

len Eira City Council is pleased to announce the completion of the extension to McKinnon Kindergarten.

Glen Eira Mayor Cr Jamie Hyams said kindergarten is a valued state education service and is seen as a fundamental part of early childhood development.

"The renovated area at McKinnon Kindergarten means that we can cater for an additional 60 children and that there is better use of shared spaces, such as the foyer, bathroom area and bag storage areas."

"All four-year-old children have been offered a place in a community managed kindergarten and there are still 27 vacancies," Cr Hyams said.

In the past 12 months, an additional 275 funded four-year-old places have been created in Glen Eira in a

range of service settings including community managed kindergartens, long day care centres and early learning centres.

Early last year, Council's Family and Children's Services Unit made a successful State Government grant application for \$300,000 for the capital upgrade at the McKinnon Kindergarten.

The grant, along with Council's co-contribution of \$225,000 has resulted in a playroom that now caters for an additional 60 children. Other internal works, which included the refurbishment of the foyer and bathroom area and a new kitchen and meeting room, have also been completed.

Officially opened on 14 March by Mayor Cr Jamie Hyams and Elizabeth Miller MP State Member for Bentleigh, the McKinnon

Kindergarten was one of 97 early childhood services that benefited from more than \$40 million as part of the State Government's record investment in early childhood infrastructure.

McKinnon Kindergarten mother Karin said that there was such a need for extra kinder places in the area.

"The refurbishment has refreshed the kinder and allowed for a lot more children," Karin said. "This will help with my daughter's transition into primary school."

Some of the other comments received from parents at the opening:

"Playful, delightful, spacious and refreshing."

"A welcoming injection of new life." Forty parents, educators and Council staff attended the official opening on 14 March.

Save the environment — save money

Glen Eira City Council has started converting lights in residential streets in the City of Glen Eira to a more energy-efficient alternative to deliver environmental and financial benefits to the community.

At the end of February, more than 1,500 street lights had been converted. By the end of May, Council's contractor will have replaced around 5,000 lights.

The new lights are 68 per cent more energy-efficient than the old lights, which Council has arranged to recycle as part of the project. The new lights will reduce greenhouse gas emissions by about 1,870 tonnes (the equivalent of taking 410 cars off the road) and reduce the cost of providing street lights in Glen Eira by about \$250,000 a year.

The project is a key action from Council's *Carbon Emission Reduction Plan.* It is a good example of projects which improve the environment while also demonstrating value-for-money.

Deadline looms for pet registration

Glen Eira pet owners are running out of time to renew their dog and cat registration.

Renewal notices were sent out in March and must be paid before Tuesday 10 April.

Registration is the best form of identification for pets and acts as a safeguard for pet owners if they lose their animals.

Once a pet is registered, a new registration tag is provided which the pet must wear whenever it is outside its owner's property.

Failure to register dogs or cats can result in a \$282 fine per animal.

Parents please note: The Australian Childhood Immunisation Register recommends that all childhood vaccinations are completed by four years. If your child is not vaccinated by four years and one month they will be considered overdue and you will receive reminder letters from Council.

Family day care focus on community participation

Family day care in Glen Eira offers quality child care and education. One of the standout benefits of family day care is the flexibility it offers for children to be involved in the local community. For instance, family day care educators are able to walk preschool children to a local kindergarten if you have organised sessions. This offers flexibility and choice to families who want to balance the individual needs of their children.

In addition, educators regularly make use of our great local parks where children of all ages are able to explore and experience the natural environment and play. These types of experiences also build a strong sense of place and social connection with the community.

Educators' routines reflect the children's individual needs and family life so children are likely to participate in small shopping experiences, such as going to the post office and purchasing

stamps, posting letters or parcels. Community activities like these provide learning opportunities to choose and count items, practice numeracy skills and have conversations with local shop keepers.

Council's Family Day Care
Co-ordination Unit is a licensed
children's service with the Department
of Education and Early Childhood
Development and has been assessed
by the Australian Children's Education
and Care Quality Authority (ACECQA)
as exceeding the National Quality
Standard. A maximum of four
preschool children can be cared for by
educators who work from their own
home and are supported by the
co-ordination unit staff.

Change your clock, change your smoke alarm battery

Glen Eira City Council urges all residents to change their smoke alarm batteries when they change their clocks at the end of Daylight Savings on Sunday 7 April.

Replacing smoke alarms

Smoke alarms have a lifespan of 10 years. The date of manufacture is indicated on the alarm. After this time they should be replaced. The old smoke alarm can be disposed of with the rest of your household rubbish.

Testing and maintaining smoke alarms

Testing and maintaining your smoke alarm is simple. The MFB recommends that residents:

- test smoke alarms each week by pressing the test button with a broom handle;
- vacuum the alarms monthly to clean the vents;
- change the batteries at the end of daylight savings to ensure correct operation. This not only applies to your residential home, but also your holiday home or caravan; and
- think of others who may need assistance in testing and maintaining their smoke alarms, particularly the elderly who may struggle to get up a ladder.

Smoke alarms for the deaf and hearing impaired

There are special types of smoke alarms available for people who are

deaf or hearing impaired. The specialist smoke alarms consist of three components including:

- a smoke alarm fitted to the ceiling;
- a strobe light which sits in the eye sight of the house occupant; and
- a vibrating alarm which rests under a pillow or bedding.

Fire levy on top of rates:

In the February and March Glen Eira News, we reported the decision by the State Government to levy all properties through the rates system to pay for the fire services. The levy will be included on all Rates Notices from July 2013. The levy on properties will replace the levy plus Stamp Duty plus GST which is currently on property insurance premiums.

The levy on properties will take effect from 1 July 2013. It will consist of:

- a fixed component of \$100 for residential and \$200 for commercial, industrial, and other non-residential properties; and
- a variable component calculated as a percentage of the capital improved value of a property.

The Government will fund \$50 rebates for concession holders that currently qualify for rate rebates.

The State Government has not yet confirmed what the variable components are going to be.

In 2012, the Department of Treasury gave examples using variable components of 0.00756 per cent for residential properties and 0.083 per cent for business properties. For illustrative purposes, the table below provides examples of the cost of the levy on a range of residential and business properties in Glen Eira:

Property type	Fixed charge	Property value	Levy rate	Fire services levy
Residential	\$100	\$400,000	0.0000756	\$130
Residential	\$100	\$850,000	0.0000756	\$164
Residential	\$100	\$1,500,000	0.0000756	\$213
Business	\$200	\$1,000,000	0.00083	\$1,030

Using a variable component of 0.00756 per cent for residential properties and a variable rate of 0.083 per cent on commercial/industrial properties, the total levy on rateable Glen Eira property would be in excess of \$12 million.

The actual component is expected to be determined by the State Government in April or May 2013.

Attracting local native birds to Glen Eira: Grey Butcherbird

The Grey Butcherbird (*Cracticus torquatus*) gets its name from its habit of hanging uneaten food in the forks of branches or twigs in trees and may be found in local parks and gardens.

Residents can help attract native birds and insects to Glen Eira by adding plants to their garden that provide habitat and food.

The Grey Butcherbird is found in forests, suburban parklands and wooded areas across most of Australia.

The Grey Butcherbird is grey in colour on the wings and back with a white underbelly and band around the neck. The head is black with dark eyes, a large beak with a distinctive hook at the end.

The Grey Butcherbird eats a wide variety of food from insects, fruits and seeds and small vertebrate animals such as other birds and reptiles.

It has a lovely song, which is its most distinctive feature.

There are a range of local indigenous shrubs that can help attract and protect the Grey Butcherbird, including the Black She-oak (Allocasuarina littoralis).

The Black She-oak is a medium tree which is moderately fast growing. This upright, almost conical form of tree makes a substitute for European conifers.

The tree becomes covered in tiny, orange flowers in autumn to winter.

The Black She-oak requires well-drained soils and lives in full sun or partial shade.

Height: four to eight metres

Width: two to five metres

Flowers: March to June

Your local indigenous nursery will be able to assist you with other indigenous plants that also help attract insects which are a source of food.

Delivered meals — yes please!

Glen Eira City Council's Delivered Meals Service offers a wide range of meal choices which cater for all dietary requirements.

More than 300 meals are delivered every day to older residents and residents with a disability who need support to live at home independently.

Local resident Jack has been receiving the service for 14 months now.

"The staff are very supportive and friendly when delivering the meals and the meals taste really good and are quick and easy to heat up and prepare," Jack said.

Jack also said that receiving Council's delivered meals has been a great help to him.

Meals are delivered each day between 9am and I pm and are available chilled for those who wish to heat and eat the meal later in the day or hot for those clients who wish to eat the meal immediately.

Clients can select a daily meal from a choice of six mains and three desserts. Fruit juice is also included and the menu is updated twice a year to reflect seasonal changes. Soup is included during the winter months.

The menu includes favourites such as roast beef, grilled fish and spaghetti bolognaise, as well as some new dishes including, chicken schnitzel and gravy, spinach and cheese cannelloni with napoli sauce, steak and mushroom casserole, beef and black bean sauce

and lamb and coriander meatballs in red wine sauce.

All meals are delivered in biodegradable containers which have a clear film lid so that the meal can be seen.

How to access the service

All it takes is a quick telephone call to access this service. Delivered Meals staff will ask a few questions to determine your eligibility for the service and any dietary or delivery requirements. The service may be able to commence within two working days.

Old cleaners, left over paint, dead batteries and weed killer stored around your home can now be safely disposed of without putting a strain on the environment.

The free service can help households minimise the danger of accidents and reduce the risk to the environment.

The collected materials will be treated and recycled, or disposed of safely by a specialist team.

Materials not accepted include:

- chemicals used by businesses for industrial and commercial purposes;
- · ammunition and flares;
- waste asbestos;

- · farm chemicals; and
- containers over 20 litres.

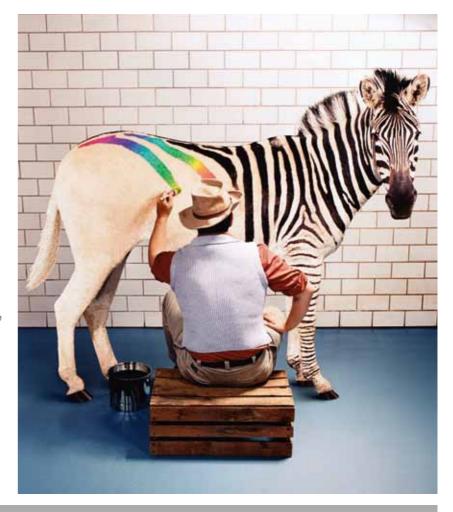

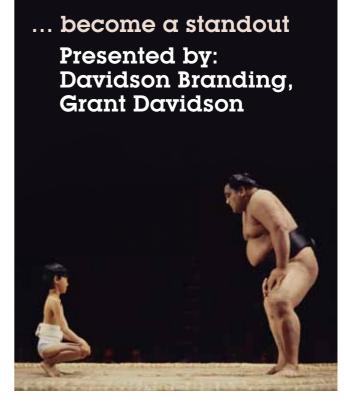

請在夏令時結束撥鍾時更換煙霧報警器 的雷池

Glen Eira 市政府提醒所有居民在4月7日夏令時 結束撥鍾時更換家中的煙霧報警器電池。

如果家中發生火災,煙霧報警器能提供重要的 早期警報。煙霧報警器如果接線故障、脱落或 電池沒電了,就不會起到應有的效果。

據市區消防隊(MFB)説,如果家中沒有安裝煙 霧報警器或煙霧報警器失效,就會出現以下情 況:

- •房屋毀掉或受損的可能增加57%;
- ·人嚴重受傷的可能增加26%。

MFB編寫了一些簡便提示,幫助居民保護家人 和住房的安全。

安裝煙霧報警器

每個睡覺的房間外面都應當安裝煙霧報警器。 此外,如果睡覺時會關上臥房門,臥房里面也 應當安裝煙霧報警器。如果住房是兩層樓的, 每個樓層都須安裝煙霧報警器。

測試和維護煙霧報警器

測試和維護煙霧報警器很簡便。MFB建議居 民:

- 每周一次測試煙霧報警器,方法是用掃帚柄 按煙霧報警器上的測試按鈕;
- ・毎月一次用吸塵器清潔煙霧報警器上的通 氣口;
- 夏令時結束時更換電池,確保煙霧報警器無故障。自己的住房應當這樣,度假屋或房車也應這樣;
- 有些人需要幫助才能測試和維護煙霧報警器,特別是無法上梯子的老年人,可向這些人提供協助。

更換煙霧報警器

煙霧報警器的使用壽命是十年,每個煙霧報警器上都標有生產日期。過了十年,煙霧報警器 就應更換。更換下來的舊煙霧報警器可與家中 垃圾一起倒掉。

聾人和聽力障礙者專用煙霧報警器

市場上有聾人或聽覺障礙者專用煙霧報警器供應。這類專用煙霧報警器有以下三個部分組成:

- ·安裝在天花板上的煙霧報警器;
- ·安裝在家中可看到處的頻閃燈;以及
- 放在枕頭或床單下面的震動報警器。

Αλλάξτε την ώρα, αλλάξτε τη μπαταρία του συναγερμού καπνού

Ο Δήμος Glen Eira παροτρύνει όλους τους δημότες να αλλάξουν τη μπαταρία στο συναγερμό καπνού όταν αλλάξουν τα ρολόγια τους στο τέλος της Θερινής Ώρας την Κυριακή 7 Απριλίου.

Οι συναγερμοί καπνού παρέχουν μια ζωτική και έγκαιρη προειδοποίηση σε περίπτωση φωτιάς στο σπίτι σας. Είναι σχεδόν άχρηστοι αν δεν είναι συνδεδεμένοι, είναι κατεβασμένοι ή έχει τελειώσει η μπαταρία.

Σύμφωνα με τη Μητροπολιτική Πυροσβεστική Υπηρεσία (MFB), αν δεν έχετε εγκαταστήσει συναγερμό καπνού και είναι σε λειτουργία, έχετε:

- 57% περισσότερες πιθανότητες να προκληθεί
 ζημιά και απώλεια στο ακίνητό σας, και
- 26% περισσότερες πιθανότητες να πάθετε σοβαρό τραυματισμό.

Η Πυροσβεστική Υπηρεσία MFB συνέταξε μερικές απλές χρήσιμες συμβουλές για να βοηθήσει τους δημότες να διατηρήσουν την ασφάλεια και την προστασία των οικογενειών τους.

Εγκατάσταση συναγερμών καπνού

Οι συναγερμοί καπνού θα πρέπει να τοποθετούνται έξω από κάθε χώρο ύπνου του σπιτιού. Επιπλέον, αν κάποιο άτομο κοιμάται με την πόρτα του υπνοδωματίου κλειστή, θα πρέπει να τοποθετηθεί συναγερμός καπνού μέσα στο υπνοδωμάτιό του. Αν μένετε σε διώροφο σπίτι, απαιτείται συναγερμός καπνού σε κάθε όροφο.

Έλεγχος λειτουργίας και συντήρηση των συνανεομών καπνού

Ο έλεγχος και η συντήρηση του συναγερμού σας καπνού είναι απλός. Η MFB συνιστά στους δημότες:

- να ελέγχουν τη λειτουργία των συναγερμών καπνού κάθε εβδομάδα πατώντας του κουμπί ελέγχου με το ξύλο μιας σκούπας,
- να σκουπίζουν τους συναγερμούς με την ηλεκτρική σκούπα για να καθαρίσουν οι γρίλιες,
- να αλλάζουν τις μπαταρίες στο τέλος της θερινής ώρας για να εξασφαλίζεται η σωστή λειτουργία.
 Αυτό ισχύει όχι μόνο για την κατοικία σας, αλλά επίσης για το εξοχικό ή το τροχόσπιτό σας, και
- νοιαστείτε για άλλους που μπορεί να χρειάζονται βοήθεια στον έλεγχο και στη συντήρηση των συναγερμών τους καπνού, ειδικά ηλικιωμένοι που μπορεί να δυσκολεύονται να ανεβούν στη σκάλα.

Αντικατάσταση των συναγερμών καπνού

Il Comune di Glen Eira esorta tutti i residenti a cambiare le batterie dei dispositivi di rilevazione fumo assieme all'orario sugli orologi domenica 7 aprile per la fine dell'Ora Legale.

I dispositivi domestici di rilevazione del fumo forniscono un vitale segnale di allarme anticipato nel caso in cui si verifichino incendi in casa.

Non sono di alcun aiuto se sono scollegati, staccati dalla sede o se la batteria è scarica.

Secondo il Metropolitan Fire Brigade (MFB), se non si è istallato un dispositivo di rilevazione del fumo o se lo stesso non è in funzione:

- nel 57 percento dei casi si è più suscettibili di subire perdita o danno alla proprietà; e
- nel 26 percento dei casi si è più suscettibili di subire lesioni gravi.

L'MFB fornisce dei semplici suggerimenti per aiutare i residenti a mantenere sicure e protette le abitazioni e le famiglie.

Istallazione dei dispositivi di rilevazione fumo

I dispositivi di rilevazione fumo dovrebbero essere istallati all'esterno di ciascuna area letto. Inoltre, se si dorme tenendo chiusa la porta della camera, si dovrebbe istallare un dispositivo di rilevazione anche in camera da letto. In caso di abitazione a due piani, è necessario istallare un dispositivo di rilevazione fumo in ciascun piano.

Controllo e manutenzione dei dispositivi di rilevazione fumo

Il controllo e la manutenzione dei dispositivi è semplice. L'MFB raccomanda ai residenti di:

- controllare i dispositivi settimanalmente premendo il tasto di controllo con un bastone di scopa;
- spolverare i dispositivi mensilmente per mantenere puliti gli sfiati;
- cambiare le batterie alla fine della stagione dell'ora legale per garantirne il corretto funzionamento. Ciò vale non soltanto per la casa di abitazione, ma anche per la casa di villeggiatura o la roulotte: e
- tenere in considerazione chi potrebbe necessitare di aiuto per effettuare il controllo e la manutenzione dei propri dispositivi, specialmente gli anziani che possono avere difficoltà a salire su di una scala.

- una luce stroboscopica situata nel raggio visivo di chi occupa l'abitazione; e
- un allarme a vibrazione posto sotto il cuscino o il materasso.

Когда переводите часы - замените батарейку в дымовом пожарном извещателе

Муниципалитет Glen Eira настоятельно рекомендует всем жителям заменить батарейки в своих дымовых пожарных извещателях одновременно с переводом часов при окончании летнего времени в воскресенье 7 апреля.

Дымовые пожарные извещатели обеспечивают жизненно важное раннее предупреждение в случае пожара в вашем доме.

От них нет никакой пользы, если они отсоединены, сняты с потолка, или если в них сели батарейки.

Согласно данным Городской пожарной бригады, если в вашем доме не установлены работающие дымовые пожарные извещатели, у вас:

- nна 57 процентов возрастает вероятность потери и повреждения имущества и жилья, а также
- на 26 процентов возрастает вероятность получения серьезных травм.

Городская пожарная бригада подготовила несколько простых советов, которые помогут жителям обезопасить и защитить свои семьи и жилье.

Установка дымовых пожарных извещателей Дымовые пожарные извещатели должны быть

установлены на выходе из каждой спальной зоны. В дополнение к этому, если вы спите с закрытой дверью спальни, извещатель должен также помещаться внутри вашей спальни. Если вы живете в двухэтажном доме, дымовой пожарный извещатель должен быть установлен на каждом этаже.

Проверка дымовых пожарных извещателей и уход за ними

Проверка дымовых пожарных извещателей и уход за ними просты. Городская пожарная бригада рекомендует жителям:

- проверять дымовые пожарные извещатели каждую неделю, нажимая на кнопку проверки ручкой швабры;
- очищать входные отверстия извещателей пылесосом каждый месяц;
- менять батарейки при окончании летнего времени, чтобы обеспечить надежную работу. Это относится не только к месту вашего постоянного проживания, но и к вашему загородному дому или жилому автофургону; кроме того,
- подумайте о других людях, которым может понадобиться помощь при проверке и уходе за дымовыми пожарными извещателями, особенно о пожилых людях, которым может быть трудно залезть на лестницу.

Замена дымовых пожарных извещателей Срок службы дымовых пожарных извещателей

составляет 10 лет. Дата изготовления указана на извещателе. По истечении этого времени их необходимо заменить. Старый дымовой пожарный извещатель можно выбросить вместе с другим бытовым мусором.

Дымовые пожарные извещатели для глухих и слабослышащих

Существуют специальные типы дымовых пожарных извещателей для глухих или слабослышащих людей. Такие специальные дымовые пожарные извещатели состоят из трех элементов, в которые входит:

- дымовой пожарный извещатель, прикрепленный к потолку;
- проблесковый световой оповещатель, расположенный в поле зрения жильца, и
- вибрационный сигнальный прибор, располагающийся под подушкой или под постелью.

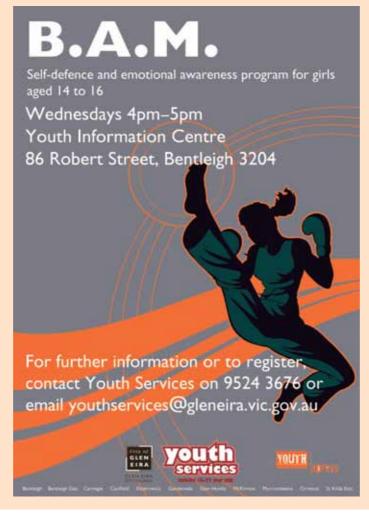


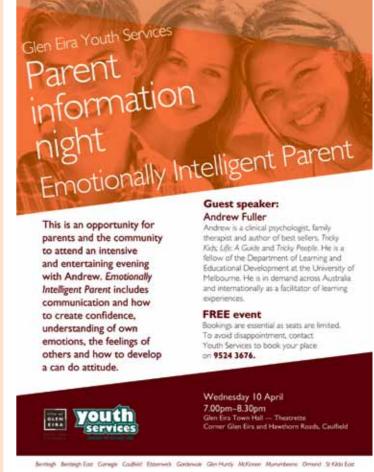
B.A.M. — Body and Mind.

Bike lane upgrades

Consistent with trends across Melbourne, cycling for pleasure, sport and commuting is continuing to grow in popularity in Glen Eira. The area's proximity to the CBD, great parks, playgrounds, cafes and shops make cycling an ideal way to get to places without having to contend with congestion or parking.

As part of Council's continuing commitment to promote and encourage cycling, the on-road bicycle network continues to grow with lanes being added to Booran Road, Tucker Road and Koornang Road. Examples of these lanes can be seen along Kooyong Road and Bambra Road, where bike lanes have been reinforced to provide greater separation from traffic.

If you are unsure about where to cycle, pick up a *TravelSmart Map* from Council offices or download one from Council's website. The maps are pocket-sized street maps which contain information about bicycle routes, cycling safety tips, bus routes, tram routes, car sharing and a map of Melbourne's train network.

History of the Hopetoun Gardens cannons

The cannons in Hopetoun Gardens were manufactured at the Royal Arsenal, England in 1866 for the Victorian Government. They were originally installed at Fort Gelibrand in 1901 and then erected in Hopetoun Gardens in 1910.

They are 80 pounds (36 kilos), rifle muzzle loading guns, mounted on wooden dwarf 'c' pivot mounts. The barrels are 6.3 inch (160 millimetres) calibre and each weighs 4064 kilos.

The cannon plaque was presented by the mayor and councillors of the City of Caulfield in conjunction with the Caulfield Historical Society as part of Victoria's 150th Anniversary Celebration.

Unveiled by Mayor Cr Rudzki on 16 July 1985.

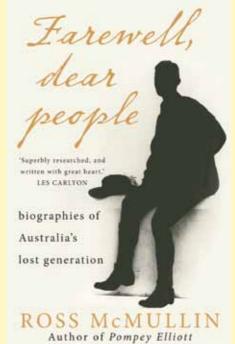
Farewell, Dear People: biographies of Australia's gifted lost generation of the Great War with Ross McMullin

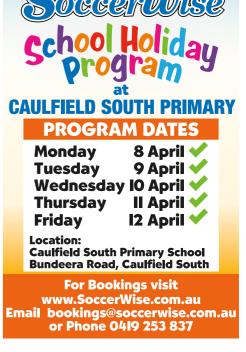
