

ore than \$320,000 in community grants have been awarded to 136 not-for-profit community groups and organisations as part of Glen Eira City Council's 2010–11 Community Grants Program.

The *Program* assists community groups and organisations within the municipality to implement projects and activities.

Every year, Council awards grants across a broad range of categories including arts and culture, sport, recreation and youth, public health and community development, aged and community services and family and children's services.

Calvary Health Care Bethlehem was awarded a grant for \$5,082. Part of this funding has been allocated towards Creative Connections a free program that supports children and young people who are experiencing difficulty dealing with the serious illness or passing of a loved one.

Since it began in 2008, more than 100 families have been supported by the program through music and art therapy.

As part of the sessions, a qualified art therapist works with children on a variety of artistic projects, creating paintings, masks, drawings and clay modelling.

Director of Mission John De Bono said art and music therapy gives children the opportunity to express their feelings in what is always a very difficult time in their lives.

"When there is a serious illness or death in the family, often young children are deeply affected by the situation, but can't articulate their emotions," Mr De Bono said.

Chief Music Therapist and Creative Connections Co-ordinator Karen Bolger said even though some serious topics are discussed during the sessions, they are conducted in a fun and friendly environment.

"We want the children to recognise that they aren't on their own," Ms Bolger said.

"When many of them start the therapy they can find it difficult to talk about what is happening in their lives, but as they get involved in the art work or music they begin to open up and the difference is quite noticeable.

"This is an amazing program and we would love to hear from anyone in the community who would benefit from it or is keen to help out in some way."

The Ormond Angling Club Inc. was also awarded a community grant. The Club received \$1,830 to help them host fishing clinics for children and to promote their activities.

Ormond Angling Club's Walter Firestone said the clinics would be held in the school holidays once the redevelopment of the artificial lake at Caulfield Racecourse is complete.

"Some of the kids enjoy the clinics so much they'll stay the entire day," Mr Firestone said.

The funding will also go towards the installation of folding ramps at the club house to create a user-friendly facility for people living with a disability.

"We've recently formed a partnership with Access Unlimited and have plans to hold learn to fish days for people with disabilities in the future," Mr Firestone said.

New Councillor for Camden Ward

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Steven Tang has welcomed Cheryl Forge as the new Councillor for Camden Ward.

Cr Forge, who was sworn in at a Council meeting on 31 August, replaces Cr Helen Whiteside, who resigned from Council in July.

Married with two adult children, Cr Forge has lived in Glen Eira for most of her life. She attended Glen Huntly Primary School and during her secondary school years was a student at Shelford and Caulfield Grammar.

"Most of my professional career as a physiotherapist has been involved as a committee member and convenor of state and national physiotherapy bodies," Cr Forge said.

"More recently, I have been involved in planning issues as State Secretary on the Save our Suburbs committee." Cr Forge said she has many ideas for a better Glen Eira.

"I would like to increase the public visibility, accessibility and use of Caulfield Racecourse Reserve, including replacing the corrugated iron fence which surrounds two thirds of our park," Cr Forge said.

"I want to bring together the major stakeholders of the Caulfield Major Activity Centre and transport hub to develop a fabulous billion dollar regional shopping, recreational and cultural centre, readily accessible by rail, tram and bus, thus reducing taxes by avoiding duplication of such facilities elsewhere.

"Finally, I want to expedite the planting of green leaf canopy trees on our main roads, making Glen Eira a more desirable municipality in which to live, as well as concealing unsightly developments."

New technology gives rubbish new life

You might not realise that you can now recycle plastic takeaway food containers, plastic pots that plants come in, almost all hard plastic bottles (shampoo, cleaners and drink), aerosols and clean foil, milk and juice cartons, crushed cardboard boxes, envelopes, office paper and newspapers.

The technology that sorts recycling is now so advanced that it automatically sorts recyclables. It uses filters, magnets, floatation pools and lasers to sort materials.

Glen Eira's recyclables are first sorted by Visy at its Springvale plant.

As well as avoiding waste, recycling reduces greenhouse gas emissions released when rubbish decomposes in landfill.

The big no-no is putting things in the recycling and green waste bins that are not currently recyclable, especially plastic bags and ceramics.

Glen Eira City Council's Environment Advisory Committee Chair Cr Steven Tang said a single plastic bag can shut down an entire material recovery facility if it gets caught in its machinery.

"A few contaminated green waste or recycling bins can ruin an entire truckload destined for compost, mulch or recycling," Cr Tang said.

Thanks to residents for help with bin downsizing

In July, Council made 120 litre waste bins standard to promote better recycling habits. This decision is in line with nearly every other Melbourne council.

In July and August, more than 22,000 smaller rubbish bins were delivered to residents in Glen Eira. In addition, almost 5,000 households signed up for new green waste recycling services. The

old bins collected will be recycled into plastic covering for underground cables.

Council would like to thank the thousands of residents who helped by putting old bins out for collection, reporting stray bins or by reporting work that had not been completed.

There were several unexpected challenges including having to replace many more old bins than expected. Many of Glen Eira's old bins were made in 1981 and are some of the oldest in Melbourne.

There were many more requests than expected and because of this there were some delays in actioning requests. This work is now complete. If you still need something to be fixed, please contact Council.

Council adopts Municipal Early Years Plan

Glen Eira City Council has endorsed a plan which establishes clear planning and service provisions to meet the needs of children and their families.

The Municipal Early Years Plan (MEYP) 2010–2013 is a strategic plan for the development and co-ordination of early education, care and health services, activities and other local developments that impact on children from birth to six years.

An important part of the *Plan* is the *Action Plan*, which provides further details about the actions that will be undertaken to address the four strategic objectives.

Four key themes were identified — partnerships and advocacy; health and

safety; services for children and their families; and community engagement and connection — and four strategic objectives were developed according to these themes.

Council's Manager Family and Children's Services Jill Jolliffe said in preparing the MEYP, Council consulted extensively with the community.

"The Action Plan addresses some of the key issues raised during the community consultations, including lobbying the State Government for sufficient kindergarten funding and improving access to local playgroups," Ms Jolliffe said.

Ms Jolliffe said highlights of the Action Plan include new programs to facilitate

access for children of all-abilities and to protect children from vaccine preventable diseases.

"Parents will also receive additional support and will have the opportunity to attend a range of information evenings focusing on child health, development and parenting issues," Ms Jolliffe said.

Council will also actively promote health initiatives including walking and pram pushing between neighbourhood activities and *Taste 4 Health Kids*, as well as encouraging and supporting breastfeeding to optimise health outcomes for families.

CEO's column



Local government collects three per cent of total government taxation, but is responsible for 35 per cent of total government assets.

This means that councils need to spend a high proportion of their resources maintaining and renewing assets.

It also means federal and state governments, which between them collect 97 per cent of taxes, need to put more of that money back into local projects to provide community facilities and infrastructure.

Glen Eira City Council has been successful in attracting about 20 per cent more in government grants than our peer councils.

However, we still need continuing investment by government in, for example, early childhood development centres, recreation facilities (including libraries and community facilities as well as community sport), upgrading local transport (including bike networks and road safety) and retro-fitting infrastructure to reduce energy consumption and emissions (e.g. most of Council's emissions are generated from formerly government-owned street lights).

Co-operation between all levels of government is critical in achieving the best results from the taxes that we all pay.

Glen Eira sportsgrounds to benefit from eased water restrictions

Glen Eira City Council welcomes the State Government announcement to ease watering regulations for sportsgrounds and trees in public gardens and along streetscapes.

From September, Council is allowed to water all sportsgrounds in the municipality under Stage 2 exemptions, which will provide a huge boost to Glen Eira's sportsgrounds.

Council's Manager Recreation and Youth Services Linda Smith said sport plays a huge part of the culture in Glen Eira, with more than 330 sporting teams involving 6,000 people participating each year.

"The new regulations will ensure that Council can improve and maintain suitable playing surfaces," Ms Smith said.

Since Stage 3a water restrictions were introduced in 2007, Council has been proactive in managing its parks and sportsgrounds.

Council's Manager Park Services Laurie Unwin said putting water-saving initiatives in place was vital to conserve the municipality's parks and sportsgrounds.

"Council installed subsurface drip irrigation systems and resurfaced a lot of the grounds with warm season grasses," Mr Unwin said.

"Water tanks were also installed and two million litres of rainwater was extracted from an open excavation on East Boundary Road to water more than 3,000 street, park and reserve trees.

"In light of this announcement, it's important that Council keeps doing its best to implement water-saving strategies to prepare for extended dry spells in the future."

The other changes to the regulations allow Council to have more flexibility for watering trees.

Households and businesses will be eligible to apply for a one-off, 28 day

exemption from water restrictions to enable new warm season lawns to be established. For the average Melbourne backyard, water use is likely to be reduced by 30 per cent with these grasses.

Currently, Melbourne's water storages are approximately 40 per cent capacity, around 13 per cent higher than at the same time last year.

Council continues to fight graffiti

Graffiti represents a huge cost to the community and creates a negative and uninviting perception of neighbourhoods and commercial centres in the City of Glen Eira.

Reactive removal of graffiti from private property

Glen Eira City Council continues to assist residents with a reactive graffiti removal program on the title boundary of private property (both residential and commercial) which is visible from a public place. Requests for removal from private property can be made via Council's Service Centre on 9524 3333 or www.gleneira.vic.gov.au Requested works are referred to a priority list for consideration.

Graffiti removal kits

Glen Eira residents and traders can obtain, free of charge, personal graffiti removal kits from Council's Service Centre, corner Glen Eira and Hawthorn Roads, Caulfield.

Council and Victoria Police working together

Council welcomes the recent arrests for graffiti offences.

Caulfield Police apprehended the offenders in the McKinnon area in August.

Council will work with local police, providing any information available in order to assist with the successful prosecution of these and any other offenders.

Council's graffiti removal contractors maintain a database of all graffiti removed each month, including information on tags. This information is passed on to Victoria Police.

E-waste collection day

Glen Eira City Council will host an electronic waste (e-waste) collection day on Saturday 9 October.

To be held from 8am to 4pm at Carnegie Swim Centre, Moira Avenue in Carnegie, residents will be able to dispose of unwanted e-waste, including computer screens, keyboards and televisions.

Commercial quantities will not be accepted.

Assessments give parents peace of mind

Early childhood is an exciting time for children. For parents it is both rewarding and challenging.

Glen Eira City Council Maternal and Child Health Service offer an 18 month health and developmental assessment for every child.

The visit, which is part of the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development's 10 Kev Ages and Stages Visits Program, is conducted by one of Council's experienced maternal and child health nurses.

What happens at the 18 month visit?

The 18 month key ages and stages visit includes an assessment of the child using the Parent's Evaluation of Developmental Status (PEDS) questionnaire and includes the following:

- gross motor development walking well, running while watching the ground and carrying toys while walking;
- · vision and fine motor turning the pages of a book and pointing to objects;
- language, speech and hearing using five to 10 words, obeying simple instructions and pointing to eyes, nose and mouth; and
- social behaviour and play using a spoon and cup and taking off shoes and socks.

The maternal and child health nurse will also assess growth, nutrition, immunisations, oral health and discuss any concerns you may have.

Other assessments

It is important not only for 18 month old children to be assessed, but also children at other key stages of their development.

These visits are important in detecting any health or development issues early so appropriate referrals can be made.

The first assessment is conducted at the child's home following their discharge from hospital.

Subsequent assessments are then carried out at their local centre at two weeks, four weeks, eight weeks, four months, eight months, 12 months, two years and three and a half years.

The Service Centre consists of a 14 seat call centre and a four person front counter, which handles in excess of 230,000 calls and more than 50,000 counter enquiries per year.

Council's Customer Service Manager Greg Goldenberg said his team places a key emphasis on resolving customer queries the first time they contact

Council, thus improving our services to residents.

"The recent award is an indicator that the hard work we are putting in is making a difference for our community," Mr Goldenberg said.

Caulfield Primary School wins Award for Environmental Excellence

Caulfield Primary School has been recognised for its eco-friendly initiatives, winning Glen Eira City Council's 2010 Award for Environmental Excellence in Primary Schools.

The Award acknowledges primary schools who have demonstrated outstanding achievement and initiative in developing and implementing environmental projects for the benefit of the school or Glen Eira community.

Council's Environment Advisory
Committee Chair Cr Steven Tang said
Caulfield Primary School expanded their
environment program to engage school
and kindergarten students, teachers and
parents in a wide range of activities.

"The school's strong environmental leadership and planning has been the key behind several initiatives over the last two years," Cr Tang said.

"The installation of rain water tanks and water efficient toilets and taps has resulted in a 64 per cent reduction in use of drinkable water." On top of this, the students planted nearly 350 trees as part of Planet Ark's *National Tree Day*, built three new vegetable gardens and raised money for Oxfam and Tear Fund to fund environmental projects in communities in Cambodia and Tanzania.

They also received a *Victorian Rubbish* Free Lunch Challenge Award for their efforts in reducing plastic packaging in student lunches in 2009.

Caulfield Primary School Acting Principal Bronwyn Morgan said the students were "thrilled" to win the Award for Environmental Excellence in Primary Schools.

"There is a core group in the school community who are very passionate about environmental sustainability, and being recognised is a validation of what they've been doing," Ms Morgan said.

"The students have built a very strong understanding of how to look after the environment, and this has been done by complementing our sustainability projects with our other learning programs."

The other applicants for this year's *Award* were:

- Glen Huntly Primary School the school has significantly reduced their water use and continues to develop a school-wide approach to sustainability;
- Bentleigh West Primary School —the school continues to demonstrate leadership in biodiversity, water conservation, waste management and energy savings;
- St Peter's Primary School the school has reduced waste going to landfill by 50 per cent, established a kitchen garden and installed a 27,000 litre water tank;
- Carnegie Primary School the school has concentrated on biodiversity and created a bird, bug and frog friendly space in their school yard;

- Coatesville Primary School the school has developed and are implementing a Waste Management Action Plan; and
- Melbourne Community School —
 the school has installed a solar panel
 and established a kitchen garden,
 used by students once a week to
 prepare lunch together.

"These schools are also to be commended for their excellent work. There was a very high standard of applications and it showed how many schools have now established very effective environmental projects," Cr Tang said.

Make a difference in the community

Do you enjoy helping people, working flexible hours and doing a wide range of work across the course of your day?

Glen Eira City Council currently has vacancies for support workers to provide assistance to elderly residents or people with a disability.

There are three different positions available: home care worker, home care/personal care worker and respite care worker.

Home care workers provide domestic assistance to maintain a clean and hygienic home. Tasks may include vacuuming, mopping, cleaning bathrooms and shopping.

Cheryl has recently taken on a home care worker position and finds the job very rewarding.

"I've only been working in the job for 12 months, but I've really built up a rapport with the clients," Cheryl said.

Before joining Council, Cheryl worked as a sales representative for more than 20 years. She said a health scare a few years ago prompted her to consider a change in career.

Cheryl said she enjoys the experience of learning things from the variety of people she encounters on a daily basis.

"I've learnt a lot about history, gardening and different cultures just by chatting to the clients and that's something that's very rewarding about the job," Cheryl said.

"I feel as much as I give, I get just as much back."

Home care/personal care workers undertake household tasks as well as tasks of a more personal nature such as helping clients with bathing, dressing and grooming.

Support worker, Tina has worked with Council for more than 12 years and said she still enjoys the job as much as she did when she first started.

"I've formed a special bond with many of the clients because I've worked with them for a long period of time," Tina said.

"You need to be very compassionate, patient and understanding because you have to deal with both elderly and younger clients."

Respite care workers provide a break from the caring role for the primary carer in a family.

In home respite can be provided to a person who cares for a child with a disability or an adult who is frail or has a disability.

The role combines duties of both home care and personal care.

Carer Berni has worked across all three roles over the last 18 months and believes she was geared to do this job.

"What I do enables clients to stay at home for longer because I help them do things they can't do for themselves," Berni said.

"I believe in quality care. This isn't just a job to me — I believe in making a difference in people's lives."

Keeping safe this summer

With summer fast approaching, here are some simple safety tips to help you get through the warmer months.

Who is most at risk from heat-related illness?

- people over 65, particularly those living alone without airconditioning;
- pregnant women, breastfeeding mothers and infants;
- overweight or obese people;
- people with pre-existing health conditions;
- people with limited or poor mobility; and

 people taking medications that may interfere with the body's ability to regulate temperature.

Preparing yourself for a heatwave

- Improve your aerobic fitness by undertaking regular, moderate exercise in warmer weather prior to severe hot weather. This will enable your body to adapt and cope better during a heatwave.
- · Lose excess weight.
- Visit your doctor and make sure any pre-existing medical conditions are as well controlled as possible.

Preparing your house for a heatwave

- Have your airconditioner serviced.
- Look at the things you can do to make your home cooler, such as installing awnings, shade cloth or external blinds on the sun facing sides of the house.

Preparing for a power failure

- Think about what you would do if a heatwave caused a power outage or disrupted public transport — would you be ok?
- In the event of a power outage, ensure you have a torch, fully-charged mobile phone, battery-operated radio and sufficient batteries.

Look out for others

- Take care of yourself and look out for family, friends and neighbours who may need help coping in the heat. Help them to prepare their house for the hottest part of summer.
- Have a list of family and close friends' telephone numbers by your phone in case of an emergency.

Keeping your newborn safe around the family pet

Welcoming a new member to the family is always a wonderful experience, but are your pets ready for this dramatic change in lifestyle?

Dogs and cats are usually not comfortable with sudden changes to their routine and need time and training to adjust to a situation.

Pets need to be comfortable with having toddlers around, so take some time to familiarise your pets with children in a supervised environment.

Areas of your home may now be made 'out-of-bounds' for pets and because of the newborn, the amount of attention your pets receive is likely to reduce in the initial months.

Research indicates that children under five are at the highest risk of injury from dog attacks, which highlights the importance of familiarising both pets and kids with each other.

For pets, seemingly harmless behaviour such as jumping up or play-biting that was tolerated before needs to be discouraged. In order to do this, ignore incorrect behaviour and focus on positive reinforcement. Remember that patience is a virtue, as this may take

some time. It may be a good idea to speak to your local vet or animal behaviourist for advice.

When your toddler is old enough to move around, it is important to actively supervise them when they are around pets. Toddler's are unsteady on their feet and are at risk of accidentally hurting or scaring your pets which could have severe consequences.

Before the arrival of your newborn, arrange annual vaccinations for your pets and trim their claws if required.

Even if you own a breed that is known for being good with children, still take the time to slowly familiarise your pet with your toddler. An animal's training and individual temperament are more important than its breed.

Who are your emergency contacts?

If you were involved in a serious accident or fell ill, would the person attending the scene know who to call?

This is often a situation that confronts paramedics when they arrive at the scene of an accident, but have no idea who the patient's emergency contact is.

The In Case of Emergency (ICE) campaign hopes to solve this problem, with emergency services and hospital staff being able to quickly contact the right person by simply dialling the number you have stored in your mobile phone as ICE.

British paramedic Bob Brotchie came up with the idea in May 2005 and since then the campaign has attracted growing support across Europe, Australia and North America.

Your ICE contact could be a family member, close friend or doctor. You can also list more than one contact. In your mobile phone's address book, enter the contact names as ICE1, ICE2, ICE3, and so forth.

Your ICE contact should know your basic medical information, such as blood type and allergies and be able to help emergency services make decisions if needed.

Glen Eira City Council Manager Public Health and Community Development Mark Saunders said emergency contacts can provide crucial information to those at the scene.

"It's hoped that nobody will ever have to use your phone to ring an ICE contact, but unfortunately accidents do happen sometimes," Mr Saunders said

While mobile phones can not be solely relied upon in times of emergencies, taking this small step could help you in times of need.

Safe disposal of medication

Residents wanting to dispose of unwanted or out-of-date medications are encouraged to visit Glen Eira Town Hall during October.

As part of Community Safety Month, a medical waste disposal unit for residents will be placed in the foyer of Council's Service Centre.

Council's Director Community Services Peter Jones said people often keep medicines that are no longer needed or are out-of-date without realising the potential consequences. "Storing large amounts of outdated medicine is dangerous and is one of the major causes of the alarmingly high rate of childhood poisoning," Mr Jones said.

"Medicine can also contaminate the environment when deposited into landfill sites and sewerage facilities.

"Residents wanting further information about disposing of their medication safely should speak to their local GP"

Η νέα τεχνολογία δίνει στα σκουπίδια νέα ζωή

Μπορεί να μην έχετε καταλάβει ότι τώρα μπορείτε να ανακυκλώσετε πλαστικά πακέτα έτοιμου φαγητού, πλαστικές γλάστρες για φυτά, σχεδόν όλα τα σκληρά πλαστικά μπουκάλια (σαμπουάν, καθαριστικά και ποτά), αεροζόλ, και καθαρό αλουμινόχαρτο, χαρτόνια γάλατος και χυμών, πατημένα χαρτοκιβώτια, φάκελα, χαρτιά γραφείου και εφημερίδες.

Η τεχνολογία που ξεχωρίζει την ανακύκλωση είναι τώρα τόσο προχωρημένη που αυτόματα ξεχωρίζει τα ανακυκλώσιμα. Χρησιμοποιεί φίλτρα, μαγνήτες, δεξαμενές επίπλευσης και λέιζερ για να ξεχωρίζει τα υλικά.

Τα ανακυκλώσιμα του Δήμου του Glen Eira ξεχωρίζονται πρώτα στο εργοστάσιο της Visy στο Springvale.

Μαζί με τη αποφυγή σκουπιδιών, η ανακύκλωση μειώνει τις εκπομπές αέριου του θερμοκηπίου που διαρρέουν όταν τα σκουπίδια αποσυντίθενται στη χωματερή.

Το μεγάλο όχι είναι να μην βάζουμε πράγματα στους πράσινους κάδους ανακύκλωσης που επί του παρόντος δεν είναι ανακυκλώσιμα, ειδικά πλαστικές σακούλες και κεραμικά.

Ο Δήμαρχος της Glen Eira Στίβεν Τάνγκ είπε ότι μια μόνο πλαστική σακούλα μπορεί να σταματήσει όλη την εγκατάσταση ανάκτησης υλικών αν πιαστεί στη μηχανή

Gli impianti di selezionamento del riciclaggio sono adesso così avanzati da selezionare automaticamente i prodotti riciclabili. Per il selezionamento utilizzano filtri, magneti, vasche di separazione e laser.

I rifiuti riciclabili di Glen Eira vengono prima selezionati dalla Visy presso l'impianto di Springvale.

Oltre ad evitare lo spreco di risorse riutilizzabili, il riciclaggio riduce le emissioni di gas serra che si formano durante la decomposizione dei rifiuti nelle discariche.

È assolutamente sbagliato deporre nei bidoni del riciclaggio e dei rifiuti organici ciò che non è adatto al riciclaggio, specialmente sacchetti di plastica e oggetti di ceramica.

Il Sindaco di Glen Eira, Cons. Steven Tang, ha affermato che un solo sacchetto di plastica può causare il bloccaggio di un intero impianto di recupero materiali se rimane impigliato nei macchinari.

"Bastano pochi bidoni contaminati da materiale non riciclabile per rovinare un intero carico destinato a concime, pacciame o riciclaggio" ha ribadito il Cons.Tang.

Un ringraziamento ai residenti

Nel mese di luglio, il Comune di Glen Eira ha standardizzato i bidoni dei rifiuti da 120 litri allo scopo di promuovere una migliore attitudine al riciclaggio allineandosi con quasi tutti gli altri comuni di Melbourne.

Новая технология переработки отходов

Современные технологии позволяют перерабатывать такие виды отходов, как пластмассовые контейнеры для готовой еды, пластмассовые горшки для цветов, почти все виды бутылок из твердой пластмассы (шампуни, напитки, химикаты), аэрозоли и чистая фольга, картонные контейнеры из-под молока и сока, спресованные картонные коробки, конверты, писчая бумага и газеты.

Сортировка разных видов отходов происходит автоматически, с использованием различных фильтров, магнитов, флотационных бассейнов и лазеров.

Сортировка отходов, собранных в муниципалитете Glen Eira, производится компанией Visy на их предприятии в районе Springvale.

Помимо экономии ресурсов, утилизация отходов позволяет уменьшить выделение парниковых газов в атмосферу, которое происходит при разложении отходов в местах захоронения.

Для эффективности процесса утилизации очень важно, чтобы жители муниципалитета не клали в специальные мусорные контейнеры для переработки бытовых отходов и переработки садовых отходов то, что не может быть переработано, особенно полиэтиленовые пакеты и керамику.

Мэр муниципалитета Glen Eira г-н Steven Tang отметил, что один полиэтиленовый пакет, если он попадает в оборудование, может привести к остановке всего технологического процесса.

"Несколько неправильно заполненных мусорных контейнеров для переработки отходов могут испортить целую партию груза, идущего на компостирование, мульчирование или переработку," отметил г-н Tang.

Спасибо жителям муниципалитета

В июле этого года муниципалитет Glen Eira принял решение перейти на 120-литровые мусорные контейнеры для оптимизации переработки отходов. Такое же решение было принято почти во всех остальных муниципалитетах Мельбурна.

В июле-августе более 22000 новых 120-литровых контейнеров было доставлено жителям. Старые контейнеры пошли на переработку: из них будут изготовливать пластмассовую изоляцию для подземных кабелей.

Муниципалитет благодарит всех жителей, которые выставили для сбора старые контейнеры, сообщили в муниципалитет о потерянных контейнерах или о различных работах по благоустройству, которые не были завершены.



This will be achieved through a combination of physical improvements, considerate policy, promotion and prioritising sustainable transport options.


The Strategy also addresses the needs of all types of cyclists by providing a range of safe, continuous and connected routes.
