len Eira City Council Youth Services is set to get even better, following its relocation to the Bentleigh Library precinct.

This new permanent centre will house all Youth Services information, support and referral services, as well as its highly successful programs, including the Plugged-in music program and Young Men's and Women's personal development programs.

The Youth Leadership Team, who will be assisting Youth Services in organising and running Battle of the Bands 2010, will also be based at the Council's Manager Recreation and Youth Services Linda Smith said the relocation to Robert Street is a massive boost to the community.

"This fantastic location will ensure Youth Services is easily accessible to young people, families and the greater community," Ms Smith said.

The precinct is close to public transport and the numerous services available at Bentleigh Shopping Centre. Bentleigh Railway Station is located approximately 500 metres away and bus services along Centre Road are just around the corner.

Ms Smith said the new facilities will improve the quality of services offered by Youth Services, such as the Plugged-in music program for young people aged between 12 and 25 who want to learn about music production

"We've now got the space to create a proper music studio with industry standard equipment, which no doubt will appeal to all participants of the program," Ms Smith said.

New food safety laws to protect public safety

The State Government has amended Victorian food safety laws, providing Glen Eira City Council with new powers to deal with food businesses that have unhygienic and unsafe practices.

Amendments to the *Food Act 1984* were announced last year by the State Government and will be implemented across the City of Glen Eira over the next 12 months.

From I July 2010, Council has the power to temporarily close food businesses that are found to be unsafe or stop food handling from occurring until the business is in a clean and sanitary state. If this occurs, it must be reported to the Department of Health and Council has the right to inform the public through the media.

Council also has the discretion to seize food or equipment and issue written legal notices to bring businesses into line with National Food Safety Standards. Failure to comply will result in the matter being brought before a Magistrate.

The second stage of changes begins in March 2011 and enables Council to issue penalty infringement notices to businesses for a range of breaches relating to safe food handling and cleanliness. New fines range from \$233 to \$1,168.

Council's Manager Public Health and Community Development Mark Saunders said the new laws would assist Council to act quickly to remove public health risks found within local food premises to protect the public's safety.

"A large majority of the 850 registered food businesses in Glen Eira do the right thing and have excellent hygiene practices," Mr Saunders said.

"Council officers conduct more than 1,500 inspections at local food businesses each year to ensure that they comply with National Food Safety Standards and operate in a clean and safe manner.

"Officers work to assess standards within food businesses and educate proprietors about how to prepare and handle food safely."

Mr Saunders said the vibrant restaurant and café culture has been enjoyed by the people in the City of Glen Eira for many years.

"Unfortunately, there are a few outlets who don't follow the rules and these changes will allow us to deal with them a lot quicker than the processes that are currently in place," Mr Saunders said.

Five-Star Safe Food Program

Mr Saunders said Council is unique as it provides a *Five-Star Safe Food Program* so that the community can make an informed decision about where they eat out and where they purchase food.

"Council officers rate food premises during inspections and those that achieve a five-star food safety rating are published in Council's *Residents' Handbook*," Mr Saunders said. "The community should also look for the five-star food safety certificates that are issued to businesses to display within their premises."

New state-wide single registration system

The final set of amendments to the Food Act 1984 relates to the registration of all food vans and market stalls that operate in Victoria.

A new state-wide single registration system will be introduced from July next year, eliminating the need for owners to pay registration fees with multiple councils.

Once they register with one council, they are free to operate in the 78 other municipalities across the state with no additional charge.

Communicating the changes to businesses

Mr Saunders said because of the large number of changes, Council will assist local businesses to comply with the new laws.

"Seminars at Bentleigh, Elsternwick and Carnegie would soon be held for local food businesses and will provide an overview of the changes to the legislation, Council policy and provide opportunity for proprietors to ask questions," Mr Saunders said.

Information about the new laws will also be published in Council publications and in food safety information packs sent out to businesses.

Easier disposal of TVs, computers and e-waste

In the effort to make it easier for residents to dispose of electronic waste (e-waste) such as computer screens, keyboards and televisions, Glen Eira City Council will trial a free increased turnover of electronic devices such as mobile phones and computers are all contributing to growing e-waste volumes.

Public open space

Council has confirmed its willingness to be appointed as the committee of management for the Crown Land comprising the former Glen Huntly Reservoir for public recreation purposes. The land represents a rare opportunity to make a significant addition to public open space. Further consultation regarding the sites use will take place after more information is established about the physical characteristics of the site and any other constraints.

Pedestrian safety

Council is advocating to VicRoads to upgrade 28 pedestrian signals in Glen Eira with infra-red overhead detectors. The detectors would sense the presence of pedestrians on the crossing, therefore improving safety by increasing the crossing time if a slower pedestrian is detected.

Engaging our community

Transport

During August, Council listened to residents' views on proposals to install speed cushions at four locations in Glen Eira, as well as proposals for parking restrictions in various streets.

MRC redevelopment panel report

Council is analysing a report by an independent panel on Amendment C60, which seeks to rezone the land in the State Government's Major Activity Centre between Caulfield Racecourse and the railway line. The three person panel considered 67 submissions in hearings lasting six days. This followed Council's rejection in 2007 of an earlier proposal. The report can be downloaded from

collection service.

Currently, residents are able to dispose of e-waste at Monash or Boroondara councils transfer stations.

However, as part of the budgeted \$65,000, 12 month trial, the service will allow residents to easily dispose of their e-waste at three locations across Glen Eira.

According to *Clean Up Australia* statistics, e-waste is one of the fastest growing contributors to our waste stream. The replacement of old televisions and although Council collects e-waste as part of its hard rubbish collection service, it is not always separated, and as a result can end up in landfill. E-waste can contain a range of materials including copper, gold and platinum.

"Most e-waste can be reused so by taking advantage of the new collection service, the e-waste will be sent off for processing," Cr Tang said.

"The end result — less waste going to landfill."

It has been created to attract native birds by replicating their preferred habitat. Many native birds that were once common in urban areas are now disappearing due to lack of habitat.

Ms Smith said Council will be giving a 30 minute presentation about the aviary garden at the PLA National Conference in Glenelg, South Australia, in September.

"Our Award nomination for the aviary garden has also been forwarded to PLAs national judging panel for selection of the 2010 National Awards of Excellence, which will be announced at the Conference on 15 September," Ms Smith said.

Free health checks

Glen Eira City Council Maternal and Child Health Service offer a free health check for three-and-a-half year old children.

The check up, which is part of the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development's 10 Key Ages and Stages Visits Program, is conducted by one of Council's experienced maternal and child health nurses.

Why are the visits important?

Council's Maternal and Child Health Co-ordinator Nurse Ruth Hennell said it's vital that children are assessed.

"These visits will assist in the early identification of any health and development issues, which could potentially affect school readiness, future learning and wellbeing outcomes," Ms Hennell said.

In the last financial year (2009-10), Council's Maternal and Child Health Service completed 16,285 key ages and stages assessments, well surpassing its target of 14,000.

What happens at the three-anda-half year old visit?

The three-and-a-half year old assessment is conducted between three-and-a-half to four years and is recommended before a child commences kindergarten.

The child's general health and development is checked, as well as their vision, hearing and speech.

Kindergarten readiness, behaviour, nutrition, sleep, exercise, play, safety, toileting issues and immunisation are discussed.

Where appropriate, referrals will be made to health professionals.

Other assessments

Ms Hennell said it's important not only for three-and-a-half year old children to be assessed, but also children at other key stages of their development.

"The first assessment is conducted at the child's home following their discharge from hospital," Ms Hennell said.

"Subsequent assessments are then carried out at their local centre at two weeks, four weeks, eight weeks, four months, eight months, 12 months, 18 months and two years."

What if I can't attend my local centre?

Ms Hennell said if there are circumstances in which families can't attend their local centre, alternative arrangements can be made.

"Many families have busy lifestyles, particularly if both parents work," Ms Hennell said.

"This can make it difficult for them to access the service during business hours.

"It can also be difficult for families to attend if, for example, they have mobility issues, lots of children or have just had a multiple birth.

"Council can arrange for its Outreach Maternal and Child Health Nurse to conduct key ages and stages visits either in the home, local childcare centre, early learning centre or kindergarten."

Bookings are essential and must be received by Tuesday 21 September.



Caulfield Police are looking for people to join the *Glen Eira Police Community Register*.

Formerly known as *Glen Eira Police Senior Citizens' Register*, the initiative aims to promote more confident and secure living among the City's older or vulnerable residents.

If you have some spare time and would like to be a part of a team, positions are open for volunteers and volunteer co-ordinators.

Training will be provided in all aspects of running the *Register*, which recently relocated from Murrumbeena to Caulfield Police Station.

The *Register*, which has more than 640 residents listed, has been operating since July 2007 and is maintained by Victoria Police with the support of 23 trained volunteers.

Leading Senior Constable Sue Radchenko said the *Register* was an important community safety initiative.

"The Glen Eira Police Community Register gives older residents peace of mind,"

Leading Senior Constable Radchenko said.

"It's a great way for our more vulnerable residents to stay in touch with the community. "Caulfield Police is very keen to ensure the continued success of the initiative and we see it as an ideal way of ensuring the continued safety of our older citizens." Residents who provide their details have their next of kin and emergency contact secured into the *Register's* database.All personal information is securely held.

Volunteers contact residents on the *Register* on a monthly basis to check on their welfare and security and to assist them with any concerns they may have. Referrals will be made to the appropriate service providers if assistance is required or asked for.

Glen Eira Police also offer a home safety audit to those on the *Register*, to ensure the resident's home has a clearly displayed house number, fitted smoke alarms, security doors, sensor lights and deadlocks.

Keep an eye out for swooping birds

It's nesting time for many birds in Glen Eira so from August to October, look out for swooping birds!

Like most animals, native birds instinctively protect their territory during nesting season and if they perceive you to be a potential threat, they may swoop. For many people who get caught in this position, it can be a very frightening experience.

The Australian Magpie, Magpie-lark, Red Wattlebird, Grey Butcherbird and Noisy Miners are the main culprits and are widespread throughout the Glen Eira region, especially around parks and open spaces. In a lot of cases, the birds are only trying to scare intruders away and avoid contact, but they have been known to scratch and peck people's heads and eyes.

Here are some tips to avoid being swooped.

Usually birds target individuals and stay clear of groups of people. They also tend to keep their distance if you are holding an umbrella or a large stick above your head.

Since the birds always attack from behind, be confident and face them. A strategy that is known to work quite well is sticking "eyes" to the back of hats or helmets. The worst

Reminder: Trim back overhanging branches

Glen Eira City Council is urging local residents to ensure trees and shrubs along the front of their properties aren't posing safety hazards.

Trees and shrubs planted on private property are the property owner's responsibility and any branches that hang over public footpaths and roadways must be cut back to reduce possible risks and danger to the public.

Council's Manager Civic Compliance John Bordignon said it's up to the property owner to maintain trees and shrubs on the edge of their land.

"With recent rains triggering a lot of garden growth, now is the time for residents to trim their trees and shrubs," Mr Bordignon said.

"This is particularly important along

or its fee-based fortnightly green waste service.

Mr Bordignon said if trees and shrubs are found to exceed these guidelines, residents or property owners run the risk of receiving a notice which details the issue and what action needs to be taken within 14 days.

Glen Eira City Council Manager Park Services Laurie Unwin said that swooping birds can cause injuries because they attack with their beaks and aim for people's heads.

"There is a real danger to cyclists if you do happen to ride through their nesting zones, so it is better to dismount and walk through these areas," Mr Unwin said. thing you can do is panic and run — this only encourages the birds to continue swooping.

Do not attack the birds or destroy their nests. All native birds are protected under the *Wildlife Act 1975* and there are serious penalties for taking, harassing or injuring the native wildlife. footpaths, where overhanging trees and shrubs pose a safety hazard to pedestrians. Overhanging branches can also obscure the view of drivers reversing out of driveways or travelling along streets and laneways."

Trees and shrubs must be cut to a height of three metres above the ground and they must be trimmed back to be vertical to the property boundary.

Residents wishing to dispose of the excess vegetation can use Council's free monthly bundled branch collection "Ultimately if an owner fails to comply, Council will engage a contractor to undertake the work and all charges associated with the work will be charged to the property owner in accordance with the *Local Government Act*," Mr Bordignon said.

Steve has been meeting every Friday with Monash Sport Fitness Centre

Co-ordinator Jeremy O'Halloran since the start of the year.

Jeremy told *Glen Eira News* he has worked closely with both Glen Eira and Stonnington City councils over the past few years through the *Access Unlimited* program and was more than happy to take Steve on.

"Steve assists us with a variety of tasks, from cleaning the gym to working on the front desk," Jeremy said.

Ο Δήμαρχος του Glen Eira Cr Steven Tang είπε ότι αν και ο Δήμος συλλέγει ηλεκτρονικά απορρίμματα σαν μέρος της υπηρεσίας συγκομιδής σκληρών απορριμμάτων, δεν είναι πάντα χωρισμένα, και σαν αποτέλεσμα μπορεί να καταλήξουν στη χωματερή.

Муниципалитет Glen Eira вводит в действие новую систему сбора вышедших из употребления бытовых электронных приборов (компьютеры, клавиатуры, телевизоры и т.д.) Новая система вводится в действие в пробном режиме.

В настоящее время, чтобы избавиться от вышедших из употребления бытовых электронных приборов, жители Glen Eira должны доставлять их в специальные пункты сбора, которые находятся на территории муниципалитетов Monash и Boroondara.

С внедрением новой системы, у жителей Glen Eira появится возможность оставить ненужную бытовую технику в одном из трех пунктов сбора на территории муниципалитета. Эта система вводится в действие на испытательный срок в 12 месяцев, и стоимость ее для муниципального бюджета составит \$65000.

По статистике организации Clean Up Australia, бытовая электроника является одним из самых быстрорастущих компонентов в совокупном потоке отходов.

Мэр муниципалитета Glen Eira г-н Steven Tang отметил, что хотя муниципальная служба сбора небытовых отходов в настоящее время вывозит вышедшие из употребления электронные приборы наряду с другими отходами, эти приборы далеко не всегда отделяются, и в результате часто попадают в общие места захоронения отходов. При этом бытовая электроника часто содержит такие металлы, как медь, золото и платину.

"Благодаря новой системе, мы сможем утилизировать ненужную бытовую электронику и посылать ее на переработку," сказал г-н Tang.

"В результате меньше отходов будет идти на захоронение."




