
Mission Statement

Report of a seminar by Pat Richardson

On Thursday 8th of May, Ian Nethercote and I attended a free Public Records Office Victoria (PROV) seminar presented at the Ringwood Council Chambers. We were given a taste of the immense variety of records held in the PROV climate—controlled premises in Sheill St, North Melbourne*.

The PROV collection of records comes from both State and Commonwealth sources and covers birth, death and marriage registers, criminal trials, local directories, Treasury correspondence, probate and administration of Wills, material on inquests, land selections, assisted immigration, schools, maps, plans, photographs glass negatives, an extensive library and so much more. The range of material is similar to our own collection but on a massive scale.

If like me, you find the web site initially overwhelming, never fear, by ringing the toll free number 1800 657 452 you will be able to talk with experienced volunteers. " (They)... have been there a lot longer than we have and know exactly where everything is and how to access it!" said our presenter. Years ago, when I was using the

PROV shipping indexes it meant a trip into the city to find the information in a catalogue or on microfiche, then back again when the item had arrived at PROV from their stores ready for me to read. Now by perusing the indexes on the web site, you can ring up and order the item(s) and they will be ready for you to study by the next working day.

The other interesting venture is the PROV's new Indigenous Section. At present there is some information on the website www.prov.vic.gov.au/about/kru/

or through the normal web site. We were told that at the moment, most of the collection is on paper in a series of boxes. Aboriginal people were subjected to, and subject of, huge amounts of paperwork. Forms for everything: leaving and entering an area or institution, food and clothing vouchers, school or police records. They could hardly move without it being noted down.

Volunteers are presently sifting through this information in order to collate each aboriginal person's documents. Obviously this initiative is aimed primarily at those aboriginals who come from the stolen generation and who are trying to contact family, but this information will aim to

In Search of Mr Hooke's Bike


The Story continues.

A visit to the Shrine

On Wednesday 4th of June 2008, Valda and Ted Arrowsmith attended the opening of an exhibition on Commemorative stained glass windows, at the Eastern visitor Centre of the Shrine, St Kilda Rd Melbourne. The exhibition focuses on the work of William Montgomery between the years 1915 and 1927. The exhibition was curated by Dr Bronwyn Hughes, who has recently completed her doctorate on stained glass and in particular the work of Montgomery. The exhibition includes sketch designs, photographs, watercolour and a short AV overview. The exhibition examines the range of memorials that have been created in the medium of stained glass, often commissioned by the families of the lost servicemen and women of the First World War. Valda and Ted recommend a visit to see this exhibition which closes on September the 8th.

Treasures of the lace collection

One of the treasures in the collection is the Princess wedding veil (NA 3495) and featured in the lace display. The veil was made with homemade tape and cotton embroidery in 1912 by Marjory (Madge) Brydon for her marriage to Edward Sprunt at Carag Carag, Victoria. The veil was worn by fifteen other brides in the Rushworth area, including Marjory's daughters Mary and Lyn.

You will also find in our collection some exquisite examples of Maltese, Battenburg, Tenerife, and Guipure Lace, with interesting examples of machine lace and crochet fillet lace.

On your next visit to the museum, make sure you spend some time viewing our fine display of lace.
