
The Grand Opening is on:

LORA'S POINT OF VIEW

With very little fanfare an important and timely document has just been released.

It is Ecology Australias's Final Draft Report of Sites of Botanical & Zoological Significance in Wonga Park commissioned by City of Manningham, with the intention of consolidating the provisions of the Doncaster & Templestowe and Lillydale Planning Schemes.

The Report findings will assist in the review of planning controls currently under way as part of the State Government's planning reform programme.

Ten sites are identified and recommendations are made for appropriate planning measures to ensure their long term conservation. "The need for public awareness of the value of the natural landscape and biota is critical in ensuring its conservation," says the report. One of the sites is on "Narr-Meian", Carol & Alastair Traill's property in Freyne Street, and they are justifiably proud of this.

Recorded in the study area are:-

184 indigenous plant species

54 weed spp

37 mammal spp (10 introduced)168 bird spp (11 introduced)19 reptile spp2 native fish spp

However, warning bells have been sounded also. The 'bush' character of Wonga Park can easily be further degraded or at the worst, lost if attenton is not paid to management issues such as:-

Weed invasion

Eucalypt dieback

Domestic stock grazing on native vegetation

Rabbit grazing

Fire management

Isolation of significant sites (need for habitat links)

OSSUMS IN THE GARDEN

New regulations gave come into force making it now illegal to re-locate possums to a new site. Research has shown that very few survive when relocated, as all suitable locations have their own territorial population and the newcomer will not be made welcome. The Department of Natural Resources suggests that if a possum is in your rook it should be removed and a nesting box placed in the garden or the possum transferred to a suitable tree. It is of course essential to close any gaps into the roof. Only if there is no suitable garden site for the possum is it legal to take it to a vet (in a permitted cage) and for the vet to put the possum down. It is not legal or acceptable for anyone else to-kill possums, nor for possums to be treated inhumanely, or be put in non-regulation cages.
