The Seydlitz story

The ship that brought Mary and Emil together

P.D. (Reichspostdampfe) Seydlitz, at 7942 gross tons, was built by the F. Schichau shipyards in Danzig for the North German Lloyd Lines (Norddeutscher Lloyd) and was launched on December 25, 1902.

On August 5, 1903, she started her maiden voyage from Bremen to the Far East via the Suez Canal. She was 450.1 feet long (143.15 metres), had a beam of 55.5 feet (16.88 metres), two propellers and triple expansion engines. And, as you can see below, she had one funnel and two masts. Her service speed was 14.5 knots and she could carry 2050 passengers – 101 in first class, 115 in second, 134 in third and 1700 in steerage. Her crew ranged between 155 and 190.

In the years before she was rebuilt – at Newcastle in 1906 – *Seydlitz* completed many round-trips from Bremen – six to the Far East (to Shanghai to Yokohama in December 1906) and 18 to Australia, all via the Suez Canal. And between March 1906 and the summer of 1914, *Seydlitz* completed seven trips to New York, one to South America, and just one trip to Philadelphia.

In 1914 *R.P.D. Seydlitz*, scheduled to sail from Sydney Harbour at 2pm on 5 August, suddenly left two days early, 36 hours before Britain declared war on Germany and World War One commenced. Instead of sailing as

programmed to Melbourne, Adelaide and Perth, she headed north for Valparaiso, in Chile. The next day the Australian destroyer *Parramatta*, with twice her speed in the water, was sent to capture and take her back to port.

Somewhere on the far north coast of New South Wales the Captain, aware that he was being pursued and almost certain to be captured, sent a boat ashore with a copper sea chest containing about 3000 gold sovereigns, jewels

(reportedly diamonds) and important documents given to him by wealthy Germans living in Sydney. The chest was buried somewhere behind the beach, with the plan that it would be retrieved when Germany won the war. Although the *Seydlitz* did manage to escape the *Parramatta* (no radar in those days), she did not make it back to Germany but became involved in the decisive Battle of the Falkland Islands.

She acted as a support vessel for the *Graf Spee* Squadron for the Battle of Coronel and the Battle of the Falklands. In late 1914 she took refuge at San Antonio Este, in Argentina. There she was interned, and in 1917 her crew is reported to have damaged the engines to prevent her seizure by Argentina and her charter to the Allies. Repaired, and perhaps still under German command, on July 24, 1917 she sailed from Bahia Blanca to Bremen via Montevideo and Saint Vincent. After the Armistice she resumed South America service in late 1921, then switched to the Bremen-New York service through September 1927. In the next years she travelled via Halifax, Canada, to New York or Galveston.

It is believed she was scrapped at Bremerhaven in 1933.

At our last meeting we considered the purchase of a new showcase for a mannequin to mark our 50th Anniversary, but our Treasurer did not feel our funds were sufficient. However, Joan Hunter has very kindly offered us a donation for the purchase and Barbara Rogalski has also offered to assist.

Owing to the generosity of a member who wishes to remain anonymous, acoustic tiles have been installed on the ceiling of the Visitor Centre and at our last general meeting we were delighted to find that they have solved the problem. As they were installed in conjunction with the City of Whitehorse and are now part of the building, we do not own the tiles but we do get to enjoy the benefits.

In May, Rachael, Valda and I attended a museum workshop on Significance hosted by Knox Historical Society at Ambleside, Ferntree Gully. Knox had obtained a grant to run the workshop, and we were very grateful to attend this informative and helpful event and be looked after so well.

In June, Lyn Ford, Pat, Rachael and I attended the Association of Eastern Historical Societies Annual Conference at Karralyka in Ringwood. The range of speakers this year was excellent and we started with an entertaining talk and photos by a former photographer from *The Age* newspaper, Bruce Postle. Debra Parry, a qualified conservator, spoke next on the do's and don'ts of handling documents and photographs. Liz Pidgeon, a

librarian from the Yarra Plenty Regional Library, talked on Content Creation via Story Telling, and the final session was from Blaise van Henke, publisher, on "Your Story, Your Publishing Options". These informative sessions were interspersed with delicious food, tea and coffee. The Association provided us with an excellent and useful program this year, and we are grateful for the work that was put into organising it. At our last general meeting, on the recommendation of the committee, members passed a motion for a change of wording to our Mission Statement and to add an Acknowledgement to Country.

This means that we will not need kitchen helpers this year; however, we still need help setting up and packing up on the WHS stall, children's activities, picnic races and gumboot throwing, and if any of the demonstrators need a cuppa fetched.

The City of Whitehorse is also organising an "Australia Calls" exhibition in the Whitehorse Art Space at Box Hill Town Hall. In addition to interpretive panels and artefacts it will include the stories of five descendants, five soldier stories, letters from the front, artefacts, a children's corner, and a computer with screen to access World War One material.

February Meeting Report



N Saturday 13 June, an enjoyable afternoon was spent with our speaker, Bill McAuley, whose family have lived in Warrandyte for seven generations. They came to the area in 1850 to look for gold, and stayed on, eventually building the first school in the district.

Bill started his career as a newspaper and magazine photographer in Melbourne in 1969. For the next 40 years he worked out of Melbourne, Sydney, London and Canberra, working both journalistically for newspapers as well as in a freelance capacity. Bill has covered a wide range of subjects including hard news, bush fires, drought, crime, the arts, sport, politics and human interest. During the 1980s he travelled extensively throughout country Victoria shooting hundreds of rural assignments for The Australian.

Bill was foundation pictorial editor of The Sunday Herald, Sunday Herald Sun and Sunday Magazine. Though he ran the photographic desk on these publications he also worked on the road, shooting assignments in Tasmania, New South Wales, Queensland, South Australia, the Northern Territory and Christmas Island.

He has won The Australian Press Photographer of The Year Award and more recently received the Eltham Arts Council Award for outstanding service to the arts.



(To the Editor.)

Sir .- I write to draw attention to the old brickworks tramway track. and to point out the advisability of converting it into a high level footpath between Carrington road and Howard street. The crossing immediately west of the viaduct is dangerous for pedestrians. Five roadways converge at this point.
