VALE BILL GRAY

T is with regret that we report the death of our past president William (Bill) Gray. Bill retired from the public service at a time when the society was in need of a president to replace Joan Roczniok, who had stayed on longer than she intended, owing to the difficulty that was had in filling the presidency.

Bill's wife Beryl had been a member of the society and the Wednesday Working Group and sought her husband's help to bring some stability to the then struggling society. Bill held the position for 9 years (1985–1993) and continued to prosecute the advancement of WHS over that time and for a long time thereafter.

As well as initiating the incorporation of the Society, he was on the committee which selected Diane Sydenham as the author to write a history of Nunawading (*Windows on Nunawading*); was involved when Council purchased Strathdon with a bi-centennial grant; kept an eye on the building of the Local History Room; supported the public view when there was talk of the complex being fenced, and all this while keeping a firm hand on events within the Society.

He saw the difficult conditions the members were working under to save our local history and met with the then Nunawading Council to seek improvements. He achieved the society receiving a grant for equipment and Stage One of an extension to the museum, and participated with local schools and businesses with talks and displays.

Bill retired as president in 1993, but continued as a committee member and assisted whenever possible; for example manning a stall on Heritage Days.

He will be remembered with fondness and grateful thanks for his loyal contributions to the progress of the society. A true gentleman.

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JUNE MEETING REPORT

Launching

E met on Saturday June 17 to celebrate the launch of Rosalie Schwerkolt Whalen's book about the "amazing life" of her forebear Mary. After the usual General Meeting had whispered itself to an inconspicuous close, the unveiling began with a talk by Gerry Robinson in which he analysed History its various aspects and written forms.

"Each history is of course valid, but there is one field that seems to most people to be quite special. This is biography," said Gerry. "Here we meet real people. We learn of aims, achievements, disappointments, attitudes and relationships. Our understanding and appreciation of others can help us in our own life journeys." He went on to ask "Who reads biographies?" and answered his own question: anyone!

Speaking of Rosalie's book, he congratulated her, saying, "Far from being a daunting dry tome, it is visually attractive. The colour, cover, font size, numerous images and uncluttered layout add to its appeal. Readers will enjoy the variety of images . . ."


He felt that it was important to consider the title chosen: "The *Amazing* Life . . ." It begged comparison with another, recently read, work *The Audacious Adventures of Dr. Louis Lawrence Smith* by John Poynter. "Both L.L. Smith and Mary Schwerkolt lived in Whitehorse; however their similarities, and the similarities of their biographies, end there. Professor Poynter's academic work comprises 694 pages in two volumes, with a bibliography of 97 reference books. Some will look at it, many might refer to it, but few will read it. However Rosalie's account of Mary is presented in such an enticing form that many will be encouraged to both look at it all and read it all".

Gerry then handed over to Rosalie, who began by expressing her gratitude to friends and family members

who had travelled – in one case from Hobart – to attend the launch. She went on to share something of the background which ultimately led to her writing the book, declaring that she was, to begin with, an unwilling historian.

"My mother had just died at the age of 92," she said. "and in one of her cupboards was an old tin trunk into which my father had thrown any documents that needed saving and amazingly he had kept 40 years of correspondence from his Aunt Mary which amounted to 100 letters and scores of postcards.

I had always been a member of and maintained contact with Friends of Schwerkolt Cottage and before long Ted Arrowsmith approached me for all the family information I could supply because he was writing a book about August Schwerkolt and the



cottage. So that really got me busy and as a result he produced [his] amazing book about the family and cottage and how the council had acquired and restored it".

Rosalie joined the Wednesday Working Group, and was eventually approached to give a speech about Mary Schwerkolt at a Whitehorse Council Women's Forum.

"At the end of my speech, I was approached by several people wanting to know how they could read about Mary's amazing life and so that prompted me to set about putting this book together".

And so, the telling of an amazing life commenced. Rosalie concluded by thanking Megan Hopley, Chris Gray and Wendy Stanfield for their help in bringing the project to fruition.

The final part of the launch was the cutting of the celebratory cake, on the top of which was displayed a reproduction of the book's cover.

N each newsletter there is a small note in a discrete part of a page stating how many photographs, documents and artefacts there are in safe keeping. The number is quite staggering, but have you ever thought what exactly is behind those numbers?

You may wonder what we do every week, and why we do it? We like being there and we like what we do. It is also true that we enjoy each other's company, and eat nice biscuits for morning tea. Birthdays – they are special. The birthday person is expected to bring a cake and in return we all sing happy birthday and excuse them from washing up.

The remainder of the time we are dedicated to saving the history of our area, which covers the suburbs of Mitcham, the Blackburns, both Vermonts, East Burwood and Nunawading (which had its name changed from Tunstall only recently – i.e. within the last 100 years!).

We all have different interests and abilities that help to make everything run smoothly. As with all organisations, we have a committee who have a myriad of responsibilities other than the work they do on a Wednesday. To put it simply, there is a museum to run, documents – both paper and photographic – to preserve, and a public to inform.

Our standards are high and we are proud to have been accredited with Museums Australia for the last 19 years. The museum displays are the culmination of a lot of conservation and hard work. Before the donated articles are accepted, the Acquisition Committee meets to make a decision as to whether the article is suitable for addition to the collection. When it has been accepted it goes through a rigorous process of cataloguing, a process that involves examining its condition carefully and noting any defects. The results are all written down and stored with an identification number that is attached to the article. It is then stored safely. And it doesn't finish there; a letter of thanks is sent to the donor accompanied by a form that confirms it has been gifted.

The photographs and documents come from various sources, sometimes new, sometimes from a family hoard, but all are treated with equal respect. These too are carefully inspected for condition and content. The photographs are described in detail – sepia, colour, black and white, or faded. The details in the photograph are

noted – who are the people, where are the roads, what are the trees, and what is the date? Everything is noted, numbered, written down, the photographs are placed in an album and the details entered onto the data [text] base.

The written articles go through a similar process. These are either placed in numbered [archival] acid-free plastic sleeves in the filing cabinets or on the shelves. Everything has to have a number.

A data base is a small term that covers an enormous amount of work. Once the items have been catalogued, the information gathered is entered onto computer. Currently our computer-knowledgeable members are scanning, or photographing every document, newspaper and map in our collection for two reasons – ease of access and preservation.

Requests for information via the telephone, email, letter, or by a personal visit are all researched using the data base and our general knowledge of other sources. All are answered as promptly as possible.

Copy for the newsletter is also researched, compiled, edited and finally set for printing on a Wednesday, although a great deal of support work is done after hours. There is always hope that an article will be written about some aspect of the history of the area; if not, a search through old newspapers usually produces something of interest.

The men, who are worth their weight in gold, not only lift and move awkward or heavy objects; they care for and keep the farm machinery in good condition. Their mechanical knowledge is invaluable when unusual machines are donated.

Our work is not confined to the workroom; it also concerns the cleaning of the interiors of all the buildings in the complex. Fortunately, the Whitehorse Council maintains the buildings and the surrounding grounds, while it is the Wednesday Workers who clean the windows, remove the cobwebs and sweep up the dust and rubbish. The date of the next Working Bee is advertised in each newsletter in the hope that more members will respond, rather than leaving it to only a few. It is not arduous, just housekeeping.

All the effort by the Wednesday Workers is worth every minute when we hear compliments from the public. And to continue this work we hope to gain more members who will support the Society in one way or another.
