

Aconsultation process for the Glen Eira Community Plan, Glen Eira City Council conducted six open community forums throughout February.

More than 340 residents attended the two hour forums, which gave them the opportunity to have input into the development of the *Plan*.

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Jamie Hyams said a random telephone survey of 500 residents, three focus group discussions and online consultation were also conducted to ensure the community's views are incorporated into the Plan.

"A Steering Committee was also formed to guide the development of the Plan and comprises both Councillors and community representatives," Cr Hyams said.

Some of the issues most commonly raised during the consultation process included:

Services to support the community: Customer service and services for family, youth and the aged, including library upgrades; more childcare services; and more activities for youth.

Residential parking permits; enforcement of parking and speed restrictions; and more bike paths and safer crossings.

Town planning and development: Maintaining neighbourhood character; increased amount of multi-developments; and the impact on infrastructure and building and planning enforcement.

Governance: Open, transparent decision making; greater community consultation; and more community involvement in addressing local issues.

Recreation and open space: More open space and greenery; ensuring safety in open spaces; more recreational facilities; and the

retention of Carnegie Swim Centre.

Waste, graffiti and cleanliness: Dumping of hard rubbish; graffiti management; waste and recycling; and increasing the cleanliness of shopping strips.

and infrastructure: Environmental sustainability; drainage improvements; improving appearance of streetscapes and shopping centres; more street trees; and increased lighting.

Community building and engagement: Greater community engagement and cohesion; clearer community consultation; and development of a stronger sense of community.

The draft Plan is expected to be released for public comment in early May.

Those who attended the forums and participated in the online consultation and registered their details will be provided with a draft copy of the Plan.

All feedback will be assessed and reviewed, with a final report produced for Council consideration.

New lighting to improve crime prevention in McKinnon

In the effort to improve public safety at McKinnon Reserve, the State Government will provide \$80,000 for new lighting within the Reserve.

Announced on Friday 13 April by Minister for Crime Prevention

Andrew McIntosh, the McKinnon Reserve lighting project is part of the Government's commitment to crime prevention measures.

McKinnon Reserve has been identified as a hot spot for drunkenness, graffiti

and vandalism, with cricket nets being set alight, gates smashed and glass broken in an area where children come to play sport.

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Jamie Hyams welcomed the Government's announcement.

"Residents should not feel unsafe in their own neighbourhood," Cr Hyams said.

"The safety of Glen Eira residents is a priority for Glen Eira City Council and it is hoped this lighting project will help deter the antisocial behaviour that has been occurring."

Mr McIntosh said measures such as improved lighting may seem simple enough, but they go a long way towards discouraging crime in parks and reserves and helping people feel more secure.

The new lights are expected to be operating by the end of June 2012.

150th Anniversary of the Proclamation of the Moorabbin District Road Board

Saturday 5 May marks the 150th
Anniversary of the Proclamation
of the Moorabbin District Road
Board, which signalled the beginning
of local government in the area. To
commemorate this important event,
a history panel has been created and
is now on display at Bentleigh Library.
Information on the history of the Road
Board is also available on Glen Eira
City Council's History web page.

In May 1862, the District of Moorabbin measured 36 square miles (93.24 square kilometres) and included a population of 4,500. Horse and carts were the main form of transport,

local roads were still to be created and market gardening was the major industry. The District boundaries extended from the outskirts of Brighton and south-east along both sides of the Nepean Road to Mordialloc Creek and included the areas now known as Hampton, Sandringham, Beaumaris and Mentone.

The first general meeting of the Moorabbin District Road Board was held on 16 June 1862 at the Plough and Harrow Hotel (now the site of the Nepean Hotel, Moorabbin). Of the 23 Board nominations, nine were successful with Colonel William

Mair elected as the first Chairman. The inaugural Board was responsible for appointing the Board officers, establishing the Board offices, constructing and maintaining local roads and bridges and introducing and managing road tolls and rates.

The City of Glen Eira was formed in 1994 when the northern part of the City of Moorabbin merged with the City of Caulfield. The establishment of the Moorabbin and Caulfield District Road Boards introduced local government to the area and are significant municipal milestones. Council acknowledges and continues to build on this very important legacy.

To find out more about Moorabbin's early history, residents are encouraged to visit the City of Moorabbin Historical Society and Box Cottage Museum in Joyce Park, Jasper Road, Ormond.

Visitors can step back in time by wandering through the faithfully reconstructed 1840s pioneer cottage, which is filled with a diverse range of historical memorabilia.

Increase in tobacco education funding

Glen Eira City Council will receive State Government funding to conduct approximately 91 tobacco educational visits throughout the 2012–13 financial year. Businesses to be visited by Council's environmental health officers include certified specialist tobacconists, tobacco retailers, eating establishments and licensed premises.

These educational visits are to ensure compliance with the *Victorian Tobacco Act 1987* and cover things such as:

- · tobacco display;
- health warning signage;
- tobacco sales to minors; and
- smoke-free drinking and dining areas.

Engaging our community

School Safety Program

Glen Eira City Council's 2012 School Safety Program has received positive feedback from the schools involved. The Program is designed in consultation with schools to ensure:

- parking requirements best meet those of the school community;
- parents are educated regarding parking and speed zones around schools; and
- Council's traffic safety officers carry out enforcement.

As part of the 2012 *Program*, Council has presented at a school information session and has also given a road safety presentation to 30 kindergarten children.

Council conducts doorknock

As part of its Domestic Animal Management Plan, Glen Eira City Council is conducting a doorknock of residential premises throughout the municipality to determine the total number of dogs and cats housed.

The doorknock commenced in April and if unregistered pets are discovered, the owner will be given the opportunity to register their pets.

Ombudsman recommends action against Cr Penhalluriack

The Ombudsman has recommended that the Secretary of the Victorian Department of Planning and Community Development consider making an application to the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT) alleging gross misconduct by Cr Frank Penhalluriack.

If VCAT makes a finding of gross misconduct against a Councillor, VCAT can disqualify the person from being a Councillor for up to four years.

The recommendation is made in a 41 page report which the Ombudsman tabled in the Victorian Parliament on 28 March 2012: Conflict of interest, poor governance and bullying at the City of Glen Eira Council.

The report deals with the closure of Council's free mulch service, the ownership and use of a right of way abutting Penhalluriack's Building supplies and findings against Cr Penhalluriack by an independent legal investigator appointed

unanimously by all nine Councillors in April 2011.

The Ombudsman's report states in relation to Cr Penhalluriack:

"His disruption of the council relates to his:

- continuing refusal to appropriately acknowledge various conflicts of interest between his council role and his personal/ business interests; and
- inappropriate approaches and discussions with council staff, attempting to use his official position to alter the course of action that the council officers were adopting in relation to an issue which directly related to the councillor" (paragraph 9).

"As this report demonstrates, Cr Penhalluriack is very much an individual, but one whose services on the council have not been of assistance to the good government of the City of Glen Eira" (paragraph 12). Cr Penhalluriack has rejected the Ombudsman's criticisms.

The Mayor has stated that Council has spent \$65,000 on legal fees to date in relation to Cr Penhalluriack's conduct.

The CEO gave evidence to the Ombudsman that "Ratepayers were poorly served by the amount of time and effort diverted away from their interests" (paragraph 118).

At a public Special Council Meeting on 3 April 2012 to consider the Ombudsman's report, the Council adopted the Ombudsman's report, initiated an application to the Councillor Conduct Panel concerning Cr Penhalluriack's conduct in accordance with one of the recommendations of the Ombudsman and called on the Government to act on the Ombudsman's other recommendations.

Disability Awareness in Schools Program

Glen Eira City Council's successful Disability Awareness in Schools Program has commenced.

Now in its sixth year, local presenters will visit schools in the City of Glen Eira to speak to Grade Five and Six students.

These presentations not only focus on raising awareness of disabilities in the community, but also offer a personal view on the difficulties and challenges people with a disability face, as well as their achievements.

The presenters all live with varying types and levels of disabilities and have unique stories to share.

Eleven local schools are involved in the 2012 *Program*, with 35 individual presentations scheduled.

Council's Metro Access Officer Tracy Cassidy said the *Program* aims to promote positive attitudes when communicating with people with a disability.

"The *Program* helps students learn about various disabilities and discusses how to make the community a more inclusive place for people with disabilities," Miss Cassidy said.

One of the students who participated in the 2011 *Program* found the presentation particularly inspiring.

"I thought the presentation was inspiring because Jen had so many different things happen to her and she still thinks that she is one of the luckiest people alive."

Beekeeping in Glen Eira

Honeybees are the most important pollinators of agricultural and horticultural crops. In Australia, 65 per cent of agricultural production depends on them. In Glen Eira, there has been a recent growth trend in the number of beekeepers across the municipality maintaining their hives in residential

Beekeepers are required to maintain their hives in accordance with the Apiary Code of Practice 2011. If they comply with the Code's guidelines, they will be exempt from town planning controls.

At times, Council will receive complaints about bees. These are promptly investigated by planning enforcement officers to ascertain if the beekeepers are in compliance with the Code.

Most beekeepers are diligent in maintaining their hives, however sometimes there have been instances that require attention. The most common of these are:

Registration of beehives

The beekeeper is required to register annually with the Department of Primary Industries for a small fee. Hives are required to be branded with the beekeeper's allocated registration number.

Hive density

Only one hive is allowed to be kept on a tenement of less than 500 square metres in area. Two hives are allowable on tenements between 500 and 1,000 square metres in area.

Hive locations

Although there are some exceptions, hives must generally be kept at least three metres from an adjoining property fence.

Provision of water

The bees must be provided with a source of water, ideally placed in close proximity to the hive in a shaded area.

Collection of swarms

Beekeepers are required to collect swarms from their colonies as soon as possible. This is required to prevent the bees becoming a nuisance to nearby residents.

During the warmer months, there is a tendency for an increase in complaints about bees. This is primarily due to the hives becoming busier in this type of climate. However, if beekeepers adhere to the requirements of the Apiary Code of Practice 201 lat all times, this will make certain there will be no impact to the general amenity of the surrounding residents.

By following the guidelines within the Code, this will enable both the honeybees and people to go about their business in a residential environment.

Glen Eira City Council will host its next electronic waste (ewaste) collection day on Sunday 20 May.

To be held from 8am to 4pm at Carnegie Swim Centre, Moira Avenue, Carnegie, residents will be able to dispose of unwanted ewaste, including computer screens, keyboards and televisions.

Although only a small fraction of total waste, according to Clean Up Australia statistics, ewaste is one of the fastest growing contributors to our waste stream. The replacement of old televisions and increased turnover of electronic devices such as mobile phones and computers are all contributing to the growth in ewaste volumes.

Ninety eight per cent of ewaste is recyclable. Ewaste contains a range of materials including plastic, lead, copper, gold, platinum and rare earth metals.

Why divert ewaste from landfill?

- to reuse scarce and valuable non-renewable resources;
- to reduce greenhouse emissions;
- to reduce the burden on our landfills

Please note: Commercial quantities will not be accepted.

In addition to using Council's ewaste collection day on Sunday 20 May, the community can already take ewaste to various collection points. Details are provided in Council's 2010 Residents' Handbook (page three) and Waste Services Guide (page 15).

Residents learn about saving energy in the home

Glen Eira City Council recently hosted a free workshop for residents on saving energy in the home. The well-attended workshop was one of a series on sustainability topics that Council is running this year.

Participants discovered that by swapping to a solar boosted hot water service, they can reduce their greenhouse gas emissions and may save money.

According to Alternative Technology Association Energy Project and Policy Manager Damien Moyse, solar hot water units now cost between \$2,000 and \$8,000.

"The initial purchase price of a solar hot water system will probably be higher than a similarly-sized, non-solar water heater, but the savings in energy bills will generally pay for this difference in four to 10 years," Mr Moyse said.

"A solar hot water system has a longer lifespan than a conventional unit, so financial returns can be considerable over the life of the system."

Water heating accounts for 30 per cent of an average household's energy use.

Reduce garbage and recycle better

Recent figures show the amount of waste going to landfill has increased.

Glen Eira's garbage goes to landfill and is a source of greenhouse gases that are generated as the waste breaks down.

Glen Eira City Council Manager Sustainability Rachel Ollivier said the cost of disposing rubbish to landfill is rapidly increasing. "Reducing garbage and better recycling can help minimise waste charges,"
Ms Ollivier said.

"Every tonne of rubbish that residents avoid sending to landfill saves around \$100.

"These savings are passed on to ratepayers in waste charges, which are set on a cost recovery basis."

Ms Ollivier said residents can do their bit to minimise charges by double checking that they are recycling correctly.

"Council also urges residents to consider whether they can reduce waste in other ways," Ms Ollivier said.

Recycling and disposal checklist

- Recycle everything you can paper, cardboard, hard plastics, glass jars, tins and metals can all go in your recycling bin. If you need an extra recycling bin, it can be provided by Council for \$36 per year.
- Use less packaging.

- Use reusable bags or take your old plastic bags to the supermarket to be recycled.
- Donate or sell clothing or goods in good condition.
- Use a worm farm or compost bin for food scraps.
- Avoid food wastage.
- Make sure that electronic waste (ewaste) is disposed of correctly this can be dropped off for free at Council's ewaste collection days.
- Sign up for a green waste bin for garden waste — a once-off fee of \$55 applies for a green waste recycling bin (whether tenants or owners).
- Use Council's free on-call bundled branches service for larger prunings.

Walking improvements for Glen Eira

As part of Glen Eira City Council's Towards Sustainable Transport Strategy 2011–2014, Council is looking at ways to increase the use of sustainable transport modes and decrease congestion caused by over-dependence on cars.

The City of Glen Eira has approximately 840 kilometres of footpaths. With its predominately flat terrain, the municipality is a perfect place to walk.

However, crossing roads with high traffic volumes can be difficult at times. In the effort to improve pedestrian safety and access, Council has constructed pedestrian refuges at Kangaroo Road near Murrumbeena Park and Tucker Road near McKinnon Reserve.

Council's Manager Transport Planning Matthew Harridge said pedestrian refuges allow pedestrians to stage their crossing in the centre of the road.

"This allows pedestrians to focus on one direction of traffic at a time," Mr Harridge said.

"A refuge will be constructed in Kooyong Road near Caulfield Hospital shortly." Council is also continuing to construct kerb outstands to minimise the distance that pedestrians have to cross and to improve visibility of people walking.

The most recently installed kerb outstands are at:

- Hobart Road, at the Murrumbeena Primary School Crossing;
- Wheatley Road, at the Ormond Primary School Crossing; and
- McKinnon Road, at the western end of the shopping centre.

Walk Safely to School Day

Cycling and pedestrians

At times, cyclists may be tempted to ride on footpaths. However, doing so can place pedestrians at risk. The Road Safety Road Rules 2009 states that cyclists 12 years and over are not permitted to ride on footpaths unless:

- they are accompanying a child under 12 years (eg. a parent supervising their child); and/or
- they have a physical or intellectual disability making it undesirable,

impracticable or inexpedient to ride on the road (and they hold a certificate signed by a registered medical practitioner).

Footpaths provide an opportunity for young children to learn how to ride a bicycle and to safely travel to places such as schools. However, older and more experienced cyclists should follow the Road Rules by riding on shared paths or on the road. This makes our footpaths a more comfortable and safe place to be.

Cyclists are, however, permitted to ride on a shared path. These are off-road paths designated for use by both cyclists and pedestrians and can be identified by shared path signs or pavement markings. It is important to know that when on a shared path, cyclists must keep to the left side (unless impracticable to do so) and give way to all pedestrians.



"Staff will strengthen existing approaches and concentrate efforts to enhance the engagement of parents and exchange of information about children's care and development.

"Improvements in our Maternal and Child Health Service will be directed to the physical environments and information available in each centre.

"There will also be a review of how new parent groups are conducted."

So how can you become an Australian citizen?

How do I apply?

If you would like to become an Australian citizen, you must apply through the Department of Immigration and Citizenship (DIAC). DIAC can be contacted on 131 880 or alternatively you can visit www.immi.gov.au

DIAC assesses the applications for citizenship and forwards the names of successful applicants onto Council.

What is Council's role?

The Mayor of Glen Eira hosts the ceremonies, leads migrants through their pledges and presents them with a Certificate of Citizenship — the final step to becoming an Australian citizen.

How will I know when to attend a ceremony?

If your citizenship application is successful, DIAC will write to you, advising of the details (date, time and place) of the citizenship ceremony to be held at Glen Eira Town Hall, as well as the paperwork you should bring for identification.

If you are unable to attend the ceremony on the advised date, you will need to contact the Department to make them aware as soon as possible.

What is the duration of the ceremonies?

You will be asked to arrive at Town Hall no later than 7.30pm. The ceremony commences at 8pm and the duration of the ceremony is usually one hour.

What are the dates for the remainder of 2012?

Four more ceremonies will be held in 2012 — Wednesday 9 May, Wednesday 11 July, Wednesday 12 September and Wednesday 21 November.

The strong focus on reducing crime within the Glen Eira Police Service Area resulted in a 3.4 per cent reduction in 2011.

Acting Inspector Darryn Cooper told *Glen Eira News* there have been significant drops in the incidence of robberies, residential and commercial burglaries.

"The number of assaults, excluding family violence, also reduced, but there is obviously more work to be done in this area," Acting Inspector Cooper said. "In this context, family violence-related matters and all crimes against the person are a priority for us and we will maximise efforts to address these issues."

"Whilst these overall results are encouraging, there is still more work to be done — and for us to continue to be effective, we need your help.

"Please feel free to contact police if you have any concerns as your information and feedback is always valued."

Antisocial behaviour

Acting Inspector Cooper said some great results have been achieved already in 2012 in regards to detecting and prosecuting incidents of antisocial behaviour, particularly around train stations and public transport hubs.

"We will continue to be visible around these areas and ensure that people feel safe using our public transport system, either during the day or at night," Acting Inspector Cooper said.

Road collisions

Acting Inspector Cooper said in 2011 there was also a significant drop in injuries resulting from road collisions.

"This will continue to remain a focus for us in 2012 as disappointingly, the number of fatalities resulting from collisions has remained steady at four — which we believe is four too many," Acting Inspector Cooper said.

"Therefore, in the effort to prevent serious crashes on our roads and to get people to their destinations safely, we were out in force during the Easter break, targeting hotspots and utilising everything we had at our disposal, including booze buses and drug testing units."



Murrumbeena Park play space

Glen Eira City Council is currently finalising a proposed play space project at Murrumbeena Park on Kangaroo Road.

The proposal sees the removal of the existing playground adjacent to the main sportsground and the creation of a new play space in the eastern side of the park. The design incorporates a number of leading edge components and treatments, which will make the playspace a model for future developments.

The design goes beyond any existing playground and merges traditional play equipment with interactive landscaping, family picnic areas, tree plantings and facilities. It provides areas for toddlers and active adolescents and can be accessed by wheelchairs and prams.

In January, the Victorian Government announced a grant of \$258,921 to assist in the construction of the Murrumbeena play space as part of Sport and Recreation Victoria's Community Facility Funding Program.

The project is listed as an item for consideration as part of Council's 2012–13 Budget.

Winter cycling tips



Cyclist numbers in Melbourne have been steadily increasing.

Cyclist numbers in Melbourne have been steadily increasing every year as people discover cycling is a great way to improve fitness, beat traffic and have fun. As the short and cold winter days become more common, the motivation to ride becomes a little harder to find.

Here are some tips on how to make things safer and easier over winter.

Warm clothing

Invest in some good quality gloves and a windproof jacket. Gloves do not need to be cycling specific, but you will need to be able to use the brakes and change gears. There is a range of breathable jackets available from any outdoor store or bike shop. Remember, a jacket that breathes will also keep you dry as you work up a sweat.

Be seen

With fewer hours of daylight, chances are you will be riding in the dark. It is a legal requirement to have lights on a bike at night. As a minimum, they should be visible from at least 200 metres. Side reflectors are also important as many lights will not be visible from side on. Secondary helmet lights are also good as they are at a different height. Remember red lights at the back and white lights on the front.

Bright clothing with reflective strips will also make you more visible.

Keep dry

Invest in some mudguards to prevent water splashing up your back. Many rear guards attach simply to the seat post. Carry a plastic bag to keep your seat dry if you are planning to lock your bike outside.

Reward yourself

If you ride to work during winter, reward yourself with a hot chocolate or coffee at the end of the ride — you've earned it!

Ring your bell

When cycling on rail trails and bike paths (shared pathways) where there are many people walking, cyclists should always ring their bell, call 'passing' and slow down when passing others from behind.

Get into Bocce

Autumn can be a beautiful time to get out in the great outdoors. When planning your next trip out to one of Glen Eira's many parks and gardens, why not take time out to play a game of Bocce.

The game of Bocce originated in Italy and is fast becoming a popular recreational pursuit for people of all ages. All you need is a set of Bocce balls and a place to play. The municipality has Bocce courts at Harleston Park in Elsternwick (Mel Ref: 67H2) and Moorleigh Community Village in Bentleigh East (Mel Ref: 78 B5). Both courts are available free to the public with no bookings necessary.

Bocce is played between two players or teams of up to four players. It's similar to bowls in that the player aims to place their bowl as close as possible to the jack which may displace the opposition's bowl. The bowl can be bowled along the ground or thrown through the air.
