Madam Mayor and Councillors,

The Adam Lindsay Gordon Cottage has stood in the Botanical Gardens since 1934, containing a wide range of Gordon memorabilia, including a number of original items, Over those 54 years it has attracted many thousands of visitors.

The Cottage and its collection have been managed by a voluntary Committee of interested citizens. Day to day supervision of the Cottage has been carried out by successive caretakers in an almost voluntary capacity - the only monetary payment which the Committee could afford to such persons was a percentage of the admission charges. The only source of funds generated for the Committee's use has been via the entrance charge. From those funds the Committee has maintained the building, met the cost of the Gordon Memorial Horse in Sturt Street, erected the W.E. Roff memorial beside the Cottage, and provides an annual prize to South Street.

The Committee has been concerned, for some years, about the extreme vulnerability of the building (the likelihood of fire, theft and vandalism) and the rapidly deteriorating condition of the collection due to it being housed for so long in a completely uncontrolled atmosphere. Even had it been practical to correct the atmospheric conditions, cost would have been quite beyond the capacity of the Committee. It should be added that, in recent years when a fixed admission charge for adults (50¢) was imposed, attendances fell markedly.

Having regard not only to those two matters, but the advancing age of many of the Committee members, a declining interest in Gordon, and a lack of public interest (evidenced by the fact that at a Public Meeting called to consider the future of both the Cottage and the Collection, only one member of the public attended) the Committee determined that their "trusteeship" of the Collection demanded that steps had to be taken to ensure its future preservation. Originally the concept of shifting the Cottage to Sovereign Hill was explored, but this proved to be a physical impossibility. Subsequently it was decided to hand over the entire collection to two interest groups - the Ballarat Turf Club to take those items germain to their proposed Racing Museum, and the balance to the Gold Museum, Ballarat, both of which will provide the proper environment in which such a collection should be housed, and thus retaining them in Ballarat.

The collection has now been removed from the Cottage, and the Cottage vacated by the Committee.

The Committee desires to offer the Cottage to the Council for possible use by the Friends of the Botanical Gardens as a Garden interpretation/information centre and gardens craft shop. If the Council is prepared to accept the Cottage for such use, or a use similar to that, the Committee would be prepared to donate to the Council the balance of its funds to be used for maintenance of the building. After meeting some current commitments, the Committee will have an amount of approximately \$5,000 available.

It should be noted that the building, as it has stood in the Gardens since 1934, is quite a radical altered configuration to the way it previously existed behind Craig's Hotel. There is ample documentary evidence of this drastically altered appearance.

We take this opportunity to thank the Council for its assistance to the Committee over the years, particularly through its Superintendants and the present Director of the Gardens.

Regardless of the future of the Cottage, we believe that the memorial bust of Grodon, the memorial stone and plaque of W.E. Roff and the memorial seats should remain in their present locations. If the Cottage is removed, the Committee would be prepared to meet the cost of providing and installing a suitable commemorative plaque to the previous existance of the Cottage on the site.


