MISSION STATEMENT

The purpose of the Society is to foster historical interest and knowledge. To collect, document, research, preserve and exhibit items that show how people have lived and worked in the development of the Whitehorse area from human settlement to the present day.

WILLIAM HENRY SLATER [b. c1828 – d.23 May 1894] (Part 1) A summary of research by Yvonne Fitzmaurice 2005

WILLIAM HENRY SLATER the eldest son of Daniel and Elizabeth SLATER was born c1828 in Mitcham, Surrey. England. William's father, Daniel SLATER was described as 'being from' Blackfriars, London and his mother, 'from Mitcham', Surrey.

In 1864. at the age of about 39 years William married Mary Ann CRESSWELL. Her parent's names were not recorded on the certificate.

William Henry retired two years before his death. After being ill for six months, he died at his home in Barnes Road, Blackburn on 23 May 1894, aged 66 years. The cause of his death was stomach cancer. Mary Ann, his wife, died on the 12 August 1912 aged 88 years. Both are buried in the same plot in Box Hill Cemetery.

The obituary written for the Australian Journal of Pharmacy, June 1894, pgs 272-3, described Mr Slater as being a retiring contented and happy man with a homely disposition, and one who loved his work. It also stated 'Although he never craved for wealth or fame in the pursuit of his business, he still acquired a reputation in his own particular line, and at the same time gained modest competency,' When William Henry Slater became a prominent citizen he stood for the local council election in 1886. The position was tied. A coin was tossed and Slater lost.

It is thought that he was instrumental in changing the name of Air Hill to Mitcham*, its present name. Slater was also interested in sport and was a member of the Box Hill Cricket Club. To maintain this connection, a portion of Mr Slater's original orchard was retained for sporting activities and known as *The Slater Reserve*.

There is now a basketball stadium, a picnic area, a community garden and ample room for other sports facilities for the public to enjoy.

The 1846 English Tithe Commutation Survey showed that William's father, Daniel Slater rented two plots of land, totalling approximately one acre. One of his plots of land was in Love Lane, Mitcham, Surrey, England where he had a house and raised his family of ten children.

The 1851 English Census for Mitcham, Surrey, recorded that both Daniel and his eighteen year old son William were gardeners. 'Gardener' was the general term used for growers of physic herbs, either as small holders, or workers on the major herb farms.

William and his younger brother Benjamin both worked for James Moore, of Potter and Moore, England - the best known of all herb growers. It was here that William learnt his craft.

After completing his apprenticeship, aged 28 years and alone, William emigrated to Victoria on the 'Roxborough Castle', arriving late in the year of 1857.

He spent some time on the gold fields before returning to Melbourne and settling at Air Hill (Mitcham) as it was then known. Land on the south bank of the Koonung Creek was chosen to set up his physic garden and the access to this land was by two dirt tracks, now known as Surrey and Springfield Roads. Here he built a single storeyed house with a corrugated iron roof which he named 'Mitcham Grove' - after a grand house in Surrey.

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
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

President's address

Why did I join the Historical Society? I would meet Shirley Jones and Phyl Johnson up the street and they would ask me when I was joining the Society, as my family had been in the district since 1886. In 1984, having finished with school committees and canteens I decided to join.

At that time the Society met in peoples' homes. The first meeting I attended was at Betty Muckleston's Home. Everybody seemed so efficient. The Archives were the held at Nancy Leach's home and stored in the basement of the Nunawading Municipal Offices.

When I went to a night meeting at the Mattingley's home in Lions Court, Forest Hill, not knowing the area and finding trees growing over the street signs, I kept getting out of the car and shining my torch on the signs. A police car drew up behind me and wanted to know what I was doing. I then had a police escort to the Mattingley home.

We worked on the archives at the Municipal Offices basement amongst the Council papers. The Council staff would move boxes for us to work. Ken Barelli, a former Councillor, was doing some family research and he was horrified at the inconvenient way we were working and decided it was time the Society had a work room attached to the Museum. Fortunately, Valda Arrowsmith was a Councillor at that time and together she and Ken lobbied for a Local History Room.

This building was opened on 24th July, 1988. A very wet day with mud everywhere. Nick Fry, my son, spread tarpaulins for members and guests to walk to the new building without being ankle deep in our lovely clay soil.

We were so proud of our new History Room. Ken Barelli gave us the carpet squares and some furniture as did the Council. We found that working and meeting at this new venue had its drawbacks. When you needed to go to the toilet in the pouring rain, you trekked up the hill, past the Cottage, to the Public Toilets situated beyond the Cottage entrance in Deep Creek Road. We kept asking John Brandenburg for a

toilet in the machine room adjacent to the kitchen. He would tell us it was too difficult. He came up on Council business one day and had to borrow Beryl Gray's umbrella to go to the toilet. After this experience, wheels were put in motion for a toilet in the machine room.

When Andrew Hillier, the then Secretary got a job on the other side of Melbourne I found myself secretary of the Society to Bill Gray, who had replaced Joan Roczniok as President. Bill Gray was a joy to work with. He had exceptional negotiating skills, enabling him to see the bigger picture. Beryl, his wife was a wonderful organizer, assistant Secretary and later took over the role of Archivist when Joan Rocznick retired.

One day Beryl and I were delighted to meet film star, Christopher Timothy alias James Herriot when he came to visit the cottage to film an advertisement for dog fleas. Bill was not impressed.

Shirley and Ian Barker were Treasurers for many years and were very careful with our hard earned money.

How did I become President?... Continuing on the Committee after 10 years as Secretary, I was happily doodling on my agenda at a meeting and heard someone say – what about Judith and found myself President

I have seen many changes over the years that I have been a member of the Historical Society. With a lot of hard work we became an accredited museum. In the early days and thanks to the help of Legal Aid in Blackburn we became incorporated.

A Wednesday working group has evolved and a core group of 10 or more volunteers can be found working here, changing displays, cataloguing, working on computers and enjoying each others company. We attend festivals, set up library displays, attend skills updating workshops and organize open days.

The support of members, Council and the wider community is very important to the Historical Society. This Complex is indeed a jewel in the heritage crown of the Whitehorse Council.
