## Shop of the Year 2013

**W**orld of Food Café and Catering in Murrumbeena has been named Glen Eira City Council's *Shop of the Year 2013*.

Announced at Council's annual *Food Business Awards* on 29 April, World of Food Café and Catering received the award for achieving the highest food safety rating after being assessed by Council's environmental health officers during 2012.

Shop owner Effie told *Glen Eira News* that she was thrilled to receive the award.

"Winning the award is a wonderful acknowledgement of our business.

"We have been opened for five years and winning this award really reaffirms that we produce a high quality standard of food," said Effie.

To achieve a five-star food safety rating, businesses must operate in accordance with Victorian food safety laws; pass Council's food hygiene questionnaire; pass all food sampling results; have no justified

complaints within the previous 12 months; and achieve a low risk rating and a compliance score of 90 per cent or above with National Food Safety Standards.

Cielo Gourmet Pizza Pasta in McKinnon was named *Shop of the Year Runner-up*.

There were 11 finalists and each business was nominated as the best performer in their particular category and presented with a highly commended certificate.

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# Council honours local volunteers

Glen Eira City Council recognised 234 people for their work as volunteers in the local community at a ceremony at Town Hall on Thursday 16 May.

As part of *National Volunteer Week*, Glen Eira Mayor Cr Jamie Hyams presented Council's annual *Volunteer Recognition Program Awards*.

Volunteers from 49 organisations and guests gathered to celebrate the work of local volunteers and their commitment to others.

Cr Hyams said the celebration of volunteering had become a special part of life in Glen Eira.

"Now in its 23rd year, we hold this ceremony to celebrate the many

members of our community who give their time to help others," Cr Hyams said.

"Volunteering within Glen Eira enriches our community. In every facet of community life, volunteers make a difference by selflessly giving up their time and energy to make our community vibrant and assist those who may need a helping hand.

"Council is delighted to have this opportunity to recognise the contribution of our volunteers and show our appreciation."

Awards were given to 76 people for 500 hours of service, 33 people for 1,000 hours of service and 17 people for 2,000 hours of service.

After hearing about the number of volunteers within the City of Glen Eira who had given more than 10 continuous years of their time to organisations, Council introduced two new award categories honouring those who had given 20 years and 30 years of continuous service.

Fifty five people received an award for 10 years of service, 45 people received an award for 20 years of service and eight people received an award for 30 years of service.

Mrs Felicitie Campbell won an award for 30 years of continuous service for her volunteer work at Glen Eira Historical Society.

Previously known as Caulfield Historical Society, Glen Eira Historical Society was formed in 1994 following the changes made to Council boundaries.

The Society is committed to the capture, preservation and dissemination of material on the history of Glen Eira and its residents.

Felicitie volunteers at the centre on Tuesday and Friday mornings and spends most of her time cataloguing files on major housing in Caulfield. This includes churches, schools and sports clubs.

"I have grown up in the City of Glen Eira and I have a genuine interest in its history," Felicitie said.

"If anyone is interested in becoming a volunteer, we are always looking for more."

Felicitie has been an inaugural member of the society since it opened in 1972 and was the second president of the society. She is now honorary Vice President to John O'Callaghan.

#### War memorial funding

Announced on Monday 22 April by Minister for Sport and Recreation and Minister for Veterans' Affairs The Hon. Hugh Delahuntly MLA, Council was recently successful in obtaining State Government funding to assist the restoration of five First World War memorials in the municipality. #### Save the environment — save money

Council started converting residential street lights to energy-efficient technology in December 2012. This will deliver significant long-term financial and environmental impacts for Glen Eira.

There are approximately 5,400 mercury vapour (MV80) lights in residential streets. These lights will be replaced by T5 lights which reduce energy use by 68 per cent compared to the existing MV80s.

This project will cut Council's total greenhouse gas emissions by more than 10 per cent and reduce running costs by approximately \$250,000 per annum.

By the end of May, Council's contractor will have converted 5,000 lights.

### Engaging our community

#### Glen Eira Sports and Aquatic Centre — lifesavers

Glen Eira Sports and Aquatic Centre (GESAC) has recently won the inaugural *Lifesaving Victoria Lifeguard Challenge*, which was held on Friday 26 April at Kardinia Aquatic Centre in Geelong.

The challenge was broken into three parts:

- six scenarios testing the teams ability to deal with aquatic, first aid, teamwork and communication skills;
- technical theory paper; and
- rescue technique swimming relays.

GESAC won the inaugural challenge, beating 13 other teams from the top pools in Victoria.

## CEO's column



There are more than 800 food businesses in Glen Eira. Council's approach is to reward those which perform well against National food safety standards and use our powers

to require less well performing businesses to improve or close.

Food businesses which perform well may achieve the five-star food safety certificate which can be displayed in their business. They may also win categories of Council's annual *Food Business Awards* as we are publicising in this edition.

We have established additional categories for healthier food alternatives for the general population and for businesses which are easily accessible by those with special needs (eg. wheelchairs or prams).

More than 200 businesses have achieved five-stars under Council's programs. Those that have complied with standards but not at the level of five-stars have been given information on where they could improve.

At the other end of the scale, Council has issued a small number of notices or infringements to businesses which have not complied to food safety standards, and in one case, closed the business until improvements were made.

In the last 12 months, Council has undertaken more than 1,700 inspections — all of them to ensure the highest standards of food safety for the Glen Eira community.

## Glen Eira Sports and Aquatic Centre — first birthday



Glen Eira Sports and Aquatic Centre (GESAC) celebrated its first birthday last month on 7 May.

The Centre enjoyed a number of

remarkable achievements in its first year of operation.

Firstly, GESAC signed up its 10,000th member in January of this year, only eight months since opening.

In March, GESAC reached 3,000 swim school students, becoming one of only a small number of facilities in Victoria which can boast such a high number of students at a single site.

GESAC also won the *Institute of Public Works Engineering Australia (IPWEA) Victorian Awards for Best Capital Works Project* over \$3m in March, which recognised the work done by the project management team in delivering an outstanding building.

In April, GESAC welcomed its one millionth visitor, an achievement that was originally estimated to take nearly two years to reach.

The GESAC stadium enjoyed its first year of social sporting competitions with 78 teams registered in social futsal and netball competitions as of April, and a strong basketball program.

Finally, Council has just completed new customer car parking options around Bailey Reserve and a new Results Studio that plays host to a number of new specialised group training programs — a wonderful addition to the state-of-the-art health club.

Centre Manager Mark Collins said it's been an exciting journey for staff and customers over the past 12 months.

"The GESAC experience centres on delivering quality facilities, value-for-money, outstanding programs, excellent customer service and best practice safety measures.

"GESAC's success has been built on this experience and our staff will continue to focus on continually improving this into the future," Mark said.

Overall, the facility provided an opportunity for all-round fun and fitness for the whole community, a Centre where everyone is welcome.

Council was recently successful in obtaining State Government funding to assist the restoration of five First World War memorials in the municipality. ## Glen Eira Sports and Aquatic Centre history captured

An historic ceremony was held on 7 May at Glen Eira Sports and Aquatic Centre (GESAC) to witness the sealing of the GESAC time capsule. The capsule was sealed by Glen Eira Mayor Cr Jamie Hyams.

The GESAC time capsule commemorates the development of Glen Eira City Council's largest community project. The contents inside the capsule were selected to reflect key aspects in the development of GESAC, providing a unique snap-shot of this award-winning state-of-the-art

facility. It also contains images of the Moorabbin Memorial Pool and 1990s images of the East Bentleigh Pool, which originally occupied this site.

The event was a successful step in Council's preservation and promotion of Glen Eira's significant contemporary municipal history. GESAC patrons are invited to view the time capsule, which is on display in GESAC's foyer.

The capsule is scheduled to be opened in 2042 on the 30th anniversary of GESAC's opening.



# Waste collection and disposal costs

In 2013–14, the Federal Government carbon tax and the State Government landfill levy will make up approximately 36 per cent of the total cost of collection and disposal of waste (see graph below).

Waste management charges are levied on a cost-recovery basis. As a result, Glen Eira City Council's waste management fees will increase from 1 July 2013.

These fee increases have been set to recover the extra costs of the landfill levy increase, increased garbage quantities, and higher uptake of hard waste and bundled green waste services.

The proposed waste management fees for 2013–14 are:

- 240 litre household bin — \$377 (\$360 in 2012–13);
- 120 litre household bin — \$173 (\$165 in 2012–13);
- 240 litre flat/unit bin — \$173 (\$165 in 2012–13);
- 240 litre family bin — \$283 (\$259 in 2012–13);
- 240 litre commercial bin — \$328 (\$286 in 2012–13); and
- 120 litre commercial bin — \$186.

# Have your say on the draft 2013–14 Annual Budget

Glen Eira City Council's draft 2013–14 Annual Budget is now available for public comment.

Highlights of the draft Budget include:

- \$2.15 million for completion of the Duncan Mackinnon Pavilion;
- \$1.3 million to commence construction of a new pavilion at Centenary Park (\$2 million provided to complete construction in 2014–15 — includes car park, open space works and environmentally sensitive design features);
- \$650,000 to resume sportsground tolerant grass planting;
- \$250,000 to fund the upgrade of Elsternwick Plaza, owned by VicTrack;
- \$300,000 for completion of the energy-saving street lighting program; and
- a strong capital investment program to renew major infrastructure including drains, footpaths, roads, and community facilities.

The increase in general rate income will be 3.5 per cent. This is made up of a reduction of \$1.925 million currently paid for the Metropolitan Fire Brigade Levy, followed by an increase of 6.5 per cent, as planned in the 2012 Strategic Resource Plan. The State Government is introducing a Fire Services Levy, which will be on top of Council rates.

Average rates and charges will be \$1,417 per property, equivalent to \$27 per week. Council will continue to have average rates about \$215 per assessment (\$12.9 million per annum) below other inner metropolitan councils.

Residential garbage charges are proposed to be levied on a cost-recovery basis, with fees being set to cover cost increases, including the State Government landfill levy, increased garbage tonnages, higher uptake of hard waste and bundled green waste.

Council called for submissions by advertising in the *Leader* and *The Age* newspapers in early May 2013. Closing date for submissions is 6 June 2013.

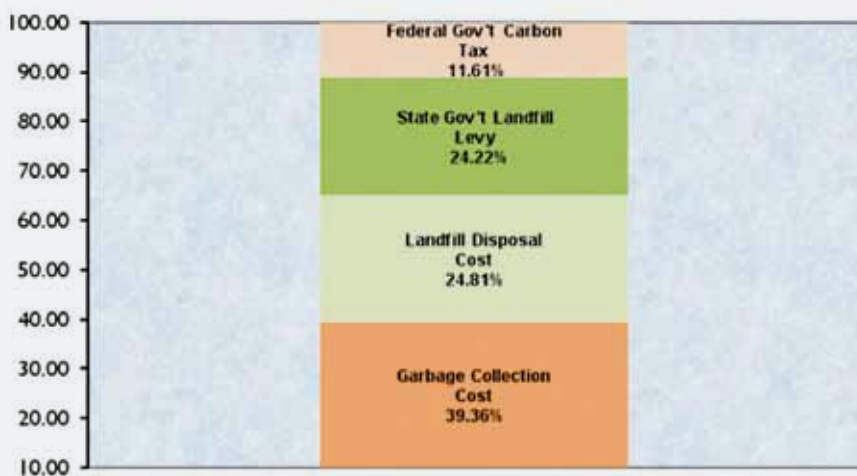

# Fire levy on top of rates

In the February, March, April and May *Glen Eira News*, we reported the decision by the State Government to levy all properties through the rates system to pay for fire services. The levy will be included on all Rates Notices from July 2013. The levy on properties will replace the levy plus stamp duty plus GST, which is currently on property insurance premiums.

The levy on properties will take effect from 1 July 2013. It will consist of:

- a fixed component of \$100 for residential and \$200 for commercial, industrial, and other non-residential properties; and

- a variable component calculated as a percentage of the capital improved value of a property.

The Government will fund \$50 rebates for concession holders that currently qualify for rate rebates.

On 2 May 2013, the Government released the variable components of 0.0069 per cent for residential properties, 0.0607 per cent for commercial properties and 0.095 per cent for industrial properties. For illustrative purposes, the table below provides examples of the cost of the levy on a range of residential properties in Glen Eira:

Property type	Fixed charge	Property value	Levy rate	Fire Services Levy
Residential	\$100	\$400,000	0.000069	\$127.60
Residential	\$100	\$850,000	0.000069	\$158.65
Residential	\$100	\$1,500,000	0.000069	\$203.50

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# Growing literacy in our education and care settings

One of the primary concerns of parents is the growth of their child's literacy skills. These are a vital part of children's development and a focus on learning in the early years. However, it's sometimes hard for parents to see the literacy learning taking place.

Team Leader at Carnegie Children's Centre Lynn Cramp said we often have parents express concern that their child isn't learning their letters and can't 'read' yet but literacy learning permeates every part of our curriculum.

"Before children learn to read and write, they need to have firm foundations in speaking, listening and understanding, as well as the ability to watch interpret behaviour and draw," Lynn said.

Manager Family and Children's Services Jill Jolliffe said research on children's brain development tells us that the language experiences children have before they're six, help form multiple and powerful brain connections.

"These connections are used for language and thinking," she said.

"Without activities like talking, singing and reading, the brain doesn't develop this rich network of connections.

"Communication, reading and rhyme are all part of literacy development. Our staff work with families to understand early years literacy development so they work together on each child's development and strengthen the family and educators' partnership," Jill said.

## Tips for growing literacy

### Communicating

Parent bonding and interacting with your baby from birth, helps create a sense of security and a desire for

interaction. A baby responds to smiles, baby-talk and facial expressions and as time progresses, imitates sounds. All communication is helping children understand speech and its rules and conventions.

What you can do:

- Talk to your baby — it helps them understand how language is put together.
- Sing to your child — this provides experiences with different tonal qualities rhythm and rhyme.
- Talk about the everyday things you're doing and seeing together.
- Name people and point out special features on different objects.
- Talk about feelings.
- Listen to your child — follow their lead and talk about things they bring up.
- Tell your child stories.
- Play with words and sounds that make up words.

### Reading

It's a good idea to read with children everyday. Children who experience different types of language and print from an early age are more likely to develop a solid literacy foundation. Reading also provides an enjoyable time with your child as you share an activity, look at pictures and play with words.

What you can do:

- Read to your child.
- Encourage your child to hold the book and turn the pages.
- Guide your finger on the line as you read, showing that we always start on the left and move to the right when reading English.
- Point out pictures and describe them in words.
- Have some fun by making the sound of animals or other objects in the book.

### Rhyme

Rhyming teaches children the connection between the sound of a word and how it's written.

What you can do:

- Play with rhyming words.
- Play games that involve the sound and rhythm of words.
- Read rhyming books.

# Attracting local native birds to Glen Eira: Rainbow Lorikeets

The Rainbow Lorikeet (*Trichoglossus haematodus*) is unmistakable with its bright red and colourful plumage. Both male and female have a blue/mauve head and belly; green wings, tail and back; and an orange/yellow breast. Juvenile birds have a black beak which gradually brightens to orange as they grow into adults. They are often seen in flocks making lots of noise at dusk.

This is a medium sized parrot ranging from 25 to 30 centimetres in size with a wingspan of about 17 centimetres.

The Rainbow Lorikeet mostly forages on flowers or trees to harvest nectar and pollen, but also eats fruits, seeds and some insects. The birds tongue is like a bristle brush which it uses to get the sweet pollen from plants.

Residents can help attract native birds and insects to Glen Eira by adding plants to their garden that provide habitat and food.

## Lightwood tree

There are a range of local indigenous trees and shrubs that can help attract the Rainbow Lorikeet. This bird is often found foraging in flowering gums however if this tree is too big for your back garden, try planting Lightwood trees (*Acacia implexa*).

The Lightwood adapts to moist or dry soil of all types. It tolerates moderate winds and grows in full or part sun.

Lightwood is a graceful, reliable, long-lived wattle with attractive bark. Its narrow form makes a good screen plant. It flowers in summer and sometimes again in autumn.

Height: Five to eight metres

Width: Two to three metres

Flowers: January and October/November

Your local indigenous nursery will be able to assist you with other indigenous plants that help attract local birds to your garden.

# Recycling and disposal

Recycling is valuable because it avoids waste, but it also helps to keep costs down. Disposal of waste is expensive and costs are increasing. Council is paid for every tonne of recycling that is received. This goes towards reducing garbage charges for residents. Every tonne of rubbish that residents avoid sending to landfill saves around \$125.

Recycling checklist:

- Don't put recycling in plastic bags. Put recycling items loose in the recycling bin.
- Recycle everything you can — paper, cardboard, hard plastics, glass jars, tins and metals can all go in your recycling bin. If you need an extra recycling bin, it can be provided by Council for \$41.
- All hard plastic materials can go into the recycling bin — small toys and plastic plates can all be recycled even if they don't have a number on them.
- Use less packaging.

- Use reusable bags or take your old plastic bags to the supermarket to be recycled.
- Donate or sell clothing or goods in good condition.
- Use a worm farm or compost bin for food scraps.
- Avoid food wastage.
- Make sure that electronic waste (e-waste) is disposed of correctly — this can be dropped off at one of Council's free e-waste collection days.
- Sign-up for a green waste bin for garden waste — a once-off fee of \$55 applies for a green waste bin (whether tenants or owners).
- Use Council's free on-call bundled branches service for larger prunings.

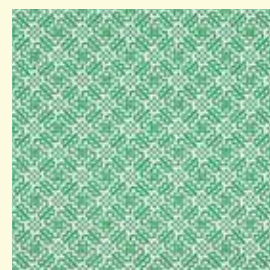

## Safety around dogs

Many Glen Eira families enjoy the benefits of owning a dog; from the opportunity to socialise, to increased physical activity and the enjoyment that a pet's companionship can provide. Without detracting from the many positives it is important to be mindful of the responsibilities and risks associated with dogs.

While it is the responsibility of dog owners to ensure their dogs are safe

and able to be managed off-leash, children should always be closely supervised near animals and taught how to behave safely around dogs.

Each year children are injured due to incidents with dogs, with younger children most at risk. Incidents are usually triggered during play, eating or around other dogs.

Here are some ways to avoid incidents:

- Never approach a dog, even if it looks friendly. Always have your child ask you and the dog owner if they want to pat a dog.
- If the owner has agreed, pat dogs gently and calmly.
- Stand still if an unfamiliar dog approaches; don't run or scream.
- Never intervene between dogs that are fighting.

Parents are encouraged to teach children to treat all animals gently and calmly. Never hurt, tease, frighten, surprise or corner an animal. Most importantly, always closely supervise children near dogs, especially during noisy high-energy play and when food is present.

## Volunteers

Every day of the week in Glen Eira you will find thousands of people competing, training or practicing sport. Glen Eira facilities are used by more than 100 sport and recreation clubs, which provides great opportunities in a diverse range of sports from football and cricket, to croquet and lacrosse.

Surprisingly all this activity doesn't just happen, it takes an army of dedicated, passionate and willing volunteers. Without the efforts of volunteers, many of the opportunities the community currently has to participate and be active in sport and recreation would disappear.

A great example is the Carnegie Caulfield Cycling Club, which provides a range of competitive, development and training programs to more than 500 members and many more guests.

To put it all in perspective here are some statistics:

- The club hosts 75 races a year, which equates to 15,000 individual racing experiences.
- It co-ordinates a junior development program for more than 70 juniors, which is often rated the best in Australia with many children going onto state

competition and being offered Australian Institute of Sport scholarships.

- It maintains a website that receives more than 100,000 hits each year.

These impressive numbers are made possible by a team of volunteers who spend countless hours passionately ensuring activities run smoothly. This includes arranging equipment; opening pavilions; course marshaling; registering riders; updating race reports; organising kits and attending committee meetings.

Volunteers are an important aspect of what makes community sport so important to the community — it welcomes everyone. While the lure of competitive sport is not for all, there are many other ways to be involved in your local sports club.

As community members, we can be really proud of the selfless work undertaken by volunteers to ensure that sport continues to be an important part of the social fabric of Glen Eira. Whether at training during the week or on the weekend as an official, trainer or canteen volunteer everyone's contribution is invaluable.

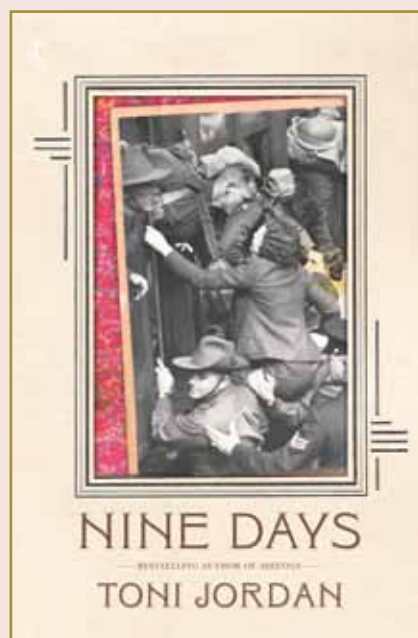

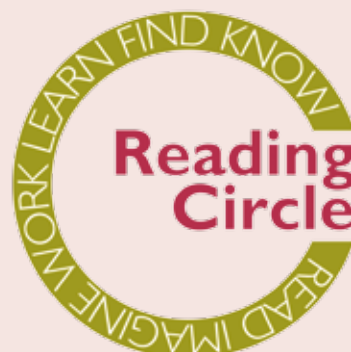

**Kate Just. The Texture of Her Skin**  
**31 May–16 June**

*The Texture of Her Skin* presents a wide range of tools, faux archaeological relics, armours and knitted second-skins that translate a complex, overlapping, and accruing sense of touch, identity and belonging through skin. This exhibition is the culmination of Just's studio-led PhD at Monash University. It comprises a major body of sculptural and installation works produced between 2010 to 2013 exploring skin's relevance to subjective and multi-layered visions of the female body.

Researched and produced around the world on residencies in New York, Barcelona, Madrid, Vienna, Krems and Melbourne, the works reflect Just's sustained engagement with diverse visual representations of the body. The works were created with media and processes bearing a conceptual affinity to skin. Together, these textile, clay and photographic works challenge surface accounts of the female body, reimagine history from a female subjective position and manifest skin's capacity to sustain our most intimate connections.

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# Improve your business's technology with help from Swinburne students

Glen Eira's *BusEd Program* is continuing to link Swinburne's Information and Communication Technology students with Glen Eira businesses to build websites, develop software solutions or analyse information systems for the business.

These projects are ideal for Glen Eira businesses that would like to develop their business through improved technology, be it a public website or other IT system, but have limited resources.

The projects, generally run over one semester (three months); are a collaborative effort between client and students; and are supervised by university staff.

There is no cost to Glen Eira businesses to participate in the *Program* — just a commitment to invest the necessary time to allow for the best possible outcome.

Expressions of interest are now being sought from local businesses that would like to participate in the second semester round of Swinburne projects, commencing in August.

Projects that are available include:

## Website and/or software development projects

These projects involve the development of a new website and/or database that can:

- provide or enhance a web presence for the business;
- enable online selling and stock management;
- improve collection and management of client data;
- help businesses to use client data to better market their business; and
- streamline and improve internal business processes and enable many other business functions.

## Business systems analysis and business systems configuration projects

In the business systems analysis projects, students review existing business information systems and make recommendations for improvement. This may include research into existing technologies or suggestions for customised software.

A second team of students could then configure a solution in the following semester if appropriate, as part of a business systems configuration project.

Configuration projects can also include helping a business to configure and integrate the functions of existing or purchased software with their other business systems and processes.

The following two case studies feature Glen Eira businesses, which are currently participating in Swinburne projects and illustrate the benefits of being involved in a project.

## Sunflex Australia — integrating customer database (CRM) with website

Paul Bronstein is the founder of Sunflex Australia, a business that provides table tennis coaching, competition, sales and consulting services to people of all ages and abilities. In 2012, Paul participated in a *BusEd* project, which involved Swinburne University students successfully developing a website for his business to help advertise services and promote social networks.

The next step for Paul was to find a way to integrate the business's customer database Customer Relationship Management (CRM) database with the newly created website.

Paul applied for a second Swinburne project, this time a configuration project, where students would assess the different ways the integration could be achieved and configure the recommended option.

Paul has been impressed with the professionalism of the students and the way they are working together as a team.

"The students are working collaboratively with me to find a way to integrate our customer database and website in order to save us time with paperwork and data entry," Paul said.

"As a team, we have identified and prioritised the issues that need to be resolved and I am confident that the students will implement a solution that will make my life easier," he said.

"I anticipate we will have an improved database system and a much easier way of updating the website.

"I would strongly recommend this *Program*. It's a great experience for the students to work with a real client and for us, apart from the improved systems for our business, I am learning a lot about how to use technology to help my business."

Timothy Baird is leading the student group and says that they enjoy working

with Paul.

"Paul is very clear on what he wants and is very supportive of our team. He is communicative and committed to the project and shows faith in us to make suggestions and develop solutions," Timothy said.

"This project has given us the opportunity to further develop our skills in a way that will be very useful to us in our future work and life experiences."

## Lifestyle Breakthrough — analysis of national IT systems

Lifestyle Breakthrough, founded by Nathan Givoni, provides the community with dieticians and exercise physiologists through medical centres, retirement villages, community centres as well as through their own clinic in Caulfield.

The business is growing rapidly and now operates in several states. The expansion has meant that the business needs to establish national IT systems whereby staff across Australia can access the systems and work together in an efficient and secure manner.

Nathan applied for a Swinburne business systems analysis project in order to work with students to analyse the different options for national IT systems and develop recommendations for the business.

Nathan is pleased with the progress of the project so far and the enthusiasm of the students.

"Being involved in the assessment of options means that we are gaining a good understanding of what infrastructure we need as we expand.

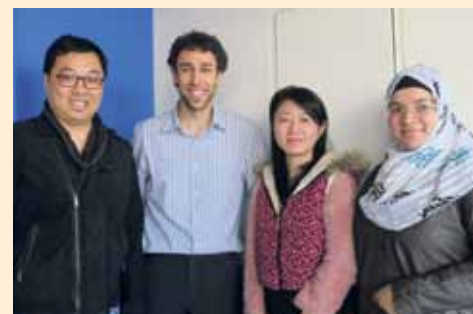
