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Play — keeping it simple

Playing with your child has many benefits. Not only does it help parents foster a close relationship with their loved one, but play helps children organise and make sense of their social worlds as they engage actively with people, objects and representations around them (Being, Belonging and Becoming: The Early Years Learning Framework).

Although play is for fun and enjoyment, children are continually improving their own personal development and self-esteem and developing problem solving and negotiation skills. Play can also expand children's thinking and enhance their desire to know and to learn.

Playing with your child is a special time for both you and your child. Parents are encouraged to take time every day to observe their child, their interests, what they can do and what they like doing.

When your child is challenged, try and assist them as much as possible. Follow your child's lead as to when to join in and remember to provide space and resources.

Playing with other children is just as important, so providing opportunities for children to play together is an essential part of their growth and development. As children play alongside and with other children — talking, negotiating, making decisions, expressing their feelings and ideas — they are developing skills and an

understanding of relationships for lifelong learning.

Through play, children develop social skills and interpersonal skills. They develop numeracy, literacy and language skills, setting them up for future academic success.

Council's Public Health Unit assists with national product recall

Glen Eira City Council's Public Health Unit has assisted the State Health Department with a national recall of a dangerous gym pre-workout supplement powder.

Following a complaint to the State Health Department by a Glen Eira resident who was hospitalised shortly after consuming the powder, Council's environmental health officers visited the resident's home, obtained written statements and collected the remainder of the product for testing.

Testing revealed that the product contained prescription only medications, resulting in a national recall of the product — a satisfying outcome for all involved.

Council officers have visited the one Glen Eira store which stocked the recalled product to ensure it had been removed from sale.

CEO's column

Glen Eira City Council has consulted on a proposal to build a new open space at what is currently the intersection of Archibald and Gisborne Streets in Elsternwick. The location is in one of the gap areas identified in Council's *Open Space Strategy*, which was finalised earlier this year. Council has endorsed the concept and initiated the statutory process to close the intersection. Speed humps are proposed for Riddell Parade in order to slow traffic as it passes the new open space.

We are currently consulting on the concept for a large new park on the site of the Glen Huntly Reservoir. Consultation is open until Friday II July.

These are two of the five open space projects that are funded in 2014 to 2015.

The Victorian Auditor General has commenced a Performance Audit of the Caulfield Racecourse Reserve Trust. It will address the Trust's governance of the Reserve in accordance with the purposes of the Crown Grant — a racecourse, public recreation ground and public park. A report is expected to be tabled in Parliament later this year.

Rates: what you pay and why

How rates are set

The rates system is set down in State Government legislation. One of the easiest ways to explain this system is that if you own one per cent of the value of property in a municipality, you pay one per cent of the total rates.

Rates are set according to how much your property is worth compared to the rest of the municipality. For example, a \$700,000 property in a wealthy municipality may be below the average house value, so the owner would pay below the average rates. However, a \$700,000 property in a less affluent municipality might be well above the average house value so the owner would pay above average rates.

The distribution of rates on residential properties within the City of Glen Eira is set out in the following graph:

Distribution of Residential Rates and Charges Payable 2013–2014 (After rebate — excludes the State Government Fire Services Levy)



Revaluation of all properties

All properties in the City have been revalued as at 1 January 2014. The total value of rateable property in Glen Eira is \$46.3 billion. The revaluations of all properties are required by the State Government to levy land tax and the Fire Services Property Levy.

The level of value, as set by the Valuer General, has been assessed as at 1 January 2014 and used for rating purposes from 1 July 2014 to 30 June 2016. Owners may object to the valuations.

the type of property they own, where it is located and how its value has moved relative to the average.

How does the City of Glen Eira compare with other municipalities?

Average rates and charges for the City of Glen Eira are \$215 per assessment below the average of inner metropolitan councils. (\$13.1 million per annum. Refer to figure one.) This means that Council charges \$13.1 million per annum less than inner metropolitan municipalities and has \$13.1 million per annum less for upgrading or providing facilities and services. The average rates and charges per person, per week in the City of Glen Eira will be \$12.33.



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The revaluation has no effect on Council's total rate income

The revaluation has no effect on Glen Eira City Council's total rate income. Rising property values do not impact on Council's total revenue collection. They usually result in the adjustment, by Council, of a lower rate in the dollar to offset the overall increase in property values. For example, the rate in the dollar in 1987–88 (City of Caulfield) was 9.4985 of net annual value. The rate in the dollar in 2013–14 is 3.3218.

If Council had held the rate in the dollar constant at 1995–96 levels, then Council would have raised more than \$280 million extra in rate revenue since then.

The revaluation can affect the rates on an individual property. Rates are redistributed according to the shift in property values that have occurred in different parts of the municipality. Some ratepayers may experience a change in their rates depending on In terms of operational expenditure (excluding depreciation), Glen Eira ranks as spending \$221 less per assessment (\$13.5 million) than the average for the inner metropolitan grouping. (Refer to figure two.)

Council's capital spending has been very solid over the trend period and continued to be strong in the 2012–13 financial year, with a demonstrated commitment to renewing and upgrading existing assets. (Refer to figure three.)







The amount of rates collected by a council depends on conscious and considered choices as to the quantity and quality of services that it decides to provide and how much of the cost is to be recovered from other revenue sources. The amount collected in rates represents the difference between the total expenses required by Council to fund programs, maintain assets and to service and redeem debt, and the total revenue from all other sources. Other revenue sources include grants from other levels of government, prescribed and discretionary fees, fines and charges, income from the sale of assets and interest earned. Hence, rates are the balancing item between total expenses and all other revenue sources.

What are the pressures on rates?

Council's services can be maintained with rates at the current level in real terms. However, the renewal of ageing infrastructure and community facilities needs to be accelerated.

The majority of Council's buildings and facilities were built before or during the 1950s, 60s and early 70s and are reaching the stage of their life where they require major maintenance and renewal works.

In addition to this, a number of shopping strips need to be upgraded along with roads, footpaths and drainage systems.

Investments in local facilities can have a positive impact on property values. Properties in areas with good shopping strips, parks and playgrounds, children's services, libraries, recreation facilities, etc. can be more attractive and therefore more valuable.

Another pressure on rates is cost-shifting situations whereby federal and state governments shift their responsibility for delivering programs and service onto Local Government, with no or insufficient funding.

Over the years many joint government-council programs have been established on the basis of cost sharing. As the years unfold, governments do not maintain their share and ratepayers are left to pick up more of the costs.

The Federal Parliamentary Inquiry into cost-shifting several years ago revealed:

3.10 "The submissions make a strong case that there has been cost-shifting from the States and the Commonwealth to local government:

- States (and to a lesser extent the Commonwealth) have legislated for local government to assume additional responsibilities, or changed regulatory frameworks in such a way as to impose additional costs on councils, without providing matching resources.
- States (and sometimes the Commonwealth) have reduced or withdrawn financial support for services leaving local government to deal with community expectations that those services will be maintained.

3.25 On the available evidence, the Committee has little doubt that local government faces some real

How does Local Government compare with other levels of government?

The whole community pays taxes and rates. Of the total tax revenue collected by all levels of government, currently councils only collect 3.5 per cent. The other 96.5 per cent goes to federal and state governments. The more tax revenue that federal and state governments return to local projects, the less pressure there will be on rates.

Council's reliance on rates is influenced by policy and legislative factors that preclude or limit Council's ability to charge. Council does not have discretion to set user fees and charges for a range of services where this is set out in State legislation or regulation, such as prescribed fees for planning permits, or in funding agreements with other levels of Government, such as those applying to aged services and maternal and child health. afficulties in generating adequate revenues to meet its expanded responsibilities, and that significant financial problems may be in prospect. Shortfalls in infrastructure spending are of particular concern."

Glen Eira residents support local park proposal

Glen Eira City Council has proposed a new park in Elsternwick. The new local park would see the closure of a roundabout at the intersection of Archibald Street and Gisborne Street.

Local resident Matthew Annells said he and his family are extremely happy with the proposal and fully support Council's plans.

"There are many families with young children who live in the immediate vicinity of the relevant area for development," Mr Annells said.

"I think the new park would be a wonderful addition to this pocket of Elsternwick."

Mr Annells also stressed how important having access to open space is.

"With so much development going on in and around suburban Melbourne and the consequential increase in population density, the need for more parks and open spaces has never been greater."

"The health, environmental and community benefits of open spaces like the one being proposed are really important if Elsternwick is going to maintain the right balance between development and lifestyle," Mr Annells said.

Council's proposed park will enhance the local streetscape and reinforce the character of the area with the continuation of tree planting along Riddell Parade and softening of existing footpaths through the park.

The park will incorporate large canopy trees, a grassed area and plantings will assist to alleviate urban heat and contribute to creating a walk-friendly neighbourhood for all ages to enjoy.

This project responds to a key priority of Council's Open Space Strategy.



Restricted breed dogs: owner responsibilities

Restricted breed dogs are defined as dogs that fit the *Approved Standard for Restricted Breed Dogs in Victoria*. These may be pure or crossbred American Pit Bull Terriers (or Pit Bull Terriers), Perro de Presa Canarios (or Presa Canario), Dogo Argentinos, Japanese Tosas or Fila Brasileiros.

Following changes in September 2011 by the State Government to the *Domestic Animals Acts 1994*, the only restricted breed dogs that can be kept are those that were in Victoria prior to I September 2010 and are registered (as any breed) with the local council prior to 30 September 2011.

Owners of restricted breed dogs must comply with a range of requirements. Not only must the restricted breed dog be registered, but it must be desexed and implanted with an ISO microchip (unless already microchipped prior to 20 May 2003).

Restricted breed dogs must wear a securely fastened, prescribed collar at all times.

The collar is specifically designed to be visible from a distance and is reflective at night.

Restricted breed dogs must be kept in a secure, escape-proof enclosure with warning signs. Any gates to this enclosure must be self-closing, self-latching and lockable.

When being exercised off the property, restricted breed dogs must be muzzled and leashed.

There are major penalties for owners of restricted breed dogs who fail to comply with the requirements for the keeping of a restricted breed dog.

Owners can also be jailed for up to 10 years if their dog kills someone or for up to five years if their dog endangers someone's life.

In accordance with legislation, Glen Eira City Council will take action and owners will face serious consequences.

Working together to address cat overpopulation

Changes to occasional care

Glen Eira City Council's occasional care sessions will change to Wednesday and Thursday from the week commencing Monday 14 July.

Located at Carnegie Children's Multi-purpose Centre, the program provides short-term and affordable care options for children aged six months to five years.

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However, what many people don't realise is that feeding unknown cats and not taking full ownership or responsibility for them contributes to the high number of feral and stray cats.

As part of the Who's for Cats? campaign, Glen Eira City Council is calling for people who are feeding an un-owned cat to act humanely and take full responsibility for the cat by contacting Council to seek advice on either taking ownership of the cat (registering and desexing) or by bringing the cat into their "Cats breed extremely quickly, and if left alone, the stray cat population would continue to breed," Mr Bordignon said.

"Large numbers of unowned cats on the streets is causing problems for residents, such as spraying strong smelling urine around houses and cars, fighting with other cats and spreading disease.

"This is a situation no humane person or

限制犬種:犬主的責任

限制犬種是指《維州限制犬種認可標準》 (Approved Standard for Restricted Breed Dogs in Victoria) 中規定的狗,包括純種或雜種 美國比特犬(或比特犬)、皮羅·德·伯裡沙·卡 納裡奧犬(或伯裡沙·卡納裡奧犬)、阿根廷杜高 犬、日本鬥犬或巴西菲拉犬。

州政府於2011年9月修訂了《1994年家養動物 法》,此後可養限制犬種只限在2010年9月1日 已存在於維多利亞州並於2011年9月30日之前向 當地政府註冊過的限制犬。

限制犬種主人必須遵守各種規定。限制犬種不僅 必須註冊,還必須經過閹割並植入ISO晶片(除非 2003年5月20日之前已經植入晶片)。

限制犬種必須始終牢固地用規定的狗項圈拴住。 這種特別設計的狗項圈很遠就能看見,而且夜晚 也會反光。

限制犬種必須關在無法逃離的圍牆之內,並設置 警告標誌。圍牆的門都必須能自動關上、自動拴 上並能鎖上。

帶出遛狗時,限制犬種必須戴上口絡並拴上狗 繩。

沒有遵守限制犬種規定的限制犬種主人將受到 嚴厲處罰。

如果狗咬死人,狗主人還可能被判監禁10年以下;如果狗危及人的性命,狗主人可能被判監禁5年以下。

按照法律,Glen Eira 市政府將採取行動,狗主 人因此將面臨嚴重的後果。

Σκύλοι απαγορευμένης ράτσας: υποχρεώσεις ιδιοκτητών

Ως σκύλοι απαγορευμένης ράτσας ορίζονται τα σκυλιά που υπόκεινται στην Εγκεκριμένη Προδιαγραφή για Σκύλους Απαγορευμένης Ράτσας στη Βικτώρια. Μπορεί να είναι καθαρόαιμης ή διασταυρωμένης ράτσας American Pit Bull Terriers (ή Pit Bull Terriers), Perro de Presa Canarios (ή Presa Canario), Dogo Argentinos, Japanese Tosas ή Fila Brasileiros.

Μετά τις αλλαγές που έγιναν τον Σεπτέμβριο 2011 από την Πολιτειακή Κυβέρνηση στους *Νόμους Κατοικίδιων Ζώων 1994*, οι μόνοι σκύλοι απαγορευμένης ράτσας που μπορεί να έχει κανείς είναι οι σκύλοι που υπήρχαν στη Βικτώρια πριν την 1η Σεπτεμβρίου 2010 και ήταν δηλωμένοι (όπως οι σκύλοι κάθε ράτσας) στον τοπικό δήμο πριν τις 30 Σεπτεμβρίου 2011. Οι ιδιοκτήτες σκύλων απαγορευμένης ράτσας πρέπει να συμμορφώνονται με διάφορες διατάξεις. Ο σκύλος απαγορευμένης ράτσας όχι μόνο πρέπει να είναι δηλωμένος αλλά πρέπει να είναι στειρωμένος και να έχει εμφυτευμένο μικροτσίπ ISO (εκτός αν είχε εμφυτευτεί μικροτσίπ πριν τις 20 Μαΐου 2003).

Οι σκύλοι απαγορευμένης ράτσας πρέπει να φοράνε ανά πάσα στιγμή συγκεκριμένο κολάρο που να είναι δεμένο με ασφάλεια. Το κολάρο είναι ειδικά σχεδιασμένο για να φαίνεται από απόσταση και είναι αντανακλαστικό τη νύχτα.

Οι σκύλοι απαγορευμένης ράτσας πρέπει να διατηρούνται σε ασφαλές περιφραγμένο χώρο απ' τον οποίο δεν μπορούν να διαφύγουν και να υπάρχουν προειδοποιητικές πινακίδες. Οι οποιεσδήποτε πόρτες του περιφραγμένου χώρου πρέπει να κλείνουν και να μανταλώνουν μόνες τους και να κλειδώνουν.

Όταν οι σκύλοι απαγορευμένης ράτσας ασκούνται εκτός του ακινήτου πρέπει να φοράνε φίμωτρο και είναι δεμένα με λουρί.

Επιβάλλονται σημαντικές κυρώσεις για τους ιδιοκτήτες σκύλων απαγορευμένης ράτσας που δεν συμμορφώνονται με τις διατάξεις διατήρησης σκύλου απαγορευμένης ράτσας.

Οι ιδιοκτήτες μπορεί επίσης να τιμωρηθούν με ποινή φυλάκισης έως 10 χρόνια, εάν το σκυλί τους σκοτώσει κάποιον ή έως πέντε χρόνια, εάν το σκυλί τους θέσει σε κίνδυνο τη ζωή κάποιου.

Σύμφωνα με τη νομοθεσία, ο Δήμος Glen Eira θα λάβει μέτρα και οι ιδιοκτήτες θα αντιμετωπίσουν σοβαρές συνέπειες.

Cani di razze soggette a restrizioni: responsabilità del proprietario

Si definiscono cani di razze soggette a restrizioni quei cani che rientrano nello standard delle razze ristrette approvate nel *Victoria Approved Standard for Restricted Breed Dogs in Victoria*, e cioè il Pit Bull Terrier Americano (o Pit Bull Terrier), il Perro de Presa Canario (o Presa Canario), il Dogo Argentino, il Tosa Giapponese o il Fila Brasiliano siano essi di razza pura o incrociata.

A seguito delle modifiche apportate nel settembre 2011 dal Governo Statale alla legge *Domestic Animals Acts 1994*, gli unici cani di razze soggette a restrizioni che è possibile tenere sono quelli che si trovavano già nel Victoria prima del 1 settembre 2010 e che sono stati registrati (come qualsiasi altra razza) presso il comune di appartenenza prima del 30 September 2011. l proprietari di cani di razze soggette a restrizioni sono tenuti ad osservare un certo numero di obblighi. I cani di cui sopra devono infatti essere sottoposti a registrazione, devono essere sterilizzati e dotati di microchip ISO (tranne che non siano già stati dotati di microchip prima del 20 maggio 2003).

I cani di razze soggette a restrizioni devono portare in ogni circostanza il collare prescritto saldamente allacciato. Il collare è specificatamente manifatturato per essere visibile da lontano e riflettente al buio.

I cani di razze soggette a restrizioni devono essere tenuti in un recinto sicuro, a prova di fuga e dotato di segnaletica di allarme. Tutti i cancelli d'ingresso al recinto devono avere chiusura automatica dotata di chiavistello e serratura.

Quando vengono portati fuori dalla proprietà, i cani di razze soggette a restrizioni devono portare la museruola ed essere tenuti al guinzaglio.

Pesanti multe possono essere comminate ai proprietari di cani di razze soggette a restrizioni che non ottemperano agli obblighi relativi al possesso di detti cani.

l proprietari rischiano l'incarcerazione fino a 10 anni nel caso in cui qualcuno venga ucciso dal loro cane oppure fino a cinque anni se il cane mette in pericolo la vita di una persona.

Il Comune di Glen Eira agirà in ottemperanza alla legge ed i proprietari si troveranno ad affrontare serie conseguenze.

Породы собак специального законодательства: ответственность владельцев

К породам специального законодательства относятся собаки, соответствующие специальному *Стандарту пород собак специального законодательства штата Виктория – Approved Standard for Restricted Breed Dogs in Victoria.* Это такие собаки, как американский питбультерьер (или обычный питбультерьер), перро де преса канарио (или преса канарио), дого аржентино, японская тоса-ину или фила бразилейро (чистокровные или помесь).

В сентябре 2011г. Правительство штата Виктория внесло изменения в *Закон о домашних животных 1994г. (Domestic Animals Acts 1994),* в результате которых жители штата имеют право держать только только тех собак пород специального законодательства, которые находились в Виктории к 1 сентября 2010 и были зарегистрированы в муниципалитете (как должны быть собаки любых пород) до 30 сентября 2010.

Владельцы собак пород специального законодательства обязаны выполнять целый ряд требований помимо регистрации. Эти собаки должны быть стерилизованы (кастрированы) и иметь микрочип ISO (за исключением тех собак, которые уже имели микрочип до 20 мая 2003).

Собаки пород специального законодательства обязаны всегда носить надежно застегнутый ошейник специальной конструкции. Этот тип ошейника ночью светится отраженным светом и виден издалека.

Собаки пород специального законодательства должны содержатся в надежных, исключающих возможность побега клетках / вольерах со специальными предупредительными знаками. Вход в такой вольер должен быть самозакрывающимся и самозапирающимся.

На прогулке эти собаки должны быть в наморднике и на поводке.

Нарушение этих требований влечет за собой серьезные последствия для владельцев.

В случае смертельного исхода в результате нападения собаки, владельцу грозит тюремное заключение сроком до 10 лет, а в случае угрозы жизни человека – сроком до 5 лет.

В соответствии с этими законами, в случае нарушений, муниципалитет Glen Eira будет принимать самые серьезные меры в отношении владельцев собак пород специального законодательства.
