the evening there was a good deal of conversation as to the duties of the individuals of a party such as ours during an excursion of this nature the general tenor of which was that the party ought to keep together under all circumstances & hints were thrown out against the procedure of Mr Anderson & myself in leaving the party as we did. On the following morning being anxious to get home I left the others and followed down the course of the river Leigh, cutting off the bends and heading the creeks that ran into that river from the eastward. I passed through the country afterwards known as Barginie & crossed the Barginie creek near the spot which was afterward occupied by Mr George T. Reid as his homestead & travelling down the valley of the Leigh which was occupied by the Glyde Company, I reached Mr Phillips station at Edinburgh the same evening after I left the party at Williamson's Creek they went one or two days journey following up the Leigh & exploring the country about Winters Freehold & Ballarat.
