
Last but not least, I would like to thank the Board of Directors for their great help and support over the last twelve months.

Every year we like to participate in a national event, the Lions Youth of the Year Program.

This year, we welcomed five Year 12 students to our Club Final — Owen Shooter, Meaghan Ferguson and Ben Reid of Castlemaine Secondary College (CSC), and Allea Ferguson and Bradley Reeves of Kyneton Secondary College. Meaghan won the public speaking section, but Owen was the overall winner.

Then he represented CSC and our Lions Club at the Regional Final in Bendigo, which featured eight candidates. Owen thought Youth of the Year was an enriching experience and thanked us for the opportunity.

Lions Licola Wilderness Camp

In January 2017, the Club again sponsored three students from a local primary school to the Lions Wilderness Camp at Licola in eastern Victoria for a number of days.

The parents and students, selected by the School Principal on the basis of need, are briefed on the nature of the Camp and activities they will be involved in, and shown a five-minute DVD on the camp. Upon return from camp, the students, along with their parents, are invited to a Club Dinner in the New Year to share their camp with Club experiences members. Somewhat disappointingly, the boy selected this year pulled out at the last minute, and one of the girls was unable to come to the Club dinner to share her experiences.

We have sponsored ten children from four different schools in the last four years and the majority of students report that they have had a positive and enjoyable experience.

We anticipate sending another three students to the camp in January 2018.




In summary, the local winning entries are submitted to the District level, then


Then, on the Saturday, came the setting-up for the big day and directing early site-holders. To all who helped, thank you.
