



BRUSHY CREEK DRAINAGE SCHEME



As indicated in previous issues of this paper and in a brochure issued by Lillydale and Croydon Councils, the proposal was to do drainage works on the Brushy Creek costing various estimates ranging from \$4 mallion dollars upwards of which \$1 million would be met by the State Government and the remaining uncertain amount by the two local councils. The M.M.B.W. would manage the scheme and operating coats would be met by applying their drainage rate of \$1.4 per annum on the NAV value of properties within the watershed.



The flash flood problem is caused by the immediate run-off of heavy rain from the roofs and streets of heavily built-up areas, and Wonga Park is a net absorber of such water rather than the creator of the flood.

Dr. Mills commented that he had attended the previous night's meeting at Mooroolbark when the following points were made:-

The overall cost of the project would be \$4,000,000, towards which the Victorian Government would contribute \$1,000,000.

Of 10,000 people affected, 7,000 were in the Lillydale Shire, and of these only 310 responded in writing, of whom 205 were against the Scheme, and 105 in favour. In this regard, it must be remember In this regard, it must be remembered that a large portion of Mooroolbark is in the Shire of Lillydale.

The speaker also suggested that a great number of people would not bother to protest in what they take to be foregone decision.

Dr. Mills continued... "A lot of argument had more words than wisdom,

but the Hon. Mr. Lacy made the point that -- a distress situation should be shared. That this one was caused by each person who lived in the community, in the flood-prone area, and should be borne by those causing it. It was unreasonable for all tax-payers to carry it.

"Mr. Chairman, (said Dr. Mills,) I could not agree more. The pith of our objection, Mr. Chairman, is that, to the NORTH of the Highway, no flooding is caused; no work on Brushy Creek, north of the Highway is contemplated, and by resolution of the same Authorities as are suggesting this Scheme, the area involved, north of the Highway is not declared flood-prone, and therefore cannot be built on, but the adjacent land is now not to be sub-divided into less than 62 acre lots, and therefore never can compound the flood problem of Mooroolbark.

To paraphrase Mr. Lacy's words, it is a south of the Highway problem, and we at the north end should not be included at all. In fact, Mr. Chairman, by altering the flow rate of Brushy Creek, you are denying farm lands the benefit of periodic flooding.

So, to assist only 45 to 50 foolish owners in Mooroolbark, we are being asked to pay such larger, individual contributions than they are, -- FOR EVER. That is iniquitous!

the south of the Highway. Any more is only a legal convenience for the Authorities involved."

Those words were followed by rousing cheers and applause by all persons in attendance.

The proposal was put that the Scheme and it's cost should apply only to the area south of the Highway where the problem originated and household flooding occurred. This was met with the thought that the M.M.B.W. would not agree as it was not their usual policy to take only part of a watershed -- Bureaucracy at work.

Some people, including a Member of Parliament, said, maybe not enough research had been done, others said, why should we pay when the problem is not of our creation, nor does it inconvenience us and on this note the meeting ended.

- .. develop Christian fellowship within the community.


