# A few words on paper can say so much

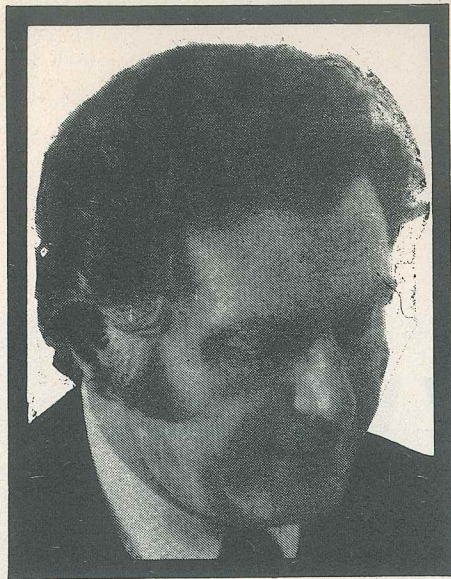

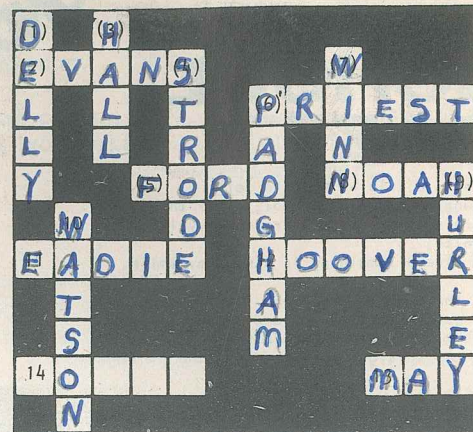

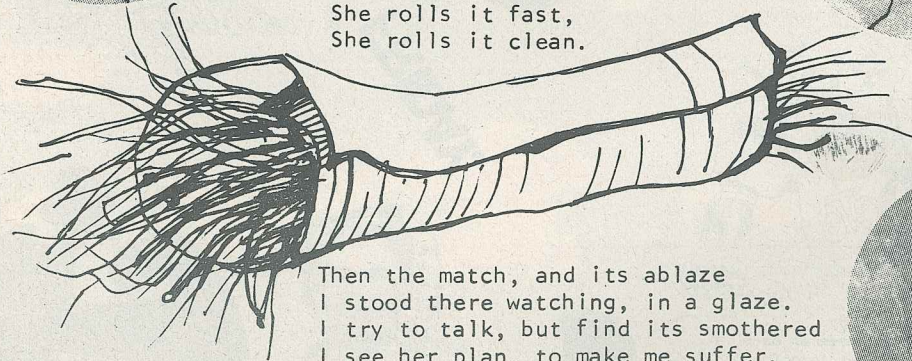
MY TEACHER

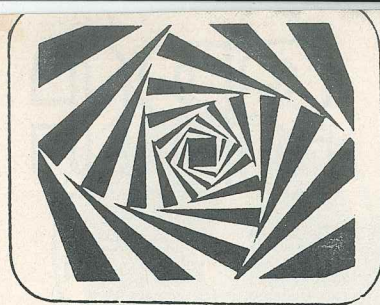
The S.R.C. also got the sporting tribunal working again in the school, which made for cleaner sporting activities.

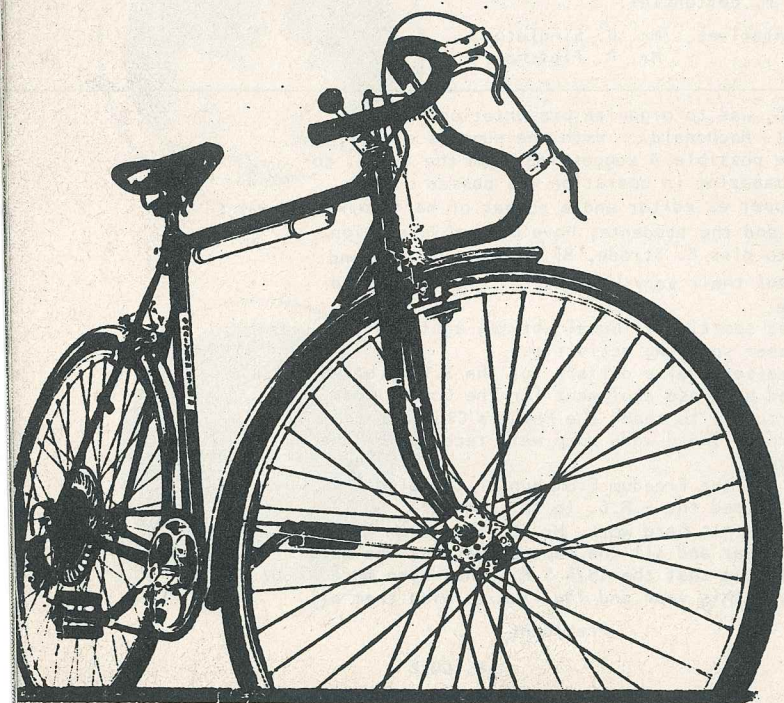
### Brad

Brad Robbins also put up a very good result on the same two days but he competed in the juvenile second.

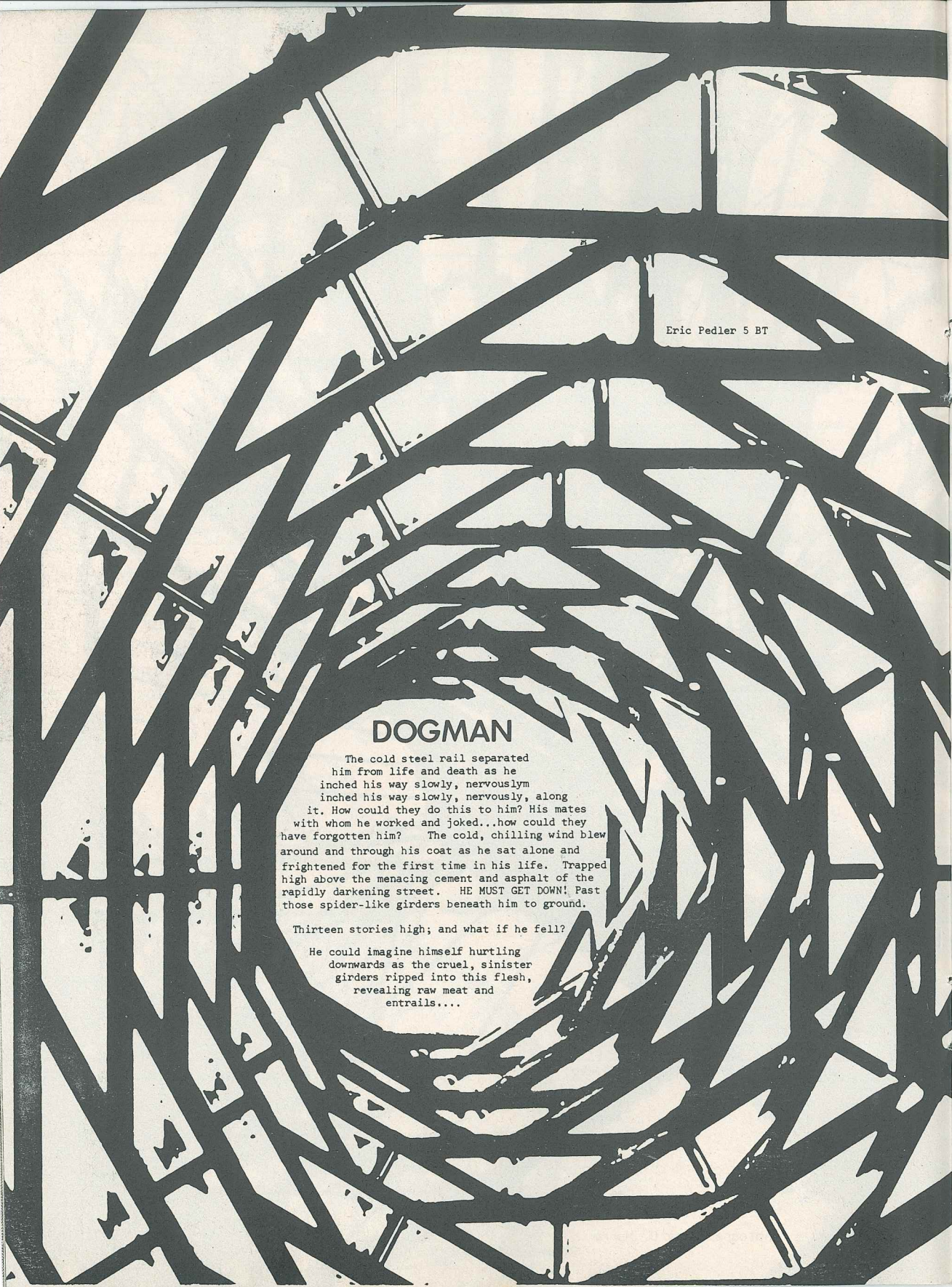
Brad won the twelve mile scratch race and the Ten mile time trial. Brad was the Club's Juvenile Champion, winning by four points.

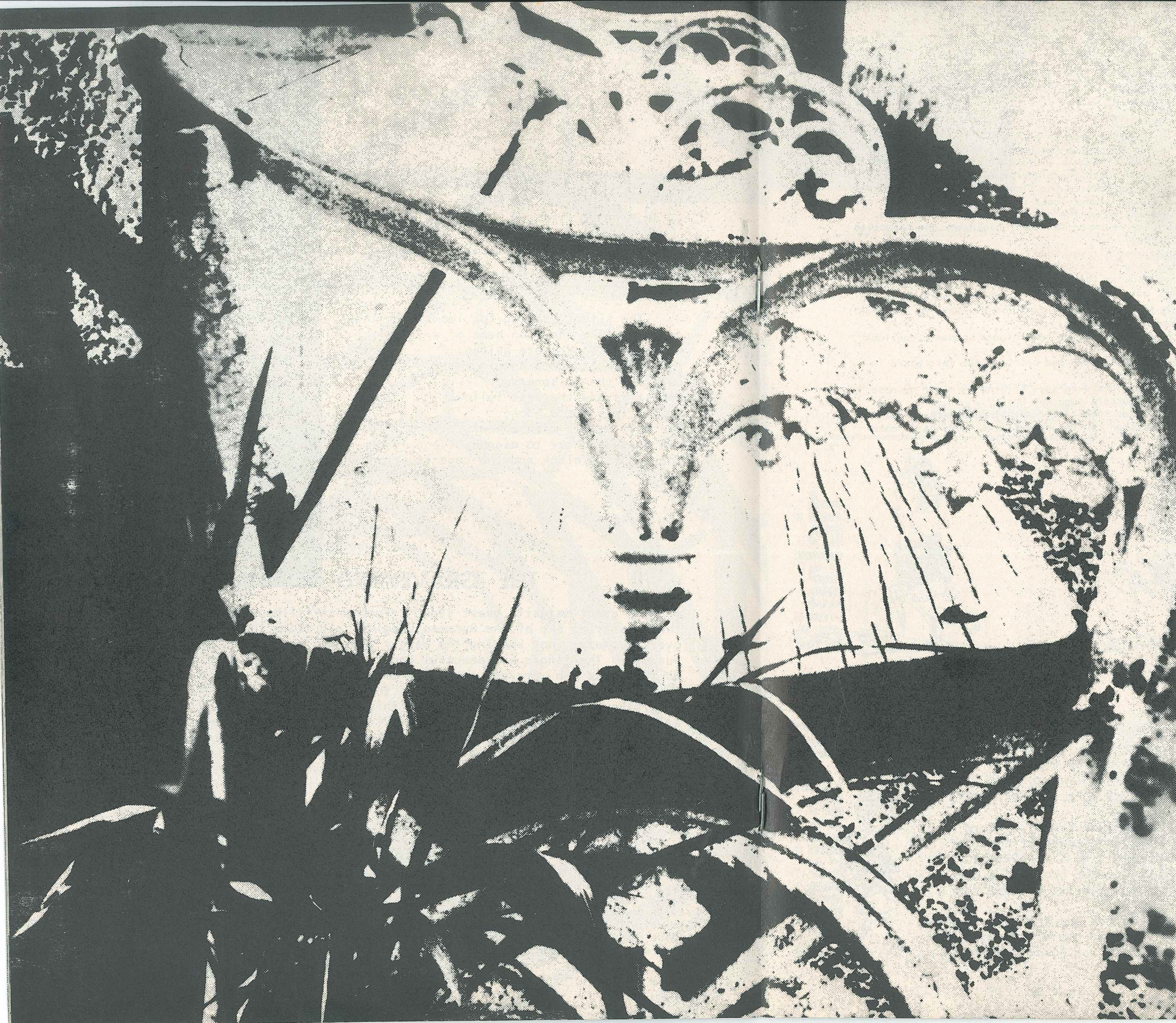

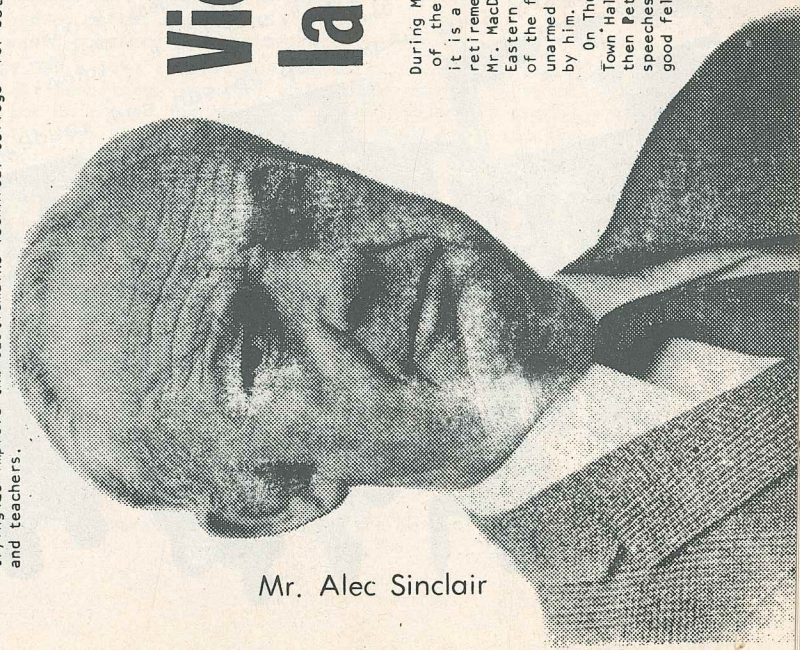
## Retirement

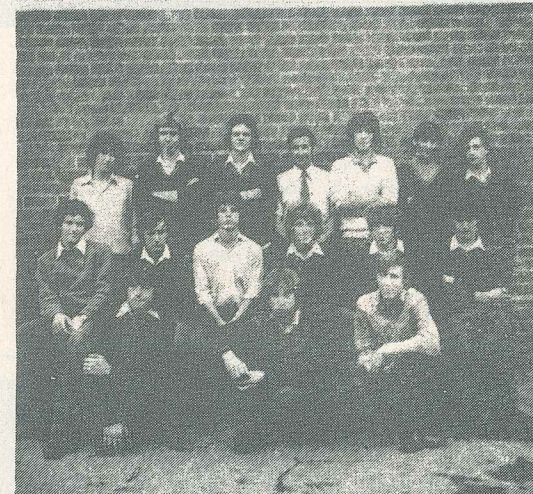

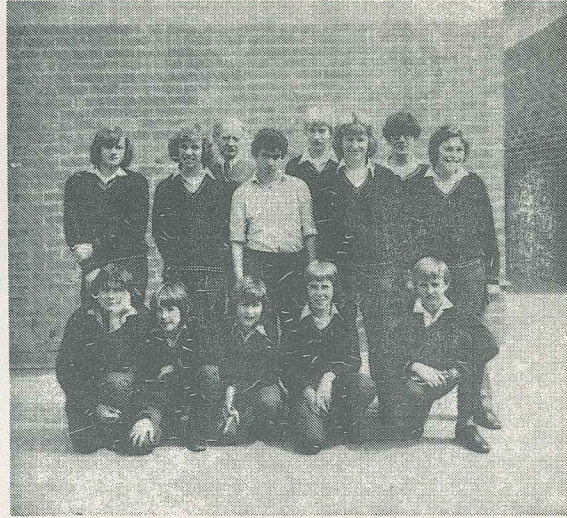

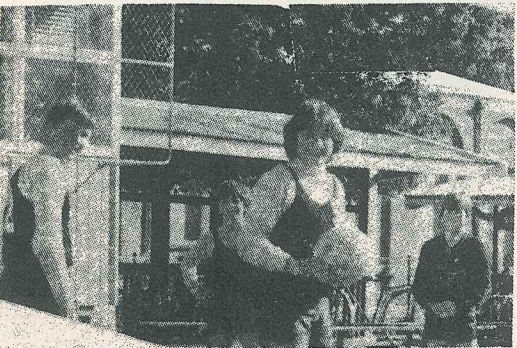
