Glen Eira City Council Pools Steering Committee Chairman Cr Michael Lipshutz said GESAC offers the most fun and fitness you could have under one roof.

"More than 4,500 members and many casual participants are enjoying the state-of-the-art facility," Cr Lipshutz said.

"GESAC's youngest member is six months and our oldest is 98 — it is a community facility for Every Body."

GESAC's Swim School commenced on Monday 14 May for its 1,100 members.

As a brand new facility, it has taken the opportunity to do a few things a little differently from many swim schools, including the implementation of reward and recognition programs; offering lessons year-round for continuous, accelerated learning; and free aquatic access for all students.

GESAC's Swim School also has a no re-enrolment process, so if commitments change or your child needs to move up a level, you just need to notify staff and they will sort this out for you immediately.

Glen Eira seniors are also enjoying what GESAC has to offer, including Living Longer Living Stronger (LLLS) which is a progressive strength program that helps improve the quality of life and the ability to perform everyday activities for older adults.

The program is specifically for over 50s who care about their health and fitness and enjoy exercising with like-minded people. The program aims to develop functional strength, improve balance, co-ordination and mobility while being fun and challenging.

GESAC is running eight LLLS sessions each week, with the hope of growing the program into one of the largest providers in Australia.

GESAC has been built by Council, in partnership with the Commonwealth and Victorian Governments. GESAC will be officially opened on Friday 22 June at 1.30pm by Glen Eira Mayor Cr Jamie Hyams, Federal Minister for Regional Development and Local Government and Federal Member for Hotham The Hon. Simon Crean and Victorian Minister for Sport and Recreation The Hon. Hugh Delahunty.

Whilst everybody is welcome to come and use the facilities at GESAC, residents are also reminded that Carnegie Swim Centre will reopen as usual on I November 2012 for the November to March season.

Glen Eira City Council recognised 208 people for their work as volunteers in the local community at a ceremony at Town Hall on Thursday 17 May.

As part of National Volunteer Week, Glen Eira Mayor Cr Jamie Hyams presented Council's annual Volunteer Recognition Program Awards.

Volunteers from 49 organisations and guests gathered to celebrate the work of local volunteers and their commitment to others.

Cr Hyams said the celebration of volunteering had become a special part of life in Glen Eira.

"Now in its 22nd year, we hold this ceremony to celebrate the many members of our community who give their time to help others," Cr Hyams said.

"The Glen Eira community is strong because of the commitment of these volunteers, who enrich the lives of everyone right across the municipality.

"Council is delighted to have this opportunity to recognise the contribution of our volunteers and show our appreciation."

Awards were given to 74 people for 500 hours of service, 55 people for 1,000 hours of service and 23 people for 2,000 hours of service.

A special award for 10 or more continuous years of service was also given to 56 people.

Dorothy, Elizabeth, Gwen, Rosa and Veronica received an award for their volunteer work at Tony's Café.

Tony's Café is an outreach program of St Anthony's Church in Glen Huntly.

Opening in 2009, the Café provides a three-course meal and take-home food parcels every Thursday to around 70 disadvantaged residents.

Tony's Café also provides a Christmas Day dinner to more than 200 residents every year.

Gwen, who received an award for 2,000 hours of service, told Glen Eira News Tony's Café provides residents the opportunity to sit down with others while sharing a nice, home-cooked meal.

"It is like one big family at Tony's Café - people feel like they belong and are cared for," Gwen said.

Each week, between 11 and 20 volunteers help out with a variety of difference tasks, from food preparation and cooking to serving the food and cleaning up afterwards.

"We have people of all ages helping out, from school aged children and young adults to an 80-year-old who helps set up tables and dries dishes," Gwen said.

"We also have one remarkable young man, Vincent, who not only helps co-ordinate Tony's Café, but he takes every Thursday off work to collect food from Foodbank Victoria in Yarraville for cooking and also for the food parcels."

"Do it once, do it properly." That principle drives our efforts to provide the Glen Eira community with modern facilities.

Previous examples include the

upgrades to our parks, many of which are among the best in Melbourne, our playgrounds, the libraries at Bentleigh and Carnegie, our adult day care centre, many of our maternal and child health centres — just to name a few.

The latest example is Glen Eira Sports and Aquatic Centre (GESAC). For the first time, this Council is providing aquatic and recreational facilities that can be used all-year-round, not just in the warmer months.

While GESAC has the usual facilities for young adults, the biggest growth segment in our demographic is people around retirement age — GESAC provides many types of facilities and programs for them to keep well.

GESAC also caters for the very young with the all-important classes to learn-to-swim.

Parents of young children have access to the 30 place occasional care centre so that they too, can participate fully in GESAC's opportunities.

Until now, Council had not provided any indoor courts for community sport. Now we have three full-sized courts to cater for netball, basketball, indoor soccer, badminton and other activities.

GESAC is also good value. We were successful in obtaining government grants covering a third of GESAC's cost. Ratepayers enjoy 100 per cent of the facility after contributing two-thirds of the cost.

Under one roof, GESAC provides something for Every Body — "Do it once, do it properly."

More than 200 people honoured the traditions of service and sacrifice at Glen Eira City Council's annual ANZAC Day Service on Sunday 22 April.

"Let us remember the first ANZAC Day 97 years ago and the service of all members of our armed forces since then," Cr Hyams said.

"Let us remember that our men and women are serving their country, as we speak, on active service, in disaster relief and in peace keeping missions around the world."

'We are the toll' road enforcement campaign

Victoria Police recently launched a major three month road enforcement campaign in response to the frightening start to the year on Victorian roads.

The 'We are the toll' campaign will focus on speed, impaired driving and vulnerable road users, with road policing intelligence reports indicating that these factors are key contributors to road trauma.

Glen Eira Police Area Manager Inspector Stephen Clark said current trends indicate that 2012's final road toll could be 30 to 40 deaths higher than last year.

"This has resulted in road policing enforcement becoming a daily operational focus for every Victoria Police member," Inspector Clark said.

All police members have been asked to support the campaign by:

 increasing the number of intercepts and interactions with drivers and other road users, particularly on arterial roads, highways and freeways;

- ensuring any breaches of road rules/legislation by any road user is actively enforced;
- lowering tolerance for minor infringements, especially low level speed infringements; and
- patrolling and intercepting vehicles in the vicinity of known road trauma black spots.

In addition, the 'We are the toll' campaign will see large-scale operations conducted across the state, increasing the visibility of road enforcement to change driver perceptions and behaviour.

Inspector Clark said there has also been a 'We are the toll' campaign facebook page created to engage with the community.

"I encourage all interested residents to access the facebook page and offer any suggestions that may assist," Inspector Clark said.

"Road trauma represents a significant

cost to our community in terms of lives lost and serious injuries — we can all play our part to minimise trauma on our roads."


Despite the large number of police resources that have been dedicated to this campaign, Victoria Police ultimately rely on drivers to be responsible while using the roads.


Inspector Clark said two days after the commencement of the campaign, Highway Patrol members intercepted two vehicles for excessive speeds on our roads.

"A 21-year-old male driver was intercepted travelling at 165 km/ph in a 100 km/ph speed zone, whilst in a separate incident an 18-year-old male was intercepted travelling at 168 km/ph in a 100 km/ph speed zone," Inspector Clark said.

"Both drivers had their vehicles impounded and will face court in relation to speeding and related offences."

Waste collection and disposal costs





Government taxes and levies will make up approximately 34 per cent of the total cost of collection and disposal of waste in 2012–13 (see graph above).

The State landfill levy has increased from \$9 a tonne in 2009 to \$48.40

- 240 litre commercial bin \$286 (\$250 in 2011-12).

Have your say on the draft 2012–13 Annual Budget

Glen Eira City Council's draft 2012–13 Annual Budget is now available for public comment.

Residents have until Thursday 7 June to provide feedback on the Budget.

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Jamie Hyams said Councillors are very interested in hearing whether ratepayers agree with the way Council intends to spend their money.

The Budget includes \$802,000 for the second stage installation of new technology street globes.

Cr Hyams said the installation of new technology street globes should result in a decrease in electricity and maintenance costs of approximately \$250,000 per annum.

"Council's carbon emissions should also reduce by around 1,800 tonnes," Cr Hyams said.

Other highlights of the draft Budget include:

- \$1.09 million for the Duncan Mackinnon Pavilion construction (plus funding carried forward from 2011-12);
- \$310,000 to fund two additional change rooms and toilets at Victory Park Pavilion:
- \$520,000 to fund the extension of the McKinnon Kindergarten (subject to receiving a \$300,000 grant from the State Government);
- \$200,000 to commence design works on the Centenary Park Pavilion;
- \$225,000 for stage two of the Packer Park west redevelopment;
- \$1.04 million for the Murrumbeena

playground redevelopment (includes government funding of \$259,000); and

· a strong capital investment program — averaging \$460 per property to renew major infrastructure including footpaths, roads, drains and community facilities.

Cr Hyams said in line with Council's long-term financial plan, rate revenue will be increased by 6.5 per cent.

"Council will continue to have average rates about \$212 per assessment (\$12.7 million per annum) below other inner metropolitan councils, with costs per property being approximately \$382 less (\$22.9 million per annum) than other inner metropolitan councils," Cr Hyams said.

Cr Hyams said residential garbage charges are proposed to be levied on a cost-recovery basis, with fees being set to cover large cost increases, including the Federal Government's carbon tax and the State Government landfill levy.

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Jamie Hyams said the draft Plan guides decision making and details the priorities that Glen Eira City Council will pursue to meet the needs of the Glen Eira community.

"The draft Plan also includes the Strategic Resource Plan, which sets out the long-term financial resources of Council and includes key financial indicators," Cr Hyams said.

"The Strategic Resource Plan takes the strategic objectives and strategies as specified in the Community Plan and expresses them in financial terms."

Cr Hyams said Council consulted extensively with community members to ensure their views were incorporated into the Plan.

"This consultation process included six open community forums, a random telephone survey of 500 residents, three focus group discussions and online consultation," Cr Hyams said.

"A Steering Committee comprising both Councillors and community representatives was also formed to guide the development of the Plan."

All members of our community are encouraged to read the draft Plan as it highlights key directions and strategic objectives which will determine the way Council manages and delivers services to the Glen Eira community.

The importance of play

Playing with your child has many benefits. Play is the way in which children learn most effectively as they are relaxed and having fun.

Children's learning becomes meaningful when they are free to learn at their own rate and in their own way.

Playing with your child helps parents foster a close relationship with their loved one. It is the adult's role to guide, evoke and extend, but not to dominate or dictate.

Although play is for fun and enjoyment, children are continually improving their own personal development and self-esteem levels.

They develop problem solving and negotiation skills and learn about the world around them.

Playing with your child is a very special time for both you and your child. Parents are encouraged to take time everyday to observe their child, their interests, what they can do and what they like doing.

"The most important play for young children is play with parents — make sure you make some time for play every day [sic]" (Learning is Child's Play).

When your child is challenged, try and assist them as much as possible. Follow your child's lead as to when to join in and remember to provide space and resources.

Playing with other children is just as important, so providing opportunities for children to play together is an essential part of their growth and development.

The benefits of cycling

The best time to learn to ride a bike is during childhood.

Children have different levels of competency and parents need to decide what is appropriate for their children when learning to cycle.

The best place for children to learn is in a park or the backyard, away from traffic, until they have developed good bike handling skills and road sense. Children under 12 are also permitted to ride on footpaths.

Safety authorities recommend children under eight years cycle only in safe off-road environments and children aged eight to 10 ride on roads only under adult supervision. Children aged eight to 10 can begin to develop better traffic skills and more responsibility, but parents still need to frequently reinforce not only the need for care, but the road safety rules.

Parents who want to teach their children to ride with traffic should teach children to:

- be alert for traffic;
- stop and look both ways, scanning for traffic before entering the street;
- stop at all marked and unmarked intersections; and
- always use hand signals.

They should:

- correct children when the safety rules are ignored;
- teach children how to care for their bikes; and
- teach children to set cycling speed limits.

Children learn by example, so parents should also practise these rules.

Know your road rules

Glen Eira City Council receives a number of queries about when drivers are permitted to drive over linemarking in the centre of the road. The following information provides a brief reminder. Full details about the Road Safety Road Rules 2009 can be found at www.vicroads.vic.gov.au


Broken white dividing lines

On a road with a broken white dividing line, you must keep left of the lines and drive as close to the left side of the road as you can. You may cross these lines to enter or leave the road, but only overtake or U-turn if it is safe and if the road ahead is clear.




Single continuous dividing lines

A single continuous dividing line means you can cross it to enter or leave the road, but you must not overtake or U-turn. You must not park opposite the dividing line unless there is at least three metres of clearance between your vehicle and the dividing line unless otherwise indicated on a parking sign.




Double continuous dividing lines

You must always keep left of these lines. Do not cross them to overtake, to turn, or to enter or leave the road or for any reason (except to avoid an obstruction if safe and necessary).



Painted island

On a road with a painted island you must keep left of the painted island and drive as close to the left side of the road as you can. You may cross the painted island lines to enter or leave the road.



News in brief

Graffiti removal

Glen Eira residents and traders can obtain personal graffiti removal kits free of charge from Council's Service Centre. Prompt removal of graffiti is often the best deterrent.

Glen Eira City Council also continues to assist residents by removing graffiti from the title boundary of private property (both residential and commercial), which is visible from a public place. Requested works are referred to a priority list for consideration.

Requests to remove graffiti from private property can be made through Council's Service Centre on 9524 3333.

Battle of the Burbs blood challenge

Glen Eira residents have shown their community pride and spirit by donating blood as part of the Australian Red Cross Blood Service's latest challenge, Battle of the Burbs.

At the conclusion of the challenge, the City of Glen Eira had registered 926 donations. With every one of those donations saving up to three lives, residents have helped save 2,778 lives.

Thirty one Local Government areas participated in the challenge, which saw Glen Eira finish in 10th place.

Overall, a staggering 23,537 blood donations were made across Melbourne by generous residents, which resulted in up to 70,611 lives potentially being saved.

Each year, more than 1.4 million blood donations are used in Australia to save the lives of people with cancer; heart, stomach and bowel disease; accident or trauma victims; pregnant mothers and newborn babies.

One in three people will need blood in their lifetime, yet only one in 30 currently donates — chances are they could be your next door neighbour.

Energy and water saving initiatives at GESAC

The newly constructed Glen Eira Sports and Aquatic Centre (GESAC) is one of the premier sports and aquatic centres in Australia. GESAC features five separate pools, two waterslides and a fully-equipped aquatic wellness area.

A number of energy and water saving initiatives have been incorporated into the design of GESAC.

Water saving measures

- rainwater harvesting for the pools;
- grey water treatment for the toilets and irrigation;
- water recycling by retaining and treating pool backwash water for irrigation;
- introduction of pool blankets to minimise evaporation and heat loss;
- the planting of drought-tolerant plants; and
- use of high water efficiency fixtures and fittings.

Energy saving measures

- introduction of heat transfer systems between airconditioning exhausts and air supply ducts by use of heat exchangers;
- solar assisted heating of hot water for showers and basins;
- integration of a Building
 Management System for the
 effective and continual monitoring
 and control of variable speed plant
 and equipment;
- introduction of daylight sensors for effective control of lighting during daylight hours; and
- incorporation of quality glazing and insulation to achieve a balance between natural solar gain and building energy efficiency, reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

The site also uses renewable energy to reduce its greenhouse gas emissions. A quarter of the electricity used at the site is Green Power, which is generated in Australia mostly from wind turbines.

Exchange your old showerhead

As part of the South East Water and Glen Eira City Council Showerhead Exchange Program, residents can exchange their old showerhead for an AAA rated water saving one.

By installing the AAA rated showerhead, households can save about 20,000 litres of water a year.

Residents will also notice a reduction in their water bills and energy costs for heating their hot water.

Residents wanting to participate in the *Program* can bring their old showerhead to Council's Service Centre — Monday

to Friday between 8am and 5.30pm — and they will be given a new showerhead in exchange.

Residents are encouraged to check what type of hot water system they have as the AAA rated showerheads are not compatible with gravity fed systems (located in the roof) or some instantaneous or older hot water systems.

Tenants should obtain consent from the property owner prior to making any modifications to their bathroom fixtures.

Energy-efficient street lights to save more than 1800 tonnes greenhouse gas per year

In an effort to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, energy-efficient street lights are to be installed in Glen Eira's residential streets.

Public street lighting is Glen Eira City Council's largest single source of greenhouse gas emissions. Glen Eira has more than 8,500 street lights accounting for more than 50 per cent of Council's reported greenhouse gas emissions. More than 5,300 of these lights use 80 watt mercury vapour (MV80) globes.

Council is preparing to convert the majority of its current MV80's to more energy efficient T5 fluorescent lights. T5 lights are 65 per cent more energy efficient than MV80's, using only 30.5W of power compared to around 96W of power. Works are planned for the 2012–13 year.

If all the MV80 lights are changed, the project would reduce carbon emissions from lighting by 1,870 tonnes — that is 11 to 15 per cent of Council's carbon emissions. It will also cut public lighting costs by around \$250,000 per year.

Green waste service

Glen Eira City Council's fortnightly green waste service is a great way to compost your garden waste. If home composting is not practical and you have too much garden waste, this very convenient collection service is the answer.

A once-off fee of \$55 applies for a green waste recycling bin (whether tenants or owners).

Residents are also reminded that residential recycling bins are free (additional bins incur a small charge).

Indigenous plants for residential gardens

A diverse range of indigenous plants have been evolving in the City of Glen Eira for thousands of years.

If you are considering growing indigenous plants at home, it is important to know the plants requirements before purchasing to ensure the soil and environment will suit.

It is best to grow plants from seeds collected in your area. Your local nursery will be able to assist you. A list of indigenous nurseries can be found on the internet.

Some examples of useful indigenous plants include:

Pale Flax Lily (Dianella longifolia var. longifolia)

Height: 30–80 cm Width: 50 cm

Grows in full sun or part shade. Attractive dark blue or purple berries follow blue flowers.

Kangaroo Grass (*Themeda triandra*) Height: 40cm Width: 70–90cm

Grows in full sun to partial shade.

Common Tussock-Grass (Poa labillardieri) Height: 30–80cm Width: 30–50 cm

Grows in all local moist or slightly dry soils, in full sun or partial shade. Graceful and vigorous grass.

Environmental weeds

A number of garden species widely available in commercial nurseries are environmental weeds. The following environmental weeds should be removed as they are the most invasive, often self-sown from birds dispersing seeds:

- Sweet Pittosporum (Pittosporum undulatum);
- Ivy (Hedera spp.); and
- Broadleaf Privet (Ligustrum lucidum).

Glen Eira City Council is currently seeking community feedback on concept plans for the former Caulfield Service Reservoir (Glen Huntly/ Booran Road Reservoir). Under the Crown Land Act, the site is temporarily reserved for public recreation purposes.

The unique 1.6 hectare site presents a number of challenges and opportunities. The reservoir basin is contained behind large earth mounded walls and the basin itself is divided into two halves by a high concrete wall along the midpoint.

Council has prepared three concept plans that use the existing concrete reservoir in either a functional or aesthetic manner. Each plan has one of the following themes:

- 1. active sports facility;
- 2. passive recreational space; or
- 3. a mixed-use area consisting of sporting, leisure and contemplative spaces.

The site has the potential to be a landmark public open space within a City known for its parks and gardens.

Improve your business technology with help from Swinburne students

Glen Eira City Council's BusEd Program is proud to announce a new partnership with Swinburne University.

As part of the *Program*, Swinburne's Information and Communication Technology students are working with Glen Eira businesses to build websites, develop software solutions or analyse information systems for the business.

These projects are ideal for Glen Eira businesses that would like to develop their business through improved technology — be it a public website or internal system — but have limited resources.

The projects which generally run over one semester (three months), are a collaborative effort between client and students and are supervised by university staff.

There is no cost to Glen Eira businesses to participate in the *Program* — just a commitment to invest the necessary time and allow for the best possible outcome.

Expressions of interest are now being sought from local businesses that would like to participate in the second semester round of Swinburne projects, commencing in July.

Projects that are available include:

Website and/or software development

These projects involve the development of a new website and/or database that can:

- provide or enhance a web presence for the business;
- enable online selling and stock management;
- improve collection and management of client data;
- help businesses to use client data to better market their business; and
- streamline and improve internal business processes and enable many other business functions.

Business systems analysis and configuration:

In these projects, students review existing business information systems and make recommendations for improvement. This may include research into existing technologies or suggestions for customised software. A second team of students could then configure a solution in another semester, if appropriate.

If businesses have recently purchased software and require assistance to configure the functions to their business processes, Swinburne configuration teams can also assist in this area.

The following two case studies feature Glen Eira businesses which are currently participating in Swinburne projects and illustrate the benefits of being involved in a project.

Vision Now — web development project

Harold Sabel of Vision Now runs a busy optometry practice in Elsternwick. For some time, Harold has been hoping to upgrade his website to enable customers to make online bookings, utilise social media and establish an online store.

Harold was excited about the opportunity to work with Swinburne students to achieve his goal. He admits to being a little apprehensive before starting the project but upon meeting the team, his concerns dissipated.

"The team is always organised, on time, open to suggestions and willing to modify the system according to my needs," Harold said.

"When they presented the first mock-up of the system, I was surprised by how much they had achieved in the time frame. I believe

Tucker Road Dental Clinic — business systems analysis project

Dr James Gioutlou and Dr Vivian Lee of Tucker Road Dental Clinic in Ormond were looking to implement a new software package to support the growth of their business. James and Vivian had researched the options available, but wanted to learn more about the benefits and drawbacks of the different options and were thrilled to be selected for a Swinburne business systems analysis project.

Over the past two months, a team of Swinburne students has analysed a range of industry software packages in relation to the business requirements. This involved assessing current business processes and IT systems as well as the benefits and disadvantages of each package. To complete the project, the students will make a recommendation about the most appropriate package solution for the

James and Vivian are very happy with the progress of the project.


"The students are very professional and have taken the time to understand what our business needs,"
