Crossing leaves motorists seeing red

he RACV and Leader Community Newspaper's 2010 Redspot Survey identified the Murrumbeena and Neerim Road rail crossing as Melbourne's most frustrating stretch of road.

According to the Survey, motorists wait for up to 36 trains to travel through the crossing between 8am and 9am, with boom gates down at times for more than 38 minutes.

While it is the first year this intersection has been named as the number one redspot, Glen Eira residents have been aware of the worsening traffic conditions for several years.

The problem isn't just confined to

Glen Eira Mayor Steven Tang said the forum allowed the community to share their views with the Department of Transport and Council's traffic engineers.

"Council has exerted pressure to encourage the State Government to investigate and allocate funding for grade separation of the Dandenong line," Cr Tang said.

To date, no funding has been provided for grade separation works. However, the State Government did allocate \$1 million in the 2010 State Budget for a grade separation investigation of 11 level crossings between Caulfield and South Dandenong.

The RACV believes the best solution is to put the rail line underground to fix all three crossings.

The State Government recently allocated \$440 million over 10 years for railway crossing grade separations across Victoria. However, RACV Chief **Engineer Traffic and Transport Peter** Daly said this would "barely scratch the surface."

Mr Daly called on the State Government to construct a minimum of five underpasses or overpasses each year to eliminate all major railway crossings in the metropolitan area.

Murrumbeena Traders' Association President Sue Foley described

the Murrumbeena and Neerim Road crossing, with nearby Poath Road and Koornang Road crossings falling just outside the top 10 redspots.

The concerns of local residents were most recently expressed at a Glen Eira City Council forum held to discuss grade separation. This process involves changing the height of either the road or rail line so that they don't cross paths, which in theory will increase safety by improving the flow of trains, cars, cyclists and pedestrians.

VicRoads Acting Regional Director Metro South East Frank De Santis said the investigation would assess which sites are suitable for grade separation or what alternatives could be used to alleviate congestion in the Caulfield and Murrumbeena areas.

"The investigation will include considering ways to improve the efficiency of level crossings that are linked to traffic signals in order to reduce delays," Mr De Santis said.

the intersection as an "absolute disaster" because of the effect lowered boom gates were having on traffic flow, which in turn impacted on local businesses.

"People avoid the area because they run the risk of being stuck at the intersection," Ms Foley said.

"We will be speaking to local traders to create a petition to our governments to address the problems created by the traffic issues."

Glen Eira City Council's Student Achievement Award Program has had its largest ever response from local schools since it started in 2006.

Mayor's column

November heralds another election — this time the Victorian State Election.

Such a time presents a good opportunity to highlight some of the issues of state importance that residents and ratepayers have put on the advocacy agenda.

The separation of local level crossings is a perennial issue that has been most recently highlighted by Murrumbeena Road's number one position in the RACV and Leader Community Newspaper's Redspot Survey. Many in our community are looking for a response to the level crossings that contribute to excessive congestion, fracture shopping strips and create potential safety.

Local residents have also voiced their concerns about greenhouse gas emissions. The Glen Eira community was amongst the first in Melbourne to change light globes in their homes and now is the perfect time to give our streets the green light too. Glen Eira City Council is part of a campaign asking the state and federal governments to help fund the high upfront cost of switching to energy-efficient street lights.

Lastly, the next State Government needs to ensure that reforms to early childhood education are supported by adequate infrastructure funding, adequate support for the increased staffing requirement and do not come at the expense of much-valued community-run programs, such as three-year-old kindergarten and playgroups. I will be speaking to candidates about these and other issues, such as public transport, planning and the Caulfield Racecourse Reserve. I wish everyone well for Saturday 27 November and hope that the sausage sizzle, cake stall and, above all else, the result live up

GESAC work continues, new website launched

Construction on the \$41.2 million Glen Eira Sports and Aquatic Centre (GESAC) is progressing well and is still on track to open in late 2011 — in time for summer.

The 25 metre indoor pool, learn-to-swim pool and warm water program pool are starting to take shape, with preliminary work beginning on the outdoor area surrounding the eight lane, 50 metre pool.

Work on the indoor sports stadium is ahead of schedule and once it is complete will be suitable for netball, basketball, badminton, volleyball, futsal and table tennis.

Glen Eira City Council Group Manager Major Projects and Infrastructure Renewals Mark Judge said it had been a challenge to keep the program on schedule because of the wettest winter experienced in 13 years.

"We are expecting things to accelerate over the summer months," Mr Judge said.

"Previously a lot of the work we had been doing was underground. Most of

this is now finished and when residents go past the site they will notice significant progress on the exterior."

Manager GESAC appointed

Council has recently appointed Mark Collins as the new manager for GESAC.

Mr Collins, who has an extensive background in leisure facility management, said he was looking forward to working with the Glen Eira community in what will be one of the country's premier leisure facilities.

"GESAC has been designed as a facility that will have something for everyone aged from six weeks to 75 years under the one roof," Mr Collins said. Mr Collins said his first priority is to build a profile for the facility within the community.

A new website — www.gesac.com.au — has been developed to keep the general public up-to-date with construction and facility information.

"I encourage all members of the public to check the website regularly as it will have the most up to date information on the construction process and facility information," Mr Collins said.

"There will also be some fantastic foundation membership offers coming soon which will be a chance for the community to get a never-to-berepeated special deal on membership – so stay tuned."

"In response to this, the Glen Eira and Bayside Tasking Units ran two operations which were successful.We patrolled hotspots and some arrests were made," Inspector Sharp said.

"We'd like to remind residents to remove valuables and to lock their car at all times. Items like iPods, mobile phones and navigation devices are regularly stolen. Just because your car is in the driveway doesn't mean it's safe."

In terms of traffic statistics on Glen Eira's roads, there has been a slight drop

Police statistics show crime in the City of Glen Eira dropped two per cent from July 2009 to June 2010.

Robbery decreased by 15 per cent, while motor vehicle theft dropped almost 40 per cent. There were also reductions in burglary and drug offences committed within the municipality.

Police Service Area Manager for Glen Eira Inspector Bryan Sharp said a high visible police presence was one of the major factors in the improvements.

"Glen Eira continues to be a safe place for residents and businesses. Overall, crime is down and we are pleased with the results that have been achieved," Inspector Sharp said.

While the results have been encouraging, one statistic that stands out is the rise in theft from motor vehicles. in fatalities, but the major improvement is the reduction of serious injuries in road accidents, which is down by almost 28 per cent.

Across the state, the crime rate has decreased for the ninth consecutive year. The highlight of this year's figures is the 19 per cent reduction of robberies involving knives.

Proceeds from the ribbon sales go towards programs that seek to change attitudes in the community and raise awareness of the issue.

Glen Eira Mayor Steven Tang said every member of the community has the right to feel safe.

"When children are exposed to violence at an early age, it often has a knock-on effect and impacts on their lives when they get older," Cr Tang said.

"We need to ensure children grow up learning how to relate to others with trust and respect."

Cr Tang said the City of Glen Eira compares favourably against the majority of Victoria's other regions, however there is still a lot that can be done.

"Police statistics show there were 505 recorded family incidents in the municipality last year — an 11 per cent reduction on the figure for 2008–09," Cr Tang said.

"There was also a two per cent drop in overall crime across Glen Eira in the last 12 months."

Clean up after your dog

There's nothing worse than returning home after an afternoon at the local park with family and friends, only to realise something smells funny. A quick check of the soles of your shoes confirms exactly what you hoped not to find, and suddenly you're now in a foul mood.

It's a situation that seems to be occurring too often, so Glen Eira City Council is urging all pet owners to be mindful of others by cleaning up after their dogs and to dispose of litter responsibly.

Council's Manager Civic Compliance John Bordignon said dog litter is a major contributor to pollution in our waterways and the bay.

"When it rains, any rubbish or waste left on roads, nature strips or gutters is washed into the stormwater drainage system, meaning it ends up in Port Phillip Bay," Mr Bordignon said.

"It's also rather unpleasant and is a real eyesore for anybody who has to walk past."

Apart from the environmental and health risks, leaving dog litter in public spaces can also damage your hip pocket. Anyone caught failing to pick up their dog's litter could receive a \$125 on-the-spot fine.

Pet owners should never leave the house with their pet without taking a few spare plastic bags along, however plastic bag dispensers are available in some of Glen Eira's parks and reserves.

Civic compliance officers will also be distributing POOch Pouches during their patrols of local parks. "These pouches can be fixed onto your dog lead and can hold up to two shopping bags. Residents are more than welcome to contact Council if they would like to pick one up," Mr Bordignon said.

"It's not difficult for dog owners to ensure Glen Eira's parks, gardens, playgrounds, footpaths and other public spaces remain enjoyable for everyone."

School crossing supervisors play a vital role in the safety and wellbeing of residents in the Glen Eira.

Dental health and your child

As part of Glen Eira City Council's Maternal and Child Health Service, free oral checks are conducted at the eight week, 18 month and three-and-a-half year old key ages and stages visit.

Oral checks are an integral part of these visits however, parents can talk with the nurse regarding their child's oral development at any of the 10 key ages and stages visits.

Nurses can provide general advice and if necessary refer you to either Bentleigh-Bayside Dental Clinic or a child-friendly dentist in your local area.

Tooth tip one

Did you know that tooth cleaning should start as soon as your baby's first tooth appears? Maintaining healthy teeth and gums at an early age will reduce the likelihood of gum disease later in life.

As soon as your baby's teeth appear, clean the baby teeth twice a day by wrapping a clean damp face washer or gauze around your finger and wiping each tooth front and back.

Tooth tip two

Avoid using a baby's bottle for comfort and encourage your child to drink from a cup from around six months of age.

For babies and toddlers, problems start when a bottle is used for comfort when going to sleep, to suck during the night or to snack on during the day. If the bottle contains any drink other than water including milk — the sugar in the fluid sits on the teeth and gums for some time — this could cause decay before the teeth have even broken through.

Tooth tip three

A low fluoride toothpaste (a pea sized amount is enough) and a soft, children's toothbrush can be introduced between 18 months to six years. Remember to encourage your child to spit out the toothpaste after brushing.

Tooth tip four

We know that children do not need soft drinks for good health. Establishing good behaviours early in life is important, so encourage your child to drink and enjoy water.

Water helps keep the body healthy and also washes out the mouth after eating.

Children who have sweet drinks such as cordial, soft drink and juice regularly are at higher risk of tooth decay.

2009-10 Annual Report now available

Glen Eira City Council's 2009-10 Annual Report is now available.

Council produces the Annual Report each year to provide the community, stakeholders and staff with information about how it has performed against the



objectives set out in the Community Plan.

Council's Chief Executive Officer Andrew Newton said that a number of key improvements had been made to the city in 2009-10, meeting the strategic objectives and actions outlined in the *Community Plan*.

"The Annual Report is a snapshot of Council's achievements, challenges and difficulties faced over the year," Mr Newton said.

"The information contained within the report is an open, accurate and transparent look at our performance across all sectors.

"We encourage the community to take an interest in the report and welcome any feedback from our residents."

2009-10 highlights

- Construction began on the \$41 million Glen Eira Sports and Aquatic Centre (GESAC). This is expected to be completed by late 2011.
- The Bentleigh Library was renovated and reopened with a day of community celebration.
- Council immunised more than 9,000 children and completed more than 16,000 key ages and stages assessments.
- More than 13,000 square metres of graffiti was removed from more than 1,200 individual sites across the municipality.
- Council received an Award for Planning Excellence from the Planning Institute of Australia for its No Request for Further Information (NORFI) program.
- A study found that gross greenhouse gas emissions from Council's operations were amongst the lowest of the metropolitan councils. Eco-Buy also recognised Council for having achieved the highest amount of green purchasing and mains water savings.

"They are able to choose the type of care they want to provide, including full-time, part-time, before and after school and holiday care."

Ms Bergroth said careproviders are able to set their own fees that reflect the service they provide.

"Another benefit is that careproviders are strongly supported by Council's qualified early childhood professionals and provided with regular home visits and professional development training," Ms Bergroth said.

Careproviders involved in the Family Day Care scheme undergo an application process that includes orientation and a police record check, a Working with Children Check, a home safety check and a medical assessment.

IBL Program

Since 1994, Glen Eira City Council has participated in Swinburne's Public and Environment Health Industry Based Learning (IBL) Program.

The Program is offered to Swinburne University students who are completing their third year in the Bachelor of Health Science (Public and Environmental Health) course. Once students complete this four year course, they are qualified to work as environmental health officers.

The IBL Program encourages students to observe, think, analyse, synthesis, evaluate and apply the theory they have learnt in the classroom.

For the past 16 years, Council has offered Swinburne University students the opportunity to complete their industry based learning year with Council as a Cadet Environmental Health Officer.

During this 12 month program, the cadet is assigned an environmental health mentor who assists them with their training and development. The Program also requires the cadet to gain practical experience in a variety of areas, such as food inspections, complaint investigations, food and water sampling and tobacco education information.

Upon completion of the placement, the cadet is then required to complete their final year at Swinburne University. Once the students have received their Bachelor degree, they are then able work in local government as a fully qualified environmental health officer.

In addition, Council's participation in the IBL Program has assisted with recruitment issues faced by the environmental health profession, with Council retaining a number of Swinburne students that have previously completed their industry based learning year with Council.

Food Safety Week

Myths and Mastery is the theme of Food Safety Week 2010, which will be held from 8–14 November.

What isn't a myth is the statistics surrounding food poisoning. Out of the 5.4 million cases of food poisoning reported in Australia annually, a third of these cases are thought to have originated from cooking in the home.

With the festive season around the corner and the daily temperatures rising, it is important to implement safe food practices as hot weather, large crowds, overloaded fridges and foods we don't normally cook, all make perfect conditions for food poisoning.

We are also more likely to be cooking for several generations and need to be especially careful when preparing food for young children, the elderly, pregnant women, and people whose immune systems may be compromised. Food poisoning could be very serious for them.

Here are a few easy things to do in order to minimise the obvious food safety risks.

Shopping

- · Buy from reputable suppliers with clean premises.
- Avoid spoiled foods, foods past their use-by dates or foods in damaged containers or packaging.
- Buy chilled and frozen foods towards the end of your shopping trip.



With the festive season just around the corner, it is important to implement safe food practices.

- Hot chickens and other hot foods should also be purchased later in your trip and kept separate from cold food.
- Take chilled, frozen, or hot foods straight home in insulated containers.
- Once you arrive home, immediately transfer chilled and frozen food into your fridge and freezer.

Storing

- Cold food must be kept at 5°C or colder.
- Frozen food must be kept frozen solid at minus 15°C or colder
- Thaw food in the fridge. Food that is thawing should be stored below and separate from cooked and ready to eat foods. This means that raw food cannot drip onto the cooked food.
- Divide large portions of food into small batches before thawing. Large portions take longer to thaw.

Cooking

• Use a thermometer to ensure the centre of the cooked food needs to reach 75°C.

Cook poultry until the meat is white — there should be no pink flesh.

- Cook rolled or stuffed meats, mince, sausages and whole poultry until the juices run clear.
- Keep hot food at 60°C or hotter.

Cleaning

- Always wash hands with warm soapy water before and after handling food.
- Use dry, clean, sanitised cutting boards, utensils, containers and equipment and wash with hot soapy water between handling raw and cooked food.
- Clean and rinse cloths after each use. Replace cloths frequently.

Taste 4 Health and Taste 4 Health Kids

Glen Eira City Council encourages all food businesses to respond to the public demand for healthy, nutritious food by taking advantage of Council's Taste 4 Health and Taste 4 Health Kids nutrition programs.

Statistics show an alarming increase in the number of overweight children and adults in Australia. Now more than

ever, consumers are concerned about the nutritional value of what they eat. As a result, the food industry and many businesses are making changes to provide healthy food options.

Council's Taste 4 Health and Taste 4 Health Kids nutrition programs are award-winning public health initiatives that assist local businesses with

food they serve.

The programs involve a nutrition assessment of the business menu based on criteria developed in partnership with the International Diabetes Institute, Caulfield Community Health Service and Bentleigh-Bayside Community Health.

Council's Manager Public Health and Community Development Mark Saunders said the criteria is focused on reducing total and saturated fats, salt and refined sugar and increasing dietary fibre.

Taste 4 Health and Taste 4 Health **Kids tips**

- · Offer water or have it visible for customers to help themselves.
- Offer your customers low fat alternatives such as boiled or steamed rice, noodles and baked potatoes instead of fried rice, fried noodles and chips.
- · Leave edible skins on fruits and vegetables during preparation of dishes.

Food Act amendments

As reported on page three of the September edition of *Glen Eira News*, the State Government has amended Victorian food safety laws.These laws provide Glen Eira City Council with new powers to penalise food businesses that have unhygienic and unsafe practices, including:

- temporary close food business that are found to be unsafe;
- stopping food handling from occurring at a food business until the business is in a clean and sanitary state;
- seizing unsafe and unhygienic food and equipment;
- issuing written legal notices, requiring businesses to comply with National Food Safety Standards; and
- issuing penalty infringement notices to businesses for a range of breaches relating to safe food handling and cleanliness (from March 2011).

Council has also retained the powers to prosecute poor performing food businesses in a Magistrates Court.

These new laws will assist Council to ensure that the public's safety is

protected by dealing with the food businesses that do not comply with the regulations a lot quicker than in previous years.

In addition to these powers, the laws have been amended to take into account the unique nature of some occasional activities conducted for the purposes of fundraising by community groups, such as sporting clubs, senior citizens groups, church groups and other similar bodies.

These groups are able to conduct fundraising activities, such as simple

sausage sizzles, cake stalls (without cream filling) and the sale of biscuits, tea and coffee at temporary food premises without the need to obtain *Food Act registration* with Council. The groups only need to notify Council of the operation of the temporary food premises and this can be done by filling out Council's *Notification to sell food at a community event* form.

鐵道路口

RACV 和 Leader 社區報社聯合開展的 《2010 年危險點調查》確認在 Murrumbeena 和 Neerim 路上的鐵道路口為 2010 年維多利 亞州第一危險點。

據《調查》報告,上午八點至九點之間,共 有 36 列火車通過該鐵道路口,欄杆放下時間 累計為 38 分鍾之多。

Glen Eira 市政區 Steven Tang 市長説, 市政府認為 Dandenong 火車線,包括 Murrumbeena 鐵道路口造成了交通問題。

"市政府對州政府施加了壓力,對分離 Dandenong 鐵道與公路進行調查並撥出 資金。"

Tang 市長説:"州政府設有 4.4 億澳元的鐵 道與公路分離資金,但迄今未説明這筆錢將 花在甚麼地方。"

市政府對鐵道與公路分離所作出的評論是以 《Eddington 報告》為背景資料的,該報告建 議新建一條長 17 公里的地下鐵道,一端連接 Caulfield 火車站,另一端至內西區。

該地下鐵道和未決定的至 Dandenong 的第 三條鐵道雖然可使去 Caulfield 火車站乘坐 火車的乘客人數一小時增至四萬左右,但也 會加重鐵道路口的堵車現象,因為火車班次 多,鐵道路口欄杆放下的次數也隨之增加。

Tang 市長説,只有在鐵道與公路分離後,鐵 道與幹道相交道口的塞車現象才可能減緩。

市政府的主張迄今未得到州政府的支持。

《2010 年維州財政預算》撥出一百萬澳元供 VicRoads 開展鐵道與公路的分離調查,重點 放在 Caulfield 和 Murrumbeena。

Διασταύρωση αφήνει τους αυτοκινητιστές θυμωμένους

Η Έρευνα «Redspot» του RACV και της Κοινοτικής Εφημερίδας Leader του 2010 εντόπισε την διασταύρωση τρένου στην Murrumbeena και Neerim Road ως το υπ αριθμόν ένα Redspot στη Βικτώρια για το 2010.

Σύμφωνα με την Έρευνα, οι αυτοκινητιστές περιμένουν για μέχρι και 36 τρένα να περάσουν τη διασταύρωση μεταξύ 8πμ και 9μμ με τις μπάρες κατεβασμένες σε αυτό το διάστημα για περισσότερο από 38 λεπτά.

Ο Δήμαρχος του Glen Eira Steven Tang είπε ότι ο Δήμος έχει αναγνωρίσει τη γραμμή του Dandenong συμπεριλαμβανομένης και της διασταύρωσης Murrumbeena, ως πρόβλημα.

Ό Δήμος εξάσκησε πίεση στην Πολιτειακή Κυβέρνηση να ερευνήσει και να παραχωρήσει χρηματοδότηση για επίπεδο διαχωρισμό της γραμμής του Dandenong.

'Η Πολιτειακή Κυβέρνηση έχει \$440 εκατομμύρια χρηματοδότηση για τον επίπεδο διαχωρισμό αλλά ακόμα δεν λέει που θα διατεθεί αυτό το ποσό,' είπε ο Δήμαρχος Tang.

Τα σχόλια του Δήμου για τον επίπεδο διαχωρισμό έχουν γίνει στο πλαίσιο της *Έκθεσης Eddington*, η οποία συνιστά νέα σιδηροδρομική σήραγγα 17 χιλιομέτρων που θα συνδέει το Σταθμό του Caulfield με τα εσωτερικά δυτικά προάστια.

Η σήραγγα και η υπό συζήτηση τρίτη γραμμή για το Dandenong ενόσω αυξάνει την χωρητικότητα κατά 40,000 επιβάτες την ώρα στις γραμμές τροφοδοσίας στο Σταθμό του Caulfield, θα αυξήσει μόνο το αδιέξοδο στις διασταυρώσεις όπως τα περισσότερα τρένα κάνουν τις μπάρες να καταβαίνουν συχνότερα.

Ο Δήμαρχος Tang είπε ότι μόνο αν γίνει ο επίπεδος διαχωρισμός θα υπάρξει μείωση στη διένεξη και στο συνωστισμό όπου η σιδηροδρομική γραμμή διασταυρώνει κύριους δρόμους.

Μέχρι σήμερα, οι προτάσεις του Δήμου στην Πολιτειακή Κυβέρνηση δεν έχουν υποστηριχτεί.

Ο Πολιτειακός Προϋπολογισμός του 2010 διέθεσε \$1 εκατομμύριο στην VicRoads για να κάνει έρευνα επίπεδου διαχωρισμού, η οποία θα επικεντρωθεί στο Caulfield και στην Murrumbeena.

Ο Δήμαρχος Tang είπε ότι ο Δήμος προτείνει στην VicRoads να διαβουλευτεί με την κοινότητα ως μέρος της έρευνάς της.

Passaggio a livello fa vedere rosso agli automobilisti

Il sondaggio 2010 Redspot Survey condotto dalla RACV e dal *Leader Community Newspaper* ha indicato il passaggio a livello tra la Murrumbeena e la Neerim Road come il "Punto caldo" numero uno nel Victoria per il 2010.

Secondo il sondaggio, tra le 8:00 e le 9:00 del mattino gli automobilisti restano fermi in attesa del transito di un numero di treni fino a 36 in attraversamento del passaggio a livello che resta con le sbarre abbassate per più di 38 minuti.

Il Sindaco di Glen Eira, Cons. Steven Tang, ha affermato che il Comune ha constatato l'esistenza di un problema causato dalla linea ferroviaria di Dandenong, con incluso il passaggio a livello di Murrumbeena.

"Il Comune ha esercitato pressione sul Governo Statale per condurre un' indagine e successivamente sovvenzionare l'intersezione a livelli separati nella linea ferroviaria di Dandenong."

"Il Governo Statale ha stanziato 440 milioni di dollari per l'intersezione a livelli separati, ma non ha ancora detto dove verrà spesa questa somma di denaro," ha ribadito il Cons. Tang.

Il Consiglio comunale ha espresso i propri commenti a riguardo dell'intersezione a livelli separati nel contesto del rapporto *Eddington Report*, che raccomanda la costruzione di una nuova galleria ferroviaria della lunghezza di 17 kilometri per congiungere la Stazione di Caulfield con il centro dei quartieri ovest.

La galleria e la proposta terza linea ferroviaria per Dandenong, incrementando la capacità di trasporto fino a circa 40.000 passeggeri all'ora sui raccordi ferroviari per la Stazione di Caulfield, causerebbe un incremento di ingorgo agli incroci in quanto il transito di un maggior numero di treni richiederebbe una più frequente chiusura dei passaggi a livello.

Il Cons. Tang ha aggiunto che soltanto effettuando l'intersezione a livelli separati si verificherà una riduzione di contrasti e congestione nei punti in cui la linea ferroviaria incrocia le arterie principali.

Fino ad oggi, il patrocinio operato dal Consiglio comunale nei riguardi del Governo Statale non ha ottenuto alcun supporto.

La finanziaria 2010 State Budget ha assegnato 1 milione di dollari alla VicRoads per condurre un' indagine sulla separazione dei livelli di percorrenza sulla linea ferroviaria, che si concentrerà su Caulfield e Murrumbeena.

Il Cons. Tang ha informato che il Consiglio comunale sta esortando la VicRoads a consultare la comunità nell'ambito dell' indagine stessa.

Железнодорожные переезды – помеха для автотранспорта

Клуб автолюбителей штата Виктория (RACV) и районная газета *Leader* провели специальное исследование по выявлению мест, создающих заторы на дорогах в нашем районе в 2010г. *(2010 Redspot Survey).* Самой значительной помехой для нормального движения автотранспорта во всем штате оказался железнодорожный переезд Murrumbeena – Neerim Road.

Исследование показало, что с 8 до 9 часов утра водителям приходится пропускать до 36(!) поездов, прежде чем им удается проехать переезд, и шлагбаум в течение этого часа бывает закрыт более 38 минут.

Мэр муниципалитета Glen Eira г-н Steven Tang отметил, что муниципалитет считает железнодорожную линию Dandenong (и в том числе переезд Murrumbeena) серьезной проблемой для движения автотранспорта.

"Муниципалитет настаивает, чтобы Правительство штата проанализировало ситуацию и выделило средства на разделение движения железнодорожного и автомобильного транспорта на линии Dandenong."

"Правительство штата Виктория имеет специальный фонд в 440 млн. долларов для разделения движения, но как будут использованы эти средства пока не известно," сказал г-н Tang.

Позиция муниципалитета по этому вопросу была сформулирована в ответ на так называемый Отчет Эддингтона (Eddington Report) – отчет об исследовании транспортных проблем штата, в котором рекомендуется строительство нового 17-километрового железнодорожного туннеля, который соединил бы станцию Caulfield с районами к западу от Сити.

Этот туннель, а также предлагаемая в дополнение к туннелю третья железнодорожная ветка в Dandenong увеличили бы пассажиропоток через станцию Caulfield на 40000 человек в час и еще больше затруднили бы движение автотранспорта через переезд, т.к. шлагбаум должен был бы закрываться еще чаще, чем сейчас.

Г-н Tang отметил, что только разделение железнодорожного движения в местах пересечения с основными автодорогами может уменьшить заторы и разрешить эту серьезную транспортную проблему.

До сих пор позиция муниципалитета по этому вопросу не находит поддержки в Правительстве штата.

В *бюджете штата на 2010г.* был выделен 1 млн. долларов для VicRoads на проведение анализа возможности разделения движения в районах Caulfield и Murrumbeena.

Г-н Tang отметил, что муниципалитет настаивает, чтобы VicRoads провело опрос мнения жителей района по этому вопросу.



Murrumbeena Cricket Club centenary celebrations

The 2010–11 cricket season marks the 100 year anniversary of the Murrumbeena Cricket Club. Founded in 1910 in humble beginnings, the club grew into one of the major suburban clubs by the 1930s.

The club initially played on a wicket known as Peggy's Paddock situated at the corner of Dandenong and Murrumbeena Roads. It is believed early pitches were a mixture of rolled grass and gravel, which probably accounts for the many low scores. Outfields were generally quite rough and the grass long. Cattle were often bought in before the season to chew down the grass and then the curator would smooth out the hoof prints.

In 1913, Caulfield Council purchased the present site at Kangaroo Road from William Dillon for £960 and developed this into Murrumbeena Park and granted tenancy to the club.

Presently, the club has four senior teams in the Victorian Turf Cricket Association (VTCA) and 10 under aged teams in the Southern District and Churches Cricket League (SDCCL). The top two senior teams play in South A1 and A2 with the 3rds playing in South C1 and the 4ths playing in the South C3 2 day competition.

The club has had a long and illustrious history all brought about by people with a passion and love for the game of cricket. A detailed history can be found on the club's website: http://murrumbeenacc.com/

"This is usually done for such circumstances as for example young teenagers being out at two or three in the morning and located in high risk areas," Senior Sergeant Kirk said.

"The letters also encourage parents to contact police if they have any further concerns and if required we can offer referrals and advice to parents through our Proactive Unit."
