Spiders in the Loo

Pat Richardson's second book *Spiders in the Loo* will be launched at our June meeting. The idea to put the book together came from members of the society. Pat has selected 16 stories about residents from the Whitehorse area, many of them migrants, and included her own family history.

As you read through the book you notice recurring themes of life in the early 20th century in the Whitehorse area. Life was certainly tougher with no water, gas or electricity and no modern conveniences such as the telephone. Historic events such as the Depression and World War II tested the strength of the people in these tales. It's hard to imagine bushfires in the area now, but they also feature in several of the stories.

The stories provide a snapshot of a time gone by. The general store, local school and church were the hub of the community. The importance of the family doctor is evident in these tales and some of the medical treatments will raise eyebrows, as will the medicos who were real characters.

The history of the Deaf & Dumb Society in Blackburn is a very interesting story, as is Pat's own story about her grandmother.

Martha was a pioneer of the area whose life is fascinating, though very sad at times. This edition of our newsletter includes a selection of excerpts from the book.

April Meeting


The guest speaker for the April meeting Gerry Robinson, ex Vice Principal Ringwood Secondary School, Member Ringwood Historical Society, and Ringwood Garden Club. Gerry kept us fascinated in his topic "Streets named after Governor and Governor-Generals".

He distributed printed sheets that allowed us to follow his discussion on each of the Governors and follow their histories. Governor Hopetoun, who became Governor of Victoria at only twenty-nine in 1889. A wealthy man, "ostentatiously imperious", was later appointed as our first Governor-General of Australia, but was not popular due to an appointment know as "Hopetoun's Blunder". He nominated an anti-federation politician William Lyne as our first Prime Minister. He later resigned as leading Federalists refused to work with him, so Edmund Barton became our Prime Minister, a natural leader.

We made an appointment to see an estate agent at Box Hill. When we got there the girl at the desk, "Sorry. It's such a nice day, he went fishing instead." My Dad jumped up and down saying that no English business would survive if people took that attitude to appointments, and all the girl said was "But you're not in England now, are you?" Eventually we found a new weatherboard house in Hastings Avenue, off Middleborough Road, South Blackburn.

During that first summer we realised how incredibly hot it could be. Both my parents love the heat but anything over 90°F made me throw up. Dad had been offered a job as a manager of a new men's hairdresser at Foy and Gibson's. When we got there we discovered that the salon had not yet been built, and they gave him a job instead in the hardware department. This proved to be his forte and he never cut hair professionally again.


From a letter by Walter Grundy in 1986

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By now I had one brother, Albert, and two sisters, Marie and Bertha. There had been some problems in previous years. Dad had dropped Albie over his shoulder and he had landed on his head. This injury may have been the cause of problems later in his life. I had tipped over in my high chair and was taken to the Alfred Hospital with a suspected injury to my shoulder and ankle. My parents were told that I had to have an operation for a rupture, but when my Dad heard this he decided that I was to come home. He took his revolver, Mum, and two friends, Mr and Mrs Hitman, and came to the hospital to demand my release. The doctor told Dad that he would have to sign for my release, which he did, and I was never operated on. Later on I suffered with pneumonia, and the treatment then was to be put in a mustard bath. Following that I had to wear a cotton wool vest around my chest whenever I had a bad cold.

When Antonio Park Was Home

Memories from Robin Harris in 2005

In 1951, Betty, Dennis and Mark Coleclough rented the single-roomed building on property owned by the Antonio brothers. It would become known to my family as 'The Shack'. The official address of 'The Shack' was 627 Whitehorse Road Mitcham and it had previously been rented by a family named Burgess. It was located about forty metres from the Whitehorse Road side of the property and about a hundred metres in

from Deep Creek Road. Conditions were very primitive. There was no running water, and an outback style 'dunny' was located some distance from the house along a dirt path. This same track was a popular place for large brown snakes to coil up and sun themselves. Eventually, a Volkswagen car case was fixed to the rear of the shack as a sleep-out, and some years later a new 'dunny' was located nearer to the house. Even then, night-time visits on wet or windy nights were at best unpleasant, and at worst, quite frightening.



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Association Of Eastern Historical Societies Conference - 45th Anniversary

On Saturday 14th May, Lyn Ford (our Association of Eastern Historical Societies Representative), Valda Arrowsmith, Rachael Cottle, Barbara Gardiner, June Ventouras and I attended the Annual Conference. This year it was hosted by Ringwood Historical Society and held for the first time at the Karralyka Centre in Ringwood. This was a wonderful venue – very comfortable and with excellent service. We were treated to delicious morning and afternoon tea and lunch.

The program started with a welcome Glen Turnbull (President) and the cutting of the 45th Anniversary cake.

The first presentation was from a representative of the Find My Past on-line genealogy site with access to comprehensive records. The second part of the presentation was a new on-line site, Unlock The Past, set up for genealogy and history societies (no fees) which Rachael is going to use to further our profile.

After our morning tea (with warmed muffins) Jim Connor, President of the Eltham &District Historical Society spoke on the history of mud-brick building in their area, Nillumbik Shire. This interesting talk included power point display and a very messy showing of an actual mud brick from Jim's house. It was a 25 year old much weathered brick that was very heavy and crumbling around the edges.

The next presentation before lunch was from Russ Haines, President of Ringwood & District Historical Society. Russ spoke on Murder, Death and a Ghost in Ringwood. This revealed the number of interesting cases to be found in police records, coroner's reports and word of mouth history. The cool rooms of Hotels, in the early days, were the place that bodies were stored until official viewing. The coronial inquests were also held there. The Ghost was in one of rooms in the collectables/antiques shop in East Ringwood next to the railway station. The last owner of the shop had it exorcised.

After a delicious lunch (vegetarian rolls, pasta, cheese & fruit) we had an excellent presentation by noted historian Alan Gregory on the life and times of Bill Woodfull, one of the greatest Australian cricketer of the 1920s and 1930s. Bill Woodfull's cricket record was outstanding and he was a man of great integrity. Alan's book on Bill Woodfull is available from Melbourne High School Old Boys' Association as Bill Woodfull was a Principal of the school after his cricket career.

After afternoon tea (scones and anniversary cake) our topic was artistic. Sue Thompson, Lilydale & District Historical Society spoke about Dame Nellie Melba. Sue spoke of Dame Nellie's artistic career and her personal life. Her most important contributions with which she was honoured with two citations, were her work raising funds for Belgium relief work and assisting young women to singing careers, which lasts to the current day.

Our thanks go to the Committees of the Ringwood Historical Society and the AOEHS for organising such a great day.

Pills and Potions

After I left school I began an apprenticeship with Keith Williams who had pharmacies in Box Hill and Ringwood. I worked in both at some time or another. My dates are a little mixed up here but before I was married I did some relieving work for Mr Wellington, who owned the Mitcham Pharmacy.

In 1956 I was fortunate enough to get a position at Ogg & Co in Collins Street. Later that year I was in Mitcham talking to Mr Wellington, and he mentioned that he would be prepared to sell us the Mitcham Pharmacy, and in November 1957, we took the business over.



Mitcham had a history of the medical profession which went right back to the days when Stanley Cochrane built his house in Mitcham Road. He was a very interesting man! People swore by him! Before he got a motor car he used to do his house calls on a bicycle. Recently I was talking to an elderly local lady and she said that when one of her children was sick she sent for Dr Cochrane. He knocked on the door, went straight across the hall into the living room, sat down at the piano and started to play. He stopped to ask what the trouble was, and then said, "Don't worry about that", and then he went back to playing the piano for a further fifteen minutes. He then said, "Just give him an aspirin and he'll be right", and he left, leaving the woman very frustrated.

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
