GENERAL: Our work has linked us with all the major public hospitals in the metropolitan area, to whom relief on a wide scale

Midwifery patients have been transferred twenty-four hours after confinement. It is to be regretted that, because of the acute shortage of beds, many post-natal patients are discharged from hospital on the sixth or seventh day. The mothers would benefit from the rest if a longer period were possible.

Every available help is still given to the Women's Hospital—maternity cases in particular. Great difficulty is being experienced in placing elderly patients, who live quietly at home until overcome by sickness which makes them very dependent upon charitable assistance. It is a constant source of anxiety to our Social Service Officer to know where to place these people so that they can be cared for.

The past year has been an arduous one, mainly because of persistent staff shortage and the results of the forty-hour working

MEDICAL OFFICERS: I wish to offer my grateful thanks to the Honorary Medical Officers for devoting so much of their time and skill to the patients. The resident medical staffs of all public hospitals have given ready co-operation, which has been greatly appreciated.

OBSTETRICS: One hundred and eleven mothers were delivered in their own homes. Sixty-two of these patients were attended by their own doctors, and four patients were transferred to the Women's Hospital. Four obstetrical emergencies were attended.

We nursed two hundred and eighty-eight mothers and babes transferred from the Women's Hospital on their fourth day.

ANTE NATAL CLINICS: 2,605 visits were paid to the Ante Natal Clinics. These cases are transferred mostly from the Women's Hospital, and a smaller number from the Queen Victoria Hospital.

Dr. George Simpson and Dr. Norman Dodd continue to give their valuable time conducting the clinics.

THE MOTOR AUXILIARY is a valuable asset to the Society, as the work could not be carried on to such an extent without its help. Special thanks are offered to the members by the nursing staff—especially to those who drove so frequently during the extended tram strike—and also to the Red Cross, who have supplied cars and drivers for this service.

NURSING STAFF: It is my privilege to extend my thanks to the nursing staff for their efficiency and co-operation throughout a strenuous year.

I should like to thank the President and Committee of Management for their help at all times; also the Secretary, the Office Staff, and the Matron of the After-Care Hospital for their co-operation during the year.

# REPORT OF SOCIAL SERVICE OFFICER

As Social Service Officer, I have pleasure in presenting my report for the past year.

So many of the patients passing through this Hospital need assistance and advice with their problems and cares, and it has been my duty to assist them in every way possible.

Transport to their own homes and to the various Benevolent Institutions has been arranged for patients on their discharge from hospital, and our thanks and appreciation are extended to the Red Cross Society for the wonderful response given to our requests to supply transport for the aged and needy.

An important part of my work is arranging further convalescence for patients living alone and unable to fend for themselves. Admission to the various Convalescent Homes, where they can remain until they regain their normal health, is much appreciated. Furthermore, convalescence has been arranged for child inmates, essential in cases where home conditions are deplorable. A holiday means much to these children, and the necessary arrangements for clothing, etc., were made.

Several successful applications have been made to the Housing Commission for better homes for families living under unsuitable conditions. Arrangements were completed for many of our post-natal patients to have further rest at the Lady Dugan Red Cross Maternity Home, and, in some instances, the children of these patients have been accommodated at a Home provided for this purpose during the temporary absence of the mother.

Patients applying for the Social Service Sickness Benefit, Old Age and Invalid Pensions have been attended to and given every assistance. Several patients have been admitted to Benevolent Institutions, and it would appear, from observation and investigation, that the need for further accommodation for the aged and infirm is very necessary, and the position is becoming more acute.

It is gratifying to report that accommodation has been secured, at the various Hostels, for patients temporarily without homes, and, in some cases, financial aid has been granted.

Blankets, clothing and many parcels of baby clothing have been given to patients in indigent circumstances.

In conclusion, I desire to take this opportunity of extending my appreciation to the Almoners of all hospitals whose co-operation has been invaluable.

Work in domiciliary midwifery service has continued steadily during the year without any special worry. The number of cases remains fairly constant.

Expectant mothers have regularly attended ante natal clinics, confinements have been without any unexpected complications, and all cases attended have done very well.

For complications detected during ante natal period, two mothers

were transferred for confinement to the Women's Hospital, and three others were transferred during labour. In all, 111 mothers were confined in their own homes, and of these 62 were private doctors' cases.

In recent years an increasing feature of our work has been the domiciliary nursing of mothers who have been discharged, on account of bed shortage from the Women's Hospital a few days after confinement. During the past year 288 mothers were referred to our service after confinement at the Women's Hospital, and we were very pleased to have been able to co-operate with the Women's Hospital in this way, though we would prefer to confine the patients in their owns home also.

This system does seem to offer a solution to the problem of providing sufficient hospital beds for midwifery patients; it is being tried in other cities, and has been given much publicity.


