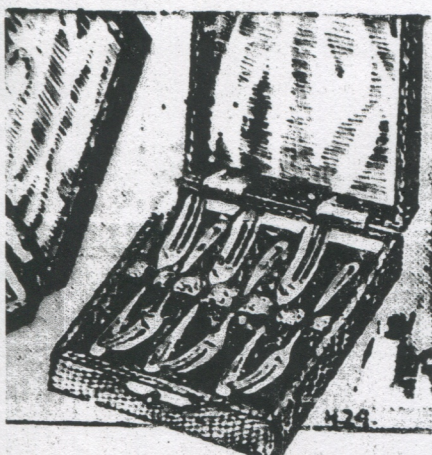

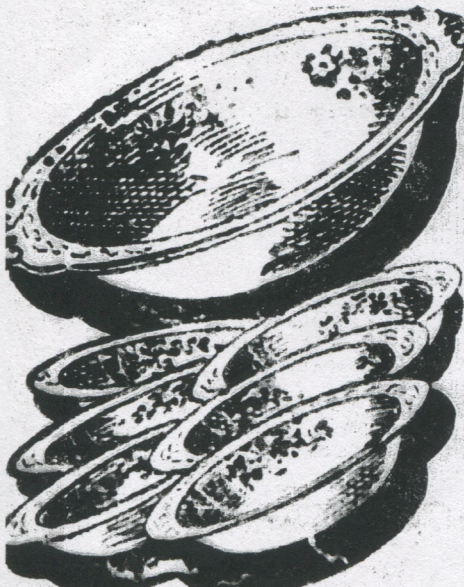

GREYHOUND COURSING.

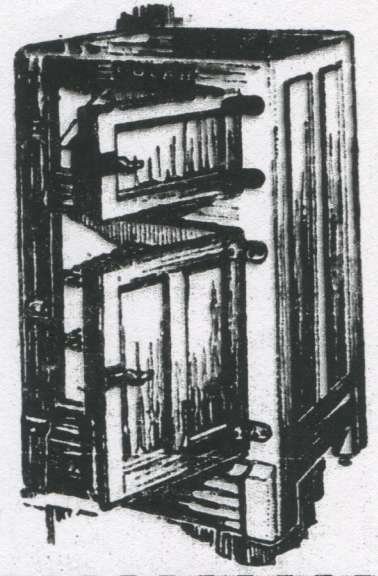
Of the 16 greyhounds that have quali-

Bendigo Ventures Firm**

The buoyancy of gold mining share
was the feature of Stock Exchange deal-
ing yesterday. Continuing their asser-
tiveness, buyers of Wattle Gully (Chev-
ton) increased their offers by 4/ to 84
without tempting holders, who widened
the breach by declaring at 89/. Centri-
Napoleon had a sharp rise of 2/ to 8/
after which dealers both ways withdrew.
An advance of 1/6 carried Deborah value
to 48/6; Ironbark South had inquiry 1
9d above Thursday's buying order, an
firmness was displayed by several other
lines. Industrials and general invest-
ments were quiet, the only incidents be-
ing support for Ballarat Brewing Co
preferences, Australian Consolidated, an
Broken Hill Pty., the latter at a slight
reactionary figure. Nine bond issues had
realisations from 1/3 to 5/ above those of
previous day.
