LORA'S POINT OF VIEW - this extract was taken from a media release.

Conservation groups have joined forces in a desperate bid to halt the clearance of native vegetation in Melbourne's outer east. According to the groups, the illegal clearance of remnant vegetation on private property is like a "death by a thousand cuts", leading ultimately to plant and animal extinctions and radically altering the character of the Green Wedge region known as the lungs of Melbourne. The groups took part in their own Remembrance Day Service on Sunday 9/11/97 and listened in silence to the reading of a list of extinct species, accompanies only by the symbolic beating of a drum. Following the formal ceremony, the groups accounded the next steps in their plans to protect the environment. A spokesperson for Wonga Park Environment Groups, Ms Flora Anderson, claims the loss of biodiversity will forever change the nature of Melbourne's famous Green Wedge. "Future generations are the big loser here. We have parcels of private land which are cleared of virtually all native vegetation either deliberately or unwittingly. Either way, the penalties for these damaging actions are pathetic" she said. "It's easy to forget that every day we are losing up to 30 species of plant and animal across the planet forever. Gone is gone!" The groups are blaming the State Government for weaknessess in Planning system and the maximum on the spot fine for native vegetation clearance is \$160.00 there is no protective mechanism for native vegetation on land under 1 acre.
