ANNUAL REPORT, 1919-20.

As was contemplated in our last Report, the season just passed proved to be of great enthusiasm, and keen interest was evinced by the attendance at the matches.

The Hon. Treasurer (Mr. F. Blake) presents to you the financial statement, and shows the necessity of each member exerting his influence and efforts to introduce new proposals for the members' list, and thus assist him in presenting a

statement free of liabilities.

The return to their homeland of the members of the A.I.F. team was the cause of intense excitement in the ranks of the cricket-loving public, and the welcome home and reception given by the Hon. D. Mackinnon (President) and members of the V.C.A. will live long in the memories of those who had the privilege of being present at the convivial gatherings, especially after their success in the Mother Country. Their display on the M.C.C. was of the best; the keenness and energy displayed on the field helped them to a great extent to achieve the many victories they gained, and should tend to give an impetus to players to devote more of their time to that important branch—fielding. The Victorian representatives, Messrs. C. Willis and B. Lampard, upheld the prestige of our State by their great performance with bat and ball.

We deeply deplore the loss the Club has sustained by the death of two of our once prominent members. The late "Billy" Dedman, one of our early-day sports, his father being one of the founders of the Club. As a batsman and fielding at point in his day he excelled. Playing with the old Dark Blues, he was the typical goal sneak, and was a terror to all opponents. The late Charley Bowes was one of a family of sports who have played with both our First and Second

XI's.

The V.C.A., in their endeavour to encourage the game in country centres, sent teams during Easter Week, where they were received in a right royal manner, and great interest was taken in the different games.

Our representatives, Messrs. W. Sewart (captain), against Bendigo team, and L. Downs and H. Clover at Mildura and

Wentworth, upheld the fame of the old Club.

At this juncture we desire to record the thanks of our Club to the V.C.A. for the generous dividend of £50 from its funds, which we much appreciate.

To the Chairman (Mr. R. Heatley), and members of our Ground Committee, we extend our gratitude for the manner in which they attended to their duties by devoting so much of their time and labour to the welfare of the Clubs.

Our Curator (Mr. Tom Warne), with his usual care and ability, has had wickets prepared in first-class style, which were very much appreciated, and commented on, not only by our own, but the opposing teams, in a praiseworthy manner. His absence from the green sward, as a partisan in the game was much regretted by the members.

The fair sex, who are so constant in their attention every Saturday, looking after the social aspect, in providing afternoon tea, have done so much in cementing the good fellowship amongst our members and the visiting teams, for which we return our sincere thanks.

Since our last meeting, a Social Club has been formed for the benefit of the members of both Clubs (the C.F.C. and C.C.C.), who, on payment of a yearly subscription of 10/6, are entitled to the privileges pertaining thereto. It is styled the Carlton Members' Club, and is controlled by a committee of gentlemen who have had great experience in organisations of a similar nature, who, along with the Hon. Secretary, Mr. Jas. Anderson, are ever ready to receive nominations for membership.

A word of praise is due to our Scorer, Mr. W. Harper, for his consistency, and attention, who so ably filled the position vacated by our energetic and genial Ise Moss, who has acted in that capacity for the interstate matches in Sydney and Brisbane

Our Tuesday Evening Concerts, under the direction of Mr. Fred. Delves, assisted by the members of the Musical Committee, were carried on as usual, although adverse weather conditions marred considerably the success of same. We would again invite the patronage of members, and so encourage the director to provide first-class artists, with a view to induce others to become members.

As usual, the press have recorded the doings of the Club in an efficient and lucid manner, for which we express appreciation.

To our Office-Bearers we feel very grateful for the manner in which they came forward, spontaneously, to provide trophies for the winners in each team.

The First XI., although not as successful as in the past few seasons, held their own by scoring six wins as against five losses, starting the season by winning against Prahran and University, and closing by beating South Melbourne, Richmond and Collingwood.

In the opening match of the season, through the splendid batting of our Captain (W. Sewart), who scored 99 not out, and H. Gray, 73, we won by 166 runs. Herb. McLean bowled well, and secured 4 wickets for 23 runs.

Against the Students, George Truman was very deadly, and captured 7 wickets for 27. Lyell Downs gave a brilliant display in his compilation of 109 not out.

In the match against the M.C.C., we were beaten by 162 runs. The highest score was made by Lyell Downs (44), who showed great confidence against the stalwart bowlers of the M.C.C.

We experienced another defeat by the Essendon Club, who exceeded our total by 128 runs. Another brilliant innings by our little champion, Lyell Downs, with top score (67); in the second innings H. Clover put together 58 not out, in a praiseworthy manner, half the score being boundary hits, for which he came in for rounds of applause.

Our batsmen failed completely in the East Melbourne match, through the excellent bowling of W. Rayson, who captured all the wickets (9 for 59). Our trundler, George Truman, topped the batting with 23 in good style; R. Robinson bagged four of the East for 20.

Our neighbours from across the park were our victims after an exciting contest, by 11 runs. The victory was due to the excellent bowling performance of W. Bowes, who put to the right-about 7 for 73, and our Captain (W. Sewart) contributed 16, which were made in masterly style.

On A.N.A. Day we were defeated by Northcote Cricket Club by 44 runs. H. Clover in his score of 85 not out gave a splendid exhibition, and gives great promise of a brilliant future as an all-round exponent of the game.

Against Fitzroy C.C. the small score of 138, on a wet wicket, was made. Stan. Stranks (42) was going strong with his colleague, H. Clover (21), when the latter got a hard knock which necessitated his retirement from the game. W. Bowes dismissed 4 for 67.

The visit of the Seasiders of South Melbourne was the next contest. The wielders of the willow came to the rescue. W. Sutherland (104 not out), and Lyell Downs (73), proved a strong combination, and worthy of the applause rendered by the spectators. The following ably assisted in compiling the massive score of 363:—G. Green 59, W. Sewart 50, H. Clover 30, H. Gray 18, and Stan. Hastings 10, the two latter being run out.

Geo. Truman and Geo. Green divided the bowling honours, getting 4 wickets each.

From home we journeyed to Richmond, and dismissed the locals for 158 on a perfect wicket. W. Sewart, with an admirable length, captured 3 for 31, and G. Truman 3 for 62. The continuance of the match took place on the Amateur Sports' Ground, where our team put together 281 (on a very rough wicket). Stan. Hastings batted very freely for 46, Lyell Downs very carefully 46, and Stan. Stranks 45 batted in first-class style.

Our final tussle at Victoria Park, versus Collingwood, proved another very exciting game. George Truman was at his best—kept a good length, and dismissed 5 for 56. He was ably assisted by the Captain (W. Sewart), in capturing 3 for 25, J. Ryder and S. Keating, of interstate fame, being two of his victims. Our opening batsmen collapsed, so much so, that 4 of the best fell for 7 runs; then the two rising and promising batsmen, W. Sutherland (82 not out), and Stan. Stranks (57), defied the bowlers, and put on 108 runs before they were separated, Harold Gray being the only other double figure, with 14, when they were so badly wanted, thus winning a most exciting match with 2 wickets and 4 runs to spare.

Much praise must be allotted to these batsmen for the able defence they put up, and we regret to have to announce after so many years, the loss of our promising young cricketer, Will Sutherland, who was at all times so brilliant in the field, and with the bat, also such a good Club man. It is a fitting termination of his association with us to carry with him the trophy for the best batting average, for which we give him three hearty cheers.

His removal to the Prahran district is decidedly their gain and our loss. We wish him every success on the cricket field and in his every-day life.

It is gratifying to the members to see our colleagues doing so well on the football field, and upholding the fame of other days by their bulldog tenacity. We hope they will add still another decoration to the ground.

SECOND XI.

The Second XI. must be congratulated for their splendid achievement in once again bringing the Second XI. premiership to Carlton. Our seconds have always played a prominent part in their competitive games, and last season's record of

9 wins and 3 defeats will certainly rank amongst their best performances. The team's success was due in a large measure to the splendid spirit which existed at all times, both on and off the field, and to the tactful leadership of Mr. W. Bowes.

Some fine individual performances were recorded during the season, but undoubtedly the best were fittingly registered in the all-important finals. W. Bowes's 14 wickets for 41 runs, against Collingwood, in the semi-final, and his 6 for 41, in the final game, against Prahran, must rank amongst the best efforts in the club's history, and were unquestionably the chief factor in the team's success, although the batting efforts of H. De Gruchy, who carried his bat through the first innings of the Collingwood game for 21, and of Vin. Gardiner, who had an excellent double of 21 and 35 not out in the final game, are also worthy of special mention. Although the batting figures are considerably behind those of former seasons, they must still be considered satisfactory. The average was obtained by Vin. Gardiner, with the splendid figures of 394 runs for ten completed innings, placing him an easy first on the list. Throughout the season he batted consistently and well, and had very few failures. His 102 against North Melbourne was a brilliant piece of work, the runs being obtained at the rate of one a minute. H. Percy also got 110 not out in the same game, and generally showed fine form during the season. R. Beckerleg, S. Hastings, H. De Gruchy, and C. Hoy also performed well and consistently in this department.

The bowling honours were won by W. Bowes, who obtained 51 wickets at an average of 9.47. His best performances were recorded in the finals, and have been previously referred to. M. Cain, with 36 wickets, at an average of 11.5, was a close second, his bowling being at times very deadly. His best efforts were 8 for 45, against North Melbourne; 7 for 54, against Northcote; and 7 for 21, against Richmond. R. Shaw, S. Hastings and R. Robinson also bowled ably when required, the latter's work being much better than shown by his figures. Altogether, during the season the team scored 2735 runs, for the loss of 150 wickets, giving them an average of 18.2, as against an average of 14.1 obtained by their opponents, who lost 171 wickets for 2421 runs. The fielding of the side was generally good, the best efforts in this important department being contributed by V. Gardiner, S. Hastings and H. Percy.

The duties of scorer were carried out by Mr. H. Pennington, who is deserving of the best thanks of the team for the efficient manner in which he performed his work.

In conclusion, the Second XI. wish to place on record their thorough appreciation of the efforts of those ladies who so kindly dispensed afternoon tea during the season. Their presence at the final game on the Albert Ground, with "the cup that cheers," undoubtedly contributed in no small measure to our splendid win, and we ask them to accept our grateful thanks.

The team is being ably captained by Bill Bowes, whose play as Catcher leaves nothing to be desired. In Alex. Malcolm and Harry De Gruchy, the team has two fine pitchers as well as first basemen, both playing the positions splendidly. Sid. Hastings has charge of the keystone sack (2nd base). His play has been high-class both here and in Sydney, where he represented Victoria in the Interstate games. Lee Bowes and Roy Beckerleg, both returned from the Front, have considerably strengthened the team by their sound and accurate play.
