The Committee of Management takes pleasure in presenting a resume of the activities of the Club throughout the year which has just drawn to a

In many respects, this year has been a most memorable one.

However, in spite of the set-backs suffered through the inability of many members to attend meetings regularly, the work of the Club has been carried on in a manner which reflects credit on all concerned.

Membership. At this moment the nominal strength of the Club is 40 members.

As in previous years, there was a slight fluctuation, 2 members having been struck off strength, 4 having tendered their resignations, and 4 new members having been admitted.

It is pleasing to note that each of the new members is honoring his obligation to the Club by performing his allotted tasks.

A glance at the Attendance Records indicates a really good average attendance at meetings, several members being present at every meeting.

Comradeship. This committee has been extremely active this year, aiming as it has, at making new members and visitors alike feel at home

When the occasions demanded it, the committee conveyed the felicitations of members to those concerned.

They also forwarded copies of the Bulletin to members who were unable to attend meetings.

During the year visits were made to the Clubs at Ballarat and Geelong and these Clubs later paid a visit to Melbourne where, after meeting at Dinner, a very successful Indoor Sports Night was held. It is hoped that these triangular visits will be made a regular feature as they help considerably in strengthening the bond of friendship which should and does exist among members of the three Clubs.

Programme. The standard of the programmes was maintained at a very high level, the speakers being particularly good, and their subjects

However, thanks to the good services of our old friend, Mr. Jim Tierney, who stepped in and filled the breach, the work proceeded with a minimum of interruption.

We extend our sincere thanks to Mr. Tierney for his excellent co-operation.

The progress made by this class was aptly illustrated by their excellent display in the recent Legacy Club Demonstration. That its popularity continues is best indicated by reference to the Attendance Records which disclose an average of 24 members at each meeting.

encouragement in the fact that the numbers are gradually increasing, and the class maintains an undoubted popularity.

The Committee of Management would like to express its sincere appreciation to the Instructresses, and trusts that their services will be available in the future. It is hoped that next year, after further contact has been made with several interested organisations, the attendances at both classes will be improved.

Members on Duty. As has been the case in previous years, several members have been attached to various branches of J.L.C. activities, and their efforts have won the approval of Senior Legatees. Several members also assisted at the J.L.C. camps at Somers during the Xmas. and Easter vacations.

Welfare Trust Fund. Again this year, it was found that no call was made on the Fund. This may have been due to the fact that some of the newer members did not know of the existence of the Fund.

Members are reminded that this Fund was created to assist those who may unfortunately be in need of financial assistance.

Bulletins. The T.L.C. Bulletin has been published regularly each fortnight, and has always been filled with entertaining and interesting jottings concerning club activities.

Copies of the Bulletin, besides being sent to absent members, are also forwarded to each of the other Intermediate Clubs throughout Australia.

These Clubs reciprocate by forwarding copies of their Bulletins, and, in this manner, we are able to learn of the activities of these Clubs.

Our thanks are due to the Office Staff, and to the Senior Club, for making their facilities available.

Finance. No member need doubt the security of the financial position of the Club at the moment.

A glance at the attached Financial Statement reveals that the Club has been served particularly well by the Treasurer.

Wardens. Throughout the year the Club has had the services of a really fine group of Wardens. Each has given the Club the benefit of his experience and knowledge, whilst in many cases, assistance in various forms has been given to individual members.

The Committee of Management takes this opportunity of expressing its appreciation of the efforts of the Wardens, who are held in high esteem by all members of I.L.C.

Anzac Day Observance. This year several members were co-opted on to the Anzac Day Observance Committee of the Senior Club, and it is pleasing to note that they earned the approval of the Committee for their efforts.

On Anzac Day a group of members assembled in the small hours of the morning and assisted the Anzac Fellowship of Women with the distribution of Light Refreshments to the men who attended the Dawn Service at the Shrine.

Later in the day, members assembled at the Shrine where a Wreath was placed on the Cenotaph.

Employment Sub-Committee. Two members were again detailed to the Employment Sub-Committee of the Senior Club, and were of much assistance in the placing of the youths whose names appear on the Unemployment Lists.

Welfare. It is a source of much pride that we are able to report that each of the Welfare cases handled during the year has either been brought to a successful conclusion, or is being dealt with to the entire satisfaction of all concerned.

Conference. Xmas. 1939-40 will see the first All-Australian Conference of Intermediate Clubs being held in Melbourne.

It is hoped that this is a forerunner of many others and it is confidently expected that much benefit will be derived by all Clubs. It is interesting to record that each Club throughout Australia will be

able to look back on a most memorable visit to Melbourne.

General. In bringing another successful year to a conclusion, the Committee of Management desires to thank all members for the assistance they have given throughout the year.

They would remind them though, that next year will see a much greater call on their time, for it is expected that we will be asked to assist the Senior Club to a much greater extent than in the past.
