks to GLG Developments.

As reported in the Glen Eira News February 2009 edition, GLG Developments made more than two million litres of rainwater available to Glen Eira City Council at the end of last year.

The extraction of the rainwater, which accumulated in an open excavation over a two year period, was completed at the end of February.

GLG Developments Director Dan Langer said the company purchased the East Boundary Road site for residential use in 2005. A planning permit has since been issued for the development of 50 residential allotments and 10 townhouses, which will be offered to the market later this year.

"Whilst undertaking the planning process for the development of the site, the previous industrial factory infrastructure was removed," Mr Langer said.

"This infrastructure included a basement which remained open for the past couple of years.

"Over this time, rainwater gathered in the open basement and rather than just dispose of it, we set about finding an appropriate use for the water."

Mr Langer said when approached, Council was most appreciative of being offered such a large volume of water.

"Council began the extraction process almost immediately to water trees across the municipality," Mr Langer said.

Council's Manager Park Services Laurie Unwin said access to the water relieved the strain on bore water supplies for nearly two months. "Council would like to thank GLG Developments for allowing extraction of the rainwater. We are very grateful for the opportunity," Mr Unwin said.

Based on this information, and following a review of VicRoads crash statistics, Council has installed speed cushions on the approaches of the following six intersections:

- · Saturn Street and Lucas Street, Caulfield South;

- · Foch Street and Malane Street, Ormond;
- Sommerset Street and Mulgrave Street, Caulfield North;

- · Stockdale Avenue and Marlborough Street, Bentleigh East

The speed cushions are intended to reduce vehicle speeds approaching the intersections and to assist motorists from inadvertently overshooting the existing stop or give way signs.

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Staying safe in cyberspace

The internet is now firmly entrenched in all families as a valuable information and communication tool. Given the pervasive nature of the internet, the rate of which it is growing and endless supply of information it contains, it's critical that young people know how to keep safe online. Moreover, it's important that parents remain aware of the dangers and remain vigilant in protecting their children's vulnerabilities. Below are some valuable tips on how to help your children stay safe when surfing the World Wide Web:

- don't let your child divulge any personal information such as name, age, school or home address;
- consider investing in key logger software to record information that your child sends and receives over the internet. This software can be used to monitor conversations your children have online;
- encourage your children to discuss any online activity they may have found uncomfortable;
- monitor your children's internet activity to ensure they are not being bullied or bullying other children online:
- develop an online contract stipulating the access times and durations for internet access. It's easy for internet usage to spiral out of control, dominating your child's time;

Given the pervasive nature of the internet, the rate of which it is growing and endless supply of information it contains, it's critical that young people know how to keep safe online.

- before your children download any new material or programs, make sure you have given consent;
- place the computer in a public area so you can easily monitor all internet activity;
- become computer literate and learn the internet language children use online such as POS (parent over shoulder); and
- use the internet together and educate your children about how it can be used in a responsible and useful manner. At the same time, make sure your children understand there are limits to how reliable information on the internet actually is. This also applies to being wary of strangers online.

Glen Eira Artists exhibition

Glen Eira City Council's Gallery will present its annual *Glen Eira Artists* exhibition. A broad range of work by contemporary artists who live, work or study in the City of Glen Eira will be on display. The exhibition will showcase a diversity of responses to contemporary art practice including painting, drawing, photography and sculpture, with a wide range of approaches to materials and concepts.

The exhibition includes Ian Bank-Smith, an abstract and expressionist painter; Mary Neighbour, who creates figurative images; and landscape painter Alison Gully. Also included are Rae Easton, whose art is concerned with human and community needs and Ben Gunzburg, a photography student whose photographs depict uneasy night scapes. Two Painters: David K Taylor and Maxwell Wilks

Two of Australia's leading impressionist artists, acclaimed watercolourist David K Taylor and tonal realist Maxwell Wilks, will be exhibiting together at Council's Gallery.

Presented by Jenny Pihan Fine Art, the exhibition will not only showcase recent paintings by both artists, highlighting shared journeys and impressions, but also diverse responses to the landscape, waterways and cities they have visited in Australia and overseas.

The paintings of David K Taylor cover a wide range of subject matter, including scenes from the Yarra Valley, the city of Melbourne and the neighbouring harbours and seaside. Maxwell Wilks' collection of paintings

records his travels across Europe (notably Italy and England), through the Australian outback, the Eyre Peninsula and Flinders Ranges, plus some adventurous aerial views, executed in oil, pastel and acrylic.

Sport and the drought

Melbourne's prolonged and severe drought conditions, coupled with the current hot and dry conditions and water restrictions are significantly impacting on Glen Eira's sportsgrounds.

Although current water restrictions allow for limited watering, sportsgrounds with cool season grasses are not responding well.

In the effort to maintain Glen Eira's 46 sportsgrounds in the best possible condition, Council has undertaken rolling programs over the last 10 years to reduce the risk of injury, sustain sports participation and respond to the drought conditions.

This has included the installation of automatic irrigation systems and soil

moisture sensors at all sportsgrounds; the installation of training lights at numerous sportsgrounds to meet new Australian standards; and the resurfacing of sportsgrounds with a low maintenance, low water usage, drought tolerant turf.

More recently, Council has installed a bore at Marlborough Reserve which has been connected to water tanks. The water harvested by the bore will be used to irrigate the soccer sportsground through a drip irrigation system.

Marlborough Reserve has also been resurfaced with drought tolerant, warm season grasses. A drip irrigation system and moisture sensors have also been installed, ensuring the surface is only watered as required.

The fight isn't over yet, but Council has made a significant impact into dealing with the drought and keeping sport alive across the municipality.

It is anticipated this project will ensure there won't be a need to use mains water for irrigation while ensuring that there is a long-term sustainable solution to the conditions. Prior to the installation of the bore, the drip irrigation system had reduced water usage at the ground by up to 50 per cent.

In an effort to reduce dependence on water and provide a safe playing surface for sports clubs, Council has also resurfaced Bentleigh Reserve, McKinnon Reserve outer, Mackie Reserve and Glen Huntly Reserve with drought tolerant, warm season grasses over the last 12 months.

The fight isn't over yet, but Council has made a significant impact in dealing with the drought and keeping sport alive across the municipality.


