

Bill Scott: "I was in the reinforcements which went to Gallipoli after the landing . . . my brother was with the Sixth Battalion and was wounded twice in the landing, killed the next year in France . . . but I was a bank clerk up in the bush in Queensland and I came down to Victoria to enlist.

"I'd been in the school cadets at Ballarat when Lord Kitchener came out, I think I was always mixed up with a military show. But the real reason I enlisted? Well, it has to be said — although I don't think people nowadays would really understand — but we just had a terrific loyalty to the King and the Crown. England was in trouble and we had to go and help her . . ."

John Rogers' was the first of the four men to arrive at Gallipoli. He went ashore on the third morning of the landing, April 27, 1915. April, 1980.

Rogers: "We'd trained very
