THE COURIER

The Society holds 16 issues of "The Courier, Official Organ of the Shire of Blackburn and Mitcham", which ran from July 1930 to 25 September 1931. The policy of the publisher, T.J.Higham Pty Ltd, was a rousing "Two Sides to Every Question, For God King and Country, Pro Bono Publico".

Donated by the State Library of Victoria some years ago, most issues are in very fragile condition, as the acidic newsprint that they are printed on yellows and deteriorates over time. As the originals would fall to pieces even with careful handling, we have photocopied them so they will be accessible for reading. Although reduced in size, they are quite legible.

The papers contain some fascinating reading. Detailed accounts of the proceedings at the Box Hill Police Court, reports from the meetings of Blackburn & Mitcham Shire Council and Ringwood Borough Council, of activities of local societies and of local football and cricket matches, as well as advertisements from local traders provide insights into local events, personalities and attitudes during the early Depression era that are often not recalled in oral histories and other recollections of participants.

For example, 17 July 1931, Council discussed the question of permitting the unemployed to work for sustenance; bicyclists riding without lights at night; noisy motorcycles "There seem to be a number of young men about Burwood who have nothing better o do than to travel up and down the streets on their notor bikes ... making a fearful noise". "Butcher" Bladin, "Pulling down one of his characteristic skyscraping marks, posted eighth goal for Kilsyth" (10 July 1931); Frank Fisher, Blackburn Auctioneer, advertised that he was also an agent for A.W.A. Radiola wireless sets at twenty-nine pounds ten shillings and thirty-nine pounds ten- the Blackberry Pest was rampant in Main Street Blackburn; and a case for assault (by sprinkling with a hose) was dismissed by the local court. 15,000 onlookers watched the 6th Battalion Volunteer Force conduct the "Battle of Mont. Albert training exercise in November 1930, although "a number of machinegun spare parts were lost during the battle, and anyone finding any of these were respectfully asked to return same" to the Drill Hall, Surrey Hills.

Council considered a request to abolish the "prohibition of the passage of cattle along the White

horse Road at certain hours in December 1930; the Rialto Theatre, Box Hill was showing Walleye Beery in "The Big House", Norma Talmadge in "New York Lights" and Clara Bow in "No Limit" in May 1931, there was an article by Henry Ford, "Why I Believe in Prohibition" in the issue of 28 November 1930, and the serial "For the Love of Jennie Adair" by G.W.Appleton went on, and on...

Anyone with a relative who was involved in a local event or organisation during this period might be able to find details of their activities in the pages of "The Courier". There may be some surprises!

FROM THE ARCHIVES

This article researched by the late Keith Patterson, a former Secretary of the Society, appeared in the June/July Newsletter of 1970. The Nunawading referred to is the area covered by the former City of Nunawading.

LAND SETTLEMENT IN NUNAWADING

Nunawading was the site of one of the most successful agricultural settlements of the eighteen-sixties. By the Land Act of 1865, it was possible to take out licences to occupy small to moderate-sized areas on or near a gold field for residence or cultivation. In most eligible districts, there was a great rush for licences from all sorts of people, from small and miners to teachers and policemen. Many of them were only dabblers who were glad to have a second source of income, but gave up when they found it required more time and work than they were prepared to give to it.

Because of its nearness to Warrandyte, Nunawading was open to applications and a combination of circumstances made the Nunawading settlers outstandingly successful. This was particularly gratifying, as the country between Nunawading and Lilydale was judged, on the basis of crude soil analysis, to be particularly barren.

Almost all unoccupied land was taken up between 1866 and 1869. Land around the present Vermont shopping centre, between Boronia and Terrara Roads was claimed by Isaac Moore, Thomas Jobbins, Joseph Cann, Thomas Bowen and John Keenan. Abraham Rooks, David Boyle and Francis Voigt took up the area in Canterbury Road between Mt Pleasant and Rooks Roads. Patrick Geraghty, John Matters, John McClelland and Robert Sergeant settled along Whitehorse Road between Springvale and Mitcham Roads. William Cook and Ainger settled on the north side of Whitehorse Road, east of Mitcham Road. Towards Donvale, along Mitcham Road, were John Brenock, William Logan, Patrick McKean, Rudy Larkins, George Hislop, John Wakefield, Michael Britt, James Kent, Robert Simpson, Carl Schmidt and Herman Herr. All except one made a success of his holding and their transactions went smoothly to the stage when they received the freehold of the land. This was unique, as no other district came within sight of 100% success.

The only disturbances to a completely uneventful

process of selection and purchase were the cutting of roads through some allotments, the deaths of William Cook and Michael Britt and transfer of their land to their widows, and a short period when Moore was behind in his annual payments.

Factors in this excellent record were:-

- 1. Almost everyone was a farmer, wood carter or a laborer from a farming district, in fact, all had had experience on the land.
- Almost everyone came from surrounding districts Hawthorn, Camberwell, Box Hill and Doncaster, and had some local knowledge.
- 3. Almost everyone lived on the land and preferred mixed farming, including cultivation, fruit and vegetable growing, poultry-keeping and dairying, so that if one failed, another might succeed The poorest result was that of Jobbins, who was described as a gentleman and his address given as Prahran. He does not seem to have lived in the district.

In contrast to other districts, where selectors usually fenced, cleared, cultivated and built a small house, the Nunawading settlers in addition frequently had stables, dairies, fowl-houses or piggeries, and one or two waterholes on each block.

Results in Warrandyte, which should have benefited most, were very different, There were about twelve selectors, but the successful ones were mostly in that part of the parish touching Ringwood shopping centre of today, whose experience and activities were very similar to those of Nunawading. Some did take up land near the present site of Warrandyte. Apparently all abandoned the land except a printer from Richmond, who secured an area near Pound Bend.

Norma Jamieson has advised that Mrs. Jean Field died on 19th July, 2000 aged 91 years. Jean Field made a remarkable contribution to heritage and local history at both Nunawading and Sorrento.

Along with Pat Faggetter and other supporters, she was instrumental in saving our very precious Schwerkolt Cottage from demolition in the early sixties. It was through their efforts that the City of Nunawading purchased the property and restored the building. Jean was the first secretary of the Committee of Management for the Schwerkolt Cottage Reserve and worked hard to obtain furnishings for the Cottage. We have copies of her correspondence in our collection.

At Sorrento, where she had spent much of her childhood and where she and Fred built a holiday house in the late forties, she founded the Nepean Historical Society and was responsible for the establishment of the Pioneer Memorial Gardens which are located next to the interesting museum of the Society.

Present day residents of both these areas owe a great debt of gratitude to Jean Field.




